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THE BEAR FACTS

Back in 1930, the town of Fordyce, Ark., had a population of 3,206 and among its more famous citizens was a gawky teen-age boy who had made a name for himself on some of the city's most powerful football teams.

His name was Paul Bryant and even then, the nickname of "Bear" had been given him, a result of an ill-fated venture with a black bear in the interest of improving his financial condition.

A small-sized circus with a large-size bear made a one-night stand in Fordyce when Paul Bryant was 13 years of age. As a publicity stunt, the circus offered five complete dollars to any citizen who would enter the ring as an opponent of the bear in a wrestling match.

Times were tough in Fordyce that year and Paul Bryant and his friends found themselves financially embarrassed and the folks who guarded the tent flaps doubly vigilant.

Consequently, it was decided that since the lanky Paul was the largest of the group, he should be the one to wrestle the bear and purchase circus tickets for all concerned with his reward.

Of course, Paul's buddies did most of the deciding but Bryant himself wasn't hard to convince for, he figured, what did he have to lose except maybe a few square inches of hide.

Which he eventually did, of course.

What was even worse, though, was the circus declared "No contest" and refused to pay off and all Paul Bryant got out of it was a nickname.

But at that, it was a good one because the word "bear" describes the handsome, six-foot-four Kentucky football coach better than any other I can think of.

His play at right end on the famous University of Alabama teams of 1933-35 was as tough, as determined and as powerful as a bruin. And his coaching career since has been stamped with the eagerness of a mother grizzly teaching her cub how to fish.

Bryant played on the varsity for three years at Alabama and during that period his team lost only three games. Included in the victory list was the 1935 Rose Bowl win over Stanford.

Yet as staunch a defensive pillow as Bear was, his name was overshadowed in the press clippings by those of Dixie Howell and Don Hutson and Riley Smith. But there was one man who didn't overlook his ability and foresaw his possibilities as a coach. That man was Frank Thomas and when the fabulous seniors had graduated, it was Bear Bryant whom Thomas added to his staff at Alabama.

Incidentally, it was during Bryant's senior year at Tuscaloosa that he performed one of the most amazing feats in history of the game, playing five full games with a broken bone in his leg.

Bryant was an immediate success as a coach. He learned his lessons well under Thomas, not the least

of them being how to convince high school prospects his school was the one they should attend.

After four years at Alabama, Bryant started up the coaching ladder, taking a job at Vanderbilt as Red Sanders' line coach. Two years later he entered the Navy. He was released in 1945 just before the football season and accepted a last-minute job at Maryland where he astounded everybody by winning six games, losing two and tying one.

About this time, Kentucky was looking for a coach to rebuild the war-depleted football stock in the Bluegrass. Bear Bryant was the only man for the job. He had a longing to get back in his old conference and especially to become head coach of one of the league's outstanding member institutions.

He rewarded Wildcat supporters with seven victories against only three defeats his first season in 1946 and so elated were Kentuckians with him, both as a coach and a gentleman, his contract was torn up and renewed for a period of ten years.

Bear isn't one to let security interfere with ambition. Last season his team compiled a brilliant eight and three record, highlighted by great victories over Georgia, Vanderbilt and Villanova, the latter in the post-season Great Lakes Bowl game.

But Bryant isn't content. Nothing less than a perfect season will satisfy him. And chances are excellent that he'll come up with one before long, even as tough as such things are nowadays.

Bear's success as a coach might be attributed largely to three things. First, he knows how to get the material, an absolute must at Kentucky which must compete with Midwestern and Eastern colleges for boys as well as with rival members of the SEC.

Secondly, he knows how to coach the ones he gets, a fact proven by the ease with which he switched from the Notre Dame formation to the T-formation in the space of one spring practice.

And finally, the Bear knows how to compete in the post-season banquet league. He makes a big hit—and consequently, many friends for Kentucky—everywhere he goes.

You may have surmised by now that I like Bear Bryant. He is one of my favorite people and its not solely because he signed my one-month-old son to a Wildcat grant-in-aid, adequate proof of Point No. 1 mentioned above.

The main thing I like about him is his honesty. Oh, don't get me wrong. The Bear can put out bear stories about his team as well as the next one. In fact, he sometimes rivals The Big Weep, Wally Butts, in this department.

But Bear Bryant is the only football coach I have ever heard take the entire blame for a defeat to his team, saying simply and frankly, "I coached them wrong".

