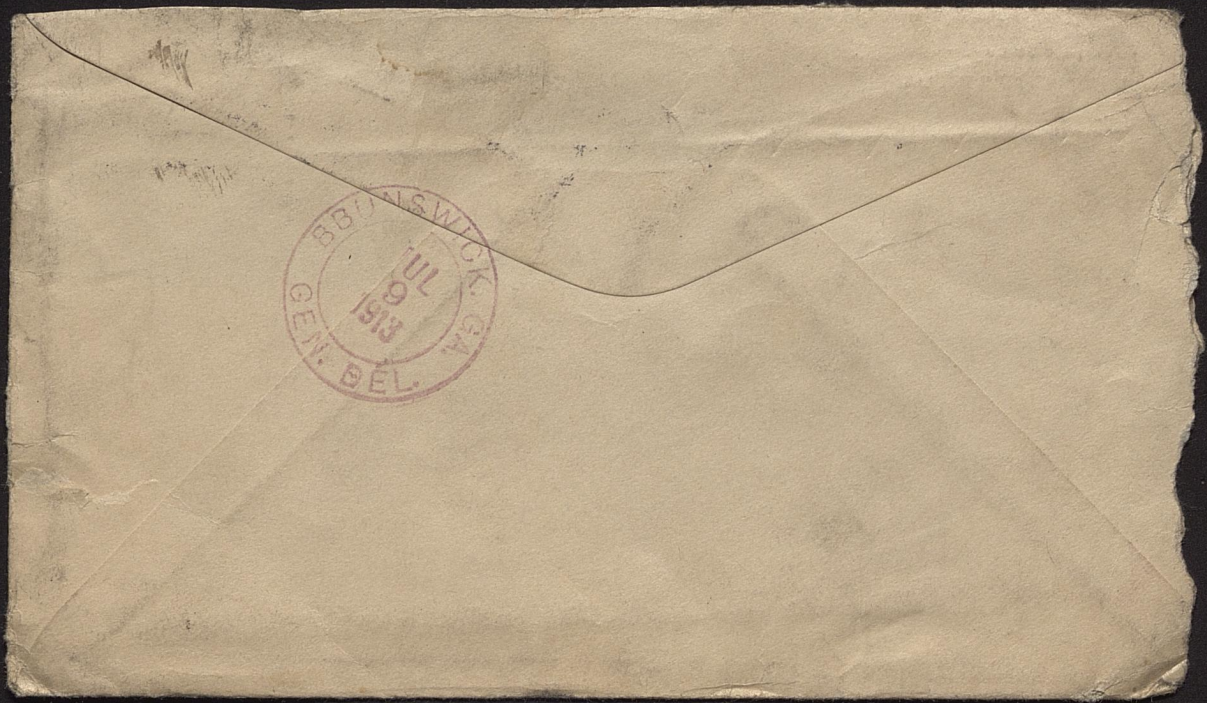

Dear Sir:

I was glad to hear from you the other day, and also to know that you are doing so well in your new field. I hope that your success will continue. Yes, we are trying to raise the balance of ~~xx~~ our pledge money for the new building, and we will have a new "Rally" on the 3rd Sunday in February, at which time we hope to get together enough to begin our building. The white Association is asking that we raise \$25,000. before the work can begin, and this is why we have not begun yet.

It shows us up rather in an unfavorable light to have the pledge campaign at the same time the white people held theirs, and their building is up, and ours has not begun. It is a case where we must maintain our racial self-respect.

Now as to your pledge, we have felt all along that you would pay the amount promised, but it has been three years now since the pledges were made, we have been meeting twice a week for more than a year going over the cards of the persons who pledged, and it has placed some of us in a rather embarrassing light to have to report some of our cards blank for that whole length of time, especially when the matter comes up at different times for discussion. I would have been happy if it could have been possible for you to have paid at least \$5 or \$10 if no more, but of course you know your own affairs better than I or anyone else, and I leave it with you as you may think best.

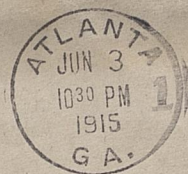

OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT
STATE TRAINING CONFERENCE FOR COMMUNITY LEADERS
Under Auspices of the State Y. M. C. A.
and the
National War Work Council.

