Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, April 4, 1972

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular statutory session on the campus of the Maysville Community College at 2:00 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time) on Tuesday, April 4, 1972 with the following members answering the call of the roll: Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mrs. Robert O. Clark, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Lyman V. Ginger, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. James H. Pence, non-voting faculty members Professor Paul Sears and Professor Paul Oberst, and non-voting student member, Mr. Scott Wendelsdorf. Absent were Governor Wendell H. Ford, Mr. Jesse M. Alverson, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, former Governor Albert B. Chandler, Mr. Eugene Goss, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, and Mr. Floyd H. Wright. The administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Vice Presidents Alvin L. Morris, Lewis W. Cochran, Peter P. Bosomworth, Stanley Wall and Robert G. Zumwinkle; Dr. Donald Clapp, Budget Director; Mr. Jack Hall, Dean of Students; Dr. Charles Wethington, Assistant Vice President for the Community College System; and Dr. James C. Shires, Director of the Maysville Community College. The various news media also had representatives present.

A. Meeting Opened

Mr. Clay, presiding in the absence of Governor Ford, called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. Following the invocation pronounced by Mr. Clay, the Secretary reported a quorum present and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business at 2:04 p.m.

B. Minutes Approved

On motion by Mr. Pence, seconded by Dr. Ginger, and passed, the reading of the Minutes of the March 21, 1972 meeting was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

C. Gift From Maysville Community College Accepted

At the request of Mr. Clay, Dr. Stanley Wall introduced Dr. Shires, Director of the College, who in turn introduced members of the Advisory Board, faculty, and students of the College who were present at the meeting. Following these introductions, Mr. Clay was presented a check from the Licking Valley College Development Corporation to be used in launching a two-year nursing program at the College in the fall of 1972. Mr. Clay accepted the check with the thanks of the Board members, adding a word of appreciation for the hospitality being extended to them.

D. President's Report to the Trustees

President Singletary discussed several of the items in his monthly report to the Trustees and recommended a more thorough reading of the report by the Board members at their leisure. Mr. Clay accepted the report and it was ordered filed.

E. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

Without discussion, on motion by Dr. Ginger, seconded by Mrs. Clark, and passed, PR 2 was approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the meeting. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

F. James E. Funk Named Dean of the College of Engineering (PR 3)

Since the resignation of Dr. Robert M. Drake as Dean of the College of Engineering, a search committee has been screening candidates for his replacement. President Singletary reported that the unanimous recommendation of this committee was Dr. James E. Funk, presently serving as Acting Dean of the College. He indicated his concurrence with the committee's recommendation and placed it before the Board with his recommendation for approval.

On motion by Dr. Sears, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed unanimously, Dr. James E. Funk was named Dean of the College of Engineering, effective July 1, 1972.

G. Honorary Degree Recipients Approved (PR 4)

President Singletary reported that on the basis of informal authorization given to him at the February 29 meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, he had contacted all persons recommended by the Honorary Degree Committee and approved by the Graduate Faculty and the University Senate as recipients of honorary degrees at the commencement exercises in May and that each individual so contacted had indicated that he would be able to be present to receive his degree. President Singletary recommended that the Board of Trustees give formal approval to the awarding of the honorary degree of Doctor of Science to Mr. Robert R. Dawson, Dr. John C. Greene and Dr. Karl O. Lange, and the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws to Mr. John A. Moser, Dr. Samuel M. Nabrit and Mr. Peter A. B. Widener III.

On motion by Mr. Pence, seconded by Mrs. Clark, and passed without dissent, the awarding of the appropriate honorary degree to the persons as recommended in PR 4 was approved. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Budget Revisions for 1971-72 Approved (PR 5)

The budget revisions for 1971-72 as recommended in PR 5 being routine in nature and there being no questions, on motion by Mrs. Clark, seconded, and carried, the revisions were authorized and approved as presented. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Designation of Buildings Approved (PR 6)

Without discussion, on motion by Professor Sears, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed, the naming of the buildings as recommended in PR 6 were approved as presented. (See PR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Policy Statement on Naming of University Buildings Endorsed (PR 7)

President Singletary explained that the policy statement, a copy of which had been mailed to the members in advance of the meeting, did not require Board approval inasmuch as it was an Administrative Regulation; however, he felt that the Board should have an opportunity to react to the statement prior to its distribution to the administrative staff of the University.