In my book, that's honesty.

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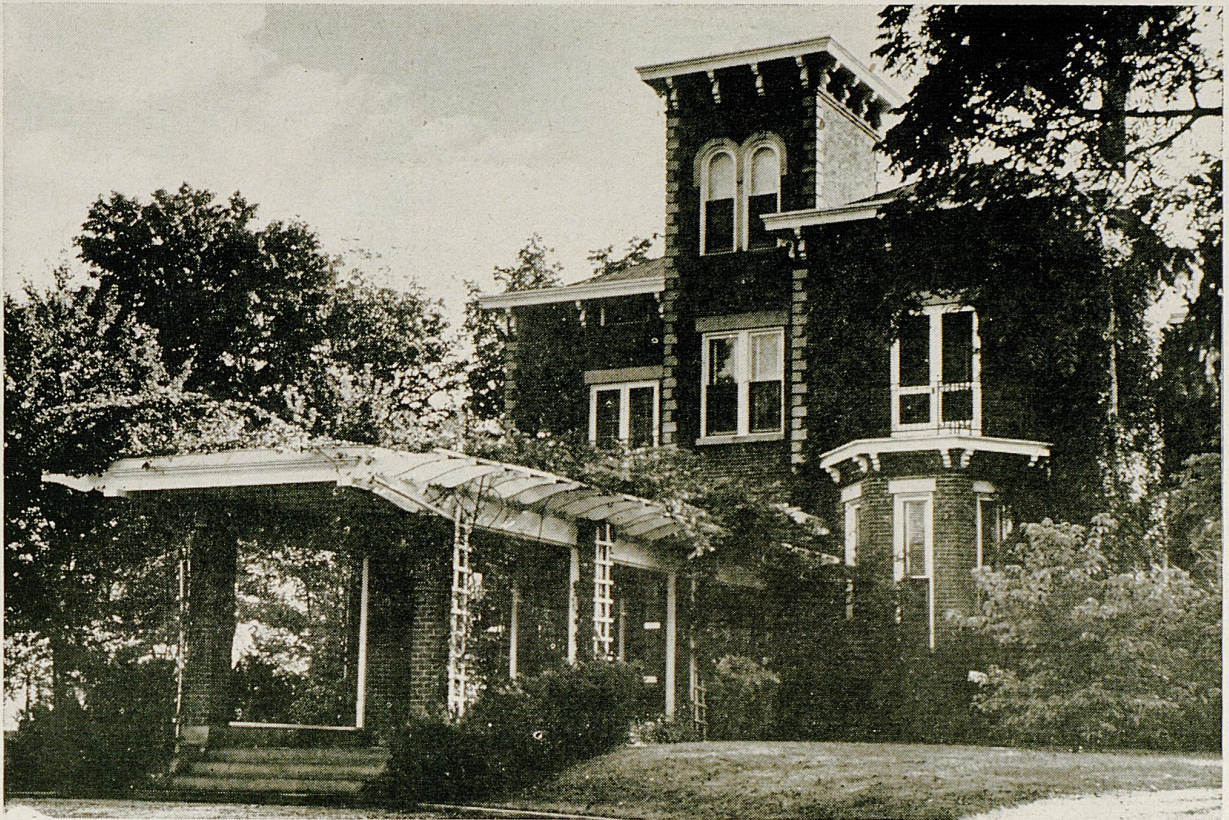

