Abstinence vs. sex education

Question One: Should educators teach abstinence or the realities of "safe" sex to Kentucky's teen-agers? Question Two: Can educators address these polar

opposites in harmony?

In an age when sex can kill, via the AIDS epidemic, the moral problems these questions pose for educators, students, parents and churches guarantee debate - and leg-

From the U.S. Surgeon General's bold statement that teen-agers should be taught what to do in the "back seat," to the Vatican's pleas for abstinence education, Americans are seeing sex headlining many of today's

"Kids are going to have sex," said Layne Berryman, a UK chemical engineering sophomore, who said she is now sexually active with one partner.

Berryman said children are now initiated early to sex portrayed constantly on television, movies and in other

media messages That is why, she said, condoms should be distributed in public schools to ward off possible cases of sexually trans-

The Alan Guttmacher Institute's 1994 research shows

that one-fourth of the 12 million STD's reported last

year were among teenagers.

The institute also reported that as many as 29 percent of sexually active adolescent girls have chlamydia.

Mary Brinkman, of UK's Student Health Services, said

teens, and everyone else, must worry about more than

teens, and everyone else, must worry about more than just the physical dangers that a strip of latex may solve.

"People also need to think about the psychological, emotional and even spiritual — and I don't mean religion and church — aspects," she said.

"We just want students to know there are 'ots of choice."

UK's Student Health physicians primarily advocate an abstinence-based approach for its students.

"We are talking about abstinence more and more," Brinkman said. "We know that students choose sex, real-istically, but we still are encouraging abstinence."

Some, however, say that sex education — especially in high schools — should begin and end with abstinence. For example, last week in the Dallas suburb of Irving, Texas school board members adopted an abstinence-only based curriculum to combat HIV in the district's 27

schools.

The board's president, John Sears, said the action "bans the distribution of condoms and focuses on self-control, respecting others and personal responsibility for one's actions," according to columnist Cal Thomas in the July 3 Lexington Herald-Leader.

However, Sears and his fellow board members, who unanimously voted in favor of the resolution, have met serious opposition to the district's new lessons.

Professor contests destruction of files

A four-year battle over the destruction of personnel records continues for an associate professor in the College of Human Environmental Sciences.

David C. Payne became eligible for promotion to full professor in the fall of 1990, but was denied

advancement by former
Dean of Human
Environmental Sciences Peggy Meszaros.
Shortly afterward,

Payne's promotion dossier was "improperly shredded" by Meszaros before it went to Chancellor Robert Hemenway for review, according to a letter by UK Vice President for

Administration and Official Records Custodian Donald

According to a ruling by the Attorney General on June 7, the University did not violate either Open Records Law or Libraries and Archives Law with the destruction of Payne's personnel records

When Payne requested the ruling by the Attorney General on Nov. 6, 1993, he contended that it was the duty of the president of the University, according to law, to document that the records were destroyed.

with the former dean was shaky and might have had something the do with the incident.

"When I went up for promo-tion, I was fighting the dean on faculty governance issues," he said. "She admitted to improperly destroying my records. She told me and she told the Chancellor."

Meszaros accepted a new job at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University recently, and she could not be reached for comment.
Payne signed an agree-

ment, drafted by Hemenway, stating Payne would be reviewed for promotion "on the basis of his 1990 dossier, as completely reconstructed as sible."

Hemenway said Payne's grievance was legitimate, but he did not think Payne's records

did not think Payne's records were destroyed out of spite, and he added that everything has been done to correct the situation.
"In the meetings I had with the parties," he said. "I saw no personal animosity between Dr. Payne and Ms. Meszaros.
"Www.welsed were arresponsed."

"We worked out an agreement for the consideration of Dr. Payne's candidacy. The University has made a concerted effort to consider Dr. Payne for promotion as fully and as fairly as

Payne said that no disciplinary action was taken against Meszaros

for destroying his records.

"The decision to deny my promotion was made on an incomplete dossier. It was never complete," Payne said. "I had very heavy teaching loads. That information is still principle form." information is still missing from my records."

Although Payne could take action against the University in court, he said that he does not intend to do so.

"I probably could take them to court on a contract violation, but I'd rather not do that because it would cost me about \$15,000 in legal fees," Payne said. "It wouldn't be sensible for anyone in my position.

Payne said his primary motiva-tion for pursuing the issue further is the importance of record keep-ing and procedure during consid-

and proceeding during considerations for promotion.

"I'm not getting promoted, but I do believe that people should get a fair chance," Payne said.

"Keeping records is crucial from a

faculty's point of view."

Hemenway, however, says that what happened in Payne's case is

what happened in Payne's case is not standard procedure. "In my examination, I found no evidence that the destruction of Dr. Payne's records was anything other than a misinformed mis-

Ian Harman, executive director of Lexington Planned Parenthood, said that the Irving school district is begging for a

Already in Florida and Louisiana, she said, similar school curricula, which she referred to as "fear-based," were beaten in the courts.