On motion by Mr. Pence, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and approved, the policy statement relative to the naming of buildings on the University campus was endorsed by the Board of Trustees of the University. (See PR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Committee on Housing Policy to be Appointed

President Singletary said that the administration and the students had reached an impasse in their deliberations relative to a housing policy which was acceptable to both the administration and the student body and he wished to announce his intention of naming a blue ribbon committee composed of Trustees, alumni, students, faculty and Student Affairs personnel to take a somewhat more substantive look at the housing policies on the Lexington campus. He indicated that he would request the names of the three Board members following the Governor's appointment of the new members to the Board. It is his intention to request this committee to have a specific institutional policy formulated for presentation to the Board no later than November 1972.

L. Interim Financial Report Accepted (FCR 1)

Mr. Griffin, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved that the

financial report for the eight months' period ending February 29, 1972 be accepted, explaining that the report was routine and that the financial condition of the University was satisfactory. His motion was seconded, and approved. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Transfer of Funds From Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bond Anticipation Note Sinking Fund Authorized (FCR 2)

Mr. Griffin explained that the transfer of funds proposed in FCR 2 was routine and moved that the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer be authorized to execute the necessary documents to effect such transfer. His motion was seconded, and without discussion passed unanimously. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Revisions in Code of Student Conduct Recommended by Board Committee Accepted for Study (See attachment at the end of the Minutes.)

Mr. Griffin, as Chairman of the Board Committee on Revisions of the Student Code, reported that President Singletary had transmitted to him certain recommendations prepared by the Student Affairs staff relative to the proposed revision in the Code of Student Conduct which was received at the March 21 meeting of the Board of Trustees for subsequent action at a later meeting. In view of the recommendations received from Student Affairs, a copy of which was available for all members, Mr. Griffin suggested that they be received and sent back to the committee for further study and incorporation in the present recommendations.

Mr. Wendelsdorf protested this suggestion of Mr. Griffin's, stating that the Student Affairs staff had had the same opportunity to present its recommendations to the committee as all other groups on the campus; that the deadline for making suggestions was past; and that the proper action would be for the Student Affairs committee to present its recommendations for consideration next year. He moved that the Board reject Mr. Griffin's suggestion. Mr. Wendelsdorf's motion died for lack of a second.

Mr. Griffin then moved that the Student Affairs proposed revisions be referred to the Student Code Revision Committee for study and possible incorporation in the Revised Code as presented in March. His motion was seconded, and carried.

O. Meeting Adjourned

Determining there was no further business to come before the meeting,

Mr. Clay called for a motion for adjournment which was duly made, seconded, and carried, and the meeting adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

ROBERT RANDALL DAWSON

Robert Randall Dawson, President of the R. R. Dawson Bridge Company of Bloomfield, Kentucky, since 1938, attended the University of Kentucky College of Engineering from 1921 through 1925. In addition to an illustrious career as a bridge and highway engineer and contractor, he is active on the Kentucky Commission for Handicapped Children, the Board of Managers for Cardinal Hill Convalescent Hospital for Crippled Children, and the trustees of the Lexington Theological Seminary.

Mr. Dawson has served as president of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association, is a University Fellow, has maintained two annual scholarships in Engineering, and assisted in initiating the Alumni Association faculty awards program. He was the 1963 recipient of the Sullivan Medallion for unselfish and exceptional service to the Commonwealth.

JOHN C. GREENE

- John C. Greene, a native of Ashland, Kentucky, was educated at Ashland Junior College, and the University of Louisville where he received his dental degree in 1952. He earned a Master of Public Health degree from the University of California in 1961.
- Dr. Greene has risen rapidly in the U. S. Public Health Service to the rank of Director of the Division of Dental Health and Assistant Surgeon General. He is the youngest man in the United States Public Health Service to achieve flag rank. He is recognized throughout the world for his research and administrative accomplishments, and has an impressive list of scientific publications.
- Dr. Greene, a native Kentuckian, has demonstrated a keen interest in and has been a substantial help to the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry.

