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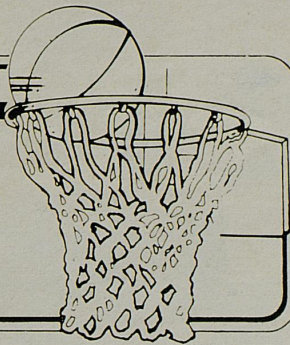

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JOHN Y. BROWN, JR.
Governor of Kentucky**



JOHN Y. BROWN, JR., became Kentucky's 59th governor on December 11, 1979, succeeding Julian M. Carroll.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law in 1960.

The Governor served in the U. S. Army from 1959-1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National

Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the Outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International named him to a recipient of the Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

He has three children, John Y. Brown, III (16), Eleanore (14) and Sandra (13). He is married to the former Phyllis George. They attend the Walnut Street Church, Louisville.

**JAMES G. AMATO
Mayor
Lexington-Fayette
Urban County Government**

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

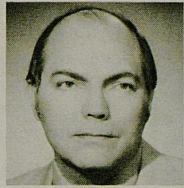
As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

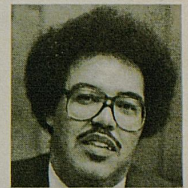

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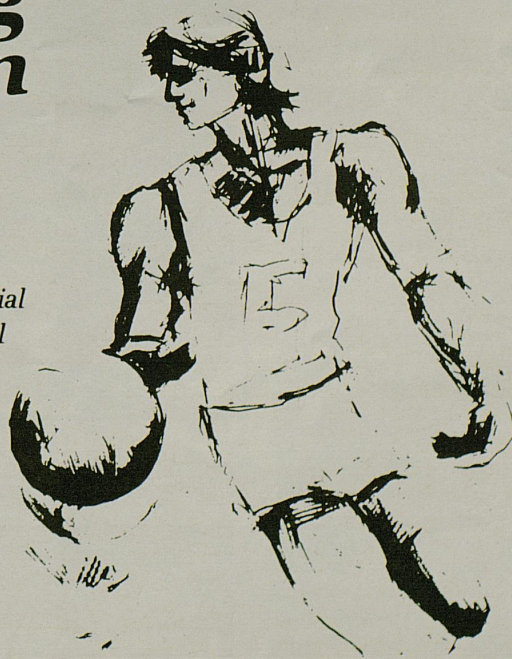

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

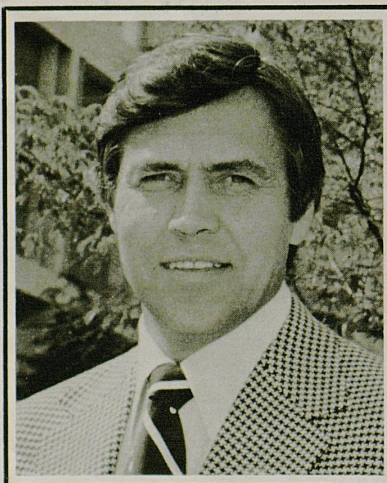
The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

FRANK HAM
Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



SUSAN FEMSTER
Assistant Director of Athletics



SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus

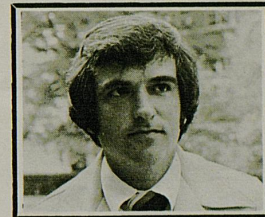
recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

LARRY IVY
Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment three years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12 losses.

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6

An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

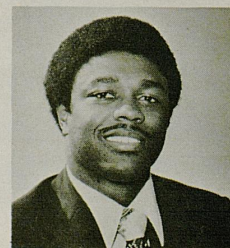


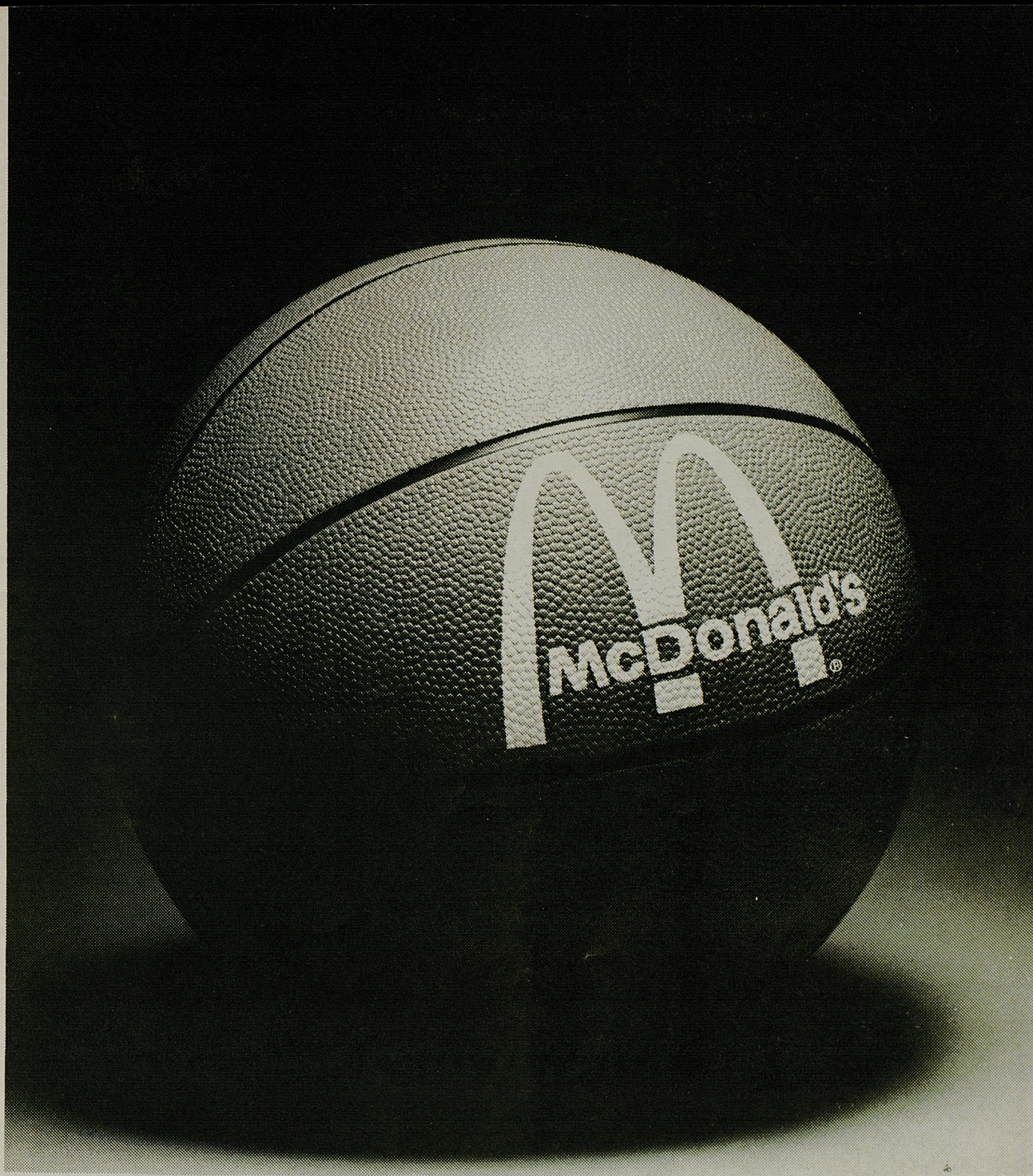

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.