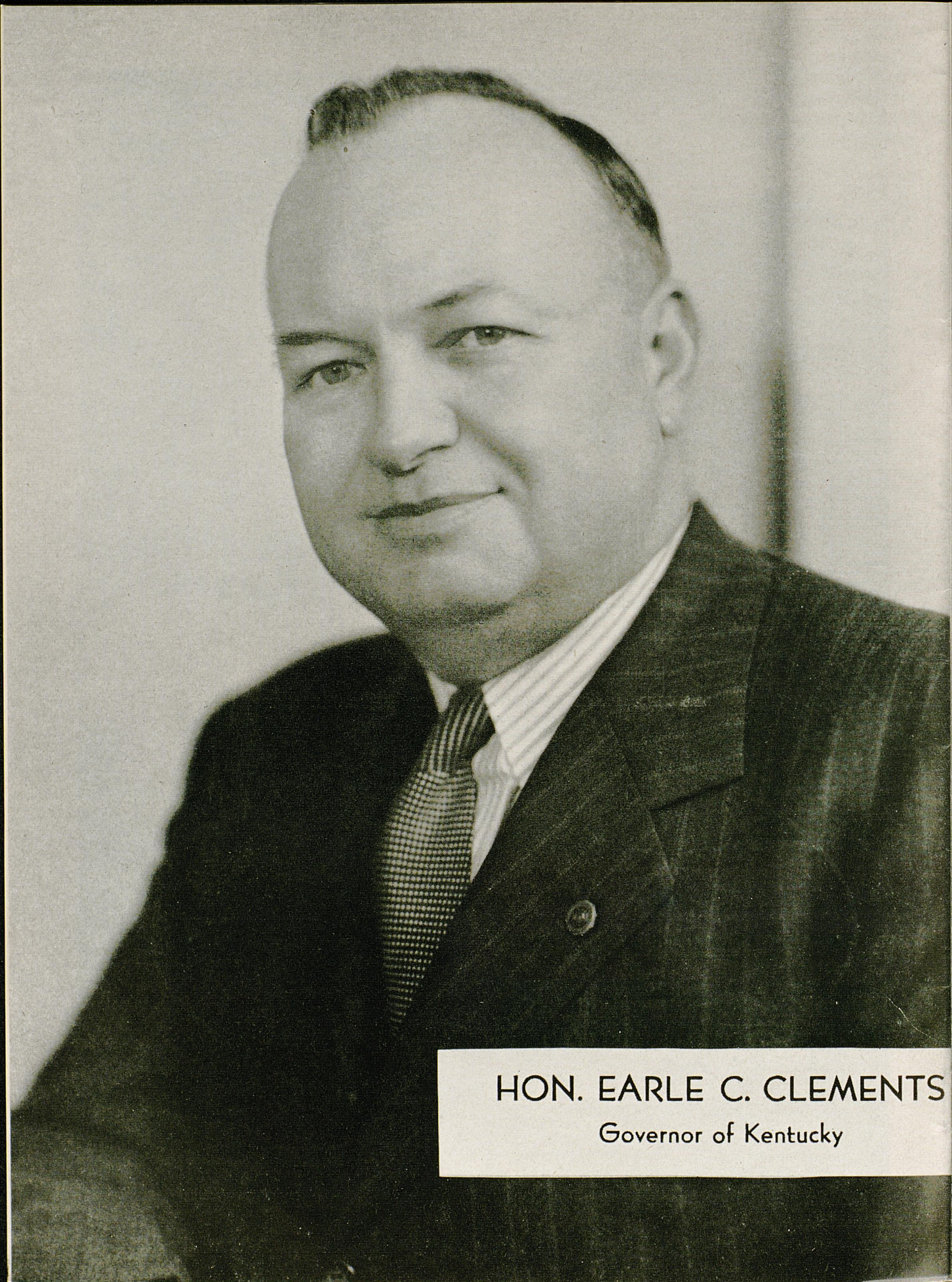

CARNEY LASLIE . . . Like Paul Bryant is a University of Alabama product and a former Rose Bowl star for the Crimson Tide . . . Laslie lettered three years at 'Bama '30, '31 and '32 . . . In '32 he played on the Tide eleven which won a 24-0 decision over Washington State in the Pasadena classic . . . Remained at Alabama as an assistant for one year after graduating . . . Then he became head football coach at the Blytheville, Arkansas, high school . . . His teams went undefeated for three seasons and then Laslie went to V.M.I. as line coach . . . From the Lexington, Va., school, Laslie entered the Navy . . . While in the Navy, he coached the North Carolina Pre-Flight eleven . . . Released to inactive duty after three years service with the rank of Lieutenant Commander . . . Joined Bryant at Maryland a few days before the 1945 season opened . . . Specializes in coaching tackles at Kentucky . . . Married and has an eleven-year-old daughter.

FRANK MOSELEY . . . A native of Montgomery, Alabama . . . Quarterbacked the Tide elevens in '31, '32 and '33 . . . Played two seasons on the same Alabama teams as Laslie . . . Came to Kentucky in 1934 and served as backfield coach under Chet Wynne and Ab Kirwan . . . Entered the Navy in '42 . . . Served as gunnery officer aboard the aircraft carrier Lexington with the rank of Lieutenant Commander . . . A veteran of practically every battle in the Pacific . . . Joined Bryant a few days before the season opened at Maryland . . . Backfield coach at Kentucky . . . Married and has a fifteen-months-old son . . . Called "Mose" by many, but "Bully" or "Chesty" by his old Capstone acquaintances.

