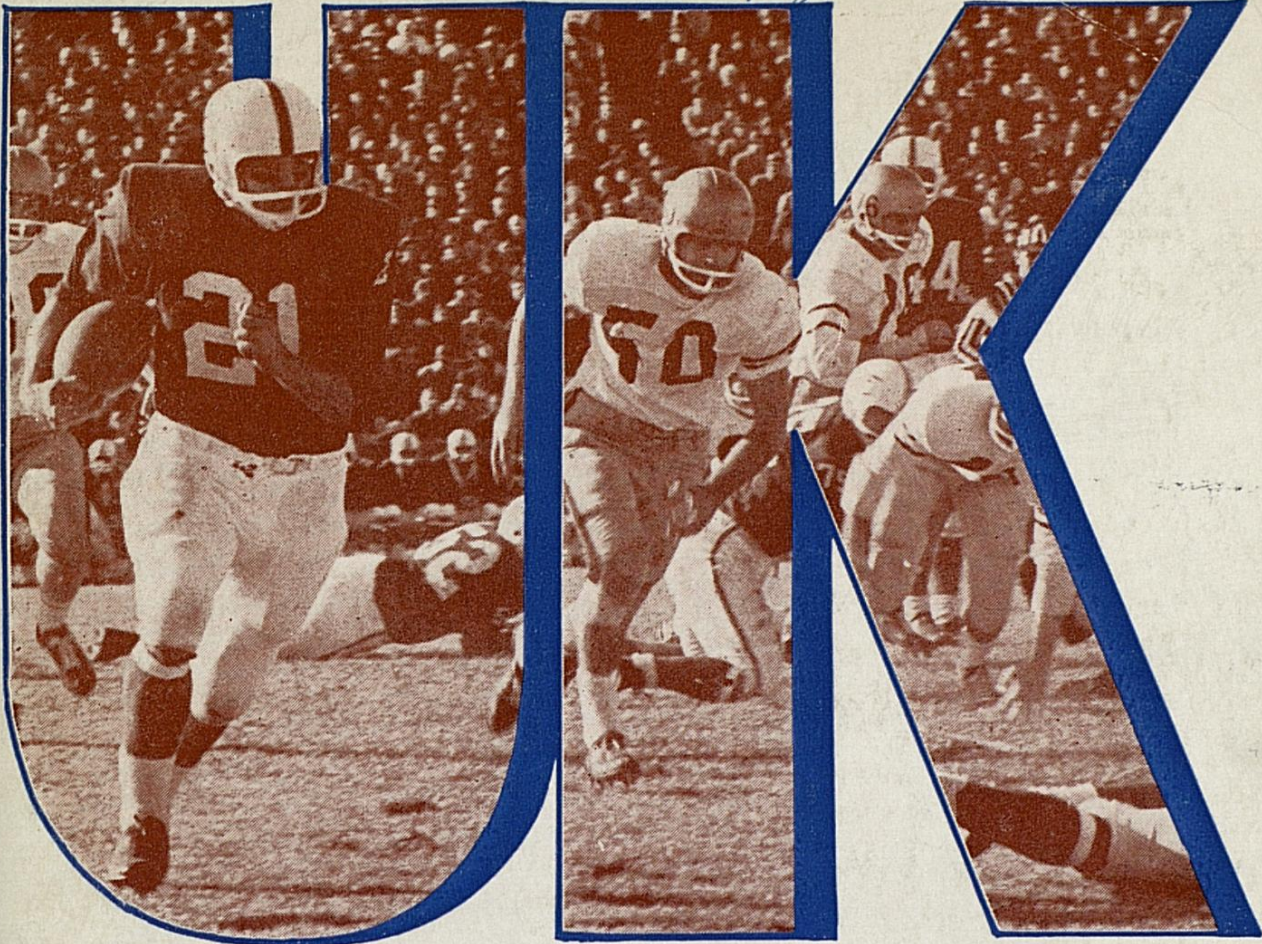

## TO THE PRESS AND RADIO

Here is your copy of the 1960 Kentucky Wildcats Football Brochure which we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U. of K. football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Publicity Office.

### Information

**WORKING TICKETS**—Address requests to Sports Publicity Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information Window in Memorial Coliseum, directly across the street from the stadium.

**COMPS**—No individual game allotment.

**WESTERN UNION**—Advise if you intend to file from press box so that you may be assigned a seat adjacent to your Western Union operator. It is also advisable to notify the Commercial Manager of Western Union in Lexington.

**RADIO**—Apply directly to Radio Director, University of Kentucky, McVey Hall, Lexington, supplying information regarding proposed sponsors and any network arrangement. Booth assignment will be made and working tickets issued by Sports Publicity Office upon receipt of approved permit from Radio Director. Spotters are available if requested well in advance. Stations should order lines installed by contacting Commercial Department, General Telephone Co., 151 Walnut St., Lexington. Rights to home games in areas outside State of Kentucky and state of visiting team assigned to G. H. Johnston, Inc., New York, N. Y.

**TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES**—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used. An agreement to this effect must be executed before permission will be granted. Application should be made to the University Radio Director and forms many be signed for the entire season. On request, the University will provide accredited newsreel agencies or TV stations-networks with a 200-foot newsclip of game highlights (processed 16 mm black and white film) at actual cost of six cents a foot.

## ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in nine different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A Board of Directors, headed by UK President Frank Dickey, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. Dr. Leo Chamberlain, vice-president of the University, has general supervision over the Department and serves as vice-chairman of the Board. Dr. A. D. Kirwan, one-time Wildcat coach and UK's faculty representative to the Southeastern Conference, serves the directors as secretary and Dr. Frank Peterson, UK vice-president for business administration, acts as treasurer in an ex-officio capacity.

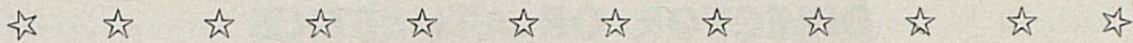

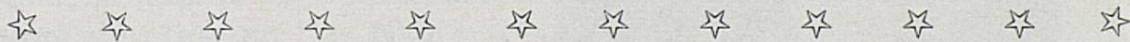

## HONORS COME LATELY

From its football beginnings in 1881 through 1942, Kentucky had only one player named to a recognized All-America team. In the short span of years since, no less than seven have earned first team mention on the national honor rolls and four of the stars were repeaters. Sixteen Wildcats have received All-Conference recognition since the loop was organized in 1933.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

### BERNIE A. SHIVELY

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is the Herculean task being carried out successfully by Bernie A. Shively.

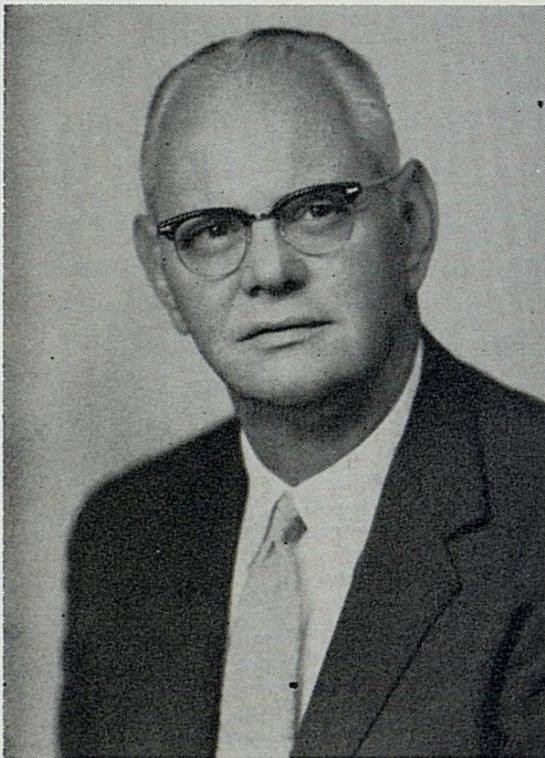
Few who have observed the untiring efforts of the tall, silver-haired former All-America footballer in the service of the University of Kentucky since 1927 and as Director of Athletics since 1938 will argue his fitness as an athletic Hercules. Not only has Shively guided the de-

velopment of Kentucky as a nationally-respected power in major sports, but he has also gained personal prestige through a fair-minded approach to many problems.

During his tenure as Athletic Director, Shively has directly supervised major expansions in Kentucky's athletic plant resulting from the progression of the school's football and basketball teams to greater national prominence and increased patronage by the sports-minded public.

The seating capacity of Kentucky's football stadium, McLean Stadium on Stoll Field, has been doubled to bring the current number of seats to approximately 37,500 and on par with most other schools located in heavier-populated areas. Powerful lighting equipment also was installed during the 1948-49 construction

to bring night football into new popularity. Partly to satisfy the overwhelming number of basketball devotees, who could not squeeze into the 2,800-seat Alumni Gymnasium, a long-planned Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950. Seating 11,500 persons for cage contests, the four-million dollar Coliseum also houses the Athletic Department.





More recently, Shively directed the acquisition of a pair of modern, ranch-style living units which have served as the home of the football team since 1954. "Wildcat Manor" and "Kitten Lodge" replace three frame houses which the gridgers had occupied since 1949.

A large dressing room building and football practice field, used since 1955, was abandoned in 1959 to make way for a huge new men's dorm. Under Shively's supervision, a spacious new Sports Center was prepared a short distance away on the University farm to take even better care of the footballers and spring sports teams. The Sports Center is generally regarded as one of the finest sports facilities in the nation.

### **All-America Guard At Illinois**

A native of Paris, Ill., Shively attended the University of Illinois where he was an All-America guard in 1926 on the same grid team made famous by Red Grange. Demonstrating a claim to being one of the finest all-around athletes in Illinois' history, "Shive" also laid claim to the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling championship and annexed letters in track before graduating in 1927.

Shively came to Kentucky in 1927 as line coach of football under Harry Gammage and six years later was named head of the UK Physical Education Department. He succeeded Chet Wynne as Athletic Director in 1938. During this period and the years following, he also served as track and baseball coach for several seasons and continued to assist the football staff as line coach until 1944. The next year, 1945, he assumed full charge of the grid squad for one season before turning the job over to mentor Paul (Bear) Bryant in 1946.

The Kentucky Athletic Director served as chairman of the Southeastern Conference basketball committee for a number of years and for the past seven years has been president of the SEC Coaches and Athletic Directors Association. Currently, he is the new chairman of the NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and of the NCAA Summer Baseball Committee. He also has been active in numerous state and civic organizations and projects, including present direction of the county recreation board. For several years he was Supervisor of Officials for the Ohio Valley Conference.

Shively and his wife, Ruth, have two children. Doug was a star end on the UK grid team for three years ending in 1958 and is now coaching at VPI while daughter Suzanne was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of UK in 1957.

## **BLANTON COLLIER**

### **Head Football Coach**

**(Six Years — Won 31, Lost 27, Tied 2)**

A quiet-mannered native Kentuckian who is widely regarded at all levels of the game as one of football's most brilliant tacticians and finest gentlemen, Blanton Long Collier is a man of unique background and the personification of a patient, thorough teacher.

With only six years in the collegiate coaching ranks behind him, the popular Wildcat mentor might be considered a novice to the uninformed. But to his fellow mentors throughout the country, who know the facts of his background and football philosophy, he is held in the highest respect and already has been accorded "Coach of the Year" honor (1954) in the nation's toughest football league—the Southeastern Conference.

A great many experts feel that Kentucky is fortunate to have the services of one of the keenest minds in the grid sport who needs only a few more "tools of the trade" (outstanding players) to boost the Wildcats to the top. Although his first six Kentucky elevens have not reached the Southeastern Conference throne room or taken part in a bowl, both University officials and the "Man In The Street" are solidly behind Collier and the program he directs with hard-working efficiency. Illustrative of this confidence is the new contract that the coach was awarded following the 1958 campaign, extending his services to Feb. 1, 1965.

When he gave up the security of a position as backfield coach of the Cleveland Browns to take over at his home-state university in 1954, he fulfilled a life-long ambition and climaxed a unique rise in the coaching game. He became a college coach for the first time after nearly a quarter-century in the profession of tutoring football.

Born in Millersburg, Ky., July 2, 1906, and brought up in Paris, Ky., only 17 miles from the University campus, Collier began his athletic career at Paris High School by playing both football and basketball. Later at Georgetown College, he lettered in both sports. Although not an outstanding gridder because of his lack of size (he weighed only 125 pounds then), he nevertheless was regarded as a close student of the game and, upon graduation in 1927, was named coach of all sports at Paris High.

He held this position until he entered the Navy in 1943. During 16 years in the schoolboy coaching ranks, his teams won or shared two Central Kentucky Conference football titles and six basketball cham-

pionships. His last high school grid team (1943) ranked as unofficial state champions. Also during this period he took postgraduate work at the University of Kentucky and received a master's degree in educational administration in 1942.

It was while he was stationed at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station during his Navy tour that Collier and Paul Brown discovered each other. Brown, a lieutenant and head coach of the Great Lakes football team, became impressed with Yoeman Collier's football knowledge and added him to the staff as an assistant coach. The following year (1946) when the Cleveland Browns were organized with Brown as head coach, Collier made the unique jump from high school ranks (via service ball) to the pros by going along as backfield coach.

During eight seasons with the perennial world champion Browns, Collier made a reputation that stamped him as a great teacher of football—determined but quietly patient. His special function as number one aide to Brown was pass defense and the club consistently ranked tops in the league in this department.

#### Enters College Ranks In 1954 As UK Coach

When the Kentucky job became available in 1954 with the transfer of Paul Bryant to Texas A & M, Collier was lured into collegiate ranks for the first time in nearly a quarter-century of coaching experience.

Given a three-year contract, Collier launched an immediate attack based on his version of the Split T offense and spiced with a generous helping of gridiron fundamentals and stress on perfection in play execution.

The results came almost immediately as the Wildcats forged a victory string of five straight from mid-season, capped with a win over arch-rival Tennessee. The Kentuckians were in bowl contention all the way as they wound up with a 7-3 record for the 1954 campaign.

Coach Collier was rewarded by grateful school officials with a new five-year contract and fellow mentors of the Southeastern Conference voted him "SEC Coach of the Year." In gaining this honor in his "freshman" season at UK, an achievement made all the more noteworthy since it was the first time the title had been bestowed on a coach in his initial year of college tutoring, Collier climaxed a unique rise in the game.

The 1955 campaign was virtually a repetition of the previous year. In carving out a 6-3-1 mark, Collier could point with pride to the fact that his men registered a win over Ole Miss, the only setback suffered

by the eventual SEC and Cotton Bowl champs, and a second straight triumph over powerful Tennessee that eliminated the Vols from bowl contention and again boosted the Wildcats' stock for a post-season date.

In 1956, Kentucky slipped to sixth place on a record of six wins and four defeats and in 1957 hit rock bottom in the conference standings as the result of only three victories in 10 starts against some of the South's toughest grid powers. But there was some solace to be gained in the knowledge that impartial observers classed the '56 record as remarkable in view of personnel problems and praised the 1957 outfit, which wound up in a blaze of glory by upsetting Tennessee for the third time in four years, as "probably the nation's best non-winning team." Another point of pride in the luckless '57 record was the Wildcats' near upset of eventual national champion Auburn, who needed a key penalty and questionable help at the goal line to eke out a 6-0 win on their home ground.

The last two seasons have seen the Wildcats plagued alternately by injuries to key personnel and ill luck against many of the top teams of the country while playing a calibre of ball that should have had them winning consistently. The '58 record of five wins and a tie in 10 starts was remarkable to observers in view of injuries and a "killer" schedule while last year's club (like their '57 predecessors) was a gridiron enigma. UK played to the limit of its ability, throwing serious scares into three of the nation's top five teams (Mississippi, LSU and Georgia won by an average margin of 10 points) before luck ran out. The final, 4-6 record failed to reflect the impartial opinion that they were the best non-winning team in America.

