683,000 women raped in 1990, new report finds

WASHINGTON — A government-funded study released yester-day found 683,000 American womment-funded study released yester-day found 683,000 American womment reports have said — and that 12.1 million women have been rape victims at least once.

In addition, the National Woment some study ad almost 62 percent of the rape victims as the study of the study

earlier.

The survey also found that:

Of the estimated 12.1 million women who have been raped, about 6.8 million were raped once, 4.7 million more than once and about 600,000 were unsure of the number of timesers.

600,000 were unsure of the number of times.

"Twenty-nine percent of perpetrators were non-relatives known to the victim. such as neighbors or friends. Twenty-two percent were strangers; 16 percent were relatives to the r than immediate family; 11 percent father or stepfather; 10 percent boyfriend or ex-boyfriend and 9 percent husband or ex-busbrand. Three percent were not sure refused to answer.

Seventy percent of rape victims were unharmed, while 24 percent suffered minor injuries and 4 percent were seriously hurt. The sur-

yey did not account for rape-murder victims.

*Rape victims' most important concerns after the assault were the family finding out, being blamed by others for the attack, and others knowing about it. Those worries declined slightly among those raped in the last five years. But there were increased fears of having their name become public, getting AIDS and other sexually-transmitted diseases and becoming pregnant.

The study's estimate of 683,000 forcible rapes in 1990 — based on a estimate of 0.7 percent of the adult female population — was more than five times larger than the National Crime Survey figure of 130,000 attempted and completed rapes that year.

The math almost works: 16 percent of 683,000 is 109,280, slightly higher than the FBI's re-ported rape figure. Steven Dillingham, director of the Bureau of Justice Statistics, which produces the National Crime Survey, declined to dispute the higher figures directly. "We have significant differences

Similarly, Lambda Chi Alpha social fratentity eliminated the use of the term "pledge" by replacing it with "associate." Nicole Buckner, president of Alpha Delta Pi, said she supports the new program because having one meeting for all members and giving voting rights to new members brings the whole sorority closer together.

Journalist Arnett criticizes censorship

Peter Arnett, Cable News Net-work correspondent and the only journalist allowed to remain in Baghdad during the Persian Gulf War, said Friday the news media are faced with new challenges now that the Cold War has end-

more than the Cotal War has ended.
"It think we've got incredible
responsibilities now, onerous responsibilities, and I hope we
measure up to it because everyone's looking for us to blow it,
'Arnett told a small group reporters at Blue Grass Airport.
The veteran journalist flew to
Lexington en route to Centre
College in Danville, Ky,, where
he was scheduled to speak to students and faculty about the former Soviet Union.
Arnett currently is on a leave

mer Soviet Union.

Arnett currently is on a leave of absence from CNN. In addition to accepting speaking engagements, he is writing a book about his 30-year career as a journalist.

American news organizations will help define post-Cold War society. Amett said.

UK recruits are every bit as good as they look

LOUISVILLE, Ky, — Silky Smooth, Slinky Salivation and Scrapps Sweet aren't as well-known as Arazi, A. P. Indy or Pine Bluff, but next, year's incoming UK thoroughbreds briefly stole the spotlight from next week's winner of the 118th Kentucky Derby while prancing about Freedom Hall and having fun.

After putting on a weekend of entertainment at the 1992 Kentucky Derby Festival, Tony Delk, Walter McCarty and Jarad Prickett were wearing garlands of roses in the form of accolades while cheers were thrust upon them from Wild-cat fans and anxious media. The three played on the same team for the first time and, at first, were somewhat unsure about speaking with the media Friday inght. But after they were treated to several rounds of appliause by UK fans, they were bubbly, It was almost as if they were supposed to be under an invisible cone of silence. But like Mr. Ed, the silence of the ponies cracked once they realized what they had really gotten themselves into.

Referring to the zany fans, Delk schulcky: "A nother reason was that be was United to the Control of the Control

Kentucky."

Another reason was that he was dying to get into UK coach Rick Pitino's machine-gun offense.

Delk is Silky-Smooth; he's the grace of Seattle Slew. His jump shot and body control are as soft as baby powder on a rash. In the game, he sank only one of 11 field goals en route to three points and three assists, but he was never fazed and his confidence never wavered.

"I thought I was pressing myself," Delk said. "I passed off well, but I tried to be too impressive." The 6-foot-2 shooting guard's quick release enables him to sink a jump-shot off one dribble better than Derrick Miller — or anyone else, for that matter. Like Miller, Delk is streaky. However, he only seems to have hot streaks. — he didn't have any empty binges Friday where he missed more than three of four in a row.

In the semi-finals of the three-point shooting contest, he made 16 treys in one minute — seven consecutively.

The UK women's soccer team kicked off Saturday's Blue-White Day festivities with a 12 p.m. intrasquad game at Cage Field. The White team won 5-2 behind freshman fullback Jody Sheehan's two goals.

The scrimmage served as a preview to next season's varsity-level squad, which will include only eight returning players from this year's 136-c tubt team. The Lady Kats may add up to 20 new players in the fall. "We'r go going to have a very young team," said Warren Lipka, "We'r go going to have a very young team," said Warren Lipka, "The oldest player we'll have will be a junior. The rest (will be) incoming fireshmen and sophomores. "I know there will be eight girds returning, but it's a night-and-day difference between playing club soccer and playing Division I soccer. So everyone will be going through a learning process the first two years."

