to bring me over.

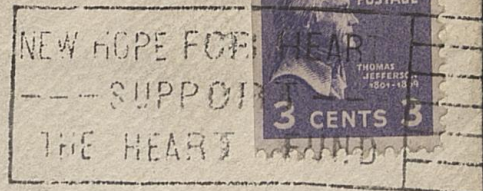
Hogan hasn't been so well, so he went to the doc. last week and he advised him to slow slow down some.

Hope Louise is well. I know she is glad you are home again & I do hope you are going to get along nicely.

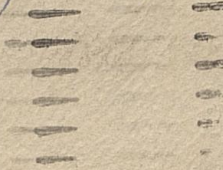
Remember us to her. Every body sends love.

My mother looks sick before I went to the hospital & is still on the waiting list. I think it is her age more than anything else. Since they are such

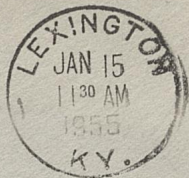