Coincidental with his success on the football field, Collier has gained increasingly wide popularity and respect throughout the state and nation. Relations with Kentucky high school coaches are at an all-time high and the Wildcat mentor is constantly in demand as an authoritative lecturer at coaching clinics all over the country. In the summer of 1957, he went overseas for the Army and Air Force to conduct clinics for armed services personnel in Japan and Hawaii. He also served as head coach of the Grays in the 1958 Blue-Gray Game and previously assisted on the East coaching staff two straight years (1956-57) for the annual Shrine East-West Game at San Francisco as well as the 1955 Christian Bowl game.

Collier married Miss Mary Forman Varden of Paris in 1931 and they have three daughters—Carolyn, Kay and Jane.

## THE COACHING STAFF



### ERMAL ALLEN

(Kentucky '42)

**Defensive Coach**

One of Kentucky's most famous athlete graduates, Allen, at 39 has had a full career as a collegiate star, pro-football player and successful college grid coach. He starred at quarterback for the Wildcat forces from 1939 to 1941 and entered military service following graduation. Returning as a graduate student after his discharge, Allen played two games of the 1946 season before a rules interpretation made him ineligible. Allen joined the UK coaching staff of Paul Bryant for the remainder of that season, spent the '47 campaign as a T-quarterback with the professional Cleveland Browns, whose backfield coach at this time was Blanton Collier, and then re-joined the Wildcat staff in 1948. He became Kentucky's head freshman mentor in 1950 and was promoted at season's end to backfield coach. Allen was retained in this capacity when Collier became head man of the Wildcats and now is chief aide in charge of defense. In the off season, he plays a lot of golf and copped the state amateur championship in 1955 and 1958. The mentally-sharp Allen holds a master's degree. Hometown: Morristown, Tenn.



### JOHN NORTH

(Vanderbilt '48)

**Offensive Coach**

A former star flankman at Vanderbilt, John North joined the Kentucky coaching staff in the spring of 1956 as Freshman Coach after a full career as collegian, pro player, high school and college coach. The 38-year-old Tennessean played at Vanderbilt in 1941 and 1942. During World War II, he served three years in the Marines. Despite shot-up legs from South Pacific battles, he earned second string All-SEC honors at Vandy in 1946-47 and played end two years for the Baltimore Colts. He started his coaching career in Tallahassee, Ala., in 1951 and three seasons later became line coach at Tennessee Tech, a job he held until his transfer to Kentucky. After guiding the Kentucky freshmen to two straight undefeated seasons, John moved up to varsity end coach and last year changed duties to take over offensive backfield operations. North holds a master's degree from Peabody College in Nashville. Hometown: Old Hickory, Tenn.



## **BILL ARNSPARGER**

**(Miami (O.) '50)**

### **Offensive Line Coach**

One of Coach Collier's former grid pupils at Paris (Ky.) High School and a native Kentuckian, Arnsparger joined the UK staff in 1954 as an assistant in charge of offensive line play. The 31-year-old former Marine brought to the staff an excellent background of coaching experience which began at Miami (Ohio) U. following his graduation from that school in '50. In 1951, he moved with boss Woody Hayes to Ohio State where he was tackle coach in charge of offensive line play for three seasons. Arnsparger played at tackle and guard on Collier's teams at Paris High from 1941-43 and entered UK as a freshman in '44. His tour of duty in the Marines began shortly thereafter and he transferred to Miami U. after his discharge to play under Sid Gillman and later Hayes. Like his current boss, Bill has his master's degree. Hometown: Paris, Ky.



## **BOB CUMMINGS**

**(Vanderbilt '48)**

### **Defensive Line Coach**

Boasting the unusual feat of playing collegiate ball at two SEC schools—Vanderbilt and Georgia Tech—plus 13 years' coaching experience, 38-year-old Bob Cummings was appointed to the Kentucky staff in 1959. He lettered as a varsity center at Vandy in 1942 and a year later, upon entering the Marines, was sent to Georgia Tech under the Navy V-12 program. He played on Tech's SEC and Sugar Bowl championship team of that season. After service duty, he returned to Nashville and joined the Isaac Litton High School grid staff in 1946. By mid-season, Bob took over as head coach and remained for eight years, meanwhile continuing his schooling at Vanderbilt and obtaining a Mechanical Engineering degree in 1948. He added a Master's degree in mathematics from Peabody College in '52. Moving into the college field, Cummings was with Tennessee Tech for spring practice in 1954 and then became line coach at Vandy later that year. After three seasons, he joined the coaching staff at Georgia Tech in 1957 as B team coach and chief scout. Hometown: Portland, Tenn.



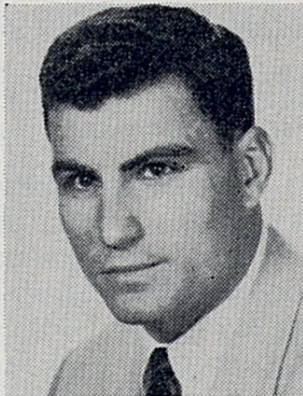


## **ED RUTLEDGE**

(Western Ky. '41)

### **Offensive Backfield Coach and Scout**

After two highly-successful seasons as Head Freshman Coach, Ed Rudledge this year will serve with the varsity in the position of Offensive Backfield Coach. He replaces Don Shula, who resigned last spring to join the Detroit Lions' staff, and the promotion is the second in three years for the former FBI man. Rutledge played end at Western Kentucky State College, graduating in 1941. He spent the next 6½ years as a Navy pilot and starred on the service champion Pensacola NAS grid squad. The 41-year-old Ohio native coached at Bowling Green (Ky.) High and served seven months in 1948 as a special agent of the FBI. Immediately prior to joining the Collier staff in 1956 as Freshman Backfield Coach, he tutored Danville (Ky.) High for three seasons. He became head coach of the UK frosh in '58 and his clubs posted a 4-1-1 record for two seasons. Rutledge, who holds a master's degree, also has charge of scouting. Hometown: Ironton, Ohio.



## **HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER**

(Kentucky '56)

### **End Coach**

A former University of Kentucky All-America flankman and professional football standout, Howard Schnellenberger entered the collegiate coaching field for the first time as he joined the staff of his ex-mentor, Blanton Collier, early last year. Howie, who prepped at Louisville Flaget High and climaxed a brilliant career by becoming Collier's first All-American in 1955, played both offensive and defensive end with the Hamilton Tiger Cats in the Canadian League in 1956. From late that year until August, 1958, he was in service at the Ft. Knox (Ky.) Infantry Training Center and played the '57 season with the service team that won the Second Army championship. Following his discharge, Schnellenberger reported to Vancouver and saw action during the '58 season with the Lions. The 26-year-old native Kentuckian, who also captained the '55 Wildcats and starred in the post-season Blue-Gray Game, works with the ends on both offense and defense. In addition, he serves as "scholastic coach." Hometown: Louisville, Ky.



## **NORM DEEB**

(Eastern Ky. '47)

### **Freshman Coach and Scout**

Experienced in both high school-prep school and collegiate coaching, 37-year-old Norm Deeb was added to the Collier staff in 1959 and assigned duties as line coach of the freshman team. Virtually all of Deeb's years in the coaching profession have been in Kentucky high school ranks. He was head coach at Bellevue High in 1956 and 1957, posting a record of 13 wins against six losses. Prior to this, he served as line coach at Shelbyville High for five years. Deeb also was line coach at Bullis Prep School in Maryland from 1949 to 1951, a period during which the service academy preparatory school won the mythical National Prep School Championship in the Beach Bowl at Daytona Beach, Fla. His last coaching assignment was at Xavier University in Cincinnati, where he coached the line during the 1958 season. After an interruption of 42 months' Army duty, much of it in Italy, he graduated from Eastern Kentucky State College in 1947. He played tackle for the Maroons. Deeb picked up his master's degree last summer from Xavier. Hometown: Louisville, Ky.



## **JOE SHANNON**

(Kentucky '59)

### **Freshman Coach and Recruiting Assistant**

A former Georgetown (Ky.) College star half-back and UK's Freshman Baseball Coach for the past five seasons, Joe Shannon this season picks up added duties of assisting with the coaching of freshman football backs. He will continue to assist Coach Collier in the administration of Kentucky's grid recruiting, a position assigned him prior to the 1959 season. The 47-year-old Shannon also will double in the off-season as frosh diamond chief and assist with the baseball varsity. Although he was an all-sports standout and captained Georgetown's freshman grid squad as well as playing regularly two years as a varsity halfback, much of Shannon's experience has been in baseball. After several years as a professional umpire in the minor leagues and one season as coach of the now-defunct Lexington Colts (Class C), he returned to Georgetown high as Baseball Coach for the '55 season. In 1956, he joined the UK staff as Freshman Baseball Coach and his teams have compiled a 35-9 record in five years. He served a three-year hitch with the Marine Air Wing (17 months South Pacific). Hometown: Georgetown, Ky.

**BUSTER BROWN—Equipment Manager:** Handling the duties of handing out approximately \$10,000 worth of football gear to the team is a seasoned veteran, S. C. (Buster) Brown. The tough-but-popular Brown served the University athletic teams in the capacity of Equipment Manager for several years before World War II. After wartime work as a stevedore on the West Coast, Buster returned to Kentucky and his old job in 1952.

**KEN KUHN—Publicity Director:** A veteran of 12 years in the job of publicizing Wildcat football and other sports activities of UK, Kuhn came to Lexington via Michigan State from which he was graduated in 1942 and later served as an assistant in the Public Relations Department. Before moving over to the Athletic Department in 1948, he worked two years as News Editor in UK's Department of Public Relations. Kuhn is a past president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Publicity Association.

**JOHN (Rusty) PAYNE—Trainer:** John first came in contact with Kentucky football when he helped out his predecessor, Smoky Harper, during the Wildcats' pre-Sugar Bowl practice on the Louisiana State campus in 1950. After graduating from LSU that year, the red-haired Arkansas native spent two years in the Marine Corps at Paris Island and Quantico, serving much of the time as athletic trainer. He joined the Kentucky staff in 1954, the same season that Coach Collier came. Payne currently is president of the SEC Trainers Association and on the executive board of the national trainers' body.

## KENTUCKY FOOTBALL — 1960

When a football coach sums up his season outlook with the seemingly-evasive comment: "Our team should have as good or better a potential than last year," the immediate reaction of suspicious press-radio observers and other skeptics is that the mentor is hedging.

However, when the speaker is Blanton Collier, University of Kentucky's popular and straight-shooting grid chief of the past six campaigns, and the topic is the Wildcats for 1960, a little more credence is lent to such a comment. In fact, when observers take the trouble to examine in detail the outlook for Kentucky football, it is difficult to state the probabilities in more explicit terms.

First of all, careful consideration reflects the fact that last year's Wildcat band was undoubtedly the best non-winning combination in the country. Their potential, hampered much of the season by injuries and often by a seeming inability to put together two good halves, was demonstrated forcefully against some of the better teams of the country.

Louisiana State, defending national champ and third in final polls of '59, could manage only a 9-0 win as the Kentucky defense bottled up the great Billy Cannon by holding him to a net total offense of 11 yards. Eventual SEC titlist Georgia survived a near-upset by the margin of a touchdown. Bowl-bound Georgia Tech was able to top Kentucky by only two points.

### '59ers Scared 'Team of Decade', Beat vols

Mississippi, later to finish as the nation's number two outfit and be voted "Team of the Decade" in the SEC, managed a mere 16-0 decision. The Rebels' victory margin was padded by a long field goal in the closing minutes and a 51-yard quarterback sneak TD in the final seconds against a relaxed UK defense. Arch-Rival Tennessee succumbed for the sixth time in the last seven seasons and the only really poor showing made by the UKats all season came against Auburn. The Plainsmen shocked Kentucky with an opening kickoff return touchdown and went on to win, 33-0.

The Colliermen, although throwing scares into the powerhouses and never a band to be taken lightly, managed only a 4-6 season record and finished tenth in the conference race. Nevertheless, as can be readily seen, the potential was there.

Although the potential may be good again, the big bugaboo in posting a better record will still plague Kentucky this season—their 70th varsity campaign. Unfortunate schedule arrangement again will handi-

cap the Wildcats in their efforts to keep morale high and to stay in contention for the league title past the first month as they face the SEC's perennial "Big Three" (Ga. Tech, Ole Miss and Auburn) in the first three games. Other "biggies" on the '60 card are LSU, Georgia, Vanderbilt and Tennessee—adding up to an unfavorably-balanced schedule of seven conference and three non-conference games. The feat of winning the SEC title with a 7-3 schedule has been accomplished only three times in post-war years.

Personnel-wise, the losses from last season's club were substantial but Coach Collier is hopeful that '59 reserves, holdouts and a promising sophomore group will take up the slack created by 15 departed lettermen. Among eight men lost who were consistent or alternate starters, the major absentees will be tackles George Boone and Cullen Wilson, guards Bob Talamini and Demo Johns, end Ronnie Cain, quarterback Lowell Hughes and fullback Glenn Shaw. In general, the 1960 Kentuckians will be a young club with 65 percent of the team composed of sophomores and only 20 letter winners returning.

### **Replacing Interior Linemen Is Problem**

Replacement of the interior linemen, finding a fullback, straightening out the quarterback situation and development of adequate reserve strength at most positions looms as the major problems that must be solved in the organization of a team capable of winning in the tough SEC.

One big step in the direction of solving the guard problem is the move of center Lloyd Hodge to guard. The 188-pound native Kentuckian and co-captain is one of the outstanding linebackers in the South. He will operate at the linebacking left guard post and Coach Collier is confident that Hodge will continue his amazing assault on enemy ball carriers in a fashion that earns the team victories and himself All-America honors.

Getting first call at the signal calling post vacated by Hughes will be Co-Captain Jerry Eisaman, who has seen important service at the position the past two seasons despite injuries. Also on hand is Leeman Bennett, a two-letter vet; and senior Tom Rodgers, who played quarterback in high school and as a Kentucky freshman, is moving over from regular duty at left end to bolster the ranks.

The backfield generally is regarded as one of Kentucky's prospective strong suits in the coming campaign with both starting halfbacks returning in the persons of Calvin Bird and Charlie Sturgeon. However, the loss of Shaw at fullback created a big gap which one of three

returning lettermen or an untested sophomore must fill. Spring practice performance indicates the nod may go to junior Gary Cochran. If Eisaman stays sound and comes through as anticipated at quarterback and fullback punch is developed, the Wildcat ball carrying contingent could be a little stronger than a year ago.

### **Experience Generally Lacking In Line**

Although the guard posts appear in good shape, with the shift of Hodge plus the return of right side alternate starter Don Sinor, and Dickie Mueller returns at right end, the line is thought of as a major problem. Only nine letterman veterans are available and it appears that a lot of dependence will have to be placed on the promising but inexperienced younger hands. The problem is magnified by the fact that UK ranked fifth in the SEC in total defense last season, allowing opponents an average of only 205.3 yards per game.

Bidding for top individual honors on the 1960 Wildcat team will be ace linebacker Hodge, halfbacks Bird and Sturgeon, quarterback Eisaman, junior center Irv Goode and Mueller at end. Among the new faces, the top prospects for eventual stardom seem to include end Tom Hutchinson and tackle Bob Gebhart.

Coach Collier plans no drastic offensive changes, intending to stick with the Multiple T pattern used in the past couple of seasons and maintaining a 60-40 percent balance in favor of the ground attack. He generally favors the new rules that will make possible more liberal substitution of personnel, particularly specialists.