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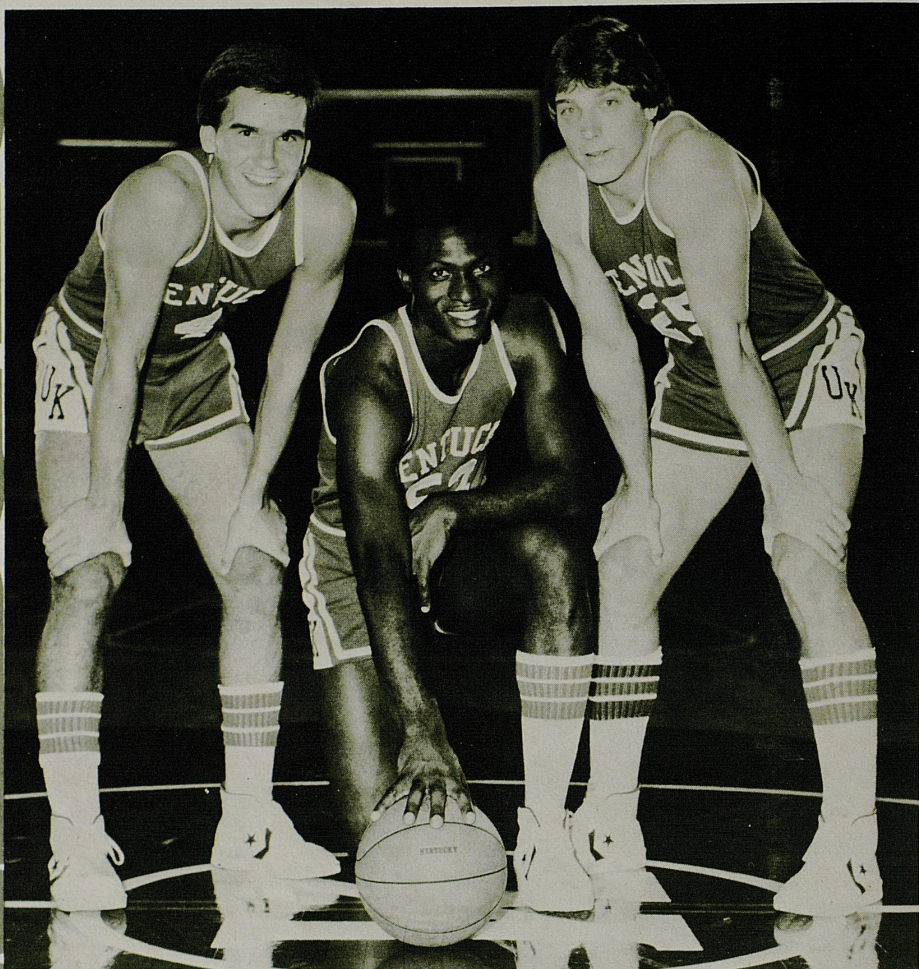

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Talented Cats Growing, Learning

Like the thoroughbred colts that bound around the pastures of Kentucky Bluegrass Region, the Kentucky Wildcats have the potential and eagerness to become champions.

Bred with a mixture of raw talent and seasoned veterans like All-American guard Kyle Macy, the Cats are learning and growing. At times this season, they have been awesome, winning by such margins as 126-81 over South Carolina and at times they have had to scratch for victories as their development had not yet matched the rigorous early schedule.

Facing a strong UKIT field, Kentucky will be trying to continue its maturation into a consistently solid team and regain the tourney's championship trophy which went to Illinois last season.

After losing to Duke in its opening tilt last month, Kentucky put together a string of six victories through last week's scrap on Kansas' homecourt.

The Wildcats have used a starting lineup of four veterans and 7-1 freshman center Sam Bowie. Waiting in the wings are more veterans and four freshmen that

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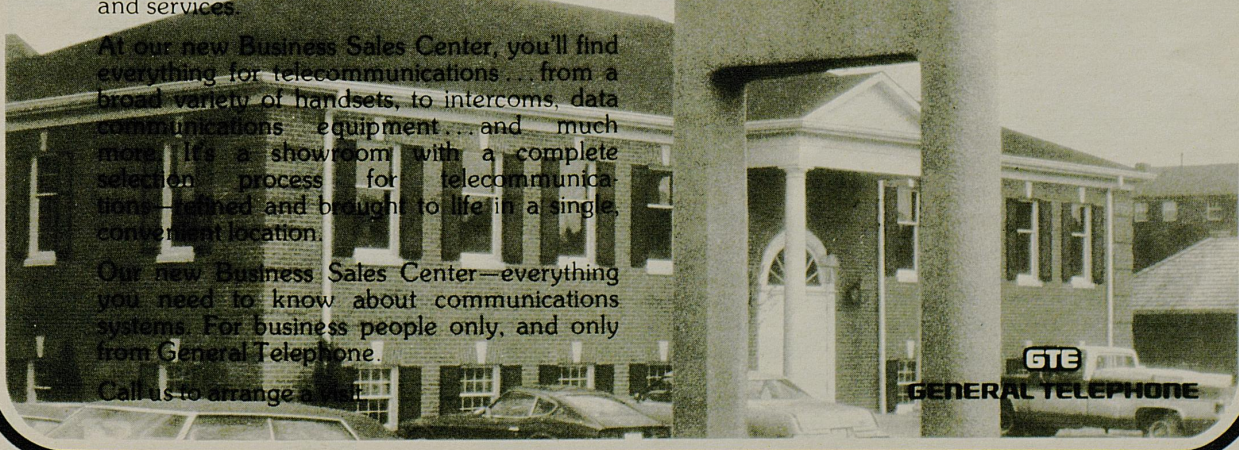

Senior guard Jay Shidler has looked like the "Bomber" of old this season, firing his high arching jumpshots from downtown and continues to pair his shooting abilities with tenacious defense.

