## Senior hurt scaling campus building

### Gun found in backpack; UK Police investigating

Each day thousands of students walk up the stairs of the Funkhouser Building. Early Friday morning, one student tried to walk up the building.

Gregory Wayne Yates, a chemical engineering senior, attempted to climb barefoot up the front of the building, said UK Public Affairs director Ralph Derickson.

Yates' attempt was unsuccessful and he fell three stories, shattering both his heels.

In the early morning hours on Friday, Yates drove to campus and parked his car in front of the building. He then removed his shoes and began to climb up

the front of the building.

He apparently got about half way up the six-story building before falling.

Yates told police he lost his grip on the third floor, Derickson said.

Before police arrived on the scene, Yates had landed on the concrete.

At about 4 a.m., a Physical Plant Division worker inside the building heard Yates scream for help and called the UK Police Department.

He was taken to Humana Hospital.

Police found a backpack near Yates that contained a .22-caliber Smith & Wesson pistol, Derickson said.

"We do not think he was climbing with the backpack," Derickson said.

Derickson would not say if anything else was going on in Yates' backpack, but that police are investigating.

Police suspect that alcohol was involved in the incident.

Beer cans were found in Yates' car, which was parked in the parking lot in front of the Funkhouser Building, Derickson said.

Yates, 25, of 108 Shawnee Park, Apt. 1, was wearing a belt used by rock climbers, but had no other climbing gear with him, Derickson said.

"He told police he had just gotten home from a backpack outing in Utah," Derickson said.

Also, Yates told police he was a climber.

He was listed in stable condition at Humana Hospital last night.

The incident is still under investigation by the UK Police Department. No charges had been filed as of yesterday.

Police said Yates could be charged with violating a University policy for having a firearm on campus.

The Code of Student Conduct says that "possessing a deadly weapon on University property without authorization of the Dean of Students," is a disciplinary offense.

SGA is responsible for putting out the phonebooks, and Chaney said everything is running pretty much on schedule for the release of this year's issue.

Students who live on campus have their phone numbers changed automatically every year, but students who move off campus have to change the number themselves.

Information also can be changed in person or mailed to Student Records in the Funkhouser Building.

Along with updated information, students need to include their UK identification numbers and personal access codes.

UK faculty and staff may include pager numbers and cellular phone numbers in listings this year.

### NATION U.S. and China plan presidential summit

BEIJING — American and Chinese officials agreed yesterday to begin planning a fall presidential summit — signaling that China's release of human rights activist Harry Wu may have begun to repair months of deteriorating relations.

Undersecretary of State Peter Tarnoff said the two sides had agreed to discuss an agenda for a meeting between President Clinton and Chinese President Jiang Zemin in the United States in October.

But Tarnoff, the highest-level U.S. official to visit China since relations began to sour in May, cautioned that much work needed to be done before such a meeting could be held.

China and the United States remain far apart on a number of issues that have plagued ties. Tarnoff said negotiators would discuss "a wide array" of topics in preparation for the meeting, but refused to elaborate.

### Plane crashes into restaurant

NEW SHOREHAM, R.I. — Kyle Jorgenson had just bought a hamburger at a Block Island restaurant when a seaplane that was trying to land crashed into a car, slammed into the eatery and exploded.

He saw a man jump out of the plane and run toward him in flames.

"He went down on the ground and just laid still," said Jorgenson, 18, who tried to beat the fire out with cardboard and his shirt.

"He was completely charred white. Flames were just swirling around him. I was freaked out."

The man died, along with two other passengers on the plane and their pilot.

Also killed in Saturday's crash was Vera Sprague, 79, who was getting her car fueled up at the restaurant, which shared a building with the island's only filling station. The plane narrowly missed the two gas pumps.

### 'Good Ol' Boys' being investigated

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department is trying to obtain the original videotape that purports to show racist activities at a "Good Ol' Boys" rally for federal agents, a spokesman said yesterday.

"We're in discussions with lawyers to see about getting the original," Justice spokesman Carl Stern said.

