

### **US** government should show more concern for citizen's lifes

While a monumental disaster was averted, Friday's Titan II missile silo explosion in Arkansas illustrated what potentially could be one of the most disasterous problems this nation faces — clossed-mouth officials.

And it is this fact that leads not only to distrust of the military but distrust of the government's concern for the public.

Granted, there are possible times when military secrecy may be in the best interests of the public and the nation. The Iranian raid, war-time manuevers, coding systems and such are examples where secrecy may serve these best interests.

But when the affairs of the military and government have a direct impact on the lives of Americans, then these people have a right to know what is going on and what they can do about it.

Such is the case with Friday's bilast.

Before the actual blast, which occurred at 3:10 in the morning, local citizens were reassured by officials that it was safe to stay in the vicinity. A leak, which had been detected Thursday night, had supposedly been fixed.

A tew hours later, the blast occured — without warning — despite the fact that it was supposedly armed with a nuclear warhead. A 9-megation nuclear warhead, according to media sources. A warhead with 750 times the power of the bomb dropped on Hiroshima in 1945.

As part of policy, the military will neither confirm or deny the existence of the warhead, despite many reports that it die exist-including an interected

couldn't be found. Instead, officials will only say that all warheads in the Titan II system are failsafe.

This may be true, but when there is an explosion of a missile which may contain a nuclear warhead, then the people in the vicinity have a right to know if this warhead is planted in their backyard.

And beyond reports on the warhead itself, there is the fact that after the explosion, local citizens—and not military and government officials — were responsible for evacuating local citizens, many going door to door.

Furthermore, military officials did not provide any gas masks or other equipment to aid in protection or evacuation of these people, even though the one worker who died did so because he inhaled toxic gases from the blast.


Besides letting the people know what is goin on, the military and government should also accept the responsibility for utilization of a safe evacuation program for those areas where defense systems are being put to use. It is only fair to do so considering that these people are willing to allow possible nuclear warheads to be planted in their backyards.

The government and military showed reckles disregard of the public with Friday's blast. Their ho-hum closed-mouth policies have left the people in the cold.