### **END TO QB SHIFT PAID OFF BEFORE**

One of the notable experiments featuring the 1960 play of the Wildcats will see Tom Rodgers, regular end for the past two seasons, shifting to quarterback duty. The last time such a move was tried, it paid off handsomely.

Big Steve Meilinger, 220-pound end who became UK's first (and only) All-Conference pick as a soph the year before, moved into the backfield as a trouble shooter in late season 1952. Not only did Steve win All-America honors for himself as a junior, but the team made a whirlwind finish to win four and tie one of its last six games.

Depended on for help will be freshman graduates headed by promising John Mutchler, three holdouts and a service returnee . . . Losses included two three-year lettermen . . . With Goode the only letterman at the position, younger men will have to come through quickly . . . Probable starter: Goode.



**QUARTERBACK**—Three senior lettermen give this position adequate experience even though one (converted end Tom Rodgers) will be operating in the signal calling post for the first time since his freshman year . . . Lowell Hughes, three-year letterman who started five games last season, will be missed but seniors Jerry Eisaman and Leeman Bennett return with experience of starting the other five contests and totaling 341 minutes of action time between them . . . Backing up this duo and Rodgers will be holdout John Rampulla and upcoming sophs Jerry Woolum and Bill Davidson, who led the freshman aerial attack with completion averages well above 50 per cent . . . Also moving into a quarterback role after early season freshman experience at halfback is Pat Counts . . . The Florida lad paced the yearling squad in rushing with a 6.4 average and is considered an outstanding roll-out passer . . . ### **UK TOSSES FIRST PASS IN '06**

The first forward pass ever attempted by a Kentucky football team was thrown in a game played at Lexington Oct. 13, 1906—the year that the forward pass was legalized by national rules—against Eminence Athletic Club. Accounts of this early contest do not mention whether the pass was completed or the name of the thrower. Earl Stone was listed as quarterback of Coach J. White Guyn's Kentuckians.

### ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

While the name is old in origin, no claim is made regarding precedence over similar nicknames boasted by Northwestern, Villanova and about 10 other major athletic teams.

An alumnus in 1947 presented a live Kentucky Wildcat to SUKY, student pep organization. Named "The Colonel," the cat served as a live mascot for UK teams until his death in 1955. The current mascot is a stuffed wildcat obtained from a Brooklyn taxidermist just before the 1958 football season and named "Tucky."

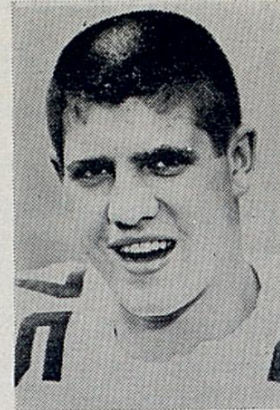

**SERIES HISTORY:** Although Kentucky and Georgia Tech first met on the gridiron in 1923, only 17 meetings are recorded in the series due to a couple of lengthy gaps in an otherwise generally-consistent rivalry. The series stands at ten wins to seven and one tie in favor of the Yellow Jackets, but UK's record in recent years against one of the nation's foremost grid powers is surprisingly good. Notable Wildcat victories are a 28-14 upset handed Tech in a 1950 meeting at Atlanta and an equally-surprising, 13-6 stinger plucked out of the 1954 game, also at Atlanta. The former proved an important stepping stone in Kentucky's successful bid for a first SEC title and invitation to the Sugar Bowl. This year's meeting will end a long-term contract covering season opener games. Miami of Florida will appear as the first foe in 1961.

**LAST MEETING:** Outclassed the first half and behind, 14-0, the Wildcats came roaring back behind the daring leadership of quarterback Lowell



Hughes to nearly catch the visiting Techmen. A near-capacity crowd saw the rally fall short after two third-period TD's less than three minutes apart. Extra point pass attempts were incomplete and a 75-yard march in closing minutes was halted on the GT five.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Uneasy Bobby Dodd claims his club is "the biggest question mark in years," but forecasters figure them stronger at every position except center and pick them fourth in the SEC chase. Rebound expectations are based on a talented crop of youngsters, such as red-shirt quarterback Stann Gann, and some prominent holdovers like tackles Ed Nutting (239) and Billy Shaw (238). Pre-season honors also are going to capable ends Gerald Burch and Taz Anderson, the latter moving from regular full-back duty to make way for impressive Lee Reid. Returning to make Dodd's Slot Offense click with usual perfection are 22 letterman veterans, including 12 of the top two units which last year posted a 6-4 season and lost a tough decision to Arkansas in the Gator Bowl. Chief loss was All-America center Maxie Baughan.

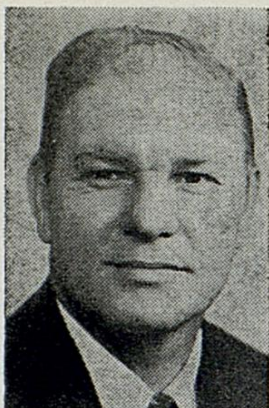

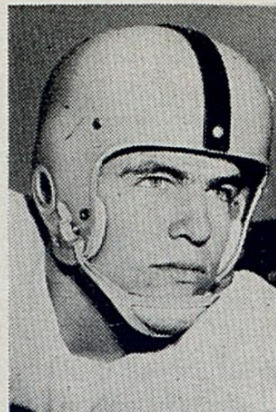

**SERIES HISTORY:** A strange sequence of upsets and near-upsets flavors the comparatively-young, but colorful rivalry between the Wildcats and Ole Miss. Sixteen meetings have been held since the series got under way in 1944, but only in recent years has either club been able to gain a distinctive edge in the battling by winning more than two consecutive games. The Wildcats got the series off to an auspicious start by winning the first game, but the men of Coach Johnny Vaught came right back to take the decision in three out of the next four meetings. But it was in 1949 that the fireworks started. Kentucky claimed a 47-0 advantage in overcoming an underdog role and starting on the road to big-time football prominence. Since then, the Kentucky game has proved the "make or break" situation for the Rebels' season and upsets have been in the category of "a dime a dozen." The 1954 meeting in Memphis was a penalty-marred spectacle resulting in several new conference records on yardage walked off for violations. In 1955, Kentucky added new fire to the "beat the favorite" series history by upending the defending SEC champions in Lexington. The 21-14 setback was the only blemish on the Rebs' record as they waltzed to a second straight SEC title

and Cotton Bowl win. Ole Miss got its revenge by recording wins in the next four meetings.

**LAST MEETING:** For a third straight frustrating year, the scoreboard reading on the Kentucky-Ole Miss encounter failed to reflect the closeness of the battle. A Lexington crowd saw the out-manned Wildcats hold the vaunted Rebels, later to be voted "Team of the Decade" in the SEC, scoreless in the opening half and then lose by an eventual, 16-0 count on own mistakes and breaks. UK was in the game until final five minutes. Leading only 6-0, Mississippi then kicked a 32-yard field goal and padded the margin with a once-in-a-lifetime, 51-yard quarterback sneak TD in the final 12 seconds against a UK defense sagged to stop the homerun pass.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Despite the graduation of 14 lettermen, experts foresee enough remaining talent in Vaught's stronghold to justify a unanimous prediction that the Rebels will finish atop the SEC in '60—a prize that avoided them last season despite a 9-1 record and Sugar Bowl win. Reportedly the Rebs don't have the '59 depth, but admit defense (which allowed fewest points—21—in two decades of national statistics) should be better. The experts also figure the Split T-Wing T offense will be in good hands with returnees George Blair, pre-season All-SEC halfback choice; end Johnny Brewer and guard Dick Price, also pre-season honor picks; and QB Jake Gibbs, who led league in passing and total offense a year ago. A major factor in drive to title and January date in Sugar or Rose Bowl is Reb schedule, voted easiest in SEC.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Former Southeastern Conference football “doormats” Kentucky and Auburn first got together on the gridiron at Lexington in 1934, the year after the league was organized, and played another game the following season at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 scrap, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision in the Wildcats’ favor. Tilts between the new-found grid powers the past four seasons have been fraught with frustration as neither could boast of decisive change in a trend to close games until Auburn smashed the visiting Kentuckians decisively last year. Now ahead in the rivalry five games to two (one tie), the defense-minded Tigers are able to boast that no Wildcat has crossed their goal line in four years.

**LAST MEETING:** In the only really bad performance turned in all year by the Wildcats, Auburn took a 33-0 decision in the rain on their home ground. The Kentuckians, demoralized by halfback Jimmy Pettus’ 88-yard

return of their opening kickoff, could do nothing right. The Tigers seemingly were successful in everything they tried and held a 27-0 edge at halftime that pointed up the futility of Kentucky's assignment in testing the nation's top grid powers in the opening half of the season. In Auburn territory only three times, UK absorbed its worst defeat since a 34-0 loss to Vandy in 1955.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** The experts are betting that the Plainsmen will not disappoint as they did last year in finishing fifth in the conference race (lowest since 1952) on a 7-3 mark. The consensus is that they likely will have to settle for second, but will have as good or better a potential than '59 despite the loss of seven regulars. Seventeen experienced hands return, headed by stellar fullback Ed Dyas and tackle Ken Rice (245). The material is there if it develops and reports say the Tigers were pleased with spring activities. Defense should be great again despite loss of operatives like Zeke Smith. QB Bobby Hunt may be a key man in offensive plans based on modified T formation. Schedule is considered not too difficult as they do not meet top contenders Ole Miss or LSU. Jordan sums it up neatly by admitting the Tigers "have the makings." Auburn is slated to wind up its NCAA probationary punishment with the current season.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Five games over a period of 18 years make up the history of previous gridiron rivalry between the Big Green and Kentucky's Wildcats. The two schools first met at Huntington in 1905 and UK managed a 53-0 victory that was never equalled or surpassed in four later meetings. Kentucky goes into the '60 encounter with a clean slate of five straight wins over Marshall.

**LAST MEETING:** When the Wildcats and Marshall's Big Green squared off in Lexington in the 1923 season, Kentucky posted a surprisingly easy, 41-0 victory that stood at season's end as one of four shutouts recorded en-route to a 4-3-2 record. Among the Wildcat players of the day were Ab Kirwan, now dean of the UK Graduate School, and C. T. (Turkey) Hughes, all-sports star now the veteran athletic director at Eastern Kentucky State College. Dell Ramsey captained the '23 UK team.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Although they have enjoyed outstanding success in the grid sport in days gone by (four undefeated seasons), Marshall can count only two winning campaigns since 1950 and has hired affable Charlie Snyder

to lead them back to prominence. Unhappily, the problems were too great last season for Snyder—a freshman coach at Kentucky in '58—to accomplish much. Things are looking up this year, however, and the expectations are that gradual improvement will be forthcoming. Aiming to be a power in the Mid-American Conference, Marshall appears in for a rough time in their own league and in non-conference tilts. But the young squad picked up plenty of game experience enroute to a 1-8 season last year and it should pay off. Reports out of Huntington say Marshall will be stronger and faster in the backfield despite the loss of their top two ground gainers. The main problem appears at quarterback and soph John Griffin may get the call to direct Wing T operations. The line will be light, but experienced. Leading a group of 18 returning lettermen is left half Dick Thomas, who averaged 3.7 yards per carry a year ago. Marshall replaces Detroit on the UK schedule.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Inaugurated with a game at Baton Rouge in 1949, the Kentucky-Louisiana State grid series is the youngest rivalry within the Southeastern Conference. Ten meetings make up the series which has been played annually with the exception of the 1951 season and LSU's victories in the last three meetings have overcome a Kentucky lead and put them ahead in the low scoring rivalry. Coach Dietzel, a former UK aide under Paul Bryant who took over the football reins at LSU in 1955, got his career as a head coach off to an auspicious start by trouncing the Wildcats in the season opener that year which was ranked as one of the biggest shockers of the campaign. A year later, when the Tigers visited Lexington, Dietzel's darlings found the going a bit rougher and the Cats gained vengeance with a comparatively-easy, 14-point whitewash job. In the three years since, Kentucky hasn't managed to turn the LSU tide as the Bengals fielded their greatest elevens—national champions of 1958 and third in the final polls last year.



**LAST MEETING:** The defending national champs left Lexington last year with a 9-0 victory, but Kentuckians held their heads high in the knowledge that the outmanned Wildcats had turned in one of their greatest efforts. Fellow mentors of the SEC acknowledged UK's effort by according Blanton Collier "Coach of the Week" honors. Determined to avenge their sloppy showing of the week before against Auburn, the fired-up Wildcats looked like their early-season selves in bottling up the celebrated Billy Cannon to the extent that he netted only 11 yards and the entire LSU offense managed only 80 yards. LSU's lone TD came on a break following a punt out on the UK five. Attempting a return punt out of his own end zone, Charlie Sturgeon had his kick deflected by a blocking teammate and LSU returned the short kick eight yards to the Kentucky 10 from where they scored three plays later. A 39-yard field goal in the closing period padded the margin.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Cannon and company (17 of the top 33) will be missing this year, but nobody is shedding any sympathy tears in the belief that Dietzel's three-unit system gained a lot of game experience. Fourteen veterans return to form the re-building nucleus and the experts figure LSU no worse than a close fifth. In fact, many feel the Bengals have one of the easiest schedules in the SEC and could easily be the "darkhorse" title threat if it were not for their reputation and left-over talent. With 44 sophs on a 60-man squad, LSU may lack experience in depth. But there are some top players still around, like pre-season All-SEC pick Mickey Mangham at end, center Bo Strange, speed boy Wendell Harris, FB Donnie Daye and ex-Bandit quarterback Darryl Jenkins.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Georgia and Kentucky began their rivalry on the football field with a game at Louisville on Oct. 21, 1939. The two schools met almost annually from that time until the series was broken off after the 1949 game and not resumed until 1956 with a game at Athens. Veteran Wally Butts, dean of Southeastern grid mentors, can lay claim for the Bulldog cause to an edge in the rivalry—Georgia having taken eight victories in 13 meetings while UK has been able to manage only four and a tie in 1940. Kentucky won that first game, but in the forties the Bulldogs were at one of the high water marks in their grid history and managed to subdue the Wildcats five times in eight meetings. Despite Georgia's superiority of wins, the series generally has been interesting. Butts' four SEC championship outfits can show an average victory margin of only 11 points in meetings with UK. Kentucky's last win came in 1956.

**LAST MEETING:** True to the general trend of gridiron relations with the Bulldogs, Kentucky threw a scare into visiting Georgia last year before bowing to the eventual SEC champions, 14-7. The surprise team of the year

used breaks and UK mistakes in the muddy going to pick up the key win that gave them the league lead they never lost. A 43-yard pass interception return gave Georgia its first marker. Kentucky tied it up with a 61-yard march in the second quarter and then went behind for good in the third frame as the Bulldogs capitalized on a blocked punt and recovery that gave them possession on the UK 22. With ace halfback Charlie Sturgeon turning in a great effort (144 yards on 20 carries), Kentucky outgained Georgia 292 to 173 in total offense.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Dean Wally Butts isn't likely to sneak up on anyone again this year as the Bulldogs defend their fourth conference title, but indications are Georgia will not need the element of surprise. On hand are 20 returning veterans, headed by All-Conference quarterback Francis Tarkenton and All-America guard Pat Dye. The Georgians anticipate exceptional strength in their backfield with halfbacks Fred Brown and Bobby Walden plus Bill Godfrey at fullback to assist Tarkenton in T operations. The annual Birmingham News poll picked the Bulldogs third behind Ole Miss and Auburn. Georgia figures to have a good first unit and the only weaknesses appear in line strength (Dye is only returning starter) and pass receiving versatility (top four ends missing).