The New York Times reported yesterday that the source of the tape and stories about racism at the roundup was Richard Hayward, a former Fort Lauderdale, Fla., police officer. The Times said Hayward was upset when he was prevented from expressing his white supremacist views at the outings. A disgruntled Hayward provided his tape, taken at the 1990 roundup, to the National Rifle Association this year, as it was gearing up a membership drive attacking the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, according to the newspaper.

Justice has issued an administrative subpoena for the tape to the Gadsden MinuteMen, a paramilitary group in Alabama, Stern said. Hayward said he gave the original tape to the group, the Times reported.

### Gates, Buffett plan to hit the rails

OMAHA, Neb. — The world's two richest men reportedly are planning to take a train ride through China.

Microsoft Corp. head Bill Gates, his wife, Melinda, and Omaha investor Warren Buffett are making the trip with friends next month, the Omaha World-Herald reported Saturday. The group is renting cars on a train.

"It is a personal vacation for them (Gates and his wife)," Microsoft spokesman Mitch Mathews told the newspaper from Redmond, Wash.

## Zinser to stay active in UK student community

The new chancellor for the Lexington Campus has been seen just about everywhere — from clogging on a stage to burning at the stake.

Elisabeth Zinser, the new chancellor, is small in stature — barely taller than 5 feet 2 inches tall, but the former University of Idaho president said she is not intimidated easily.

She said challenges and her "adventurous spirit" are what drive her.

After her approval by the University's Board of Trustees, she began her tenure at UK July 1. President Charles Wethington said students will enjoy working with Zinser.

"She is just a very personable individual," he said following her appointment. "The advisory committee and I were impressed with her energy and enthusiasm. I think students will be as well."

Zinser said students can expect energy and enthusiasm from her, but that they should expect more than that, too. She wants them to expect her to be open to their suggestions and invitations.

"If (students) take the initiative and get acquainted with me," she said, "then they're going to find someone who is really interested in them."

She said if students are involved in some group or activity during the year, then she can almost guarantee they will run into her — whether it be at student picnics or campus volleyball games.

She said she believes hanging out with students is one of her less-publicized jobs as chancellor.

However, Zinser said she can remember a time when student activism wasn't a thing she related to.

Zinser served as the president of Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C. for four days. The students at the University, a school for the individuals who cannot hear, wanted a deaf president and Zinser did not fulfill that requirement.

In protest, the students activated and blocked entrances to the campus. Zinser said they slashed car tires and pushed them in front of the gates. The students also made life-size dummies of Zinser and a Gallaudet board member and then burned them.

"I wasn't really offended," Zinser said. "I understood the students' pain and I sympathized. They burned me to make a point. It really wasn't a personal attack."

Two days after her burning, Zinser resigned as president and the board appointed a deaf president, who is still at the school.

Zinser said she considers the Gallaudet incident one of her larger accomplishments in her life because she was a key player in the "major deaf revolution for fair treatment and equality."

"I had a lot of sympathy for their cause," she said. "Students should get everything out of college that they want. Those students wanted a deaf president — they got one and I'm proud of them."

**Stranglmartin opens up on the lawn**

Local rock trio Stranglmartin is setting the stage for UK today. As part of the Music In Your Neighborhood series, Stranglmartin is the first of several local bands to play the Student Center lawn.

Led by guitarist and singer David Butler, with the combination of Jason Russo on drums and Chad Hurley on bass, Stranglmartin produces an expressive sound craved by fans throughout the country.

The band originated in 1989 with a different bassist, a different drummer and a different name. Rastafish was their original name, presented by then drummer Martin Shearer.

After continuously being mistaken for a reggae band, Butler decided on "strangle martin" not as a name but as an idea. Ironically, the name has stuck ever since.

Stranglmartin released their first disc in 1991 on the Dragon Street label and the following year on Musidisc in Europe. Then, in 1993 they independently released their second album, *Wregras*, due to difficulties with Dragon Street.

Bassist Bill Bruening was

replaced by Chad Hurley, and in 1994 were signed to a three-record deal with Safehouse Records. They then recorded their third album, *For the Sake of Argument*.

At the time of the change, Butler told the Lexington-Herald Leader, "one of the neatest things about Safehouse is that they don't go sticking their nose into the recording process at all."

