New U.S. Government Depository Library

The Ashland Community College Library has been officially designated as a United States Government Depository.

"Becoming a depository is a natural outgrowth of the college's mission to provide education opportunities and information to the community," said Carol Greene, ACC's Director of Library Services.

Acc applied for official depository status last spring when the Boyd County Library elected to give up its designation. Based on the recommendation of Congressman Carl C. Perkins, the United States Printing Office granted ACC's designation last May.

When ACC's new library, part of the Learning Resources Center now under construction, is completed next fall, the government depository collection with catalog services and microfiche readers will be established in a separate section of the library.

The Library of Congress National Preservation Program has recently issued a video-recording titled "Library Binding, A Shared Responsibility, A Collaborative Process" that has been acquired by the Preservation Department. It demonstrates many bindery techniques, illustrates the preservation options available through library binders, and describes the partnership between the library and the bindery in the preservation of library materials. The video will be shown for the library staff at 1:00 & 3:00 p.m. on December 3rd and at 10:00 a.m. on December 4th in the Peal Gallery. Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend.