1. Where held - At Camp Zachary Taylor, Louisville, Ky.
Delegates will be met at the Hostess House at the end of the Preston Street carline.
2. When - From 10:00 A. M. Monday, February 17th to 4:00 P. M. Friday, February 21st.
3. Who are to attend - At least one official representative from every county in the State and an additional representative from every town of 800 population or over, where possible. These representatives to be selected because of outstanding constructive leadership in the home community.
4. Purpose - The purpose of the conference is that those who attend shall work out while the conference progresses, programs which are adapted to the needs of their own communities with reference to those returning from war service, insofar as they are able to do so. Upon their return to their communities these representatives will assume leadership in organizing the forces of their community for carrying into effect the constructive programs which may be determined upon. The first step to this end will be the holding of a county conference in each county in the State for the consideration of the results attained in the State Training Conference.
5. Expenses - (a) All persons selected as delegates to the State Training Conference will wherever possible take care of their own expense. Where necessary, however, the State Y. M. C. A. will pay the necessary expenses for one official delegate from each county, including railroad fare and entertainment while in camp. Each official delegate will receive notification from the office of the State Y. M. C. A. which will be the basis of his claim for reimbursement upon his expenses. Where necessary, the actual board in camp will be paid for two additional representatives from each county.

(b) Local Y. M. C. A.'s throughout the State may send such delegates as they appoint to the State Training Conference and defray the expenses of such delegates out of the demobilization fund already placed at their disposal by the National War Work Council.

Where parties coming plan to meet their own expenses, the only charge will be One Dollar per day for their board in camp, in addition to railroad fare and other travelling expenses.
6. Faculty for the State Training Conference - The faculty for the State Training Conference will include such representative leaders as Dr. E. Y. Mullins, President of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Dr. D. H. Ogden, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Louisville, Ky., Hon. H. V. McChesney, Frankfort, Ky., Prof. F. O. Clark, Berea College, Berea, Ky., L. A. Cover, Camp Musical Director, Camp Taylor, V. E. Tharp, Camp Physical Director, Camp Taylor, L. J. Darter,

Overseas Staff, Army Y. M. C. A., W. I. McNair, General Secretary, Louisville Y. M. C. A., C. A. Tevebaugh, Associate State Secretary, State Y. M. C. A., P. C. Dix, State Secretary, Camp General Secretary, Camp Taylor, and others.

7. Living Conditions - Delegates to the State Training Conference will have a splendid opportunity to get in first hand touch with army life. The delegates will be housed in army barracks and will eat at an army mess served by the Cooks and Bakers School. The best way to understand the soldier's point of view is to live as he lives for a few days.

8. Program for the State Training Conference - The following is a general outline of the program for the Training Conference for each day:

- (a) Bible Study hour, one period daily.
- (b) Recreation demonstration; outdoor and indoor games, community play, dramatics, community singing, etc., two periods daily.
- (c) Discussion group. Entire conference divided into sections, such as rural, small towns or cities without Y. M. C. A.'s and larger cities. These groups to consider for two periods per day the recreational, civic, economic and religious needs of their types of communities.
- (d) General conference hour on community problems, one period per day devoted to the discussion of the findings turned in from the discussion groups just referred to.
- (e) Messages on fundamentals, three addresses per day on such subjects as "The Religious Life of the New Day", "The Message of Christianity for Social and Economic Reconstruction", "The Returning Soldier and His Relation to the Life of the Community".

In addition to the above program, the delegates in attendance at the conference will have the opportunity each evening to get in actual touch with the life of the soldier in the army camp, in the army Y. M. C. A. buildings and elsewhere, interviewing them and getting at first hand the soldiers ideas as to what should be done in the home communities to best fit them back into the community life.

My dear Friend:-

I observe that our race is thinking as never before, and many are of the opinion that some very definite thing should be done at the earliest possible date to set before our people a constructive program for the days which lie ahead of us. Personally, I feel that a selected group of our people should be called together for what I would call a conservation conference or congress to take stock of what we have; set our goal for what we must attain; put our thought upon the tremendous assets we have ourselves, but which we have not learned how to use effectively in our interest. The Banks in every city of any consequence, where our people live, have large sums of our money, which is of no real value to us from a racial standpoint. I use this as an example.