After the release of this album, Shearer left the band and was replaced by the present drummer, Jason Russo. The new combination of Butler, Russo and Hurley has made local fans happy, who have been anxiously awaiting another release from this band.

The unique mixture of solemn to almost humorous lyrics joined with a slower, almost punk rock grind appeals to fans looking for an "un-sold out" sound. Such songs as "Hello Wickedness" or "Mean Old Skeleton," reveal the upbeat personality of this "pop-punk" band.

Though compared to bands like the Minutemen and the Replacements, Stranglmartin's diversity through their powerful almost-Ramones type riffs reveals a sound of their own. Butler's crunchy guitar blasts above the rhythmic beat of the melodic bass and drums.

Butler is not only a six-year veteran of his band, he also owns the Wrocklage, a local nightclub known for booking a variety of popular local and national bands.

the perfect opportunity to be exposed to Lexington's local bands through the Student Activities Board Concert Committee's

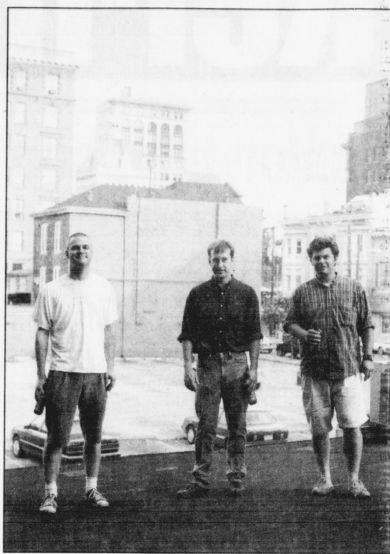

# 'Rocky Horror' is just a jump to the left of the cult film version

If you're not sexually squeamish, "The Rocky Horror Picture Show" may be your taste.

The stage production of the movie debuted this weekend on stage at the Briggs Theater in the UK Fine Arts Building.

The standard midnight showing began a little early as tickets cleared out quickly and "Rocky Horror" characters rehearsed a few of the hip-oscillating, derriere-tossing night moves.

The story, which is Benny Hill-style with the addition of a transvestite and rock n' roll music, was first introduced to audiences in the early '70s via the stage. This intentional spoof ran for two years

before being immortalized on film. From the film came the now highly evolved floor show where, in the movie theater, you will find a gamut of performances.

Senior Zachary Dietrich directed the production as his senior theater project. Taking on a production with an excess of flesh and an undeniably poorly written script was a brave-hearted endeavor or probably laced with a little carnal instinct.

Considering the cast can't be modest and must sometimes be sincere, Dietrich's choice of actors and actresses was fitted like a nut and bolt. Encouraging actors into fishnets, teddies and high heels, bearing their calves and wearing more make-up than Kiss can't be an easy sell, even to the most attention-hungry actor.

To highlight the audience performances and the captivating on-stage performances, a stage band lingered in the background, including a piano, bass, two guitars and drums. They kept the volume low enough to let the actors be heard, yet cranked up the volume on cue to send the rhythm into your seat.

The cast and script are only half of the show. A participating audience is vital to a whole production. Side remarks, squirting water guns, striking matches and crude remarks between lines make the show. It gives everyone a part.

"Rocky Horror" is not for the lustless. Whether you're a "Rocky Horror" connoisseur or a "Rocky Horror" virgin, this production would make a good lay over next Friday and Saturday night.

# Kentucky Theatre delivering Italian 'Postman' every night this week

Postmen are concerned with the intimate details of life — bills and love letters sift through their fingers in equal measure. In "The Postman" ("Il Postino"), a young postman delivers fan letters to a poet, and the daily correspondence enriches both of their lives.

"The Postman" stars the late Massimo Troisi in the leading role of Neruda. Although the cast is Italian, "The Postman" also has an international stamp. Directed by Englishman Michael Radford, the film is based on the Chilean novel "Burning Patience" by Antonio Skarmeta. The book draws on the experiences of Chilean poet Pablo Neruda during his political exile to Italy in 1952. Neruda won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1971.

"The Postman" is the latest rebreker in the recent wave of renewed interest in Italian cinema in the United States. During the 1930s, Italian Neorealism Cinema was at the forefront of the global market. Concerned primarily with social and political issues, Neorealist filmmakers scorned the use of professional actors, elaborate sets and color film.