TED D. OSBORN . . . Is the latest addition to the Kentucky staff, arriving in July from Akron Central High School, Akron, Ohio, where he had been head basketball and football coach for 12 years . . . Osborn was graduated from Ohio Wesleyan in 1931 where he starred as a halfback for three seasons . . . Following his graduation, Osborn went to Ohio State in 1933 as a freshman coach . . . Served during the war as a Lieutenant in the Navy.

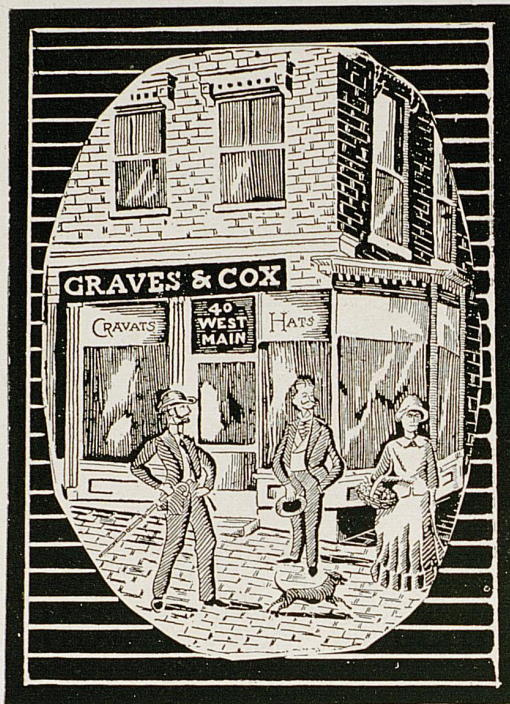

ERMAL ALLEN . . . Joined the Kentucky coaching staff after being ruled ineligible after two games in the 1946 season in one of the Southeastern Conference's most controversial cases . . . Last fall, Allen played professional football with the All-American League champions, Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns . . . Ermal was a T-quarterback for the Brownies . . . He will be a valuable addition to the Kentucky staff this fall because of his knowledge of the T . . . Married and is the father of two children.

These coaches are assisted by Bill McCubbin, Bill Moseley, Charles Browning and Leo Yarutis.