My thought would be that this conference should not be a spectacular speech making affair but that it should be a commission form of conference. The commissions to be appointed ahead of time to make reports and to suggest a goal for the race, all of this to be put in such concise, plain, simple form that the preacher, teacher, or leader in the most remote part of our back woods districts could use it effectively among the people. It would certainly mean increased interest in thrift, home buying, land buying, the conservation of the genius of our race, in music, art, literature, etc. etc.

The conference should result in a continuation committee which would influence states, counties, cities, and outlying communities through the work of proper leaders.

I suppose that it is because the Young Men's Christian Ass'n has held a neutral place in all of our racial efforts, religious, educational, and economic, that a number of influential men from different parts of the country, have been asking that I make an effort to initiate such a conference. I want your frank, candid opinion as a trusted friend, and your confidential advice. I have nothing to say about myself, except that, I have given my life up to this time unselfishly for the welfare of my people. This particular thing rests heavily upon my heart. I know a group of men, who if assembled would be capable of producing influences which in due time would bring a full measure of freedom to our race, and enable us to take our place as citizens capable of bearing our share of the nation's responsibilities.

I shall await the earliest possible reply you can give me with great interest.

I am addressing this letter to a few other trusted friends and am only sorry it is not possible to see each one personally.



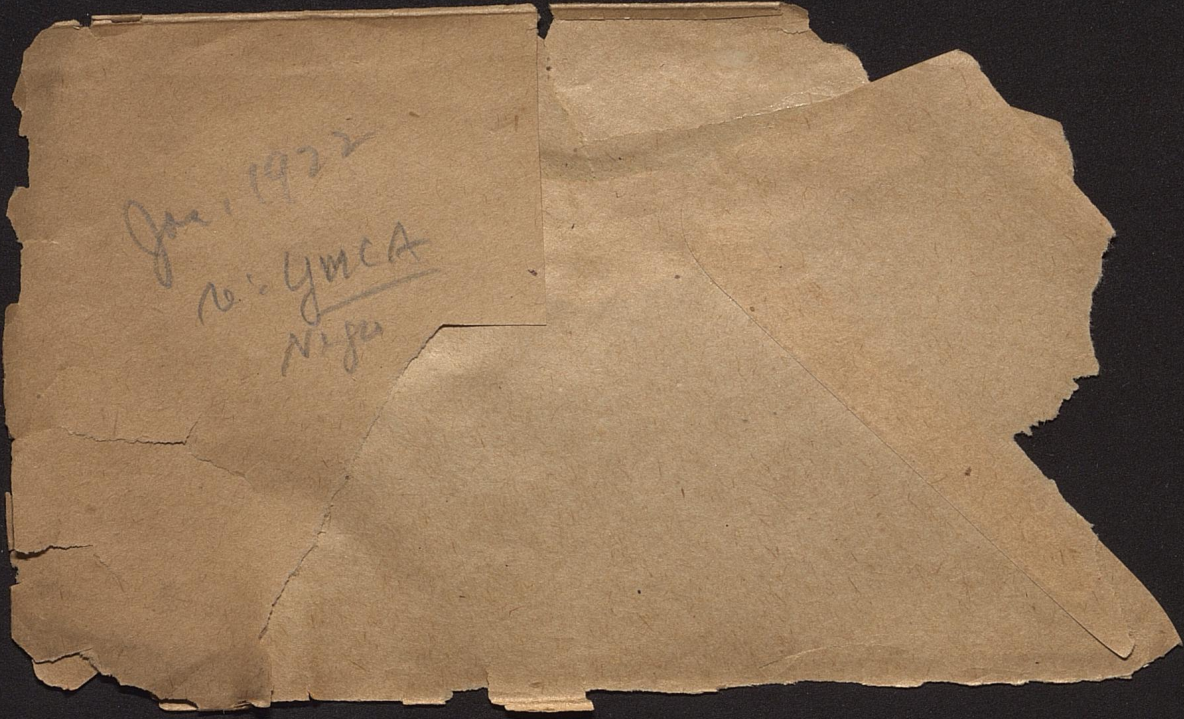
