change of underwear, one extra old suit, one change of stockings (or socks), swimming suit, heavy shirt, two heavy towels, one cake of soap, comb and brush, tooth brush and paste, handkerchiefs (or twelve pieces of clean muslin—which can be burned when soiled), knife, fork, spoon, cup and bowl.

Religious Instruction.

The religious life of the boys will be looked after. Sunday School will be held on Sunday at the camp, and some minister will preach to the boys. Day by day, they will be in constant touch with men who are interested in the boys' welfare. Every boy who is thus brought into contact with such influences will come away from camp with higher ideals, and with a finer view of life.

Announcement.

The sixth season of "Camp Dan Beard," the camp of the Louisville Council for Colored Boy Scouts, will begin Monday, August 3rd. The location is near Harrod's Creek, and is a beautiful and healthful location. This beautiful spot is easy of access, and in a splendid locality.

Camp Management.

The camp is under the general supervision of Mr. R. M. Wheat, Division Scout Executive, and the Camp Committee of the Division Advisory Board. Professor A. S. Wilson, who has been Camp Director for the past three years, will be the Camp Executive, and will have the active supervision of the camp. Professor Wilson has been very highly successful in his conduct of the camp, and the camp this year will be conducted upon the same high plane as heretofore. Prof. George L. Bullock will be Camp Director, in charge of the entire training program, swimming and athletics. He is highly efficient in every way and will make these important features highly enjoyable and thoroughly profitable. Dr. John H. Williams, the widely known physician and surgeon, who has rendered such valuable service in other years, will again be in charge of Camp Sanitation and First Aid Instruction. This is a guarantee that the health of the camp will be adequately protected, and the personal health of the boys thoroughly safeguarded. Other instructors and helpers will be present from time to time, and the entire staff of the camp is high grade in every way.

Rules and Regulations.

1. The Scout Oath and Law will be the law of the camp.
2. No firearms allowed.

3. Swimming only at specified hours, with instructor in charge.
4. Promiscuous building of camp fires forbidden. Fires to be built only when permission is granted.
5. No boy will be allowed to leave the camp without permission from the proper officer.

Camp Sanitation.

All necessary measures will be adopted to provide for the sanitation of the camp, and for the health of the boys. These important features will be carefully looked after by Dr. John H. Williams, Camp Physician.

Lodging and Food.

The boys will live in well arranged tents, and will have comfortable cots upon which to sleep. The ground upon which the tents will stand will be well drained, and the sleeping quarters will be dry all the time. The food will be plentiful and wholesome, and will be prepared by a thoroughly competent cook, and served in the large mess tent, under sanitary regulations. This feature has been so well looked after in the past that the boys have had many words of praise for the splendid "eats," and the way it has been prepared. The splendid reputation of the camp in this respect will be fully upheld this year.

Cost.

The cost will not exceed \$2.00 for a period of three days. There will be at least three periods of three days each, and a fourth period will depend upon the number of boys who might desire to stay for that period. The cost will thus be: \$2.00 for three days; \$4.00 for six days; \$6.00 for nine days, etc. A boy may register for as many periods as he desires.

Please fill out the inclosed application blank and return it, with registration fee of 50c, to Headquarters, 212 Pythian Temple, not later than July 25th, as it is very important that we know how many boys are going to camp, in order to properly provide for them. The registration fee of 50c is credited on the camp fee, and the balance may be paid before going to camp, or on arrival at camp.

We trust every boy will go for the full term of the camp if possible, but if he can not stay the full term, we will be glad to have him for a shorter time.

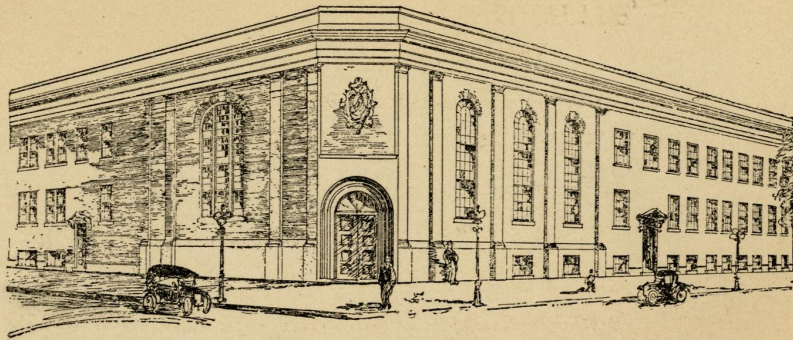