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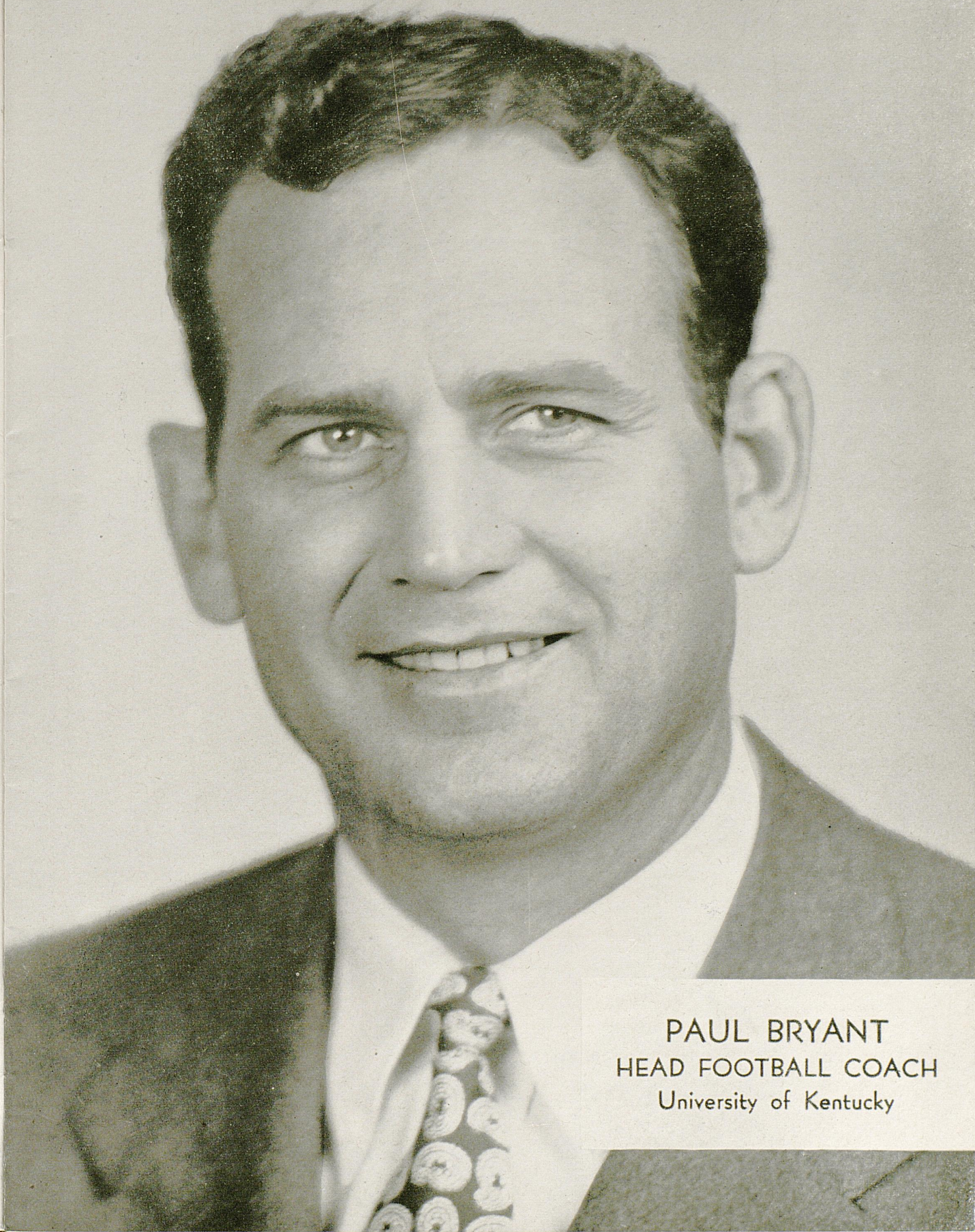

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University of Mississippi

The University of Mississippi opened its doors November 6, 1848 with 80 students and four faculty members and a 28-year-old president, George Frederick Holmes. Classes met in a single building, the Lyceum, known as "The University Building," a structure recently remodeled in celebration of the Centennial.

President Holmes was born in British Guiana and raised in England. He came to the United States by way of Canada and assumed his duties in Mississippi at an institution, the establishment of which had been provided for as early as March 3, 1815. On that day, Congress reserved one entire township of land in the district now forming the states of Alabama and Mississippi for the use of a seminary of learning. The State of Mississippi received on February 20, 1819, in lieu of this township, another entire township to be used "for the support of a seminary of learning therein".

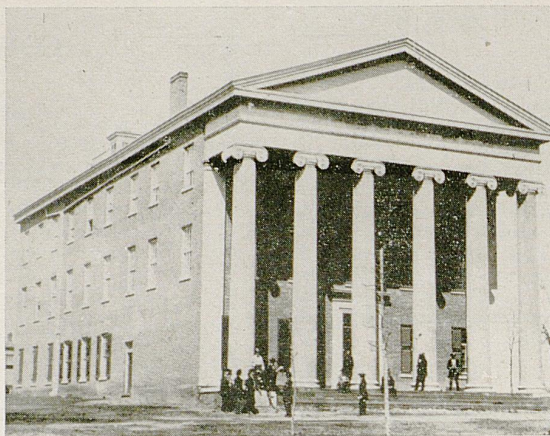
But it was not until 1844 that the university was chartered. Three years earlier, January 26, 1841, by the narrow margin of a 58 to 57 vote, a joint session of the Legislature picked Oxford in the northern part of the state over Mississippi City on the Gulf Coast to be the university site. Oxford, 75 miles Southeast of Memphis and 160 miles north of Jackson was so named, in 1837, with the idea of attracting the university. Land for the township was purchased from the Chickasaw Indians in 1836. The name of Oxford was proposed by Dr. Dudley Thomas Isom, then an employee of a trading company but later Lafayette County's first physician. He was a Civil War doctor, later a member of the University Board of Trustees.

President Holmes was succeeded after the 1848-1849 session by Augustus B. Longstreet. Frederick A. P. Barnard, founder of Barnard College, was the third president until 1859 when his title was changed to chancellor. During his administration, academic work was interrupted by the enlistment of large numbers of students in the historic University Greys, a military company of 135 men formed on the university campus. At the outbreak of the Civil War the faculty resigned and the doors of the institution were closed until the fall of 1865.