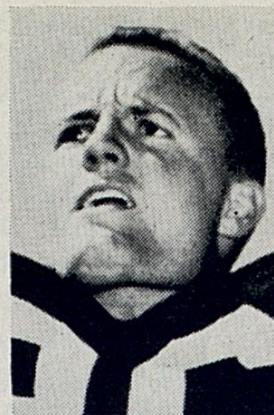

**SERIES HISTORY:** Although the Wildcats have maintained grid relations with University of Florida since 1917 and met Miami (Fla.) five times since 1948, their meeting this year with the Seminoles will be the first football contest with FSU. Florida State, a fast-rising southern independent, has been playing football only 14 years and climaxed their grid history with a 1958 Blue Grass Bowl clash with Oklahoma State at Louisville (lost 15-6). FSU replaces Miami on the Kentucky schedule this season.

**LAST MEETING:** No previous games.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Although the injury-plagued Seminoles could manage only a 4-6 record last season and their current schedule ranks as the toughest in history, they are cautiously hopeful of progress. Ambitious Florida State has a new athletic deal cooking with ex-LSU aide Bill Peterson taking over as coach and former Alabama great Vaughn Mancha as AD. With 44 of 68 players listed as sophs, Peterson is introducing a new offense—called Flexible T and combining features of Wing T and professional ball extras. Key to Seminole hopes may be senior end Tony Romeo, great as a soph but

hurt in opening game last year, and senior halfback Bud Whitehead, the nation's leading pass interception artist a year ago. They head 17 returning lettermen. Tackle Don Donateli, checking in at 231, could be one of the best and typifies a line that averages 216. A pair of junior college transfers are being counted on. They are fullbacks Doug Williams and Ed Parker. Quarterback could be a problem, but soph Charles Alexander is the front runner here. Coach Peterson called spring practice the best he has ever gone through and is optimistic that the Seminoles will show progress each week.

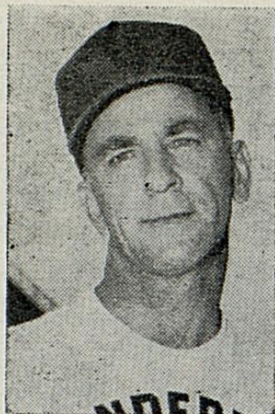

**SERIES HISTORY:** Kentucky and the Vanderbilt Commodores first got together on the gridiron way back in 1896 at Nashville and the rivalry has been perpetuated intermittently ever since with the result that it is one of the oldest in the South from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. History shows a record solidly in their favor—23 wins to Kentucky's six and three ties. Vandy registered 12 shutouts in the first 26 years of the rivalry and UK did not get into the win column until 1939. However, the post-war record shows only four setbacks. The last three meetings have seen extremely close results—a one-point win for UK, two 5-point decisions by Vandy and a scoreless tie.

**LAST MEETING:** Unable to stop Vanderbilt's big gun, halfback Tom Moore, as they had earlier stopped LSU's Cannon, Kentucky went down to a five-point defeat—11 to 6. Iron man Russ Morris, who averaged 50 minutes of action a game last season in quarterback duty, kicked a 21-yard field goal in the opening quarter and Moore counted a TD in the third period on a 62-yard gallop with end Rooster Akin catching a two-point PAT pass

for the final Vandy scoring. Kentucky's lone marker came in the final quarter as end Ronnie Cain went 15 yards with a pass from QB Jerry Eisaman. The PAT pass failed. In one stretch, as the 'Cats tried desperately to remedy a sputtering attack and superior Commodore desire, Eisaman let loose 21 straight aerals (exclusive of a couple of punts.)

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Graduation losses hit Vanderbilt pretty heavy (20 lettermen were lost, including the superb Moore) and spring practice accomplished little due to snow interference, but don't sell the Commodores short. Art Guepe has revamped his Variegated T offense somewhat and is looking for a more balanced attack that will prevent opponents scheming to stop just one big gun. Vandy looks to have the ideal ingredient of strength up the middle—quarterback Morris, center Cody Binkley and fullback Bobby Nay. They also admit to being strong at tackle, where four lettermen return, and boast an outstanding flankman in Capt. Fred Riggs. Guards appear to be the biggest problem, but expectations are for a tough defense.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Kentucky and its neighbor to the north of the Mason-Dixon line have met on the gridiron 16 times with the initial contest taking place in 1935 at Cincinnati and the last at Lexington a year ago. The meeting in 1956 resumed the rivalry which had been interrupted after the 1949 renewal and contracts have been inked to extend the annual games through the 1961 season. The Muskies' lone triumph in their series with the Wildcats came in 1938 as they posted a 27-6 success at Cincinnati. Kentucky has taken all the others, generally by decisive scores. A 70-0 shellacking administered by UK in '46 stands as one of the biggest point-production efforts ever seen on Stoll Field. The record high is an 83-0 debacle involving hapless North Dakota in a 1950 meeting with one of UK's greatest teams.

**LAST MEETING:** Equalling the second highest victory margin in the series history, Kentucky disregarded near-freezing weather to warm up for their annual clash with Tennessee by trouncing Xavier, 41-0. The score,



while reflecting the determination of the Wildcats to make up for a miserable showing of the week before against Vandy, did not tell the story completely. The Musketeers, short on brawn but long on razzle dazzle offense, were a constant threat with the strong right arm of passer Ron Costello. But UK's superior offense and sterling defense kept Costello from opening up and, in the end, it was Kentucky aerials that beat the Muskies. One of the highlights of the game came as UK's Cal Bird padded his national kickoff return lead with a thrilling, 89-yard touchdown jaunt opening the second half.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Newly classed as a "major" football school by the Football Writers Association and NCAA, ambitious Xavier has plans for making their "debut" an interesting one. Key figure in these plans will be quarterback and ace passer Ron Costello, already the author of 16 school passing marks. Costello completed 93 of 151 tosses last year for 1,062 yards and six TD's. The Musketeers return an experienced hand at every position except center and boast the return of nine men who were starters in 1959. Mike Hannon, 215-pound middle guard, and rookie fullback George Potts also stand out. Doherty promises some colorful new variations of his special brand of T formation operations.

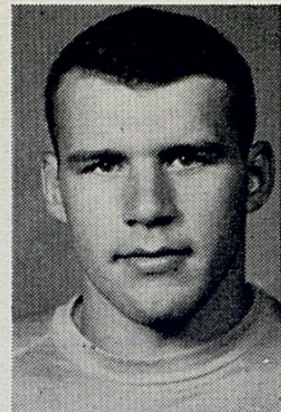

**SERIES HISTORY:** Among the six oldest football rivalries in the South, the Kentucky-Tennessee series dates from a memorable encounter in Knoxville 67 years ago. In that meeting, Oct. 21, 1893, the Wildcats annexed a 60-0 victory to get the warfare off to an auspicious start in a fashion that hasn't been equalled in the many and colorful renewals of the traditional rivalry. Except for three war years (1917-18 and 1943), the two schools have met annually on the gridiron with the result that the Vols hold a distinct-but-fading edge of 30 wins to Kentucky's 17 and eight ties. Tennessee's sparkling advantage has become slightly tarnished in the past few seasons as Kentucky started reversing the victory trend with an upsetting tie in 1952 and ate into their polished record with successes in six of the last seven meetings. The seniors on the 1955 UK squad became the first class in 43 years to graduate with the accomplishment of never playing in a game in which the Vols emerged victorious and they bowed out in a blaze of glory, triumphing to the tune of 23-0 over the bowl-hungry Vols in the most one-sided

Kentucky win since 1935. Current Wildcat mentor Blanton Collier has enjoyed the greatest success of any UK coach against Tennessee, taking five decisions in six tries.



Since 1925, the two schools have stimulated their grid rivalry with a rotating trophy — a battered old beer barrel. Much shenanigans on the part of the rival student bodies have added to the color of the series. Following the 1953 UK win, disgruntled Tennessee students raided the Kentucky campus and “kegnapped” the barrel and held it in a secret hiding place in Knoxville until persuaded to return it by threats of reprisal against their coon dog mascot, Smoky. In 1955, UK students visited the Tennessee campus hiding place of Smoky and “dognapped” him. UT

students promptly retaliated by painting up the Kentucky campus in a surprise raid and carting away “Colonel,” UK’s stuffed wildcat mascot. A trade was engineered as an added attraction at the ’55 game. For a couple of years, things were comparatively quiet. Then the stunts erupted again in the 1958 renewal at Knoxville as Vol students caught a guard “napping” and slipped away with UK’s stuffed Wildcat. Despite promises to return it at halftime of a nationally-televised basketball game, the mascot wasn’t given back until nearly four months later. A post-game sidelight to Kentucky’s victory last year saw a strange calm shattered by rioting UK students protesting a faculty refusal to reward the win with a traditional pre-Thanksgiving holiday. Up to 5,000 demonstrators and onlookers carried on for about four and one-half hours, marching on the UK president’s campus home and setting a bonfire at a main intersection in downtown Lexington.

**LAST MEETING:** Thundering Cal Bird displayed credentials for All-America mention by personally leading the Wildcats to a 20-0 victory and their sixth win in the past seven years. In reversing the Vols’ victory trend in the series, Bird warmed the hearts of old grads by scampering for three touchdowns (one a 62-yard punt return) and adding a 19th point to his total by kicking an extra point. It was a fitting climax to a season marred by mistakes, bad breaks and injuries that had cost UK deserved wins over several high-calibre opponents.

**1960 OUTLOOK:** Many experts feel that Tennessee’s talent potential might be sufficient to rate them the darkhorse nod in the SEC title chase this year. The schedule facing the Vols, however, is a deterring factor despite the advantage of meeting Kentucky, Ole Miss and Alabama in Knox-

ville. They must get by Auburn on the road in the opener, then survive a crucial test against four SEC toughies at season's end. Bowden Wyatt optimistically is predicting improvement in his Single Wing offense operations and better depth is evident—particularly in promising sophs and red shirts. The Vols have so much talent at the key tailback spot that they reportedly are considering Bill Majors as a defensive safety specialist. On hand is Gene Etter and promising youngsters. Top performer may be blocking back Jim Cartwright, winner of the Jacobs Blocking Trophy in '59.

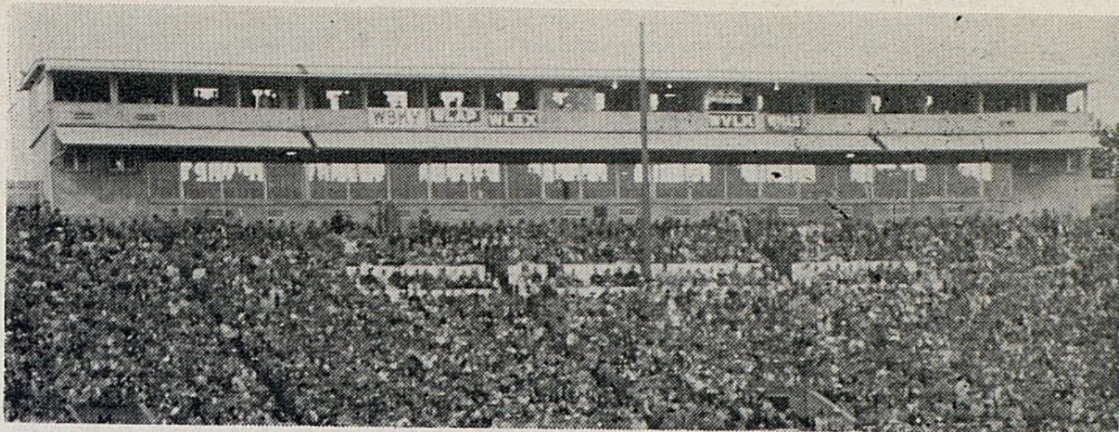

### **FOOTBALL WRITERS SALUTE KENTUCKY PRESS BOX**

University of Kentucky's football press box on Stoll Field rates as one of the best in the country from the standpoint of both working facilities and service to writers—so says the Football Writers Association of America. The national organization in 1958 added Kentucky to an exclusive list of schools that had been cited in both categories. Up to that time, only 67 institutions had won the award for press box services and 45 for facilities since the FWA started officially honoring the nation's best press boxes and sports publicity departments (who are responsible for service) several years ago.

### **KICKS OUT OF THE PAST**

Although Kentucky's kicking game in general has been one of the weak points in overall operations in recent years, the Wildcats have been blessed with a handful of place-kicking stars in the last decade or so.

Notable efforts were produced by the following: Bobby Brooks booted 25 of 34 extra point tries in 1949, including 17 straight to equal the then-existing SEC record; Bob Gain, the All-America tackle, recorded 37 of 41 placement kicks in 1950; Harry Jones in 1951 had 29 of 40; specialist Bob Bassitt put through 15 of 21 PAT kicks and two of four FG tries in 1952; Delmar Hughes missed only two of 40 placement tries in three years (1954-56); and Lou Michaels kicked 13 of 16 during 1955-57 career and had two out of three from the field.

Hopes for the current season ride on the strong right toe of soph halfback Clarkie Mayfield, who as a freshman converted four out of five times in three games and had field goals of 30 and 35 yards vs. Vanderbilt frosh. Another try from 55 yards out fell short in end zone.

A Louisville Valley High product, Baker has the size and "football sense" to be of help to the Wildcat cause this year . . . Lettered three years at Valley as end . . . All-Jefferson County and honorable mention All-State . . . Also standout in basketball and track . . . Moved from end to tackle as freshman last season and saw reserve duty . . . "B" student in Education College.

**KENTON BARNETT** (*Bar'-net*) Soph. Tackle 6-5 228 Cynthiana, Ky.

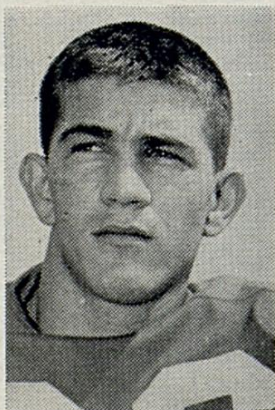
"Bull", as Barnett is known to teammates, stacks up as one of the most sizeable and promising young linemen in camp . . . Attended Cynthiana High and entered University in the spring a year ago after semester at Staunton (Va.) Military Academy . . . Made second team All-State as schoolboy junior in 1956 and the All-Military team at Staunton . . . Regular right tackle for Kittens last season . . . Served as president of freshman football house . . . Studying Agriculture and passed 32 hours last year with 2.5 standing.

**LEEMAN BENNETT** (*Ben'-net*) Senior Quarterback 6-0 185 Paducah, Ky.

Never great, but steady and dependable as field general . . . Alternated as number two QB last season and likely will be cast in key reserve role again in '60 . . . Saw 193:25 action in all 10 games as junior, starting Miami (Fla.) and Vandy games . . . Completed six of 24 passes for 44 yards and showed up very well defensively . . . Came to Kentucky in '56 from Paducah Tilghman High (same school as 1954-55 All-SEC QB Bob Hardy and graduated FB Glenn Shaw) where he was honorable mention on All-State team . . . After outstanding freshman showing, he was red-shirted in '57 . . . A year later, Leeman posted 109:54 action time in seven games and hit eight of 15 passes for 94 yards . . . Good student in Commerce.

