## Procedure may restore sight

Helping the blind to see: Implant developed at UK may help those suffering from vision loss

When Fannie Miller's vision began to deteriorate, her ability to do the things she had done for years followed. No longer could she see to read or pay her own bills.

"I walked into door facings and walls," she said yesterday at the UK Hospital.

Diabetic Macular Edema, the chronic deterioration and leakage of retinal blood vessels, stole her eyesight. A new procedure developed by UK researchers has given

it back.

It has changed her life, Miller said. She was diagnosed with type II diabetes 27 years ago. Diabetes is the leading cause of blindness in people between the ages of 20 and 74.

The treatment, developed through UK research, could be effective for several sight-threatening retinal disorders and is now being tested for DME.

Miller, 61, was one of five patients to participate in clinical trials.

Doctors perform a simple sur-

gical procedure to place a tiny implant containing medicine into the back of the eye.

The implant is designed to deliver sustained and consistent therapeutic levels of drugs directly to the diseased area of the eye for up to three years.

The design also is expected to limit the drug's exposure to the whole body, reduce the dosage needed to be effective and reduce the need for frequent treatments.

The procedure did not hurt, Miller said.

"This technology may offer the opportunity to treat DME with a drug instead of an invasive procedure," said Dr. P. Andrew Pearson, an associate professor in the Department of Ophthalmology.

Pearson, who was one of the

researchers whose discoveries led to the technology for the implant, is the principal investigator for clinical studies conducted with the implant.

He has been working on the research that led to the implant since 1988, when he took a year off between his internship and residency.

In the initial study, he used the implant delivering fluocinolone acetonide, a powerful anti-inflammatory steroid compound that controls inflammation and inhibits the growth of damaged blood vessels.

The five patients, who had not responded to prior laser treatment, each underwent the surgical placement of the implant in one eye. The other eye was not treated

and was used as the study control. In nine months, the mean visual acuity for the five patients improved from 20/185 to 20/82. The control group's visual acuity remained essentially unchanged.

"Three of the patients had very poor vision, and they would say this changed their lives," Pearson said.

This technology also is being studied to treat a variety of other sight-threatening intra-ocular diseases by combining the implant with known therapeutic compounds.

These diseases, which along with DME affect more than 8 million, include age-related macular degeneration, the deterioration of the central retina, and uveitis, a severe intra-ocular inflammation.

## How to solve credit card woes



Broke: Professor offers advice on dealing with debt and Christmas gift buying

Justin Stevens has a dilemma.

"I'm broke, my credit cards are maxed out and Christmas is less than one month away," the undeclared freshman said.

Stevens, like many other students, fell victim to the array of credit card solicitors who visited UK's campus at the beginning of the semester. Four months later, he, like many others, has four credit cards, an outstanding balance and almost nothing to show for it.

Now that all of those reached their limit, Stevens' life doesn't seem to get any easier.

Raymond Forgue, an associate professor of family studies, teaches a personal family finance class, which focuses somewhat on credit. He helps students avoid these debts. However, if they already incurred such debts, he advises them on what to do to lower the existing balance, or to even pay that balance off.

His first words of advice: college students shouldn't feel compelled to use their credit cards to buy gifts for the holiday season. "It doesn't seem that anyone would expect students to get a cash advance to buy a gift for them," he said.

Forgue recommends that students use their college status as a crutch. "There is an advantage to being poor (in this case)," he said.

Instead of increasing the balance on a credit card this season, Forgue recommends that students find a way to work on their existing balance. Likewise, he recommends trying to work any outstanding balance down.

"Students need to be aware the minimum payment is barely

## Judge rules against manual recounts

'They won. We lost': Gore attorneys say they will appeal circuit judge ruling against manual recounts in Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Circuit Judge N. Sanders Sauls on Monday rejected Al Gore's request for a manual recount of thousands of contested ballots in Florida's presidential election, and refused the vice president's request to overturn George W. Bush's certified statewide victory.

The vice president "failed to carry the requisite burden of proof" in the unprecedented legal challenge to Bush's 537-vote certified victory, Sauls said in a ruling that Gore's lawyers appealed even before the crowd cleared from his courtroom.

"They won. We lost. We're appealing," said attorney David Boies, who represents the vice president.

"A lawyer is always happy when he

wins," exulted attorney Barry Richard, who represented Bush in Sauls' courtroom. The ruling was a major turning point in the nation's election drama, and capped a day of suspenseful legal developments that ranged from the U.S. Supreme Court to the Florida Supreme Court, to the trial court where the jurist with the southern drawl presided over a hurry-up trial.