During the Civil War, the buildings were occupied alternately by Confederate and Federal troops. After the Battle of Shiloh, 1500 Confederate wounded were hospitalized in campus buildings, and more than 700 lie in the University Cemetery.

Among the early buildings was the old Observatory, constructed in 1857 through the efforts of President Barnard, an eminent scientist. It was built as a smaller model of the original and famous observatory in Pulkova, 19 miles from Leningrad, Russia, at that time considered the world's finest. A 19-inch lens for a telescope for the Mississippi observatory had to be diverted to Northwestern University because of the commencement of Civil War hostilities. The old Observatory was converted in 1947 into the home of the Naval ROTC unit.

Other Civil War buildings still being used are the Lyceum; the old Chapel, now the YMCA Building; and the "Dead House," built originally as a magnetic laboratory, used during the war as a morgue, later as a

fraternity house, a professor's residence and at present, as the office for the Mississippi Law Journal.

When the university reopened in 1865, the personnel of the student body, wealthy in ante-bellum days, changed to a class of students whose parents had lost their entire wealth during the war. They, like today's World War II veterans, came with a determination born of necessity.

Enrollment jumped after the Civil War with the rush of veterans to get an education. From a figure of 193

for the 1865-1866 session, it reached the unexpected height of 231 by 1867-1868. It was during the Reconstruction period in 1869 that the university changed from the "close college" to the university system of education according to a plan submitted by Chancellor John N. Waddell and providing for three general departments—preparatory education; science, literature and the arts; and professional education.

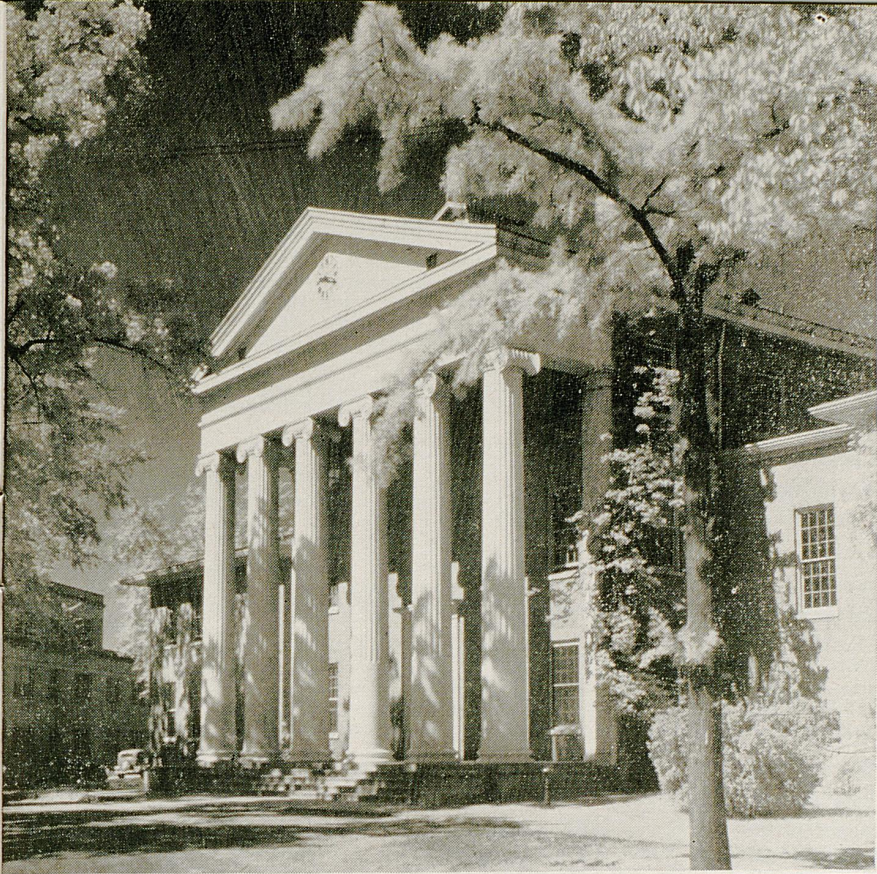
At the same time, attempts were made to recruit students by telling them how inexpensive an education was at the university. A Board of Trustees pamphlet, "Where Shall I Send My Son?", resulted in the enrollment to reach 471 by the 1877-1878 session, a figure that remained a record until 1909-1910 when it became 489.