**CALVIN BIRD** (*Bird*) Senior Halfback 6-0 192 Corbin, Ky.

An appropriately tagged bolt of greased lightning who totes a terrific pigskin, Calvin (Thunder) Bird has made a habit of taking up where he leaves off each season and improving his performance as the competition gets tougher . . . He lived up to every bit of his sparkling reputation as an All-America schoolboy with some phenomenal ramblings as a Kentucky freshman in '57 . . . Two years ago, Bird proved to be one of the South's greatest gridiron enigmas as he never was a consistent starter at UK, but walked off with "Sophomore of the Year" honors in the tough Southeastern Conference . . . Then last season, he wound up another fine campaign in fitting fashion by gaining a place in UPI's national "Backfield of the Week" and SEC "Player of the Week" honor for personally upsetting UK's arch-rival, Tennessee . . . The scintillating speedster accounted for 19 of his team's points in a 20-0 triumph . . . Mainly



because ballots were already in before his great season-ending performance, Bird finished a close second to senior vets on nationally-ranked teams in a bid for All-Conference honors . . . Although he played since a mid-season clash with Louisiana State with a slight shoulder separation, Bird started every game at left half and turned in consistently good performances during 331:27 action time to rank among the leaders of the SEC and nation in several statistical departments . . . Indicative of his breakaway speed, the Corbin flash made his best showing in kickoff returns (third nationally) and punt returns (11th nationally) . . . He ranked third in the league in pass receiving after leading in that department in 1958 . . . Bird again staged a down-to-the-wire battle for top scoring honors, finishing third among SEC scorers and 22nd nationally with 55 points to his credit . . . The previous year, he lost out in the final week to LSU's Billy Cannon after leading all year . . . Bird's rushing average of 3.4 yards per try for 98 carries was 13th best in the power-packed SEC last season . . . Coach Collier praises his star halfback's all-around ability, but admits "Calvin is at his best as an explosive runner. He is gifted with a beautifully-coordinated gait." . . . Deserved recognition seems sure to come this season as Bird already has been tabbed as an All-America candidate by the national magazines and chosen on every pre-season All-Southeastern eleven . . . Missed spring practice on doctor's advice due to "dropped foot" (nerve injury to leg), but medical opinion is that he will be ready for another great season . . . Married last December to former Miss Jean Craft of Cumberland, Ky.

**JOE BRANDEL (*Bran'-del*) Soph. Tackle 6-2 208 Hamilton, Ohio**

With high school experience at Hamilton (Ohio) Public as an end, tackle and guard, it's not unusual that Joe should be tried at various positions as collegian . . . He was stationed at end as freshman in '58, moved to tackle last year and red-shirted . . . Will continue at tackle this year . . . Married.

**BOB BUTLER (*Butt'-ler*) Junior Tackle 6-1 213 Madisonville, Ky.**

Odds are in Butler's favor that he will get nod for starting duty at left tackle this season after serving apprenticeship at end as freshman and shifting to right tackle reserve duty last year . . . He's one of hardest workers on the squad and looked very good in spring practice . . . One of two letterman tackles, Butler last season saw 165:48 action time in all 10 games . . . Only more experienced men in front of him kept this Madisonville boy from consistent duty . . . A field goal kicking threat, Butler earned 11 letters in four sports at Madisonville High . . . Won All-State and mention on the school-boy All-America as an outstanding end and halfback in football, leading scorer on cage team, centerfielder in baseball and shot putter in track.



**TOMMY BRUSH** (*Brush*) Soph. Tackle 6-4 232 Jenkins, Ky.

This sizeable youngster, one of the squad's biggest men, also stacks up as one of Wildcats' top line prospects . . . Tommy won 13 letters as an all-sports standout at Jenkins High, captained the footballers and won All-State honor . . . Easily won his freshman numeral last year as tackle and should strengthen the position this season.

**MONTE CAMPBELL** (*Camp'-bell*) Soph. End 6-3 176 Ashland, Ky.

Campbell proved himself a valuable man to have around during his freshman campaign last fall . . . Number one right end and second in pass receiving with six catches for 88 yards and a touchdown . . . Monte was Ashland High School's "most valuable offensive lineman" and second team All-Stater . . . Also chosen on state honorable mention list in basketball, stood out in track . . . Married.

**DON CARSON** (*Car'-son*) Soph. Halfback 5-11 178 Oneida, Tenn.

Along with teammate Dennis Sexton, an end, Carson seeks to become first Oneida athlete ever to pick up football letter at Kentucky . . . Held out of competition last year (as was Sexton) to gain more seasoning . . . Played quarterback for UK freshmen in '58, then moved to halfback last year and should see relief duty on the right side this season . . . Long suit is defense . . . A near "B" student in Arts and Sciences College . . . Played four years as quarterback at Oneida High.

**MEL CHANDLER** (*Chand'-ler*) Junior Guard 6-1 197 Corbin, Ky.

A graduate of the same school that produced UK backfield flash Cal Bird, Corbin's Chandler was one of the most sought-after linemen in the state . . . Although he was impressive as UK freshman in 1958, Mel has yet to find spark that will make him a consistent collegiate standout . . . The "hard-nose" youngster started one game last season as a sophomore and looked good in reserve right guard role while totaling 102:10 action in nine games . . . Could surprise this year due to impressive spring practice . . . He was team captain, All-State, All-Southern and All-America as an end and guard at Corbin . . . Enrolled in Education College and plans to coach.

**DAVE CHAPMAN** (*Chap'-man*) Junior Halfback 5-11 169 Richmond, Ind.

A former schoolboy All-America quarterback who transferred to Kentucky in 1958 after brief stay at Purdue, Chapman has yet to see action in a Wildcat uniform . . . Not eligible in '58 and laid out last year . . . Now a halfback, Dave had good spring practice and could see important relief action this season . . . Looks best on defense . . . In high school at Richmond, he won All-Indiana and All-America honors . . . Also played basketball and baseball . . . Father, Glenn, is former major league baseballer . . . A good student, Dave passed most hours (34 in Education) of anyone on team last year.

**BILL COOPER** (*Coop'-er*) Soph. Guard 5-11 196 Miami, Fla.

This likeable and capable youngster was hampered in development this spring by a minor injury, but his background indicates possibilities of great

things before graduation . . . An All-City and All-County star at Miami Edison Senior High, the Floridian proved big help to Kentucky freshmen last year as number one right guard . . . Should see important reserve action this season . . . Bill was Edison's most valuable player in 1958 . . . Plans to coach and teach.

**PAT COUNTS (Count'-s) Soph. Quarterback 5-11 172 Wauchula, Fla.**

This Florida product checks in for varsity duty with credentials substantiated by outstanding success as Kentucky freshman last season . . . Led all ball carriers with a 6.4 rushing average and classed by coaches as outstanding roll-out passer, excellent runner, fine punter and good leader . . . Pat has good speed as evidenced by rushing average and punt return leadership . . . Completed six out of 15 passes for 72 yards—all coming in season finale against Tennessee's freshmen as he turned in one of greatest all-around performances by yearlings in recent years . . . In that game, he also added 45 yards on eight carries, punted three times for 92 yards and returned two UT punts 17 yards . . . Counts, a quarterback in Kitten's first two games and then a halfback in the finale, likely will stay at signal-calling post this season . . . He was All-State quarterback at Hardee County High in Wauchula . . . Came to UK by way of Staunton Military Academy in his native Virginia.

**GARY COCHRAN (Cock'-ran) Junior Fullback 5-11 200 Etowah, Tenn.**

One of most impressive players in camp this spring, Gary (Bull) Cochran has served notice that he is THE man to take over fullback role vacated by graduated Glenn Shaw . . . Many observers figure Cochran extremely promising in offensive capacity and potentially a "darkhorse" for honor teams . . . Alternated as UK's number two fullback last season and wound up as fifth best ball carrier with 6.0 average (108 yards on 18 carries) to his credit, including 30-yard touchdown jaunt . . . Also fourth scoring and sixth pass receiving . . . Never a starter, he saw only 61:51 action time in eight games . . . Broken wrist in freshman year handicapped his development as a soph . . . Owner of a 10.3 average as schoolboy fullback at Ft. Thomas (Ky.) Highlands . . . Captain of team and second All-State pick . . . Also basketball and track standout . . . Born Corbin, Ky.



**MIKE COYLE (Coil) Soph. Tackle 6-0 202 Elizabethtown, Ky.**

An All-State honorable mention choice as schoolboy guard at Elizabethtown High, Mike switched to tackle as Kentucky yearling and responded well . . . Held out first varsity campaign last year . . . He was showing fruits of added experience this spring when he sustained a broken leg . . . Coaches are not counting him out this fall, but will heed advice of team physicians on the duty assigned to Mike . . . Popular as well as talented, he serves as vice-president of Wildcat Manor . . . Calls Frankfort home now . . . Good student in Commerce.

**NICKIE DANN** (*Dan*) Soph. End 6-5 193 Daytona Beach, Fla.

Although he now calls Daytona Beach, Fla., home, Dann was born in McRoberts, Ky., and attended high school at Jenkins, Ky. . . . During four years football as a schoolboy, he was co-captain, twice All-Conference and third team All-State as end . . . Also starred in basketball, track and baseball . . . Tried out for UK frosh cage squad, but failed to get into game last year . . . Won numeral as end on frosh grid team and could help this season.

**BILL DAVIDSON** (*David'-son*) Soph. Quarterback 6-2 198 Ashtabula, Ohio

This clean-cut youngster, one of eight Buckeye State natives on 1960 roster, isn't being underrated but likely will have uphill battle to see extensive action this season . . . With three senior quarterbacks in the fold, may have to wait until next year for golden opportunity . . . As a freshman flogger last season, Bill battled his way to number two ranking and wound up as team's second best passer with 11 completions in 20 tries for 125 yards in three games . . . Accumulated most of honors in three sports as schoolboy.

**JERRY DICKERSON** (*Dick'-er-son*) Junior Guard 6-0 193 South Point, Ohio

An all-around star athlete of South Point (Ohio) High fame, Dickerson is prize example of willingness to sacrifice headlines for good of team . . . The husky youngster was star halfback, captain of the team and All-South choice as schoolboy . . . He turned in outstanding jobs also as UK freshman back in 1957 . . . After year's absence from grid activity, Dickerson shifted in 1959 to guard and turned in consistently good performances . . . Playing on right side, Jerry accumulated total of 215:10 in action . . . Lone starting call came against LSU . . . Likely to be number two right guard this season . . . Possessing good speed, he was high point man and set records in 440 and hurdles in high school, pitched for baseball team.

**WAYNE DIXON** (*Dix'-son*) Junior Tackle 6-0 219 East Point, Ky.

Much credit is due this tough competitor . . . The fact that he is top candidate for starting duty at right tackle represents one of biggest improvement jumps on team . . . All last year, Wayne was rarely better than number three man on left side and saw only 51:45 action in six games . . . He failed to win varsity letter . . . Tough competition exists, but fire-plug-type (low and solid) Dixon is favored for top job . . . Comes from family of athletes, including brothers playing football and basketball at other colleges . . . Wayne won 13 letters in four sports at Prestonsburg High, where he was tutored in football by ex-Wildcats John Griggs and Doc Ferrell . . . Third team All-State pick at center . . . Switched to tackle at UK.



**HOWARD DUNNEBACKE** (*Dunn'-e-back*) So. HB 5-8 181 Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Short on size, but long on drive . . . This 181-pound halfback-fullback overcame size handicap last season to finish second among freshman ground gainers with 72 yards on 20 carries for 3.6 average . . . Alternated between halfback and fullback this spring . . . Most likely to see only spot duty at full, but should help at half . . . High school team used Single Wing . . . Howard picked up three letters each in football, baseball and track at Oak Ridge . . . Better than average student in Engineering . . . Married.

**DAN EASLEY** (*Ease'-lee*) Soph. Halfback 5-10 154 Detroit, Mich.

Not on scholarship this spring due to rules not allowing grant for one year to a boy who starts on his own . . . Easley earned his way by waiting on tables at varsity football house . . . Showed up well despite lack of desirable size and should help this season . . . Transfer from Western Kentucky State College and spent three years in Army.

**JERRY EISAMAN** (*Eyes'-ah-man*) Senior Quarterback 6-1 190 Bethel, Pa.

Co-Captain of the '60 Wildcats, Eisaman may be "darkhorse" star capable of leading Kentucky to successful season if he remains physically sound and shows improvement on non-passing phases of his game . . . Coach Collier calls Eisaman "one of the fine mechanical passers of the country" . . . Jerry has been handicapped in his development by injuries in his first two varsity seasons . . . An almost unheralded prize package from the western Pennsylvania hotbed of football talent, he came to the Wildcats in 1956 without achieving even All-State honor while at Bethel High . . . After fine showing as a UK freshman, Jerry began to run into an injury jinx . . . Just before the opening game in '57, he suffered shoulder separation and missed the entire season . . . Early the next year, an auto accident injury to his back caused him to sit out spring practice . . . Then, after playing 172:27 in nine games as a third-year soph in

'58, Jerry sustained cut forehead in locker room accident at the start of spring preparations last year . . . But he shook off this and an opening-game knee injury to become number two QB of the team and run up a total of 147:15 action time, including three starts . . . He was second in passing with 29 hits in 70 tries for 310 yards and four TD's . . . Coupled with his team-leading soph record, Jerry now has 59 completions out of 122 attempts and a net gain of 759 yards . . . Ranked among SEC aerial leaders both years . . . All-SEC Sophomore team selection in '58 . . . Earned nickname "Pennsylvania Pickpocket" for participation in one of year's oddest plays two years ago: Against arch-rival Tennessee, he reversed trend of close game by stealing ball from fullback Carl Smith while on the run. This set up a UK touchdown enabling 6-2 win . . . Good student, he passed 32 hours in Education College last year with nearly "B" average . . . Heir apparent to starting duty, but must fight off challenge of converted-end Tom Rodgers . . . Current vice-president of K Club.



**BOB FARRELL (Fair'-el) Soph. Center 6-4 197 Cincinnati, Ohio**

Only Queen City product on the varsity squad, Farrell is regarded as good prospect for extensive reserve action this season after year on the sidelines with red shirts . . . Bothered with ankle injury early in first varsity campaign a year ago . . . Looked good this spring . . . Top notch tackle and linebacker at Cincinnati Elder High . . . Tried at end as UK freshman in '58 due to size . . . Also starred as baseball pitcher in high school . . . Good student in Engineering.

**JIM FISHER (Fish'-er) Senior Fullback 6-0 204 Morganfield, Ky.**

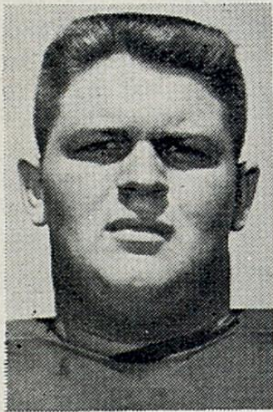
A good defensive man and exceptionally hard to bring down when in top-notch running form, Fisher should be in thick of battle for starting fullback duty this year . . . In first two seasons, he had provided key relief help although not seeing considerable action . . . Total time: 64:41 . . . Total yards: 47 on 13 trips . . . Picked up first varsity letter last season . . . Played five years football at Morganfield, winning honorable mention All-State . . . Dutch ancestry.

**DAVE GASH (Gash) Soph. End 6-2 191 Louisville, Ky.**

After spending a year on the bench (by design), Gash has given every indication he's ready for important action this season . . . Looked like one of top pass receivers on team this spring and is tough, head-knocking runner and good defensive man as well . . . Probable left side reserve . . . The blonde-thatched former Louisville Shawnee star fullback stood out as UK freshman two years ago, leading team from fullback in ground gained (111 yards in three games) . . . Son of railroad detective, Gash won second team All-State honor and was three-sport star at Shawnee.