After World War II, Italians concentrated on rebuilding the country, as well as the economy.

Directors Federico Fellini and Pier Paolo Pasolini implemented a

rebirth of Italian film in the '60s and '70s with their adventurous cinematography and explicit nudity.

Eclipsed by Hollywood's blockbuster budgets and special effects, Italian cinema stagnated in the '80s. But in the '90s, a New Wave of Italian cinema arose. Giuseppe Tornatore's "Cinema Paradiso" won the Best Foreign Film Oscar in 1990, followed by Gabriele Salvatores' "Mediterraneo" in 1991.

"Paradiso" follows a young man's love for cinema with a gentle sentimental glow. "Mediterraneo" lightheartedly examines the predicament of a platoon of Italian soldiers stranded on an idyllic Greek Island during World War II. "The Postman" delivers in this tradition with a touching story about the timeless beauty of poetry and friendship. The film has been nominated for six David of Donatello awards, the Italian equivalent of the Oscar.

"The Postman," rated R, is showing at the Kentucky Theatre through Sept. 7.

**High school star lives up to billing**

**Couch shows he can do it all**

He stands about 6 feet 6 inches tall, and weighs 210 pounds, but someday, they'll talk about Tim Couch and say that he was a good 6-7, 225. His tight, spiraling passes arch high into the air, frequently landing in the hands of one of his receivers some 40 yards away, but someday, they'll say that he threw it 80 yards on the fly almost every time.

Couch is a living legend in Kentucky high school football, and the legend, like his status among the nation's prep quarterbacks, is only going to grow.

Consider his performance in leading his Leslie County team past Ft. Thomas Highlands 44-42 on Saturday night at Bates Creek High School. Couch completed (ho-hum)17-of-30 passes for (yawn) 287 yards and three touchdowns. Standard stuff, there. But there were some stand-out plays that had nothing to do with Couch's strong right arm.

There was his rushing — 23 times for 112 yards, including a 44-yard jaunt and a 54-yard scam-

per for a touchdown. And there was his defense — the kid was playing defense in a game where 86 points were scored in 48 minutes — which produced a late interception, which Couch promptly returned 35 yards to set up one of his touchdown passes.

He punted, too. But only twice, because he was busy being involved in all 44 of his team's points.

And he danced. He can really dance. He did it after nearly every touchdown, but never more so than after the one that put his team on top 44-35 with just over four minutes left in the game.

He didn't kick extra points, but Leslie County missed all of those anyway. He did lead his team to four two-point conversions.

Not a bad night's work, but Couch said afterward he's "played lots better games."

If all of this leads you to wonder what Couch's teammates did, don't think too hard — they didn't do much. Leslie County's running backs touched the ball a grand total of two times for — 1 yards.

In fact, Couch is probably his team's best running back. LCHS' pet play around the goal line is to give the ball to Couch and let him bull his way through the other team's defensive line for a touchdown. He did that twice on Saturday.

Also, he got sacked a lot, and he didn't always get the kind of time he wanted to get rid of the ball.

Though Couch — like the good All-American kid he is — praised his offensive line after the game, he spent a lot of time on the ground, a familiar locale for UK quarterbacks.

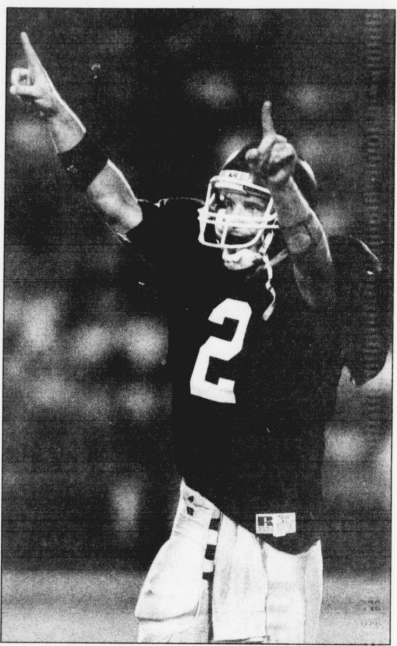
And Couch's defensive players had their fair share of problems, as their allowing 42 points would lead you to believe.