Chuck Verderber, a 6-6 sophomore forward, continues his intelligent scrappy play in a substitute's role while veteran guards Chris Gettelfinger and Bo Lanter round out the upper classmen.

Joining Bowie in the freshman class are Tom Heitz, a 6-8 forward, Derrick Hord, a 6-6 forward, Dirk Minniefield, a 6-3 guard, and Charles Hurt, a 6-6 forward.

Together, the team has prompted comments from opposing coaches such as they could become the best college team ever, but Coach Hall realizes that numerous college teams are multi-talented and is quick to remind Cat fans that his squad is young and needs to gain experience.

Growing into a skilled unit, the Wildcats have brought an even more feverish excitement than usual to the Bluegrass. Couple that excitement with a great deal of personal popularity and the Cats are creating a fun, exciting year of Kentucky basketball.

Cal Prospects Brighter

As California head coach Dick Kuchen and his staff plan for the 1979-80 basketball season, prospects certainly have to be brighter than they were a year ago. Last season, the Golden Bears won only six games, with 21 losses, for first year Coach Kuchen, and started a lineup which included a front line of 6-7, 6-6 and 6-3.

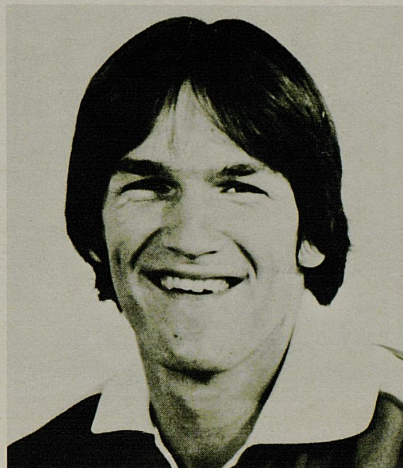
This years California team promises to be much better. Of the 15 man squad produced at UC, seven of these players are freshmen. "We had an excellent recruiting year, and I think the young players in our program are going to develop," commented Kuchen, "but it's going to take them time. I don't think anybody should be so short-sighted as to not take a good hard look at the other players in our program."

Having not compiled a record to brag about since the 1959-60 season, in which the Golden Bears finished second in the NCAA, Kuchen will depend on the leadership of Doug True and Kevin Singleton, to bring his California team from a tenth-place finish in last season's PAC-10.

True, a 6-8 forward, is entering his fourth year as a starter for the Golden Bears. Last year, he averaged 9.3 ppg. and 7.3 rebounds. Singleton was the only double-figure scorer for California last year, averaging 16.1 points. His 5.7 rebound average ranked him second to

True.

According to Coach Kuchen, "Doug will be a factor as an excellent frontline basketball player for us, without any question. Singleton really developed during the course of last season and he's been working hard on his game this

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summer. He can be an outstanding player in this league."

Other returnees which hope to bring success to this season's Cal team are Walt Gillespie, a 6-3 guard, converted to forward, 5-9 guard, Phil Wilhite and Kevin Sparks. Gillespie averaged 7.4 ppg. last year in 26 games. Off the bench, Wilhite averaged 2.0 ppg. As a freshman during the 1978-79 campaign, Sparks started all 27 of the Golden Bear games and scored at a 7.6 clip.

"Guys like Walt Gillespie and Kevin Sparks will find their roles and they will make contributions, as starters or coming off the bench. Mel Holland was the most improved player on our team last year and he's just started to scratch the surface of his abilities as a player," states Kuchen. "Down the road, he's going to be a very big factor if he continues to work and improve." Holland played in 24 games as a freshman and tallied 3.8 ppg., including a season high 11 points vs. Oregon.

To help in the small front line that started last season, the Bears will have to rely on freshmen. Of the seven signees, Kuchen got 6-7 Darrell Haley, 6-11 Michael Pitts and a pair of 6-9 men in Reid Poole and John Ritchie.

Pitts averaged 28.1 points as a senior in high school and hauled down an average of 16.9 rebounds. Also capable

of playing the forward position, Pitts is the most publicized player to enter UC since Phil Chenier.

Haley averaged 14.0 points last year, while Poole tallied 27.7 and Ritchie, 18.5.

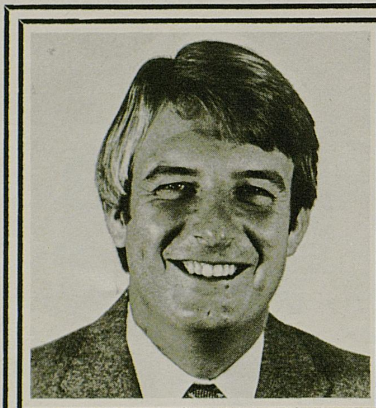
"Whatever we do this season will provide a base for the future. Our freshmen this season will have three more years, and we don't have any juniors," Kuchen says.

So what does the second year Golden

Bear coach predict?

"If we can be effective defensively and on the boards, then we can compete with anybody in the country and it's important that our younger players realize this."

Hoping to improve on last season's miserable performance, the Golden Bears may see a small turnaround, but not one which will bring them a PAC-10 Championship.



DICK KUCHEN
Head Coach

Dick Kuchen became only the 11th coach of the University of California last season, and compiled a 6-21 record. Kuchen came to Cal in 1978 from Notre Dame, where he served as an assistant to Digger Phelps, and brought with him a fine blend of youthful enthusiasm and energy, along with excellent knowledge of the game.

Known as a major factor in the Irish's recruiting, Kuchen brought in such players as Bill Laimbeer, Bruce Flowers and Kelly Tripuka to Notre Dame.

As a collegian, Kuchen played center at Rider College, where he established many career rebounding records and scored over 1,000 points in his career. A native of Ashbury Park, N. J., Kuchen and his wife, Georgia, live in Berkeley.