KARL OTTO LANGE

Karl Otto Lange, native of Frankfurt, Germany, and a naturalized American citizen, retired from the University of Kentucky Department of Mechanical Engineering in 1971 after a twenty-five year productive career of research, teaching and consulting, focused on Aeronautics and Biomedical Engineering.

After serving at several institutions including M. I. T. and Harvard, Dr. Lange joined the University of Kentucky faculty in 1946 as an Assistant Professor of Physics. In 1954, he became Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Director of the Wenner-Gren Aeronautical Research Laboratory.

Dr. Lange's publications include hundreds of journal articles and technical reports, and he holds patents in the areas of corrosive-preventive lubricant compound; design, construction, and testing of compartmented fuel tanks; parachute disreefing systems; aerial camera shutter calibration; vibration test data analysis; and the Lange-USAF contourometer.

JOHN ALOYSIUS MOSER

John Aloysius Moser was born and has lived his entire life in or around Louisville, Kentucky. A recent citation by President Richard Nixon recognized Mr. Moser for "distinguished and sustained leadership to the problems in dairy industry locally, regionally and nationally. As dairyman, organizer and administrator of dairy cooperatives, promoter of dairy products, counselor to state and national governments, spokesman for Agricultural education and research, he has been a friend to all of Agriculture."

Mr. Moser has been a long-time counselor and friend of the University of Kentucky, always ready to defend it or to offer intelligent and constructive criticism, as needed.

Mr. Moser has innumerable awards for outstanding service at all levels, including the Golden Sheaf Award of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and five distinguished service awards by state and national organizations. He has been recognized nationally as the outstanding man of his field for the past 30 years.

SAMUEL MILTON NABRIT

Samuel Milton Nabrit was born in Macon, Georgia, 67 years ago. He completed his undergraduate work in Biology at Morehouse College, and his doctoral work at Brown University. For 23 years he served as Chairman of the Department of Biology at Atlanta University, also serving concurrently, during the latter years, as Dean of the Graduate School. From 1955-66 he served as President of Texas Southern University in Houston.

Dr. Nabrit has earned national recognition principally as President of the National Institute of Science. He has served on the Screening Committee for the Ford Foundation Fellowship Program, and as a member of the Boards of the American Council on Education and the Atomic Energy Commission. He is presently serving as Executive Director of the Southern Fellowships Fund, as well as the Boards of Trustees of five universities or colleges, including Brown University.

PETER A. B. WIDENER III

Peter A. B. Widener III attended the University of Kentucky until the death of his father in 1948 when he was forced to assume personal management of the family's business interests. He has become a respected authority in criminology, having served successively as a dollar-a-year chief of the Fayette County Patrol, as Commissioner of the Kentucky State Police, and as First Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Public Safety.

More recently, Mr. Widener has become concerned with the Science of Oceanography, and has provided major financial assistance to the International Oceanographic Institute of the University of Miami.

As a collector and Fellow of the Metropolitan and the Philadelphia Museums of Art, he has maintained the Widener tradition of close association with the arts, and association highlighted by his grandfather's gift of a \$50,000,000 collection to the National Gallery in Washington.

Mr. Widener has shown a continuing interest in the programs of the University of Kentucky, having donated a \$100,000 painting, a valuable collection of cattle and horses, including a share in Nashua, as well as other substantial contributions to several university programs. He presently serves as a member of the University of Kentucky Athletic Association Board of Directors.

POLICY STATEMENT ON NAMING UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

Recommendation: that the attached revision of the policy on naming University buildings be approved, effective immediately.

Background: The policy governing the naming of University buildings has been in effect for several years. It is deemed desirable to update this policy and provide for a special advisory committee to contribute to its implementation.

