with her, did you know she had  
gone in to Christian Science, and she  
has changed so much, so considerate  
and charitable minded.

Well Mrs Beale we are all well but Oh  
this terrible war, and the high cost of  
living is driving us crazy butter is 48<sup>c</sup>  
potatoes 90<sup>c</sup> a bush sugar 10<sup>c</sup> eggs 50<sup>c</sup>  
flour 12 dollars, but lots of folks think  
it is not going to last long.

Am sorry you were sick, you ought to be  
more careful. Mr Chase is at the school,  
and Ralph is fainting. Mrs Yelland folks  
are all well she is doing lots for the  
soldier boys. Lew says you ought to  
give you land in Medford to some one  
for a garden, as every piece of land is  
being plowed up for food, we have been  
giving a piece across the street.