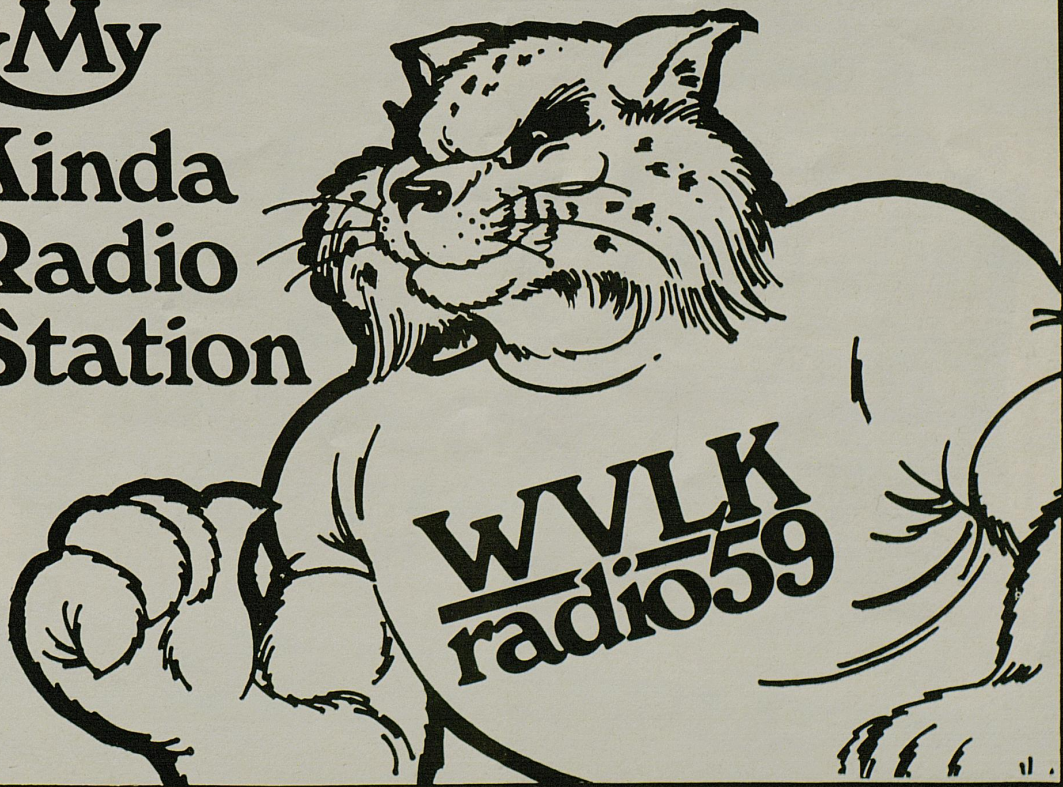

Big Ten Tri-Champ Returns 4 Starters

Purdue's Big Ten basketball tri-championship (shared with Iowa and NCAA champion Michigan State) last season was accomplished in head coach Lee Rose's first season at the Boilermaker helm.

"Four returning starters (center Joe Barry Carroll, forwards Arnette Hallman and Drake Morris, and guard Brian Walker), means nothing," Rose warns. "Basketball today is played with eight, nine, and even 10 players. We have a long way to go to be in a position where 10 players can contribute game in and game out!"

"Our depth is very inexperienced; we drop off considerably after our first four players. At this time, it appears Joe Barry Carroll will have to shoulder most of the offensive responsibility, but one player can't carry a team through a 27-game schedule."

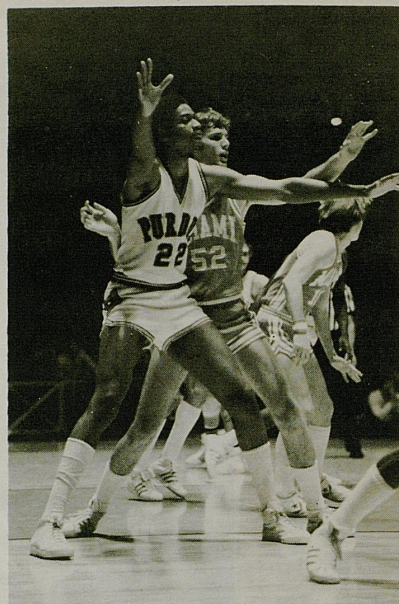
Before worrying about his bench strength, Rose first must find a replace-

ment for Jerry Sichting, the feisty sharpshooter whose ability made him a fixture in Purdue's backcourt the past two seasons. In the eyes of a coach, he was Purdue's glue; in the eyes of the fans, he was one of their all-time favorite Boilermakers.

"I have to believe it will be impossible to immediately replace a scoring guard like Jerry Sichting," Rose admits. "A player who can average 14 points a game in the Big Ten (13.6 overall and 13.8 in Big Ten play to be exact) is not easy to come by."

However, despite Rose's concerns, Carroll just may be one of the nation's finest pivotman this year as a senior, and a good 7-1 center can remedy a lot of ills.

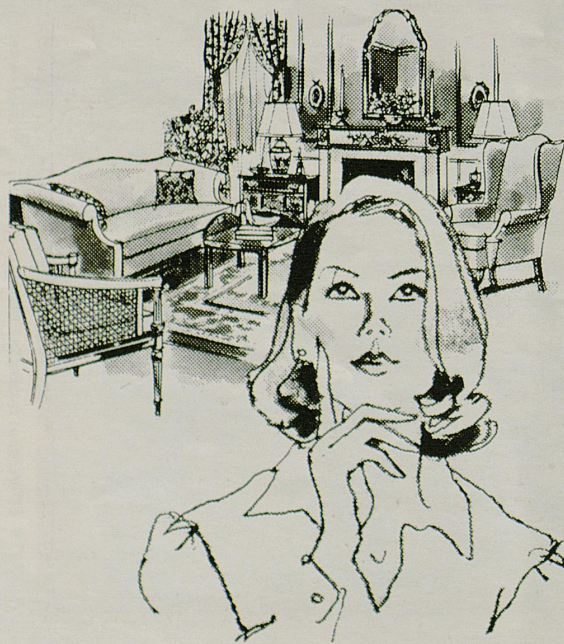
The Denver native's list of accomplishments is as long as his 85-inch frame: Big Ten's leading scorer as a junior (429 points or 23.8 per league outing); Purdue's all-time single-season rebounder

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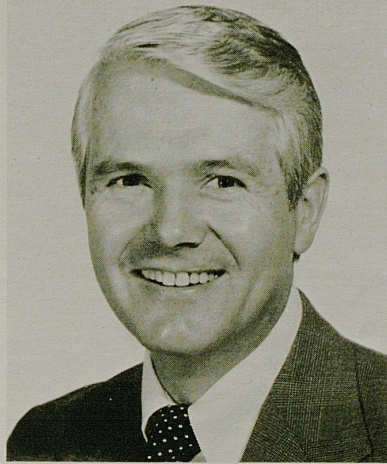

Basketball Tourney in April of 1978; and center on Rose's U.S. squad in last summer's Spartakiade Games in the Soviet Union.

Those aren't bad credentials for a young man who didn't start playing basketball until his junior year in high school.