Reading aloud to a packed courtroom and nationwide television audience, Sauls came down on Bush's side of the case on point after point.

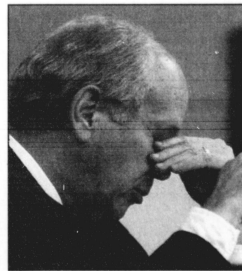
He said county canvassing boards in Palm Beach Miami-Dade and Nassau Counties had all acted within their discretion in the way they handled vote tabulations. He said there was "no authority under Florida law" for certifying an incomplete

manual recount" or for submitting returns after a deadline fixed by the state Supreme Court, a vindication of the actions of Secretary of State Katherine Harris, who certified Bush the winner.

And he said that while the record shows "voter error and/or less than total accuracy in regard" to the results in Palm Beach and Miami counties, these problems "cannot support or affect any recounting."

Gore asked for a ruling overturning Bush's certified 537-vote victory in Florida, and to order a manual recount of an estimated 14,000 ballots in Palm Beach and Miami-Dade Counties. The vice president's legal team also sought to change the official vote certification in Nassau County, although only 51 votes were involved there.

The Bush team argued there was no reason for the recount, and said the Texas' governor had been certified properly by Secretary of State Katherine Harris, on the basis of tallies submitted by the canvassing boards in all 67 Florida counties.

# The Low-down

## NASA officials talk solar panels

SPACE CENTER, Houston — NASA officials were assessing their options early Monday about when to finish unfurling the international space station's newly attached set of powerful solar panels. The debut of the \$600 million solar wings was incomplete as only the right panel was deployed Sunday. Although the right wing has started generating electricity, some of its tension cables appeared to be slack. Engineers are trying to figure out if this will be a problem in unfurling the left wing and if that can be done Monday or should be delayed until Tuesday, when astronauts on the space shuttle Endeavour conduct their second of three spacewalks during this mission.

## Guns blaze in Bethlehem

JERUSALEM — Heavy gunbattles raged overnight in what the Israeli army said was an apparent attempt by Palestinian gunmen to take over an Israeli enclave in Bethlehem. Palestinians said the fighting broke out after soldiers and Jewish settlers attacked Muslim worshippers. The confrontation lasted hours and at one point, Israeli helicopters aiming at Palestinian gunmen fired two rockets at the Aida refugee camp near Bethlehem in the West Bank, the army said. Twelve Palestinians were injured, including two who were in serious condition with gunshot wounds, Palestinian hospitals said.

## Congress reconvenes

WASHINGTON — The presidential transition is the first order of business as Congress returns from a three-week recess to confront lingering disputes with the current president and uncertainty about the next one. A House Government Reform subcommittee called a hearing Monday on the refusal of the General Services Administration to release \$5.3 million in transition funds to either Republican George W. Bush or Democrat Al Gore because it's still uncertain which will be sworn in as president. Reps. Stephen Horn, R-Calif., and Jim Kolbe, R-Ariz., sent a letter to the head of the GSA last week saying the money should be given immediately to Bush, and that failure to do so could impede a smooth handover of power from the Clinton administration.

## Zapatista leader ready to negotiate

MEXICO CITY — Even before he completed his victory lap around the country, Mexico's new

president scored another major victory, bringing the nation's most famous rebel group back to the negotiating table. Vicente Fox, who became Mexico's first opposition president in 71 years Friday, made immediate overtures to the Zapatista rebels in southern Chiapas state, whose 1994 rebellion had been a thorn in the government's side ever since. Zapatista leader Subcomandante Marcos said Saturday that while he still distrusted Fox, his fighters were ready to return to peace talks. He even said he would travel to Mexico City personally to push for an Indian-rights law in Congress.

## Pakistan makes peace offering to India

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Pakistan made a new offer in its long and bitter dispute with India over Kashmir, saying for the first time that it will not oppose one-on-one talks between Kashmiri separatists and the Indian government. The statement was a significant concession from Pakistan, which in the past has said it must be included in any negotiations on Kashmir, a Himalayan region that has been a focus of bitter contention with India for decades. The offer comes amid renewed violence in Indian-ruled Kashmir, where an explosion Monday in Baramullah killed one soldier and injured several others. Four civilians were also hurt, officials said.