They did a lot of arm-tackling and had a lot of difficulty wrapping up Highlands' short but spunky running backs.

Between the sacks and the defensive woes, Couch probably already has a good idea of what it would've been like to play for UK last year.

Whether he'll experience it first-hand next season is still way up in the air, just where Couch wants it.

On Saturday, the nation's No. 1 high school quarterback

couldn't be happier to turn his attention from UK, Tennessee and Auburn to Ft. Thomas Highlands.

"It's nice to get the season going, because some of the phone calls will die down," Couch said. "The (college) coaches want to let a guy concentrate on his season and not worry about all those distractions."

And yes, being recruited is a distraction, but not one Couch will let annoy him during his final year of high school.

"It's easy to block everything out when you step out onto the football field," he said. "I never have had a problem thinking about the recruiting when it's time to play."

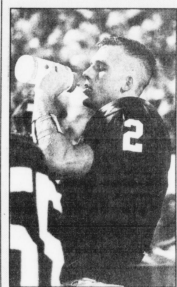
He was one of the only ones not thinking about recruiting on Saturday night. Many of the 10,000-plus fans who packed into Roy G. Walton Stadium were wearing the blue and white of UK, and Couch was as much a cause of hopeful talk as of amazement.

One particularly overzealous fan, a top contender in any Newt Gingrich look-alike contest — if there were such a thing — went a bit overboard.

"If he goes to Tennessee," he said, "I think I'd get out the rifle." Not to fear. Years from now, they'll tell you Tim Couch could stop bullets, too.

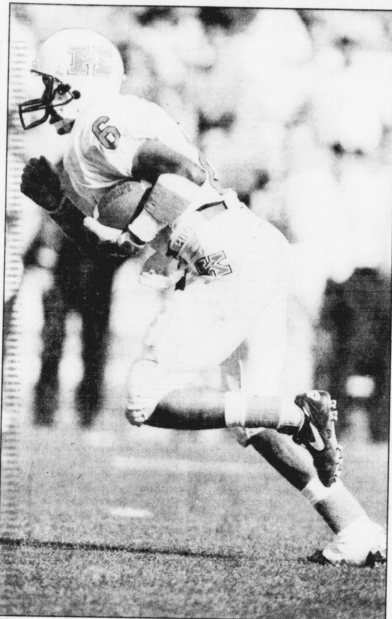

## Speedster hopes to add flash to new UK offense

When the Wildcats football team kicks off its season against Louisville on Saturday, not only will fans' eyes be on the team as a whole, but they will be closely watching sophomore wide receiver Kio Sanford.

Sanford, who enjoyed success last year as a kickoff and punt returner, will be relied on to help the Cats rebound from their dismal 1-10 record last season.

"We can't dwell on last year," Sanford says. "We just have to use it as a building stone for this year."

Sanford has worked hard to follow up a redshirt freshman season in which he led the Southeastern Conference in total kickoff returns for a game and season, total kickoff return yards in a season and highest kickoff return average.

"Going into the season, we set a goal for him to become a top-notch wide receiver, not just a kick and punt returner."

"I want to lead the nation in kickoff and punt returns," Sanford says. "I want to be one of the great receivers of the game. To do that

I'll have to concentrate and put in a lot of hard work. Hopefully it will pay off."

Not only has Sanford set personal goals, but he hopes to help the team achieve success.

With a different offense designed to maintain a balance between running and passing, Sanford says the team's hard work will result in an increased number of victories.

"Team-wise we've been having two-a-days and practicing really hard," he says.

"With the talent we have we should have a winning season and make it to a bowl game."

UK fans should definitely give the 1995 Wildcats a chance, Sanford says.

"Our offense is very exciting. It should be a lot of fun," he says. "We have great defense, also. If you want to see something exciting, come out and watch the games and we won't disappoint you. We need as much fan support as we can get."

Sanford is ready to do whatever it takes to get UK back on the winning track, saying he will accept "whatever role is given to me. I'll take the measures the team needs. If the team needs me to take on a leadership role, then I will."