POLICY STATEMENT ON NAMING UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

Naming new buildings and changing the names of existing structures of the University of Kentucky - whether on the main campus or elsewhere - is of interest to the entire university community. Choosing a truly appropriate name - one that accounts for present and possible future uses of the building, that reflects functions performed and interests served by so simple a thing as a name - is no easy task. There is a need to establish workable methods and standards for appropriately naming university buildings which will serve the following ends:

- 1. to aid the President and the Board of Trustees in selecting suitable names;
- 2. to encourage participation in the naming process by the university community, faculty, staff, alumni, trustees, and friends;
- 3. to make more generally understood the considerations involved in suitably naming university buildings.

GUIDELINES

- I. All university buildings, such as the medical center, dormitories and athletic facilities which are dedicated to highly specialized uses that prevent their conversion to other functions, shall carry as part of their names terms which describe their uses, whatever other names may be given them. Functionally descriptive names attached to other types of buildings do not, however, prevent their later use for different purposes and with different names.
 - A. Functionally descriptive names for general purpose officeclassroom and administrative buildings are generally to be discouraged since future changes in occupancy would require costly and time-consuming changes on each occasion.
- II. When some other name seems more appropriate than a functionally descriptive one, the nominations should demonstrate that the remarkable associations of that name with the history of the University or the nation with the advancement of knowledge and learning guarantee that it will remain memorable long beyond the lifetime of those who propose the name.

A. Nominations whose claims are parochial, of recent date and untested by the passage of time, or based on personal enthusiasm are to be avoided. Considerable historical perspective should be exercised before proposing names. Nominations of persons on active service with the University, especially where that service is to be performed in a building so named, is at best in questionable taste and should not be considered except in the most extraordinary cases. Proposing the names of living persons no longer on active service with the University also should be approached as most exceptional cases.

III. Priorities governing the selection of names:

- A. All living units, athletic and recreational structures and areas, and specialized-function structures should carry in their names, terms describing their uses, such as House, Village, Field, Coliseum, whatever other names may be given them.
- B. Such structures or areas ought to be given names that carry some general significance for the University as a whole, as Memorial Coliseum now does. If personal names are to be considered, first priority ought to attach to those whose interest in the University has been expressed in some unusually significant manner, or to those whose names permanently and generally symbolize to a unique degree some important aspect of University life or values.
- C. Service structures should carry only functionally descriptive names.
- D. Community colleges and other off-campus structures should ordinarily be given names which describe their geographical location.
- E. General administrative and multi-purpose office and classroom buildings serving several disciplines or offices may properly carry names of historical significance to the University as a whole, as distinct from those names of interest only to a particular function or use.
- F. Buildings devoted to the interests of a single administrative or academic unit may carry names associated historically with that field of study or endeavor or names of those whose interests in that field and in the University merit the honor.

G. It is appropriate to express the esteem and appreciation the University feels for one who has brought honor to the institution by his accomplishments, or who has given significantly of his time and money, by giving his name to a University structure or area. Wherever possible, however, his name should grace a structure that houses some activity appropriate to his field of interest or endeavor.

PROCEDURES

- I. The duty of surveying and recommending proposed names to the President and the Board of Trustees shall be lodged in an advisory committee appointed by the President.
 - A. All nominations should be submitted to the chairman of this committee, together with a statement indicating the suitability of the proposed name in accordance with the guidelines.
 - B. All nominations should conform to these procedures and guidelines. If a peculiarly appropriate name does not so conform, the reasons for setting aside the usual criteria should accompany the nomination.
 - C. All nominations shall be held in the strictest confidence by all interested parties.
- II. It is not possible to establish hard and fast rules to govern every naming situation that may arise. An orderly approach, however, is indicated.
 - A. All new buildings should be named, wherever practicable, by the time preliminary architect's drawings are approved. Barring this, their names and the name changes of existing buildings should be determined as far as possible ahead of occupancy.
 - B. When no final determination of the name of a new building seems appropriate at the time of construction, it shall be given a functionally descriptive name until such time as circumstances warrant a permanent name.
 - C. The names of certain existing buildings which reflect participation in underwriting their construction by some donor, subscription, or other special circumstance, and whose original

use was designed for particular occupants, may come in question when occupancy is changed. In such cases, special consideration should be given to the destination of its original name, and consultations between all interested parties should precede recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

D. The names of rooms in or of spaces within or adjoining buildings whose use will be confined to their occupants shall be left to the discretion of those administering the space during their term of occupancy, subject only to the approval of the committee and the President and to the provisions of the guidelines.

