Dear Madam,-

Your favor of the 3d inst. at hand. I enclose receipt for the \$12.00 covering payments to Jan. 20th, 1912.

In regard to the question of letting the Lincoln Steet lot, the man is Benjamin Robinson, Lincoln St., West Medford. He has not answered my last letter to him and I do not know if he was sincere in his inquiry or not; I enclose the correspondence with him and would advise you to see him yourself about it. Take care of the correspondence for future reference.

Now about the payments on the land,- You are credited with \$220.00 which includes this last payment of \$12.00 also the original \$50.00 paid on the bond. The amount still due is \$230.00. Thus you have paid in not quite half, but it is enough for any co-operative bank to make you a loan on the land, and give you a mortgage-deed in the place of this bond for a deed. The co-operative bank would also begin as soon as you wished to build a house for you, and the interest they would charge you would be no more, if as much, as you are now paying rent.

As you could probably readily let a few rooms or a part of the house, the income from rental should balance the outgo for interest and you would thus get your own rental free. Now I am prepared to make you the following proposal;- if the co-op. bank will loan you the balance due me on the land, I will discount the amount 8% and deliver the deed. As the bank will not charge you more than 6% for the money, you will make a profit of 2% on the deal. As I have other offers in hand, I cannot grant this option longer than two weeks, so if it interests you, you had better see the co-op. bank at once. You can refer them to Mr. Sprague who looked up your title for you, and it ought not to be a difficult matter to adjust.

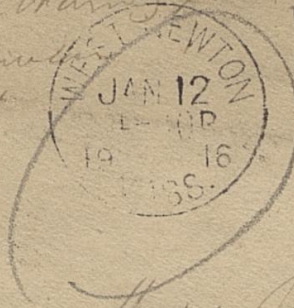