## 'Simpsons' creator lives 'Life in Hell'

LOS ANGELES — Before "The Simpsons" came "Life in Hell" for Matt Groening. The 46-year-old cartoonist says he created the "Life in Hell" weekly comic strip in 1977 to vent his frustrations about living in Los Angeles. "When I moved to Los Angeles, I thought it was horrible," Groening said. In addition to running a comic book publishing company and producing the third season of "Futurama," he still draws "Life in Hell," whose caustic rabbis inspired some of the characters on "The Simpsons." "Because these enterprises have gotten so big, a lot of the fun stuff gets taken away from me and I end up sitting in really boring meetings about budgets and scheduling," he said. "It's fun to go home or to my studio, sit down with a blank sheet of paper and draw a cartoon all by myself."

## Lakers win 99-97

LOS ANGELES — Hack-a-Shaq made life difficult Sunday night for the Los Angeles Lakers. Kobe Bryant scored 23 of his 38 points in the second half, and also had 10 rebounds and six assists as the Lakers continued their domination over Dallas by beating the Mavericks 99-97. Shaquille O'Neal added 25 points and 14 rebounds for the Lakers, but was only 5-of-19 from the free throw line, and spent time on the bench late in the game when it was obvious Dallas wanted to foul him intentionally to send him to the line. Dirk Nowitzki led the Mavericks with 25 points and 11 rebounds. Michael Finley scored 22 points, and Howard Eisley added 14 points and 10 assists for Dallas.

enough to pay the interest," he said. "Doing it this way will take a long time to pay off."

He said the most easily accessed credit cards that students get (particularly the ones Stevens has) are set up to take seven or even eight years to pay off, even if the card never gets used again.

"There are places on the web to calculate to see how much you need to pay to get the card paid off (within a certain amount of time)," Forgue said.

Other than decreasing balances and shopping around for the lowest annual percentage rate, Forgue hesitantly suggested students get two credit cards. One to use for convenience purposes that the student pays off each month, and

another to carry a balance on with a low rate.

"It seems that students often use cards for convenience purposes," he said. "They get charged interest for all these convenience purposes."

Forgue said students then add discipline to purchasing items on a card," he said.

According to Merriam Webster's dictionary, an Antichrist is either "A great antagonist expected to fill the world with wickedness..." or "a false Christ."

So which one is Marilyn Manson? Judging from his latest release he falls into the first category.

Initially, *Holywood* sounds like *Mechanical Animals* pretending to be *Antichrist Superstar*. This is not surprising since it was envisaged as the completion of a trilogy.

What this melange does, though, is prevent *Holywood* from having either the seductive aura of *Mechanical Animals* or the virulent edge of *Antichrist Superstar*. Roughly half-way through this ceases to be an issue as the thematic intent and grandiose posturing become more obvious with songs reminiscent of *The Wall*ers Pink Floyd.

Part of the appeal and part of the problem with Manson is his self-professed narcissus narcosis. He seems unable to reconcile confusing himself with Kennedy and Lee Harvey Oswald simultaneously. If you think about it, this is emblematic of much of our contemporary malaise.

Having tapped into this vein, like some miserable parasite, and being able to share that is the level on which Manson still succeeds. Besides, Antichrist or not, the man would be sexy in pajamas.

The Insane Clown Posse is better than ever since their last album, *The Amazing Jeckel Brothers*, which went platinum in only a short time.

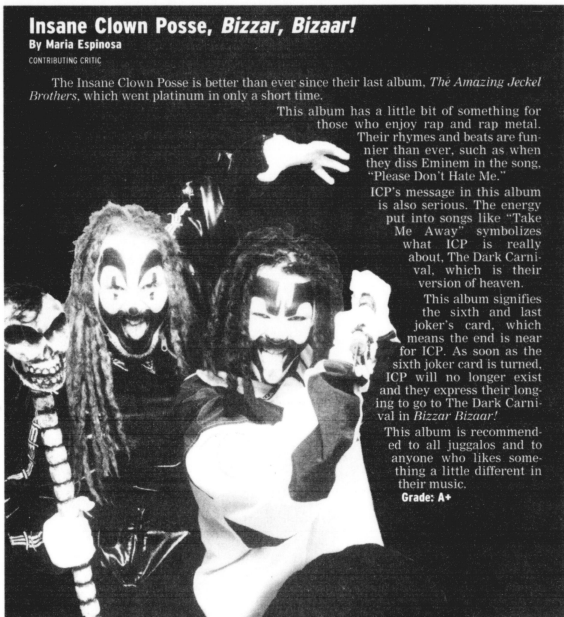

Ever since Andy Warhol collapsed the distinction between what properly constitutes art and what doesn't, it hasn't mattered what one tends to exalt or denote. Hence, the popular aversion to Warhol. People are inclined to operate as if distinctions could still be made while harboring the suspicion that he was right and hold this against him.