AUTHORIZATION TO TRANSFER FUNDS FROM SERIES A COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BOND ANTICIPATION NOTE SINKING FUND

Recommendation: that the Board authorize the Vice President of Business Affairs and Treasurer to execute the necessary documents to transfer \$75,000 from the Series A Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds Anticipation Note Sinking Fund to the Community Colleges construction project.

Background: The Community Colleges construction program was based upon a \$12,200,000 Series A Bond Issue. However, when bonds were sold a \$75,000 maturity (May 1, 1970) was bypassed, leaving an issue of only \$12,125.00. The \$75,000 was included in the appropriation for debt service in 1970-71 and deposited in the Community Colleges Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bond Anticipation Note Sinking Fund, rather than in the construction account: leaving the latter short by this amount. This authorization permits the transfer of those funds from the sinking fund to the construction fund; thus restoring the program to \$12,200,000 as originally authorized. The remaining balance in the Note Sirking Fund will be transferred to the Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds Sinking Fund Reserves.

SUBJECT: Revisions in Code of Student Conduct Recommended by Board Committee

Members of the Student Affairs staff and I have completed a thorough review of the report submitted by the Committee on Revision of the Code of Student Conduct at the March 21 meeting of the Board of Trustees. Several of the proposed revisions have great merit, and there are others to which we have no substantial objection. However, this memorandum is not addressed to such items. Rather, I wish to bring to your attention the problems and questions that would be entailed in the Board's adoption of certain proposed revisions; and, in some cases, I wish to recommend Board action concerning the Committee's proposals.

I have organized the following presentation into five divisions: (a) proposed revisions which should be rejected; (b) proposed revisions which should be amended; (c) proposed revisions which involve considerations that should be brought to the Board's attention; (d) Mr. Wendelsdorf's minority report; and (e) Mr. Bell's minority report.

* * * * * * *

A. Proposed revisions which should be rejected.

It is my considered judgment that the Committee's proposed revisions outlined below should be rejected by the Board, for the reasons given:

1.2g (Providing that "opportunity to comply with a lawful order to leave the premises must be given" as a condition for finding a student guilty of violation of Section 1.2g)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: That the proposed additional sentence to 1.2g be rejected and the original wording of that section

be retained.

RATIONALE: While in some cases the proposed addition would provide an ideal solution, the basic impact of the proposal is to make the entire section ineffective and unenforceable for many situations.

The proposal would require the University to permit one apprehended in the act of violating this section the opportunity to avoid prosecution merely by ceasing the misconduct. For example, a student who is found in an office after forceably breaking into it would not be in violation of this section if he complied with the order to vacate.

In addition, no charge could result under 1.2g where apprehension takes place at some place and time other than at the place and time of commission of the violation, since no opportunity was given to comply with the required order to vacate - i.e., a student breaks and enters, then leaves unnoticed, but is apprehended at his domicile a week later as a result of an investigation.

1.422a (Limiting the functions of the Hearing Officers for both the U. J-Board and 1.436a and the Appeals Board)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: That the Committee's proposed revision be rejected and that the original wording of 1.422a and 1.436a be retained.

RATIONALE: Nothing has occurred during the nearly two years since adoption of the Hearing Officer feature to justify the proposed change in the Hearing Officers's functions. Furthermore, it appears to me that the proposed revision is too heavily weighted in favor of formal court tradition (i.e., separation of judge and jury) and that it fails to recognize the less formal, less legalistic character of hearings in a university setting in which it is desirable to have the benefit of judicious interaction between a lay hearing board and a legally trained hearing officer.