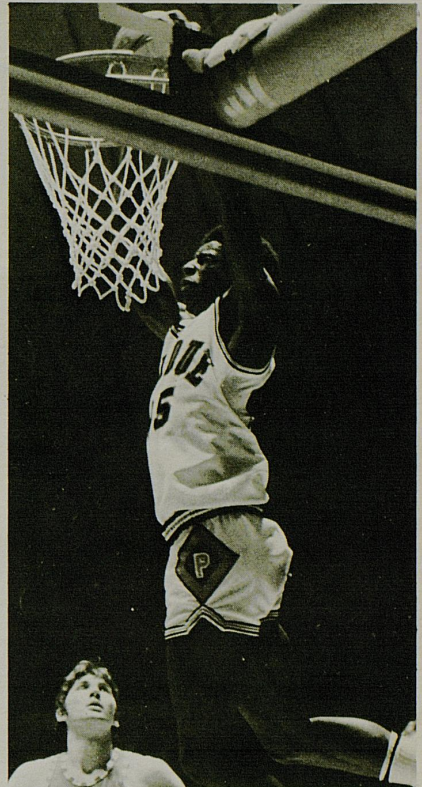

Lee Rose is the forty-three-year-old basketball coach from Lexington, Ken-

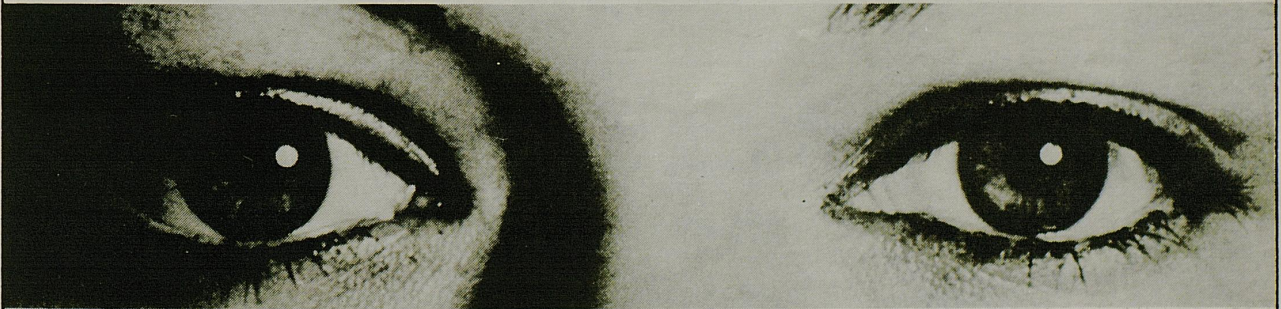
tucky and that city's Transylvania College who put the University of North Carolina-Charlotte (UNCC) on the college basketball map in his three seasons there and brought Purdue totally unexpected success in his first year at the Boilmaker helm.

Individually, his teams at Transylvania, UNCC, and Purdue have earned single-season honor after honor; collectively, they've handed him a glittering 259-83 composite record, a winning percentage of .757, and a reputation as one of the best in the business. At Transylvania, Rose's career began as a player under current Alabama head coach and close personal friend C. M. Newton. In eight seasons there as head coach (and athletic director the last seven), Rose's Pioneers appeared in either the NCAA Division II, Division III, or NAIA post-season tournaments six times.



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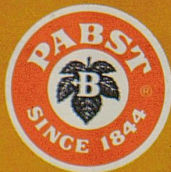

Christmas With the Cats

After the final buzzer sounds to end the championship game of the UKIT, a Big Blue fan will be hard pressed to find a Kentucky Wildcat basketball player. The final buzzer marks the end of the tournament and the beginning of a short, well deserved holiday break.

The team's members, some of whom have had their flight reservations since November, will scatter across Kentucky and the nation to their homes to spend Christmas with their families.

However, the Christmas season is not one of total relaxation for the players as Dwane Casey, the graduate assistant coach of this year's team and a former player, recalls, "Unfortunately basketball runs right through the holidays and you can't lay down and relax because there are always a lot of big games during December."

The players return to Lexington either on Christmas Day or the day following and go right back to work, preparing for

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the Notre Dame game that will be played the following Saturday and for the beginning of the SEC schedule.

Before Christmas, the players are occupied with final exams and find it difficult to have time to practice. On some occasions, the team has gone into the UKIT with almost no preparation.

The day of the opening games of the UKIT is usually the first chance the players have had to do any Christmas shopping before going home but are discouraged from doing so by the coaches since shopping would take the life out of their legs.

Some of the Cats' biggest games occur during the holiday season.

Some of the players who are involved in the Big Brothers program find time during the holidays to bring their Little Brothers to the lodge to meet the team and other activities. Jack Givens and James Lee, seniors on the 1978 team, were among the players who went out of their way to bring Christmas cheer to their Little Brothers. Casey also has been involved in the program, having unofficially taken up where former player Larry Johnson left off when he graduated.

Other players visit children's homes and hospitals to bring cheer to their young fans.

When the players return on Christmas Day, Coach Joe B. Hall's wife invites them to their home for a small party following what is usually a 9 p.m. practice on the day that they return. She presents each with gag gifts and lots of good food and friendliness. "She always made us feel right at home," recalls Casey.

Before Christmas, the players have a small dinner party and decorate the Lodge for the holidays. Again Mrs. Hall and some of the wives of the team's closest supporters provide the favor. Last year, it was a chili supper after the Kansas victory following which the team decorated two trees, hung stockings and other Yuletide decorations.

The last week of December sees the team living on a campus void of students except for the Lady Kats team which is also practicing. There are two-a-day workouts and on New Year's weekend, its off to Louisville for the annual battle with the Irish. January sees the start of the busy SEC schedule.

So, with the exception of about four days at home, the holiday season is an unannounced gift to Kentucky fans. It is a gift of labor from a team that feels a responsibility to do what it takes to maintain the proud tradition of Kentucky basketball.

SMU returns four of five starters and eight of 10 lettermen from last year's 11-16 team and the returning experience and a solid recruiting year should give the Mustangs a much improved team in 1979-80.

The two top returnees are all-Southwest Conference forward 6-10 Brad Branson and SWC assist leader Billy Allen. They should be two of the top players in the conference this season.

Reggie Franklin, SMU's 6-4 center the past two years, is SMU's only loss among the top 10 scorers. Other Mustang returnees, include guard Phil Hale, forward Richard Harris, forward Gordon Welch, center Johnny James, guard Keith Beverly, guard Mark Davis, and guard Joey Ceravolo.

Newcomers will play an important part in the success of the 1979-80 SMU team. Of five newcomers, three are junior college transfers, who should contend immediately for starting jobs. The Mustang signees, include 6-2 guard Dave Piehler from Newton, Kan.; 6-3 wingman Ollie Hoops, from Richland JC; 6-9 center Mark Hollman from Edison JC (Fla.); 6-7 forward Dwight Freeman from Hutchinson JC (Kan.), and 6-11 center Terry Lynn Domino from Ellsworth, S.D.