What this means is that it doesn't matter if Trent Reznor is (mis)constructed as a genius.

It doesn't matter if the man echoes Warhol's approach by taking what is immaculate and sophisticated and making it common by getting it dirty or vice versa. It doesn't matter if the project is perpetuated with the appropriations and expropriations that comprise the new batch of *Fragile* remixes *Things Falling Apart*.

What does matter is if we like it or not. Do we like it? Yes and no.

There are moments on the disc that anyone would be hard pressed to appreciate, like Adrian Sherwood's remix of "Starf\*\*ers Inc." Conversely, there are tracks it would be difficult not to appreciate, like Keith Hillebrandt's remix of "10 Miles High." Bonuses come in the form of two *Fragile* session outtakes and a new cover of Gary Numan's "Metal."

All in all it is petty and cheap, yet intelligent, and worth checking out if you're a fan.

## Olympic bid sends Beijing scouring

**BEIJING** - Looking for a four-star bathroom? Check out Beijing, where only those commodes with granite floors, lively music and automatic flushing get such an honor. Motivated in part by its bid for the 2008 Olympics, China's capital is cleaning up its act, ranking toilets with up to four stars to encourage better hygiene. Beijing officials agreed to a two-year renovation plan for 452 public toilets at 305 tourist sites, the communist government's official newspaper reported Monday. Toilets will be rated on 58 qualities - from decor to management, the China Daily said. Among Beijing's roughly 4 million annual visitors, fifty toilets are a top complaint, accounting for a fifth of the 206 complaints lodged with the Beijing Consumers' Association during the weeklong National Day holiday, the China Daily said. Beijing, Toronto, Osaka, Paris and Istanbul are bidding for the 2008 Olympics. The International Olympic Committee selects the host city in July.

## Ski resort set too low for park

**STEAMBOAT SPRINGS, Colo.** - The planners of an \$85 million ski resort put thought in every detail, except one.

The clearance in the underground parking lot at the Steamboat Springs Grand Resort Hotel measures 6 feet, 8 inches.

That's low enough to keep out some sport utility vehicles, which transportation officials say constitute a third of vehicles traveling to ski areas.

And that's without the skis. "If we had another 6 inches, I don't think it would be an issue," said Terry Murphy, vice president and general manager of the lodge. "We have a sign outside that says 6'6" just to err on the side of caution."

The 80-inch garage will admit most SUVs. The 80.2-inch-tall Ford Excursion or others carrying a typical 6-inch roof rack may be left out.

The garage does have a security gate which will close before a vehicle gets inside and starts breaking off fire-sprinkler heads, Murphy said.

# High profile activism leaves Jesse in the cold

With the Florida elections still in an uproar and now being fought in the courts, many supporters of Al Gore and the Democratic Party have fallen behind leaders such as Al Sharpton and Jesse Jackson. At one time an important leader on issues important to the black community, Jesse Jackson has now bastardized himself for Democratic Party activism to the point that his credibility continues to suffer, to an extent that many of the issues he once championed are suffering as well. In an appearance on "Meet The Press" on Oct. 22, Jackson's convoluted arguments before the elections on issues such as education and vouchers fell short of any weighted substance. The Reverend opted instead for continually broad and oversimplified rhetoric, deteriorating at one point to a simplistic Al Gorean analogy.

When confronted by the host with the statistical fact that 60 percent of black Americans believe in vouchers, 70 percent if you move to those under the age of 35, Jackson quickly spun away with a simplistic use of pork chops to illustrate how education should be divided.

It was difficult for Jackson to

make a convincing argument against a program that his own supporters, many in the inner cities, overwhelmingly support.

This fragmented and non-linear reasoning continues now with Jackson's presence in Florida, where his organized demonstrations preceded those of Republicans weeks.

Long a pawn of the Democrats now, Jackson's insertion of the race card into the latest round in Florida's political battles owes more to a desperate fallback on tried and true tactics than it does to the idea of justice for the voter. While Jackson's unsubstantiated claim of violations of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 continues to be the battle cry for himself and a host of his supporters, numerous facts concerning the election's procedures fall by the wayside.