"Kio's not a vocal leader," Phillips says.

"He's a leader by action. He makes big plays and the team rallies around that, whether it be on the special teams or as wide receiver."

# Soccer Cats hoping experience can take them into postseason play

When the World Cup captured the hearts of most everyone around the nation, people who once didn't care for soccer found themselves engrossed in the tournament.

The World Cup has moved on, but exciting soccer can still be found right here at UK, where the men's soccer team is gearing up for its fifth season as a varsity sport.

"The team returns eight seniors and begins play in the Mid-American Conference, a move which could help give the team a shot at playing in the NCAA Tournament. "It's a golden opportunity, a chance at an automatic bid," said Chris West, one of two candidates for the starting spot at goalie.

While offense appears to be the squad's strong point, UK head coach Ian Collins, a native of England, said the Cats need to improve their team defense.

"(The forwards) are explosive, very quick and provide excitement and entertainment," Collins said.

Among the seniors on the team, a few stand out, especially Tim Fisk, a 5-foot-11-inch, 155-pound midfielder from Louisville, who had four goals and five assists last season.

"I am not a vocal leader," Fisk said. "I like to lead by my play."

Another standout senior is Brian Dausman, a 5-9, 155-pound striker, who is also from Louisville. In 1994, Dausman scored three goals and had five assists.

In an attempt to become the Cal Ripken of UK soccer, Dausman has started 57 games over the past three seasons, one shy of senior Pat Gerak's 58-game string.

The Wildcats have added Sean Endicott, a transfer from Cincinnati, Collins said. Endicott, a 5-8 junior, adds speed and provides a scoring threat.

Endicott said he came to UK because he had "a bad year at UC," and was "frustrated with UC's team."

Another returning standout is junior Toby McComas. McComas is a 5-11, 145-pound striker from Hendersonville, Tenn., who led the team in shots on goal (46), goals (10) and points (21).

West and David Muse are currently battling for the starting spot at goalkeeper. West, a 6-3, 170-pound sophomore, played 1,343 minutes last year, allowing 24 goals. He said the starter will be named soon.

Muse, who was injury-prone last year, played 517 minutes, allowing seven goals. He also had 23 saves to

his credit along with a 3-1-1 record. The Wildcats will open their 20-game, regular-season schedule against Valparaiso Sept. 2 at Cage Field. The Cats first MAC game is Sept. 17 at home against Akron.

Admission to soccer games is free to UK students with a valid ID card.

"(We hope) to go out and play hard and be competitive in every game and bring entertainment to those who come to watch," Collins said.

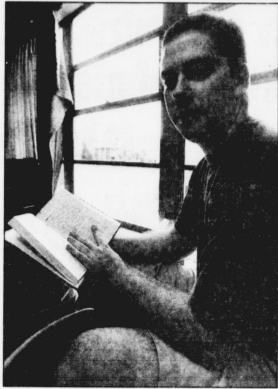

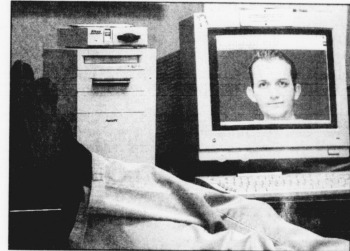

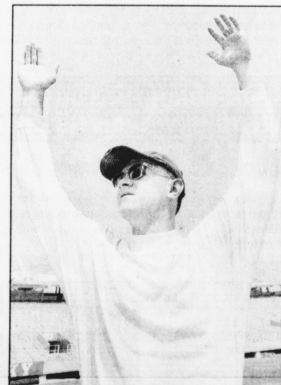

**W**alking across campus is a bit more pleasant this fall with the addition of a dismount zone to Central Campus.

Crossing campus is easier without worrying about colliding with careening cyclists.

Sure the cyclists complain about their rights being infringed, but the greater good is being served by freeing the sidewalks from the speed demons who have had free reign over campus.

Now we know not every cyclist is trouble on two wheels. In fact, most are conscientious people who try their best to make their rides through campus as painless as possible. They watch for pedestrians and usually walk their bikes in larger crowds anyway.