Also, I point to what are clearly two direct contradictions within this section if revised as proposed. First, there is a conflict between the Hearing Officer's role as "a non-voting member of the Board as to the issue of guilt or innocence and as to the quantum of punishment"

(line 1, page 8) and the requirement that, "The Hearing Officer shall neither sit in on nor take part in the Board's deliberations of the issue of innocence or guilt nor quantrum of punishment" (line 6, page 8). Secondly, there is a conflict between the J-Board Hearing Officer's responsibility to "decide and rule upon all procedural questions arising under this Code" (line 3, page 8), on the one hand, and, on the other, his proposed responsibility to "be available to advise upon procedural questions arising under this Code" (line 8, page 8 of proposed addition).

Although the actual wording of 1.436a as revised differs from 1.422a, the basic issues are identical.

2.22 (Requiring "consultation with the President of the affected Residence Hall Government" in appointing the resident advisor of each housing unit).

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: That this proposal not be adopted.

RATIONALE: In actuality, the resident advisors are the head residents, University employees selected by the Dean of Students. The effect of this proposed revision would be to confound the normal processes of appointment of residence hall staff members and complicate the definition of their administrative responsibilities. I do not believe such a provision belongs in a Code of Student Conduct.

Further, this proposal is fundamentally unworkable because a majority of our residence halls (the freshman halls) have no president until several weeks following the beginning of the fall term.

3.31 (Adding the Residence Halls Judicial System and the counseling process to the University Judicial System with respect to applicability of the following specified rights of the accused).

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: That Section 3.31 be retained in its original form and that the proposed revision be rejected.

RATIONALE: At first glance it may appear logical and meritorious to broaden the applicability of the specified rights of the accused so as to include the Residence Halls Judicial System and the counseling process, as well as the University Judicial System for which section 3.31 is written. However, a careful, detailed reading of the subsections of 3.31 (i.e., 3.311 through 3.319) reveals that most or all of those subsections are specifically designed for the University Judicial System and that to attempt to apply them literally to residence halls and to the counseling process can result in great confusion and difficulty.

For example, section 3.319 provides for "the right to either an open or closed hearing". This would allow for the interpretation (unintended by the Committee, I am sure) that a student may insist on an "open hearing" when involved in the counseling process with the Dean of Students. Section 3.319 also refers to the Hearing Officer; but the Hearing Officer has meaning only in relation to the University Judicial System, because the Residence Halls J-Boards (18 in number) do not have hearing officers.

With reference to the section's applicability to the Residence Halls Judicial System: that system operates on a more informal basis than does the University Judicial System; and I believe the proposed revision of 3.31 would have the effect of formalizing the residence halls process unduly. To be more specific, it is clear that subsections 3.318 and 3.319 should not be made to apply literally to the Residence Halls Judicial System.

Another example: several of the subsections of section 3.31 use the term "judicial agency". The Dean of Students Office is not currently considered a "judicial agency", but adoption of the proposed revision of section 3.31 could result in the contrary interpretation and thus result in undesirable limitations on the effectiveness of the Dean of Students Office. To be more specific, if the Dean of Students Office were considered to be a judicial agency for the purposes of interpreting section 3.31, think of the mischief that could be created through a literal application of subsections 3.313, 3.314, 3.315, 3.317, 3.318 (!), and 3.319.

B. Proposed revisions which should be amended.

The Committee's proposed revisions outlined below should be amended by the Board, for the reasons given:

1.411 (Adding material pertaining to the counseling session)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: Add the words "AND DOES NOT BEGIN UNTIL THE STUDENT ADMITS GUILT TO THE CHARGES PLACED AGAINST HIM" at the conclusion of the sentence, "The counseling session is strictly confidential".

RATIONALE: This proposed addition is intended to clarify the difference between the "preliminary conference" and the "counseling session".

1.424a (Adding the President of GPSA to the process of approving members of the U. J-Board)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: Add the words, "IN ADDITION", in the fifth line, page 9 after ". . . and" and before "for graduate ".

RATIONALE: For graduate and professional student appointments there would be one additional screening step. It is important to be clear that in such cases the President of GPSA is not advising and consenting in place of the Vice President for Student Affairs, but rather in addition to the Vice President.