The Mustangs were 11-16 in 1978-'79 and 6-10 in SWC play for a sixth place tie. SMU lost to Houston in first round

SWC playoff game and did not advance to the SWC Finals in Houston.

Injuries and illness to both Branson and Allen in the middle of the season hurt the Mustangs. Point guard Allen was bothered by flu, pneumonia, and various injuries and never fully recovered after the first few conference games of the season. His loss particularly affected SMU's play as the team lost 10 of its final 14 games after Allen's ailments.

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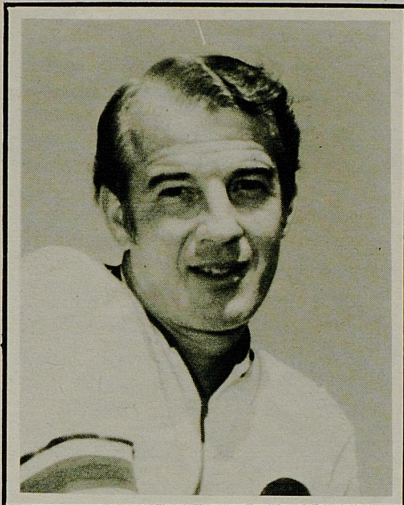

Sonny Allen, a man who has played for the highest scoring team in the nation, has coached a national championship team, has been named Coach of the Year five times, and has compiled win-

ning seasons in 10 of his last 14 years, is in his 21st year of coaching in 1979-80 and his fifth year as SMU's basketball coach.

Allen began his coaching career as the Marshall University freshman coach in 1959. Since that time he has compiled a 305-189 record.

Allen has been a collegiate head coach for 14 years and his record stands at 226-158. Before coming to SMU he guided Old Dominion to a NCAA Division II national championship in 1975. During his stay at the Norfolk, Va. school, Allen's team compiled a 181-94 record and reached the national finals twice. Among his coaching accomplishments after two decades of coaching, includes being named Coach of the Year five times in his district, and once nationally. He was named UPI's Coach of the Year in the Southwest Conference after his first year at SMU when the Mustangs were 16-12. That same year SMU was named most improved team in the national by Basketball Weekly.



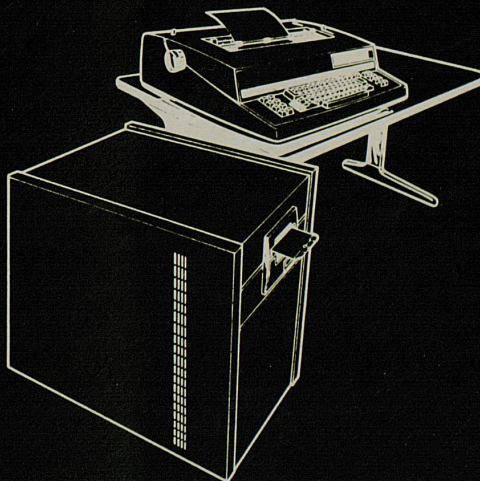

The 1978-79 Kentucky Invitational Tournament saw the Wildcats lose their Christmas tournament for only the eighth time in 26 tries. In the opening round, Texas A&M defeated UK 73-49, but the Cats rebounded the following night for a 94-87 win over the Syracuse Orangemen.

Illinois won the championship 71-57 over A&M and joined West Virginia as the only two-time winner of the UKIT. This tournament was regarded as one of the toughest in past years as all four participants were ranked in the Top 20.

Against the Aggies, Kyle Macy led Kentucky in scoring with 15 points and Freddie Cowan hauled in nine rebounds. Chuck Aleksinas' 20 points and seven rebounds sparked the Cats in the consolation game the following night. Macy also



handed out seven and six assists respectively.

The Orangemen's Dale Shackelford led the tournament scoring 40 points.

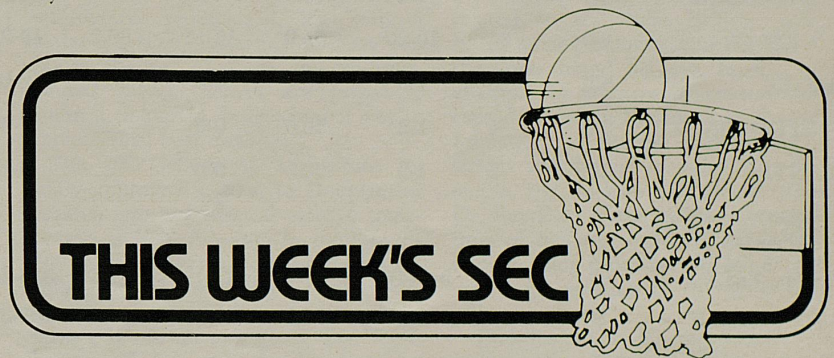

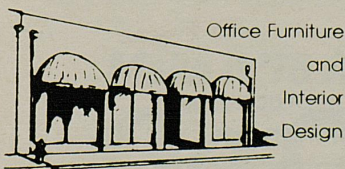

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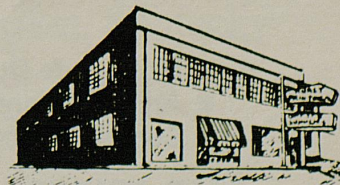

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UK Produces 'Super Cows'
Embryo transplant makes supercows out of some superior milk cows like this registered Holstein on the UK Coldstream Farm. Her friends, from left, are UK scientists Durward Olds, Robert Douglas and George Heersche, Jr.

Supercows produce an unusually large quantity of milk, and this is what makes them super. And University of Kentucky reproductive physiologists want to increase their number through embryo transfer (ET).

With techniques pioneered at UK, superior dairy cows, whose reproductive life averages three to four calves, may now produce dozens of superior calves in a single year.

It's a simple concept: The superior cow is drug-induced to "superovulate" (produce more than her usual single egg). Through artificial insemination, the egg is fertilized by a superior bull (one that grows faster than the average). The resulting embryos are removed—surgically or non-surgically by using a catheter—from the cow and implanted one by one in ordinary host cows who some 280 days later (if all goes well) each give birth to a superior calf.

To Dr. Robert M. Douglas, UK assist-

ant professor of veterinary science and a reproductive physiologist, it's "only a matter of time" before cattlemen can choose the sex of these embryo-transplanted calves (heifers are prized if you're a dairyman, bull calves if you're a commercial beef cattleman).