Jackson's current mantra dictates that the voters in the Palm Beach precincts were forced to vote on antiquated machines that are the cause of many of the county's problems. What gets lost in argument, though, is that the precincts themselves are responsible for the type of voting systems used in localized elections, including both local races and those on a national level. We get

the same arguments that voters who voted carelessly or who did not take the time to make sure of their vote are somehow victims, dismissing from their action any form of self-responsibility. Further, the contention that precinct ballots confused voters and were injected into black areas to obstruct the "will of the people" in Jim Crow fashion holds absolutely no water.

These ballots were approved by local canvassing boards and in fact were designed by a democratic official under the approval of Theresa LePore, the elections supervisor for Palm Beach County and a staunch Gore supporter.

Jackson and his supporters continue their high profile demonstrations, claiming infringements on the rights of minority voters, and one can be sure the same cries that "bullying tactics" and "efforts to sway election decisions" are being used, such as allegations applied to protesters in Florida, will be curiously silent. The troubling undertone to these actions by the Reverend Jackson, whose reputation at one time far outweighed those of recent cohorts such as Sharpton, is that his revered position in previous civil rights matters is eroding

# UK tennis increases talent

### Joining the elite: UK men's tennis coach Dennis Emery has landed many top recruits lifting UK into national contention

The UK men's tennis team plans to serve up some new players for the spring semester and beyond.

The Cats are buoyed by last week's signing of highly touted national recruit Jesse Witten, who will play fall 2001. UK will field a quality team come January with the additions of Rahim Esmail, Matt Emery, the son of head coach Dennis Emery and Todd Check, who was ineligible for the fall season.

Witten, who hails from Naples, Fla., won the National Boys 18 and under Clay Court Championship in his past summer and is currently the seventh-ranked player 18 and under in the United States.

"Jesse is a very solid player and a competitive person," Emery said. "His powerful groundstrokes, grit and speed are a combination of traits that will remind UK fans of Cedric Kaufmann. He is probably our top recruit since John Yancey in 1989."

The addition of Witten was a huge boost for the Cats, a true blue chip recruit

who can help the program immediately. Equally important were the signings of Esmail, of Vancouver, B.C., and Emery, who attends school in Lexington.

"Matt and Rahim will contribute right away to our singles and doubles lineup," associate head coach Ford Lanford said. "Matt is ranked 30th in the International Tennis Federation world rankings, was seeded ninth at the U.S. Junior Open and is the fourth highest American in the junior world rankings. Rahim is 75th in the ITF junior world rankings and is ranked second in Canada."

Two other highly prominent recruits have signed with UK, but just like the ongoing saga of the presidential election, some paperwork and formalities need to be checked before anything is finalized. The two players will probably play either in January or next fall.

If both recruits are eligible to play for the upcoming spring season, that would be the greatest present of all for coach Emery. Not only would it add more quality and depth to the lineup, but it would turn UK into a potential SEC champion and Final

Four participant, a feat the team has never achieved in the same season.

What the coaches are certain of is the outstanding play of senior Edo Bawono, who finished off the fall campaign in remarkable fashion, going 13-2 and winning his first 12 matches. That's the longest streak of any UK player since Adam Malik won 15 straight matches in 1988.

"I'm playing a lot smarter than I did last year," Bawono said. "I'm playing the best tennis of my life right now and experience has really helped me. I'm the captain and I want to set a good example to my teammates by practicing hard every day."

In order for the Cats to make a huge jump in the rankings from last year's disappointing 35th place finish, UK will need to drastically improve on its doubles play. Last year on numerous occasions they would have turned agonizingly close 4-3 losses to top-10 teams into wins by winning the doubles point. It's been a point of emphasis for the UK coaches.

"The guys we are bringing in are good doubles play players," Lanford said.

"We wouldn't touch just anyone who couldn't play doubles. If they didn't have a good doubles game we would go on to the next recruit. Honestly, we should be better this year because we have better doubles players than we did last year."

Sieglele is a sprinter and is the sister of current Kentucky swimmer Jaime Sieglele. She swims the 50 freestyle, sprint backstroke and sprint butterfly.

At the Junior National Championships last summer, Tumlinson finished seventh

on the three-meter and fourth on the 10-meter. Riccobono is a two-time state champion from Ipswich, Mass.

The UK men's swim team broke into the top 25 nationally, ranking 23rd in the latest College Swim Coaches Association of America poll.