1.426 (Appealability of Hearing Officer's decision on excused absences)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: Add, "IN WRITING WITHIN THIRTY DAYS OF THE HEARING OFFICER'S DECISION", following ". . . . the whole Board" at the conclusion of the first sentence of the new (underlined) material.

RATIONALE: This recommendation is designed to provide continuity of membership on the Board and to prevent the possibility of an appeal months after the Hearing Officer's decision.

Article (Providing that "the sanctions of Article V shall not apply until
V final resolution of the dispute" if the student challenges his
liability for a financial obligation asserted by the University)

BOARD ACTION RECOMMENDED: That the Committee's proposed revision be amended by adding the following sentence at the conclusion of the new paragraph: "Provided however that this section shall not be construed to require the transfer of credits or certification for graduation prior to resolution of the dispute."

RATIONALE: Such a provision is needed to protect the University's interest and to discourage a student's challenging his financial obligations to the University solely for the purpose of gaining clearance for transferring credits or graduating. Once a student has been graduated, the University's only recourse may be to take legal action in order to settle the financial obligation.

C. Proposed revisions which involve considerations that should be brought to the Board's attention.

The Committee's proposed revisions outlined below involve questions and implications which should at least be brought to the Board's attention before final action on the proposals. I have simply offered a brief comment on each proposal and have not recommended Board action.

1.32 (Providing that the University will not provide student addresses and phone numbers to landlords, etc.)

COMMENT: Due to the fact that it is impossible to screen adequately the vast numbers of requests for student addresses and phone numbers, the University, upon adoption of this proposal, may have to refuse release of such information to anyone except as required by law. Further, if it were possible to screen out those persons who are "landlords, retail stores, magazine and book companies, etc.", would not the University be justly charged with (a) discriminating against some citizens in favor of others, and (b) providing a sanctuary for students vis-a-vis their financial obligations?

1.414 (Providing for contact with parents in matters of discipline "only if the student is under eighteen years of age or consents.")

COMMENT: I have no substantial objection to this proposal provided the Board understands and fully supports its implications. I am thinking of the occasional case of an 18-year-old student who is in extremely serious difficulty and who refuses to consent to informing his parents. The Dean of Students would be required not to inform the parents in such a case, and the Board must be aware of potential PR implications (particularly with the student's parents) under such circumstances.

1.44 Ist sentence (Providing that the Student Government President, rather than the President of the University, will make temporary appointments to the U. J-Board -- with advice and consent of the Vice President for Student Affairs).

COMMENT: This can create a problem at a time when the Student Government President is absent from the campus, perhaps for an extended period, or if he simply fails to make such temporary appointments.

1.51 (Adding the clause, "unless imposed by the U. J-Board", to the parenthetical sentence under the sanction of "Warning").

COMMENT: By definition, the "Warning" is an action which may be invoked only by the Dean of Students or his authorized representative. Therefore, the reference to imposition of this action by the U. J-Board appears to be inappropriate.

3.320 (Adding a section on inadmissibility of certain evidence).

COMMENT: It appears to me that this proposed addition is unnecessary and redundant because the provisions of Article III accomplish the objectives of this proposal. Further, the phrase, "other improper means", is vague and does not provide the criteria and procedure for determining that "improper means" have been used to secure evidence.

D. Mr. Wendelsdorf's minority report.

The first eleven recommendations in Mr. Wendelsdorf's minority report were considered and rejected by the Committee; and it is my view that the Board should

not adopt those recommendations.

Mr. Wendelsdorf's recommendation #12 (proposing the addition of an article to deal with the process of amending the Code) has merit in principle, though I question whether it properly belongs in the Code itself. It would seem that the same objective can be achieved by agreement between the President and the Board of Trustees.

E. Mr. Bell's minority report.

Mr. Bell's proposal (that a three-man Hearing Board replace the Appeals Board to hear cases in which there are alleged violations of Section 6.1) has merit but may require further study. I have no recommendation concerning his proposal at this time.