The UK College of Agriculture recently approved a grant to Douglas for research into non-surgical embryo transfer and embryo freezing. In large herds (200 to 400 cows) it's easy to find a recipient animal for embryo transfer because five percent of the population is in estrus ("heat") on any given day; for a farmer with few cows, it's handy to induce estrus with drugs or to find a way to freeze embryos until a recipient animal is ready for implanting.

Douglas sees great promise in working with blastomeres—the cells which compose a fertilized ovum. The stage in division of the fertilized ovum at which the cells become differentiated and ready

to form an embryo is a bit uncertain but may be at 4 to 8-cell stages.

It might be possible, Douglas believes, to separate blastomeres, culture them through several more divisions and then implant an almost unlimited number of embryos with identical characteristics into an almost unlimited number of host cows.

He sees a future in which twin calves can be produced on demand, and the sex of the calves chosen.

He sees a day when embryos can be frozen as readily as semen now is. ("Some animal individuals freeze better than others," he says. "We don't yet know why.")

While thus far the cattle industry has most successfully used embryo transfer, Douglas cites limited use among breeders of swine, sheep, goats, and dogs—and horses.

Inevitably Douglas is asked how ET is related to test tube babies, multiple births among humans, and the like. "It's the same thing," he says. In fact, many attempts to improve or control human reproduction are the result of shared information and mutual work among physicians and animal scientists. (As an example, the work of UK animal scientist Dr. Ray Dutt in the 1940s to control the time of lambing by deferring ovulation in ewes using progesterone, led over time and more research to the birth control pill.)

Douglas credits UK reproductive physiologist Dr. Durward Olds with performing a great feat: the first non-surgical embryo transfer in dairy cows in 1964. Since then, Douglas says, most progress has come at the hands of commercial breeders rather than academic researchers.

Douglas and Dr. George Heersche Jr., UK extension dairy specialist, offer ad-

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vice and aid to farmers who want to explore ET. "Mostly," says Heersche, "we put people in contact with others who've done it."

Heersche gives information on how ET works and points the interested to commercial ET firms in this area.

ET has been used with horses; the quarter horse breeders have endorsed it, within careful guidelines. Other breeders, if they accept ET at all, will use it "therapeutically." That is, an aged Thoroughbred mare of very high quality, or one once fertile but now barren 2 to 3 years, can "donate" an embryo which may then be brought to successful term in a lesser mare.

No horse breeder need fear a market glutted with sons and daughters of famous mares. For one thing, multiple embryo transplant won't work with equines, says Douglas, "because its physiologically impossible at the present time to superovulate horses."

And when horse embryos are transplanted, the "take" rate appears to be

only 20 percent as opposed to some 60 percent in cows.

ET seems to be most valuable in the dairy industry which is big—and growing—in Kentucky. Demand for the offspring of a superior dairy cow can justify the up to \$2,000 it costs to breed her via ET.

For ordinary animals, it's pointless, UK scientists agree.

Heersche says some purebred dairy-men have serious reservations about ET; They're concerned lest ET flood the market with genetically superior cows at the

same time making less valuable the animals they have been breeding.

On the other hand Heersche finds many purebred breeders interested in "cow families" out of "supercows" very enthusiastic at the prospect of doing in a few years what it would otherwise take a lifetime to accomplish.

"A breeder can get a lot of daughters out of his supercow, and have those daughters in the milking string within three years," says Heersche. "That's very exciting."

Dairyman C. E. Gibson of Paris says ET is "here to stay" despite "a few reservations" about it. He says that ET would not be feasible for a cow unless her female calves would be of exceptional value.

Gibson reports an average of 4 to 5 live calves from each superovulation-embryo transfer attempt. After two years with ET ("First off, I was skeptical.") he now plans to disperse his present herd and a base new one entirely upon ET, starting with "foundation registered Holsteins."

He's sought advice of UK specialists from time to time.

The longest perspective on ET is perhaps that of Dr. Olds, a senior professor of animal science at UK. "We are still sort of limited in the number of eggs we can transfer," he says, and thus ET at its best cannot compare in efficiency with artificial insemination, established now for 40 years in the cattle industry.

Olds sees the work with blastomeres, (cells of the developing embryo), their separation, culture and transfer as holding more promise as a means of improving dairy herds in Kentucky and the world.

He's not sure that an unlimited number of identical offspring is necessarily a good thing, at least right now.

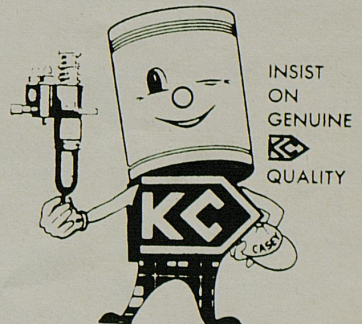

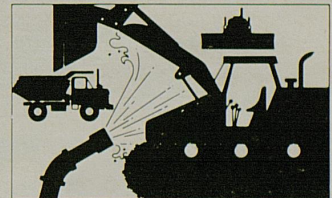

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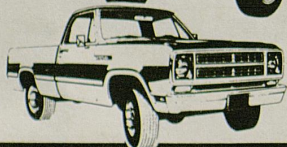