**BOB GEBHART (Geb'-hart') Soph. Tackle 6-4 248 Louisville, Ky.**

One of the biggest men ever to don a Wildcat uniform (available records indicate he is largest), Gebhart is extremely mobile for size and coaches are expecting he will be scourge of opposing linemen . . . Bob proved himself outstanding on defense as regular left tackle for last year's UK freshman eleven . . . May not get nod to start in the early going this year, but certain to play extensively . . . With experience under SEC game conditions, he is counted on to rank alongside former All-America line greats Bob Gain (6-3, 220 as freshman) and Lou Michaels (6-1, 221 first year) . . . Gebhart reported last fall at 285, trimmed off about 40 pounds before season over . . . Speed not great, but agile and adjusts quickly . . . Looked good in spring practice and Blue-White game . . . Hopes to play pro football.



**FRANK GOETZ (Getz) Junior End 6-1 192 Bloomfield, N. J.**

Frank has experienced some difficulty in making adjustment to collegiate ball, but could make grade to more consistent duty this fall . . . Came to University by way of Pottsville (Pa.) High and Greenbrier Mili-



tary Academy in 1957 with experience as end and guard . . . Played both end and center as UK yearling . . . Something of oddity at center since he's left handed . . . Saw only 6:26 action as sophomore reserve flankman and did not get into game last year . . . German-Irish ancestry . . . Born Philadelphia.

**IRVIN GOODE (Good'-e) Junior Center 6-5 212 Florence, Ky.**

Widely regarded as one of top centers in Southeastern Conference, Goode enters current season with billing as "a man to watch" . . . Named to second team advance All-SEC selections, but could surprise experts by achieving near-greatness as he sees regular action for first time this season . . . Although he played in all 10 games last fall for total of 203:51 and showed himself extremely capable, Irv never started a game due to presence at center of Hodge—whose defensive ability and experience could not be sacrificed in crucial early stages . . . With move of Hodge to guard, Goode should have little trouble taking over and blossoming into one of South's top centers . . . Coach Collier has lavished consistent praise on lanky native Kentuckian—tabbing him two years ago as "a potential future All-America" and last season as "the best blocking center Kentucky has had in recent years" . . . Played only two years of high



school football at Boone County High, but captained team and won honors ranging from All-State to All-America . . . Discus and javelin man with UK track team in off-season.

**DAN HALEY (Hay'-lee) Soph. Guard 6-1 184 Pineville, Ky.**

In past six and one-half years of his football career, Haley has played just about every position there is and looked pretty good anywhere he is stationed . . . During four years at Pineville High, he was tackle and All-State honorable mention . . . As UK freshman in 1958, Dan switched to end and showed promise . . . Last year, tried at halfback, then fullback and later at guard . . . Haley did not see action in 1959, but could settle into reserve duty at guard this season . . . Leading scorer of conference as basketball pivotman at Pineville . . . Scotch-Irish descent . . . Good student in Engineering.

**JUNIOR HAWTHORNE (Haw'-thorn) Soph. Guard 6-1 222 Pomeroy, Ohio**

Although he prefers to be called by nickname, "Junior," and you might have a fight on your hands if you use his real Christian name of "Pearl," Hawthorne has sparkled like a jewel in his football career to date . . . Came fast this spring after year on red-shirts in '59 . . . Likely to be chief relief man for Hodge at linebacking guard spot . . . Strong and possesses fairly good speed for size . . . He was a high school fullback and tackle, captained team two years and won All-America honors . . . Tried at tackle as UK freshman in '58, looked good experimentally at fullback during absence from action last year . . . Also outstanding in basketball and track as schoolboy.

**JIM HILL (Hill) Soph. Guard 6-1 190 Neon, Ky.**

A red-headed, aggressive, do-it-all man, Hill is type who looks good wherever he is tried . . . Coaches expect to station him at the linebacking left guard position this season and, in his first try at post this spring, looked good enough to guarantee action . . . Held out last season after fracturing a thumb in spring . . . At time, he was listed as halfback but looked best on defense . . . Came to UK in '58 with rep as one of Letcher County's all-time great athletes . . . A four-sport standout, he garnered total of 14 schoolboy letters and posted sparkling list of achievements including All-State and All-America mention in football . . . Led UK frosh in pass receiving and punt returns as RHB.

**LLOYD HODGE (Hah'-ge) Senior Guard 5-10 188 Whitesburg, Ky.**

Co-Captain of the 1960 Wildcats, Lloyd Hodge carries highest recommendation that a football coach can bestow: "He's a real hard-nose football player" . . . And that tag particularly fits this tough



mountain boy from Eastern Kentucky's coal fields who is generally considered to be one of the South's best linebackers . . . Hodge simply loves game of football at its roughest and once admitted to an interviewing newspaperman that he'd rather hit folks and tackle than eat—a view that a good many opponent ball carriers will subscribe to . . . As Coach Collier explains that talent of his prize linebacker, "Lloyd not only likes contact, but hunts for people to tackle . . . We credited him with being in on 15 to 25 tackles a game last season and he has been the backbone of our defense for the past two years" . . . Hard to single out Hodge's best game of last year, when he operated at center linebacker position, but many feel

it came against Louisiana State . . . In that contest, he was checked by movies to have been the initial force in stopping All-America Billy Cannon and other Tiger ball carriers on 17 occasions . . . Although he has been team's most consistent operative for two seasons, Hodge has been handicapped in gaining selection to honor teams by fact that he has played a different position each year . . . As a sophomore, he was a fullback and moved over to center last season to take greater advantage of his linebacking ability . . . This year, the unselfish star will take over the linebacking left guard spot and most observers are predicting a great year capped by national recognition that has escaped him in the past . . . All-America and All-Conference selectors admitted last season that Hodge probably was one of most underrated linemen in the South, but had to go with outstanding veterans Maxie Baughan of Georgia Tech and Jackie Burkett of Auburn—both now graduated . . . Hodge started every game for Kentucky last season, totaling 313:31 in action time . . . Two years ago, he saw 153:19 action as an alternate fullback starter and posted a rushing average of 5.6 yards per try that took a back seat only to his defensive talent . . . Winner of Lexington Salesmen's Club award as "Best Defensive Back" last year in his linebacker capacity . . . At Whitesburg High, Lloyd averaged an amazing 250 yards per game and scored 140 points . . . All-State in football, participant in basketball, track, baseball.

**BOB HOLMAN (Hole'-man) Soph. Fullback 5-11 188 Louisville, Ky.**

Bob was the leading scorer of Louisville area during final year as school-boy star at Shawnee High . . . Won All-State honor as halfback . . . Upon becoming freshman at UK last season, he shifted to guard and showed up very well on left side . . . Remained at guard this spring, but likely to be tried at fullback where depth needed . . . Awarded eight letters in four sports at Shawnee.

**TOM HUNDLEY (Hund'-lee) Senior Halfback 5-11 158 Johnson City, Tenn.**

One of Tennessee's leading prepsters four years ago, Hundley has surprised many experts who predicted he would never stick it out in collegiate competition of SEC calibre . . . Not only has Tom stayed, he has been standout . . . At his best as defensive man and punter . . . Missed only one game last season and saw 114:42 action time as reserve left half to improve on five-game total of 21:48 in 1958 . . . Third in punting last year with 33.5 average on seven boots, second in punt returns with six run-backs for 69 yards . . . Came to UK as quarterback, shifted to LH as a soph . . . At Science Hill High, he won All-Tennessee and All-America mention . . . Born Cleveland, Ohio . . . Art and wood work are hobbies . . . Married and good student in Education.

**TOM HUTCHINSON (Hutch'-in-son) Soph. End 6-1 189 New Albany, Ind.**

Rated as "a great prospect" by Coach Collier on basis of a sterling high school reputation and standout performance as Kentucky freshman last season, Hutchinson is being groomed to see important action in his first varsity year at end . . . "Hutch" is a great receiver, good defensively and shows excellent agility to go along with 6-1 and 189-pound size . . . He led UK's yearlings in pass receiving with 11 catches good for 136 yards and three touchdowns . . . The three markers also gave Hutchinson leadership among the Kittens in scoring department . . . As a schoolboy, the New Albany, Ind., product was recognized as one of finest all-around athletes in the state—starring in football, basketball and track . . . He won All-State honors on the gridiron, played regularly on team that went to state finals in basketball and won state championship with a high jump of 6-4 in track . . . Probably will operate on the left side . . . Born in nearby Stanford, Ky. . . . Hobby is bee keeping.



**KEITH HUTSON (Hut'-son) Soph. End 6-2 178 Corbin, Ky.**

One of three Corbin High School graduates on current Wildcat squad, Hutson has had difficult time in efforts to make name for himself in collegiate football . . . Broke an ankle on the first day of practice last year as a freshman and it handicapped him throughout season . . . As an all-around sports star in high school, Keith was leading pass receiver and scored 21 touchdowns in football, led rebounding as cager and high jumped in track.

**BOB HUNT (Hunt) Senior Tackle 6-2 218 Richmond, Ind.**

A tough man to move out of position, Hunt has physical equipment and strength plus know-how to be one of Kentucky's top linemen . . . Should



challenge seriously for left tackle starting berth this season . . . One of two lettermen tackles, Bob picked up second varsity "K" last year while seeing 186:36 action in all 10 games . . . Had 179:25 as a soph . . . Never started a game . . . The be-spectacled gridder, who wears contact lenses on field, was accorded honorable mention on the UPI's All-America list last season and this confidence nod from the experts could make him tough to handle in 1960 . . . Hunt was co-captain and All-State as a center-tackle on Richmond High team that ranked as mythical Indiana schoolboy champions in 1956 . . . Entered UK in '57 . . . Sgt. at Arms of Wildcat Manor.

**BOB JOHNSON (John'-son) Soph. Center 6-3 208 Ashland, Ky.**

Back after one-semester absence last fall, Johnson is being counted on to strengthen center corps . . . Won freshman numeral in '58 as a tackle . . . He was four-sport star in high school . . . Captained grid team and made third unit All-State in addition to playing basketball, baseball and track . . . High school coach at Catlettsburg was Charlie Snyder, now head coach at Marshall—UK's foe on Oct. 8.

**MARSHALL JOHNSON (John'-son) Soph. Guard 6-0 188 Lancaster, Ky.**

A quarterback for undefeated Lancaster High team in 1958, "Whitey" was tried at guard last year as UK freshman . . . Operated on the left side and impressed coaches to the extent he was consistent starter . . . During high school days, in which he won five letters for six years of football, he also tried his hand at end, tackle and center . . . Honorable mention All-State twice . . . Also basketball star and pitcher-third baseman in baseball . . . Valedictorian of his class and posted third highest standing among UK footballers last year . . . Studying pre-med with plans to become doctor.

**JON JURGENS (Jur'-gens) Junior Guard 6-4 201 Newport, Ky.**

Biggest of guards at 6-4 and 201, Jurgens could blossom into consistent reserve duty this season . . . Equally impressive on offense or defense and coaches are pleased with his mobility and desire . . . Jon played three seasons of football at Newport Catholic High, captained team and picked up All-State honorable mention . . . Won numeral as UK freshman guard starter in 1958 but did not see sufficient action last year (34:20 in three games) to letter . . . Majoring in Commerce and showed fourth highest standing on team past school year with near "B" average . . . Married.

**NICK KASIDONIS (Cass'-e-don-iss) Soph. Halfback 6-1 197 Cleveland, Ohio**

Most valuable player, team captain and All-City selection during three years as fullback at Cleveland's West High, Nick might alternate between

fullback and halfback duty in first varsity season this year . . . Has speed and power to operate effectively at either . . . Worked mainly from halfback slot as UK freshman last season . . . Also track star and cage standout in high school under name of Kavourias, changed last year when mother re-married . . . Greek descent.

**CLARKIE MAYFIELD** (*May' field*) Soph. Halfback 6-1 184 Alva, Ky.

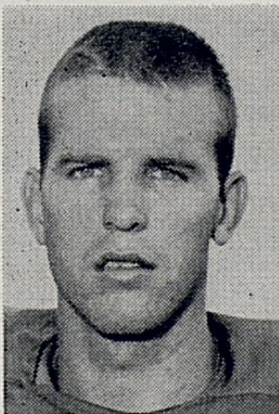
One of most talked about freshman gridgers in many years because of field goal kicking ability, Clarkie is being counted on to fill big void in Kentucky offensive arsenal this season . . . The Wildcats haven't had an outstanding place kicking specialist since Delmar Hughes recorded 38 conversions in 40 tries and 2 of 2 FG attempts in the 1954-56 era . . . (Other good marks of past are discussed in a brief elsewhere in this book) . . . Mayfield checked his credentials with four out of five conversions and pair of FGs last year as freshman . . . Markers from field travelled 35 and 30 yards to aid the Kittens in 13-6 win over Vandy frosh . . . Another boot of 55 yards fell just short in end zone . . . All-sports ace at Black Star High . . . Third team All-State gridder.

**JOE MORAJA** (*Mo-ray'-jah*) Soph. Tackle 6-1 208 Springfield, Ky.

This boy has potential and should play this year after added experience picked up during red-shirt year in '59 . . . Probably operate in reserve role on right side . . . Equally at home on defense or offense . . . Known to teammates as "J. C." . . . Prior to entering UK in 1958, he played four years of football at St. Joe Prep in Bardstown, Ky., as tackle . . . Also standout in basketball and field events man in track.

**DICKIE MUELLER** (*Mew'-ler*) Senior End 6-3 213 Louisville, Ky.

Nobody is more frank than Dickie himself in analyzing his play of last season . . . Mueller just did not live up completely to his outstanding reputation of '58, when he was chosen on the All-SEC Sophomore team, and to his unanimous pre-season selection to the All-South eleven at start of '59 campaign . . . But neither his coaches or experts are selling Dickie short and freely predict he will settle down this season to become one of South's top flankmen . . . Mueller has all ingredients for stardom—size, desire, speed, maneuverability and defensive skill . . . He is generally regarded as Kentucky's top end since All-America Howie Schnellenberger, now UK end coach . . . Regular right end last season with seven starts and 226:02 action time in all 10 games . . . Fifth pass receiving with six catches for 81 yards . . . As a soph, also started seven contests, totaled 316:55 time, caught two passes for 38 yards, stood out defensively . . . Schoolboy days at Louisville St. Xavier saw him team captain, All-State and All-America in senior year of 1956 . . . Second best broad jumper in state as member of St. X track team . . . Dutch ancestry . . . Popular off field . . . President of Wildcat Manor and K Club.



**JOHN MUTCHLER (*Mutch'-ler*) Soph. Center 6-3 189 Paducah, Ky.**

Regular center for Kentucky freshmen last season and rated outstanding prospect by coaches . . . Spring practice showing, coupled with fine frosh performance, had him tabbed as probable chief relief man at center at time he broke arm in scrimmage this spring . . . Team physicians expect he will be ready to enter bid again this fall and coaches are counting on terrific first varsity campaign . . . "Mutch" also looks good as linebacker . . . Played end in high school at Paducah Tilghman, making second All-State unit and mention on All-America.

**DON NUERGE (*Nur'-gee*) Senior End 6-0 188 Ft. Wayne, Ind.**

Never a regular last season as junior or in sophomore campaign, but Don is counted on to take over starting job at left end this year barring unforeseen development . . . Alternated between number two and number three on the right side in '59 while seeing 109:28 action time in eight games . . . Two years ago, Nuerge saw only 33:88 of action in five contests and had to wait until last year to pick up varsity letter . . . Caught only two passes last season, but is classed as good receiver . . . At Ft. Wayne North Side High, he was fullback-tackle . . . Moved to end after freshman year at UK in '57 . . . Indicative of speed, Don ran 220 and 440 on North Side High's state champion track team.