Actually, the dismount zone shouldn't be that big a problem. It takes about 3 to 4 minutes to walk through it and then you can be back on your bicycle.

Students who drive to class aren't allowed to park within the lots on Central Campus, because that would disrupt the flow of campus.

## Criminals fear armed citizens, not crime bills

**A** sleepy university town in a suburb outside New Haven, Conn. woke up on Aug. 2, 1994.

In a small coffeehouse where the elite academics gathered to philosophize the problems facing their existence, a man with a Bowie knife would change their minds forever.

That night, the man with the knife mortally wounded four people in the quiet cafe. The news alarmed the local papers, stormed the national media and landed on CNN International.

Stories like this one are exactly what the public wants: gruesome, unpredictable and an opportunity to blame politicians.

Congress caught wind of this story and used it as graphic evidence to support their crime bill.

In late August of the same year, they passed a 412-page crime bill, totaling \$12 billion. It called for enhanced prison terms, more cops on the streets, 44 new death penalty offenses, the "three-strikes-and-you're-out" policy and summaries for deportations of criminal aliens.

Not one of the measures lobbied so hard for would have stopped the New Haven massacre. One lunatic, without remorse for his hideous acts of brutality, cannot be stopped by civil law.

Crime is rampant because law-abiding citizens like ourselves condone it, excuse it, permit it and submit to it.

We allow it and encourage it because we don't fight back immediately, then and there, when it happens. The defect is in our character. We are a nation of cowards and shirkers.

The problem with crime in this country cannot be addressed without confronting the moral responsibility of potential victims. Taking responsibility for one's family, life and community requires fighting back when threatened with violence.

How? By possessing and mastering the means of resistance — an "equalizer" — a handgun.

A responsible citizen will be trained to use his weapon and will defend himself when faced with lethal violence.

The time has come to quit wasting money on crime legislation that deals with the effects instead of causes. The U.S. Congress' multi-billion-dollar package shows the mindset in this nation is more money, less crime.

America is wrongly called "an armed society." In fact, we would be better if it were. Most of the guns owned by law-abiding citizens are kept at home, but 87 percent of violent crimes occur outside the home.

The constantly armed portion of the community consists primarily of police and violent criminals. Multiplying the former cannot make us safe from the latter.

It is foolish and craven to expect the police to perform as personal bodyguards. The existence of police does not relieve individuals of all the responsibility for self-protection.

The Department of Justice reports that in 1991, for all crimes of violence, only 28 percent of calls to the police were responded to within five minutes, and it is more likely that an American will be injured by violent crime than in an auto accident.

In 13 states, citizens who wish to carry arms may do so, having met certain requirements.

Consider Florida, where the homicide rate fell following the enactment of legislation guaranteeing a gun permit who met specific requirements. Less than 1 percent of the applicants have been denied permits. This indicates that the law is serving the law-abiding.

Only 16 of the permits — less than one one-hundredth of 1 percent — have been rescinded after issuance because of a crime involving a firearm.

Ninety percent of violent crimes are committed by persons not carrying handguns. This is one reason why the mere brandishing of a gun by a potential victim often is a sufficient response to a would-be attacker.

A Florida State University report shows that armed citizens defend their lives or property with firearms against criminals approximately 1 million times a year.

While it seems imperative based on the evidence to reduce gun control legislation, America will always hesitate and sputter when faced with difficult decisions raised about morality and crime.

Even if the evidence shows that more guns on the street actually reduce crime, Americans are still going to fear them. It is the general phobia towards guns that has heightened the age of firearm abstinence.

Americans can use this fear of guns in their favor. Just as millions of perfectly harmless people fear firearms, so do the criminals. If everybody had a firearm, the crazy man in New Haven would be dead and four innocent people alive.

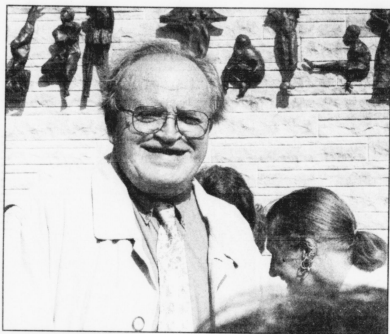