Football as an intercollegiate sport appeared at the university in the fall of 1893, having been organized by Alexander L. Boundurant, professor of Latin language and Literature and later dean of the Graduate School. The Ole Miss team defeated its first opponent, South West Baptist University (now Union University) of Jackson, Tenn., by a score of 56-0, in a campus contest. The Rebel team won its only conference championship in 1947 as a member of the Southeastern Conference.

Today, there are over a dozen buildings devoted to classroom and technical training and administrative work as well as five co-ed and 18 men's dormitories. Auxiliary buildings, including the Library—soon to be replaced by a new one—Fulton Chapel, the Cafeteria, the Gymnasium, a 26,000-capacity football stadium being enlarged to accommodate 34,000, Field House, and Student Union Building total 14.

The university offers instruction in the College of Liberal Arts (1848), School of Law (1854), School of Engineering (1900), School of Education (1903), School of Medicine (1903), School of Pharmacy (1908), School of Commerce and Business Administration (1917), and Graduate School (1927). The first summer term was opened in 1893, a senior unit of infantry ROTC was established in 1936 and a Senior Air Force unit in 1946. The Naval ROTC program was begun in 1945.

The two-word nickname, Ole Miss, is better known in many parts of the country than the official title of the University of Mississippi. Origin of the nickname dates back to the fall of 1896 when students sought a proper name for a yearbook for the university. The name suggests the ante-bellum darkey who knew the wife of his owner by no other title than "Ole Miss," and their mistress' daughter as "Young Miss". The student yearbook appears today under the same title, but the term, Ole Miss, has long since been used to apply to the whole university.



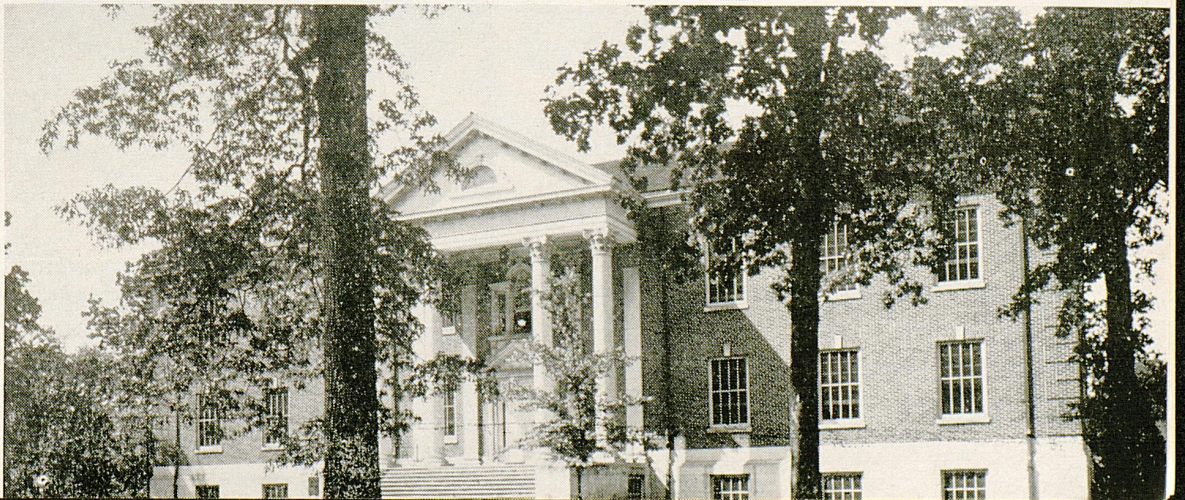

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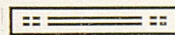
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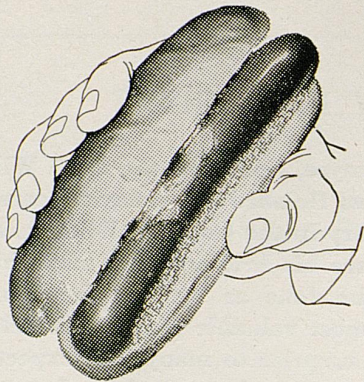


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W. E. BURGER, U. K. Trainer