**DOUG O'BRIEN (*O'-Bry'an*) Soph. Tackle 6-2 212 South Attleboro, Mass.**

One of only two New England natives on varsity, Doug laid out last year and added experience should help him see extensive relief duty this season . . . He was latecomer in development as freshman . . . Could help as he has size and desire . . . Posted ninth highest standing on team during past school year with a near "B" average in Commerce . . . Attended St. Raphael Academy, in Pawtucket, R. I., and Greenbrier.

**ELMER PATRICK (*Pat'-rick*) Soph. Guard 6-0 177 Williamsburg, Ky.**

A would-be "hard nose" type of football player, Patrick is one of the grittiest and most determined—and also the smallest—lineman in camp . . . He takes a lot of punishment and is hurt at times, but he keeps coming back and dishes out his share when he can cope with an opponent . . . Coaches and teammates, alike, respect his inner toughness . . . "Branch" played just about every position on his high school team at Williamsburg, but was mostly a fullback . . . In his senior year, he carried 150 times for a 17-yards-per-try average and 78 points . . . Captain, five-letter winner and second team All-State during eight years of football.

**JIMMY POYNTER (*Point'-er*) Senior Fullback 5-11 182 Danville, Ky.**

A former all-sports standout at Danville, only about a 30-minute drive from UK campus, Poynter is not big as fullbacks go in SEC but makes up

for lack of exceptional size by determination . . . He's typical "hard-nose" as coaches reverently remark . . . Operating most of the '59 season as number two FB, "Jimbow" was fourth best ground gainer on team with 5.0 average on 26 trips . . . Played 148:28 in nine games . . . Good speed and tough defensive back . . . During sophomore year, saw only limited action (19:34) . . . Picked up first varsity grid letter last year . . . Also lettered in track as shot putter . . . Tried at halfback as freshman, went back to full as a soph . . . In high school, he was All-State in football, most valuable player two years in basketball, regional champion discus thrower in track and star baseball pitcher . . . Married.

**JOHN RAMPULLA** (*Ram-pew'-lah*) Soph. QB 6-0 186 North Miami, Fla.

One of youngsters being counted on to put pressure on veteran quarterback corps of Wildcats, Rampulla returns after year of seasoning with red-shirts in '59 . . . He has potential to help in reserve role this season . . . Good punter, better than average speed, fine passer and deft ball handler . . . Showed up well as star field engineer of UK freshmen in '58 . . . Good student in Commerce . . . Graduate of Archbishop Curley High in hometown Miami and St. Leo Prep . . . Italian descent . . . Born Jamaica, N.Y.

**BILL RANDELL** (*Rans'-dell*) Junior Halfback 6-1 178 Elizabethtown, Ky.

One of best all-around backs on '60 Kentucky contingent, Ransdell is equally outstanding as speed boy and on defense . . . Won varsity letter last season as understudy to left half Calvin Bird, seeing action in all 10 games totaling 142:59 . . . Never a starter, but saw important duty in relief and counted on to play even more this season. Greatest attributes are exceptional speed and balance plus defensive ability . . . A willing learner, Bill had best spring practice of career this year . . . Good punter . . . Sixth in rushing last season with 4.0 average (23 trips—93 yards) . . . If knee recovers from off-season operation (made necessary by injury in Blue-White intra-squad game), should be one of top backs on club . . . A capable passer, he was a star quarterback while at Elizabethtown High and as Kentucky freshman in '58 . . . A near-"B" student in Education.

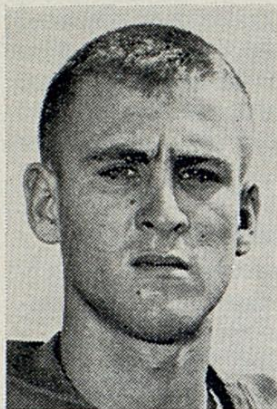


**JIM READER** (*Ree'-der*) Senior Halfback 6-1 192 Louisville, Ky.

Overcame handicaps of illness and injury last year to see important duty as number two right half . . . At season's start, Reader was a big question mark in plans due to summer siege of hepatitis and then missed early practice plus first two games with bruised hip muscle . . . When physically fit, "Mumbles" showed marked improvement in running and was good defensive back . . . As soph, he saw only 19:53 action time . . . Boosted this to 123:45 in eight games last year . . . Expected to better rushing total of 39 yards compiled in '59 . . . As schoolboy halfback, Jim led Louisville St. Xavier to 1956 mythical state championship and won second string All-State . . . Coached in football and track by ex-Wildcat Johnny Meihaus . . . Scotch-Irish descent.

**TOM RODGERS (Rah'-gers) Senior Quarterback 6-1 183 Madisonville, Ky.**

Key man in major experiment being conducted by Coach Collier, Rodgers moves from two-year regular end duty to quarterback . . . Shift intended to strengthen this important post and spring practice performance indicated that experiment will pay big dividends . . . Before breaking left hand midway through spring drills, Rodgers had worked way up to alternate as number one man with veteran QB Jerry Eisaman . . . Team physicians say hand should be OK this fall, but coaches are worried over fact Rodgers missed much practice last two weeks of spring drills . . . While physically fit, he looked exceptionally good and made believer of many skeptics wondering advisability of position shift of senior . . . Although not completely unfamiliar with quarterbacking, Tom has not played position since winning second-team All-State schoolboy honors and starring in post as UK freshman in '57 . . . Showed he's capable



this spring with sound play selection, leadership, good passing style, outstanding running ability and defensive skill . . . Shift first considered late last season when QB troubles cropped up, but abandoned in interest of fairness to boy doing good job at left end . . . Rodgers wound up second pass receiving with 154 yards on 10 catches . . . In '58, he had five catches for even 100 yards . . . Started nine games at left end and saw total action of 339:25 last year to add to '58 record of 238:04 and four starts at right end . . . As frosh quarterback, he hit 10 out of 16 passes for 343 yards in three games . . . Never has missed game at UK . . . Won 12 letters as three-sport star at Madisonville High . . . On All-State, All-South, All-America units as football senior . . . Honorable mention UPI All-America list as UK junior last season . . . Born Greenville, Ky.

**KEN ROSS (Ross) Soph. Center 6-1 202 Covington, Ky.**

Back after hitch in military service, Ross is being counted on at center and possibly may see action as well at guard—both in reserve capacity . . . Seems to have potential to help bolster center corps particularly . . . Only action in Kentucky uniform came as a freshman center in 1956 . . . Left for military duty before '57 season and returned early this year to go through first spring practice . . . Ross played center four years at Dixie Heights, achieving All-State first team honor in 1955 . . . German-Irish descent.

**FRANK SAKAL (Sake'-all) Soph. Center 6-1 205 Aliquippa, Pa.**

Moved from quarterback to center this spring after displaying considerable ability as linebacker . . . Frank operated as quarterback last season with UK freshmen and proved capable in role of passer-ball handler, but his size seemed to be going to waste . . . Also quarterback during high school days at Aliquippa . . . Broke ankle in spring practice this year and this hampered his development at new position . . . He's Hungarian in descent.

**LARRY SCHAD (Shad) Soph. Guard 6-3 192 New Albany, Ind.**

Picked up freshman numeral for reserve duty at guard with Kittens last season . . . Size and speed should qualify him for some relief duty



this season while picking up experience . . . Known as "Shadrack" to friends, Larry played tackle on same team as UK end Tom Hutchinson and came to Kentucky with him in '59 . . . Honorable mention All-State.

**DENNIS SCHRECKER** (*Schreck'-er*) Soph. End 6-3 196 Louisville, Ky.

Brother of ex-Wildcat Ray Schrecker, Dennis picked up his grid tastes as end at Louisville Male High and achieved All-State honorable mention before joining the UK Kittens for '59 campaign . . . Coached by former UK grid standout Charlie Kuhn . . . Operated as number two left end with frosh . . . Should see action in reserve role this season . . . Size good, speed adequate . . . Also standout in basketball and track as schoolboy . . . Graduated cum laude.

**BILL SCOTT** (*Scott*) Senior Tackle 6-4 217 Pikeville, Ky.

Along with Irv Goode at center, Scott ranks as biggest of returning veterans and only couple of the soph competitors at tackle outstrip him in size . . . For reasons the experts and coaches cannot figure, Bill has never fully achieved potential as collegian and has yet to win varsity letter . . . However, he looked good this spring and expected to fight for starting job on right side . . . Good size, ability, speed and equally at home on offense or defense . . . Looked good as UK freshman in '57 after schoolboy career at Pikeville High, where he made honorable mention All-State, and Staunton (Va.) Military Academy, where he was All-Military . . . Had four game appearances and 29:57 time total as soph . . . 55:32 in four games last year.

**VINCE SEMARY** (*See-mary'*) Soph. Halfback 5-10 176 Cleveland, Ohio

Based on outstanding schoolboy reputation established at West Technical High in Cleveland and on performance as UK freshman last year, great things are predicted for Semary . . . Due to more experienced men ahead of him, big chance may not come this year . . . But he could surprise . . . As number two right half for freshmen, Vince had only five carries in three games for 16 yards, caught a couple passes and returned only kickoff he handled 17 yards . . . At West Tech, he was Cleveland's leading scorer with 92 points and racked up 1,400 yards . . . Italian descent.

**DENNIS SEXTON** (*Sex'-ton*) Soph. End 6-0 192 Oneida, Tenn.

An All-State second team selection from among 4,000 players in his final high school year at Oneida, Sexton came to UK in 1958 and was an alternate end starter for undefeated Kittens . . . Held out last season while picking up experience . . . Could be ready for extensive reserve action before season is over . . . Joins teammate Don Carson (soph HB) as representative of Oneida and one of five Tennesseans on squad . . . Married.

**TOMMY SIMPSON** (*Simp'-son*) Soph. End 6-0 194 Lebanon, Ky.

A willing worker and considered top prospect, Simpson should help importantly this season—his third in Wildcat uniform . . . Laid out of competition last season after fracturing ankle . . . Coaches like attitude and consider him particularly good defensive man . . . Expected to be number two right end . . . Before joining UK freshmen in '58, he was all-sports

standout at Lebanon High . . . Earned 12 letters and All-State honors at halfback in football . . . Played this position first year as collegian, switched to end in spring practice last year . . . Good student in Education.

**DON SINOR (Si'-nor) Senior Guard 6-1 208 Hazard, Ky.**

Regular right guard most of last season (six starts), Sinor is key man in line building plans and is being counted on as steadying influence among predominantly-rookie crop of linemen . . . Showed steady improvement last season . . . Never spectacular, but dependable . . . Turned in one of best games against LSU last year . . . Total action time as junior was 291:40 in 10 games . . . Picked up first of his two varsity letters as soph right guard reserve in 65:16 action during six games . . . Won freshman numeral as a tackle . . . At Hazard High, Don was All-State and All-South as tackle final season in '56 . . . Honorable mention two other times in six years of football . . . Also basketball center, shot and discus man in track . . . Collects antique rifles as hobby . . . Sgt. at Arms of K Club.



**CHARLIE STURGEON (Stir'-jun) Senior Halfback 5-11 194 Owensboro, Ky.**

A power-type runner who is classed as one of the best all-around ball carriers in the Southeastern Conference, Sturgeon parlayed his inside-outside tactics into a creditable 4.1 rushing average last season . . . The 417 net yards he picked up on 101 trips with the pigskin ranked him as the leading ball carrier among the Wildcats and seventh best in the SEC . . . Carrying the statistics a little further, the chunky Kentucky native rated even higher when compared with the select group of runners who carried 100 times or more . . . His average trip on this basis proved to be fourth best, ranking right behind LSU All-America Billy Cannon . . . Sturgeon paced all ground gainers in Kentucky's near-upset of LSU in a rugged defensive battle and made a habit last season of looking good against the best teams . . . One of his top showings came as he picked up 144 yards on 20 tries in the Wildcats' one-touchdown loss to Georgia's eventual SEC champions . . . He nearly equalled the output of the entire Bulldog team, which netted only 157 yards on the ground, despite playing with a badly injured foot . . . In starting all 10 Kentucky games last season and piling up the most action time (383:06) of any Wildcat, the versatile right halfback also led his team in punting with a 33.5 average on 43 boots, ranked second in scoring with 18 points and was the fourth best pass receiver . . . Coach Collier also is high on Sturgeon's defensive ability, calling him the team's best sideback . . . As a four-year gridman at Owensboro High in Western Kentucky, Charlie gained All-State honors and was selected to various units of the All-South and All-America



schoolboy teams . . . He turned in an outstanding season as a UK freshman in 1957 and saw action in all contests (177:53—Auburn only start) as a sophomore, posting a 3.5 average (164 yards on 46 carries) to rank fourth among his teammates . . . Did not score in '58 after tallying three times as yearling . . . Nicknamed "Chester" . . . Married . . . Father is car dealer in Owensboro.

**GARY STEWARD (Stew'-ard) Soph. Halfback 6-1 178 Henshaw, Ky.**

Overlooked in early recruiting, Steward was "discovered" by UK coaches as he turned in outstanding performance in East-West All-Star Game here in summer of 1959 . . . Spurred by confidence placed in him by award of UK scholarship, "Jock" turned in very creditable games as regular left half of yearlings last year . . . This spring, he was talk of camp as outstanding runner and tough blocker . . . Expected to battle for number two right half job behind Charlie Sturgeon . . . Coached by ex-Wildcat Bill Dawson at Morganfield High, Steward was All-Conference quarterback . . . Switched to halfback as UK freshman . . . Also captained high school football, basketball teams and ran 100-yard dash in track.

**HOWARD TAYLOR (Tay'-lor) Soph. Center 6-3 194 Russellville, Ky.**

One of most versatile athletes on squad, this big and rugged lineman played five different positions on Single Wing club during six years of football at Russellville High . . . Won honorable mention All-State twice . . . Missed much of season as UK freshman last year but came back in time to turn in bone-crushing performance against Tennessee's Baby Vols . . . Tried at both center and tackle last year and this spring . . . Should see reserve duty at center in '60 on strength of defensive skill . . . Nicknamed "Tank".

**MARK THOMPSON (Tomp'-son) Soph. Center 6-2 199 Franklin, Ky.**

Hard work, aggressive attitude, good size and abundant ability are credentials offered by this popular lad in bid for extensive duty . . . Held out last year and added experience should help him cope with stiff competition at pivot post . . . All-Conference fullback in high school at Franklin-Simpson . . . Came to UK in '58 after one year of prep school at Castle Heights Military Academy in Lebanon, Tenn . . . Switched to center as Kitten and showed up well, especially in recovering Tennessee frosh fumbles that led to UK's only scores in 12-6 win two years ago . . . Near "B" student in Education . . . Secretary-treasurer of Wildcat Manor.

**MAX WALTON (Wall'-ton) Soph. End 6-4 192 Wellston, Ohio**

Biggest target among Wildcat receivers, Walton is being counted on for extensive reserve duty at right end this season . . . Held out last year and has valuable experience on his side . . . Came to Kentucky in 1958 after only two years of high school ball at Wellston . . . Alternate right side starter for frosh . . . Also starred as rebounder in high school basketball . . . High jumper with UK track team in off-season . . . Spent summer working in coal mine with father.

**JERRY WOOLUM (Wool'-um) Soph. Quarterback 6-2 186 Richmond, Ky.**

One of most publicized schoolboys of state in 1958 while starring at Richmond's Madison-Model High, Woolum has given every indication of

attaining greatness as collegian . . . Showed up very well this spring and last year during freshman action . . . Passes well, good runner and carries out plan of action with perfection of an experienced hand . . . Possesses a keen football mind . . . Chosen on the high school All-America as honorable mention pick and everybody's All-State while quarterbacking Madison-Model four years . . . Passed East team to 6-0 upset win over West in All-Star Game on Stoll Field two summers back . . . Alternated as number one quarterback of UK frosh last year and led passers with 15 completions in 28 tries for 155 yards . . . Beat Vandy frosh with tie-breaking TD pass in final seconds . . . Scotch-Irish descent.