But with Lipka at the helm, that learning process may not take as long as UK fans would think. Lipka has coaching experience at both the college and professional levels. His last job was with the Indiana Kicks of the Major Soccer League. He started the women's soccer program at Tri-State University in Angola. Ind. a few years ago.

at Tri-State University in Angola. Ind., a few years ago. Lipka also earned some pretty high honors as a player. A former high school All-American from St. Louis, he played collegiate soccer at the University of South Carolina.

where in 1985 he was named the Division I College Player of the Year. He also played five years in the now-defunct Major Indoor Soc-cer League.

From experience, Lipka knows not to expect immediate success from a young, first-year team. But, the UK coach said, the potential for winning is there.

"I think by the time the incoming freshmen become juniors and our freshmen now become seniors, then we'll be a team that is competitive and maybe looking toward getting a (NCAA) bid. Tipka said, "Twe been on the heavy recruiting trail these past few months, and I really look forward to next year."

UK will join Vanderbilt and Ar-kansas next fall as the only SEC schools to offer women's varsity soccer programs. But that may change soon, according to Lipka.

"There are a lot of other SEC teams talking about bringing in new programs — like Tennessee, Florida and Georgia," the UK coach said, "I think we're getting a head start on it. There's a lot of interest in the game on the women's side."



Carson's final 'Tonight Show' marks end of an era

If you want to get a good idea of what the United States was like at any given time over the last 30 years, one of the best things you can do is find a tape of "The Tonight Show" from that particular

time.

Think about it: If you want to see what people were talking about, what celebrities were popular, what fads were in vogue, what movies were current, what music was being played, what kinds of clothing and hairstyles were in style and what people were thinking and saying, what better daily video record exists than 30 years of "Tonight Show" reruns?

Would tapes of the nightly news be better? Not really, Sure, you'd get the news of the day from those tapes, but little else, "The Tonight Show" would give you news mak-res and a lot more. You'd see the actors, musicians, writers, sports stars and regular citizens who passed through. Every possible sub-

ject would be covered. Every view-point would be represented. Johnny Carson has welcomed more than 10,000 guests and done thousands of monologues — spanning seven presidents and four decades. We'll never see that kind of longevity again.

again.

One of Carson's strengths is the monologue. He is, as far as I can determine, the only comedian in the country who does eight minutes of fresh, topical stand-up material on every program. If Carson is doing a new show, expect new jokes about the news of the day. It may be hilarious or it may be flat on a particular night, but it's always there. David Letterman has his Top 10 lists and a joke or two at the beginning. Den-

nis Miller has a bunch of esoteric, inside jokes that make little sense to anyone but himself, and Arsenio Hall makes insane remarks, which prompt his audience to whoop it up; but only "The Tonight Show" has a full eight minutes of prepared, well-thought-out jokes.

People underestimate Carson's skill as an interviewer, but it's obvious how good he is when you watch the unprepared Arsenio or the cocky, self-amused Miller, Interview skill is something that you don't notice if it's done right; as skilled interviewer makes it look so effortless, you don't notice how he or she is drawing out the interviewe. And Carson does that, A bad interviewer is moticeable a mile away. The program's impact has been

terviewer is noticeable a mile away. The program's impact has been tremendous. It's almost impossible to name a major stand-up comic whose big break didn't come on "The Tonight Show." A young Hoosier named David Letterman bowled over the crowd in 1977. Two years later, he was guest hosting. Three years after that, he became a star on his own innovative program.

People wonder why Carson last-ed 30 years while almost everyone else lasted fewer than 10. It's no mystery. He simply did it all better than anyone else for the longest time. And he made it look easy.



Technology fee is an investment students need

In the center of UK's antiquated Margaret I. King Library is a sparkling example of something that makes the slogan "UK Is Worth It" true.

There, you will find one of the University's four personal computer laboratories. Like the lab in the Business and Economics Building, the library tha allows students access to computers and free laser printing. Many schools don't offer these services — especially the free laser printing — without a fee.

Unfortunately, quality is not free. In May, the Board of Trustees will be asked to approve a \$40-per-semester increase to the student fee. The increase would allow UK to extend the hours that the loabs are open. It also would allow for more computers and periodic updating of the computer services. With a student body of about 24,000 on the Lexington Campus, UK's current number of 300 computers does not pass muster. We hope the trustees will endorse this proposal.

This fee would have been easier to stomach were it proposed two years ago when the economy was better. But, to quote the Rolling Stones, you can't always get what you want. A vote against this fee is a vote against progress. And at a time of budget cuts — when quality is in jeopardy — we must protect quality where we can.

It should be noted that this increase is not necessitated by the budget cuts. UK President Charles Wethington has saved student computing from the cuts. However, the computing budget isn't getting any bigger, either. And simply maintaining the status quo in the nanosecond world of computing will cause us to fall behind.

The only other option to get more funding would be a user fee for those who use the computers. But a blanket fee is better than user fee, which is equivalent to a regressive tax. Students should have to use computers as part of their college experience. If not, they will be ill prepared for the world upon graduation. 