SIGNS

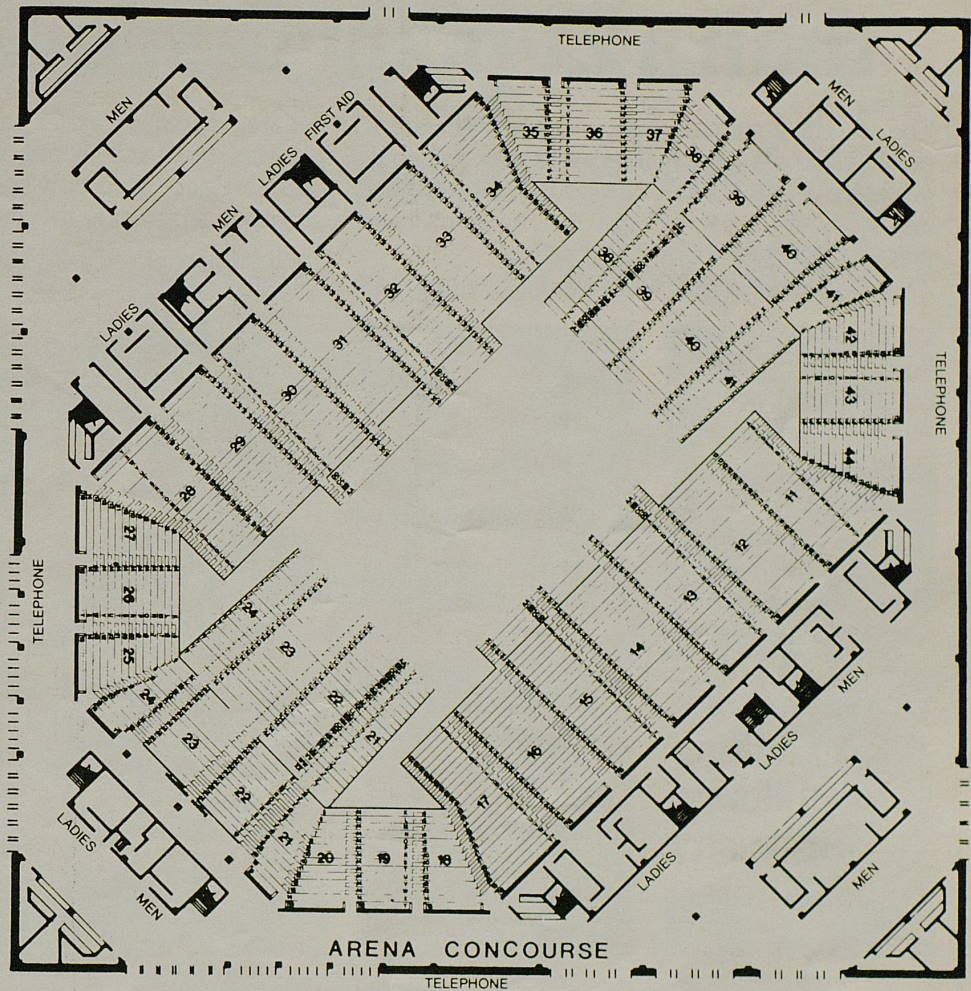
Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

UK Student Code Of Sportsmanship

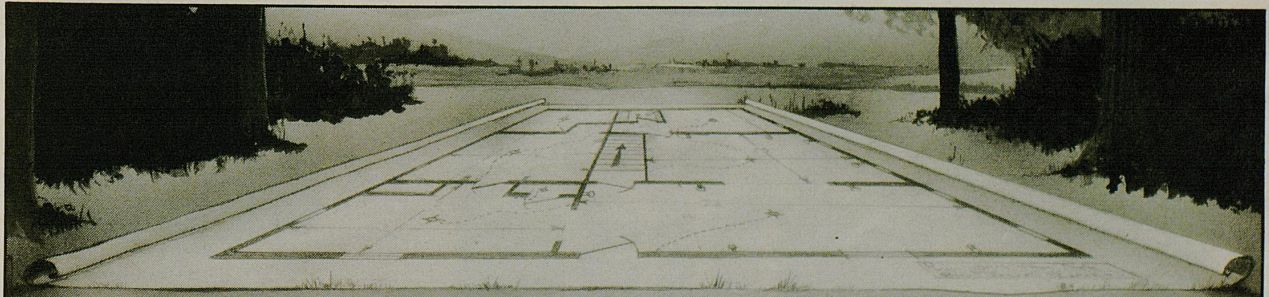
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- (1) Winning or losing, an athletic team of the University of Kentucky will have our continued and wholehearted support.

- (6) We call upon all who join us in the support of the University of Kentucky athletic teams to join us likewise in support of this code.

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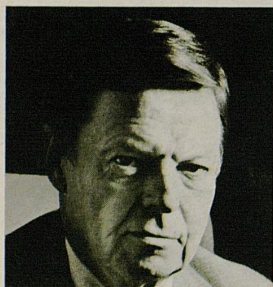
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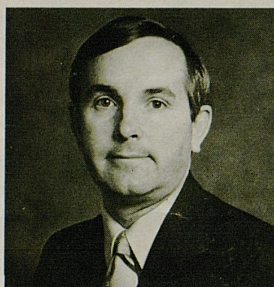
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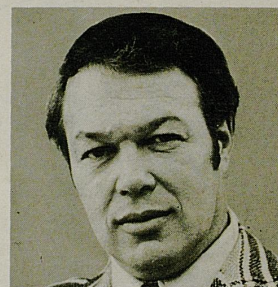
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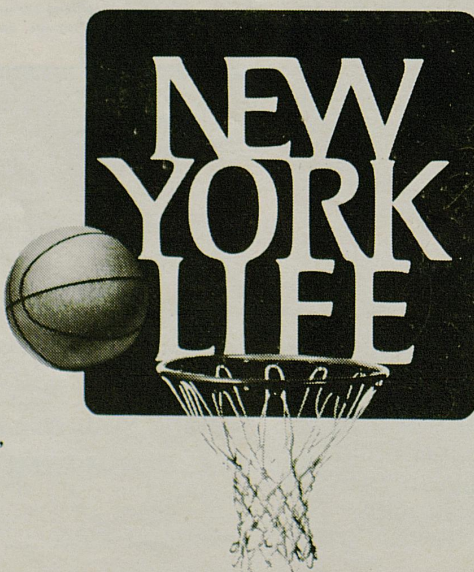
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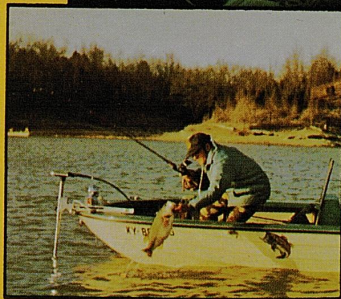
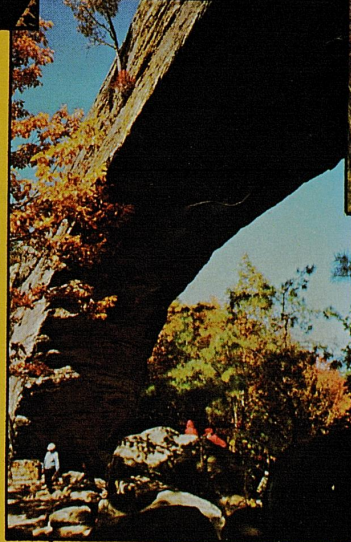
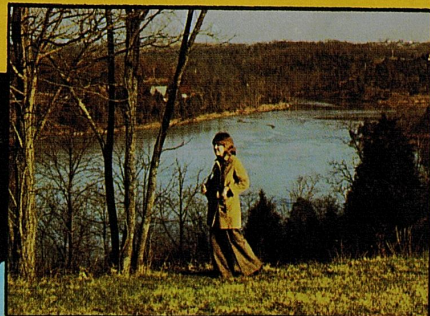
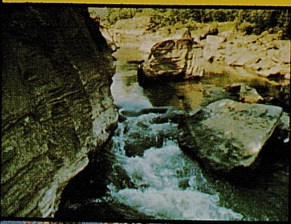
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