**JIM YARBROUGH (Yar'-bro) Senior Guard 5-11 194 Morganfield, Ky.**

One of state's outstanding schoolboy guards at the time he graduated from Morganfield following the '56 season with All-State and All-America honors . . . Lived up to sparkling reputation as UK freshman three seasons back, but has not played extensively as varsity performer . . . Saw only 29 minutes of action in five games as sophomore and last year was held out of competition after an injury early in campaign . . . The stockily-built Yarbrough has experience to see important action this season and probably will play on right side.

### KENTUCKY'S COLORS

The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

# THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

## . . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 100,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution now in its 95th year.

The present school, which last year enrolled 10,813 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a division of Extended Programs, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under

the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706-acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

Dr. Frank G. Dickey currently serves as president of the University. The youthful, athletic-minded former dean of the UK College of Education succeeded venerable Dr. Herman L. Donovan in 1956 as the fifth chief administrative officer in the school's history. Dr. Dickey also serves as current president of the Southeastern Conference.

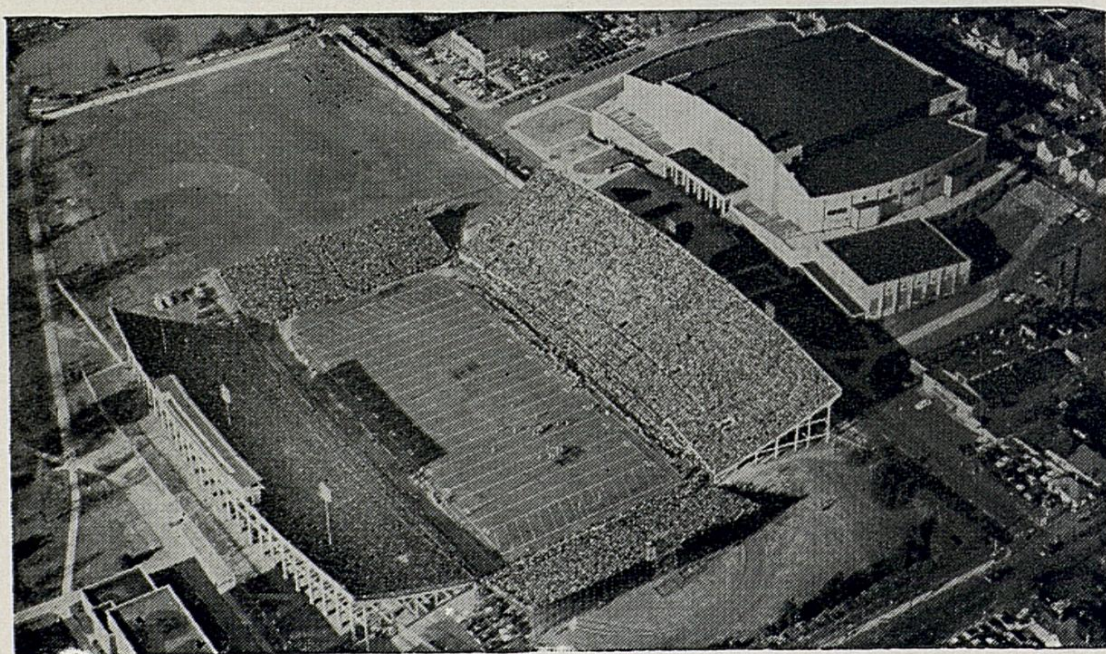
The University is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

## STOLL FIELD — McLEAN STADIUM

Much confusion among the general public and the sports-writing fraternity apparently exists over a seeming duplication of titles in referring to the University of Kentucky's football setup along "Avenue of Champions."

Officially, by action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the playing field is known as "Stoll Field." Likewise, by authority of the same body, the stadium proper is known as "McLean Stadium."

Kentucky's first football field, occupying the general site of what is now an intra-mural field west of the stadium, was first given a name when it was dedicated on October 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University of Kentucky. Soon after the first sections of



the present concrete stadium were completed on September 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville on October 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team



was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium on November 1, 1924.

The later reference to the concrete stands as "McLean Stadium" has existed since November 1, 1924, when the stadium was officially dedicated in memory of Price Innes McLean and a bronze plaque placed in the south stands by the Class of 1925. McLean, regular center on the 1923 Kentucky football squad, died November 7, 1923, as the result of injuries sustained in the U.K.-Cincinnati game played in the Queen City the afternoon before.

Major expansions of McLean Stadium in 1948, 1949 and 1959 have resulted in a current over-all seating capacity of approximately 37,500. The latest construction installed 3,655 new permanent box seats at a cost of \$115,000 and increased capacity by 1,629.

New practice facilities also have been prepared for the football Wildcats on the University farm. As part of a \$320,000 Sports Center, the varsity and freshman gridgers now practice on an area equivalent to five football fields in size. Along with the new field, they will have space in a large new dressing room building—making a facility recognized as one of the best in the nation.

The former practice lot and dressing room building, off Rose Street, were abandoned to make way for a new men's dormitory.

"Avenue of Champions" came into being in the spring of 1950 as an honorary title for that stretch of Euclid Avenue running between the University's \$4,000,000 Memorial Coliseum and McLean Stadium. The street was officially re-named by the City of Lexington in recognition of the UK athletic teams' unprecedented success of 1950 in annexing the Southeastern Conference titles in both football and basketball and their national championships in the Sugar Bowl grid game and the NCAA cage tournament.

### **PASS HEARD 'ROUND THE NATION**

A single running pass play by Mississippi State in the fading moments of a game on Stoll Field in 1955 not only cost Kentucky a victory, but proved to be even more important when the statistical filberts added up. If the Maroons had failed to complete the 83-yard, desperation aerial, the Wildcats probably would have led the nation's colleges in pass defense that season. Taking away that one play would have meant a per-game average of 39.6 yards allowed opponents via the airwaves, which would have topped the top mark posted by Florida (42.0). As it was, UK finished sixth in the nation with a 47.9 average.

## STOLL FIELD 'COW PASTURE' BIRTHPLACE OF DIXIE GRID SPORT

University of Kentucky's campus boasts the distinction of serving as the birth-place of Dixie football. Ironically, however, the forerunners of the present day Wildcats were not involved in the early grid contest.

The first inter-collegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably the first to take place west of the Alleghanies, came about April 9, 1880, on old Stoll Field. This gridiron, located adjacent to the present U.K. stadium and now used as a baseball field, was the site of the early tilt that saw Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania College) take the measure of Centre College, 13¾ to 0. The match, which was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby, followed by only six years the introduction of the game of football to the United States.

University of Kentucky (then called A & M College of Kentucky) did not play its first game until a year later on the same field, which once served as the private pasture for University President James Patterson's bovine herd.

### COLLIER GOES FROM SINGLE WING TO MULTIPLE T IN 30 YEARS' COACHING

Collier's football philosophy has varied little during more than 30 years of coaching experience. During his high school days at Paris, he taught the Single Wing system and didn't change over to the T formation until he was coaching the quarterbacks at Great Lakes during the war. He first gained experience with the "T" as a spectator during his boot camp training at Bainbridge, Md., and later while observing the pro Philadelphia Eagles of Greasy Neale. During his tenure as backfield tutor of the Cleveland Browns, he stressed the straight or "back-up" T formation. At Kentucky, he chose to utilize the Split T and plans to stick with the system this season with minor variations that make it a Multiple T now. He considers himself basically a running coach and attempts to keep a 60-40 balance in favor of the ground attack.

### ALUMNUS COACH

Although Head Coach Blanton Collier did not receive his initial college degree from University of Kentucky, he nevertheless might rightfully be called the Wildcats' third alumnus coach. He was awarded a master's degree in educational administration by the University in 1942. Only other graduates of U.K. later to take up head football coaching duties at their alma mater were J. White Guyn (1906-08) and A. D. Kirwan (1938-44).

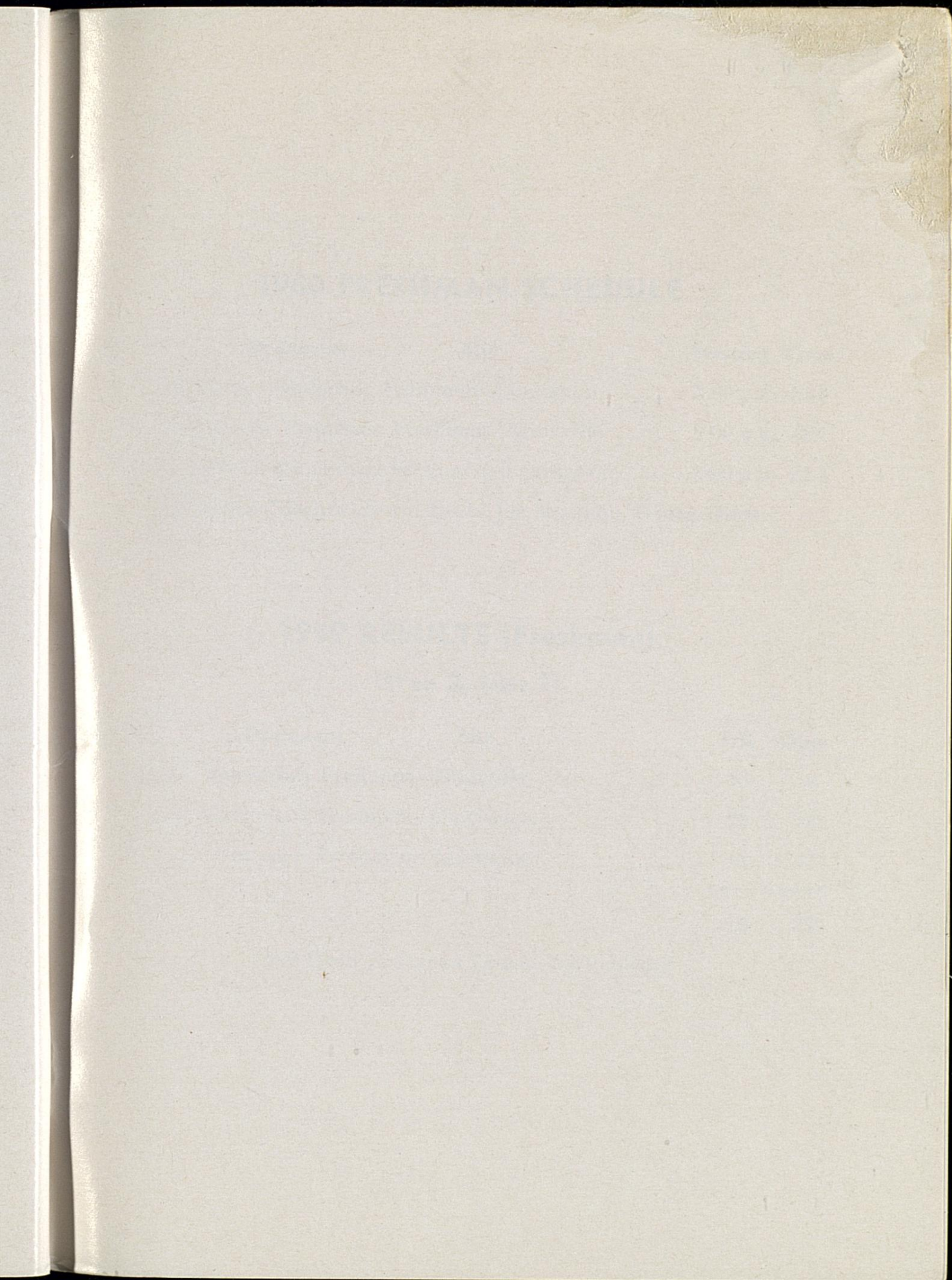

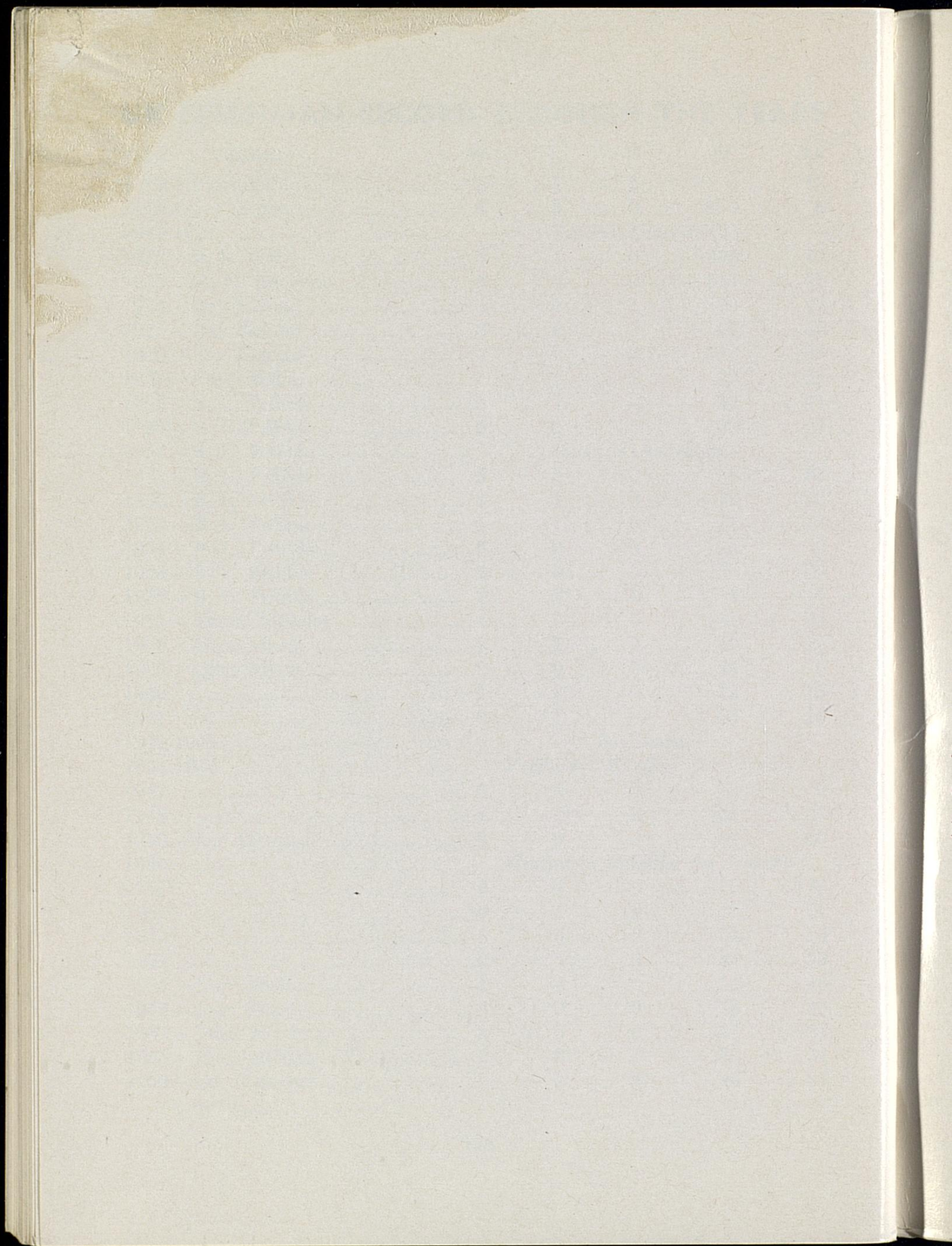