Although Harman dislikes in-school condom distribution and advocates abstinence as a first line of defense against HIV, she said society needs a more "realis-tic" approach to sex education than abstinence-only policies

While the Guttmacher study ays that 20 percent of teens abstain before the age of 18, 40-60 percent of 14-17 years old, nationally, are sexually active.

"We teach skills in how to be a

parent and how not to be a par-


ent," Harman said of her group, which publishes educational material on both abstinence and safe sex across the state.

The results of the efforts of groups like Planned Parenthood and the Kentucky educational system were published in December in a state-wide sur-

vey.
Among 1,118 Kentucky high school teens, 62 percent (694) said they have had sex, the 1993 Kentucky Youth Risk Behavior Study showed.
About one-third of the sexual-

ly active teens reported they have had more than four part-ners in their lifetime, and 48 percent said the last time they had sex they did not use a con-

The survey, which was conducted by UK's Center for Prevention Research, also found that 70 percent of respondents openly discuss HIV/AIDS education with adults in their families.

facilities. This summer is no different

By the time students return for the fall semester several major projects, including the renovation of Miller Hall, the repainting of Patterson Office Tower and the construction of a new laboratory

research facility should be completed.

Kenn Clevidence, UK's director of procurement and construction, said the \$2.4 million renovation efforts on Miller Hall, located near the Whitehall Classroom Building, should be ready for the fall

semester.

The former cartography building was evacuated because of building code problems due to age. Clevidence said the renovation will be a great improvement for the University.

"The space will be upgraded considerably," Clevidence said. "It should be of much more use to the University."

Clevidence said the upgraded building will still be used to house the Colleges of Architecture and Cartography.

"Two floors will be architecture and I think car-

ography is going back in," Clevidence said. Many students will also notice that Patterson Office Tower is getting a face-lift this summer as UK's Physical Plant Division is repainting the entire

UK's Physical Plant Division is repainting the entire building.

Clevidence said the paint job is necessary because of the age of the building.

"I, for one, think it was necessary," Clevidence said. "That building was built in the 60's; it was very stained and in need of being cleaned."

While the repainting of Whitehall ran over into the fall semester last year, Clevidence said the work on the POT should be finished before students return.

return.

The largest of the construction projects at UK this summer is the Advanced Science and Technology Commercialization Center (ASTeCC), a laboratory research facility.

The \$18 million federally funded project will be devoted mainly to research, Clevidence said.

The structure was funded over several fiscal years, which is the servicer, up into

The structure was funded over several hscal years, making it necessary to break the project up into phases. Currently, the last phase is being completed, and ASTeCC is slated for a Sept. 20 finishing date. The University is also following up on a \$1.3 million project to extend a chill water line that, according to Clevidence, will improve air conditioning in the classrooms and residence halls around campus. "We've added two, five thousand-ton chillers," Clevidence said. "We will be able to better provide air conditioning around the campus, especially during peak hours."

ing peak hours."

Again, Clevidence said, the project should be completed before students return in the fall.

SGA delivers 8-week tutors

Tutoring service at UK is increasing, thanks to efforts of Student Government Association.

This summer the SGA is bringing a summer session tutor-ing program to the University. "We decided to implement stu-

dent services as something we should offer year round," said should offer year round," said SGA President T.A. Jones. "Students need tutoring just as much in the summertime as in the fall."

There has never been a tutoring program in the summer before. The tutoring program is active throughout the fall, spring

and now summer semesters.

The response to the tutoring program has been encouraging so far. To date, there are over 60 applicants for tutoring positions and approximately 10 to 15 students applicants. and approximately 10 to 10 step dents applicants to receive tutor-ing. SGA would like to see those numbers increase. "This summer we have gotten

one of the largest responses to the tutoring program," Jones said. The program should be starting next week.

Next summer the SGA plans to have the tutoring program implemented for the four-week session.

"We are hoping to narrow down, by the end of the week, who our tutors are going to be, and tutoring will begin next Monday," said Avi Weitzman, executive director of SGA.

Jones said the implementation of the program represents SGA's commitment to students.

"(Summer tutoring) shows we are pro-student. We want students to be able to afford education. This is one of our services that makes it possible." he said.

The program started after a few students stopped in and asked about summer tutoring. Demand grew beginning with the com-mencement of the eight-week summer session, and the SGA began moving to fulfill that

demand.
"This week Avi Weitzman and Brendan McGrath (head of tutoring) are interviewing all tutors,

and the tutors get paid \$6 an hour," Jones said.

Becoming involved with the program is a very simple procedure. The student must fill out a form, which differs depending on whether the student is applying to tutor or for tutoring.

The SGA hopes more people take advantage of the tutoring

program.
Subjects included in the tutoring services are: math, chemistry, biology, English, engineering, and other "basic" classes. Tutoring can be arranged "for any class," said Jones. "We are

When Rodney Dent fell to the Rupp Arena floor early in the 11th game of his senior season, his collegiate basketball career appeared in jeopardy. The fate of eleven other young men clad in blue and white also seemed to teeter in the balance.
After all, it was Dent who

crowded the lane, snared countless boards

boards and banged with the SEC's big boys each evening. It was Dent who shouldered much of the Wildcats' hopes of a return trip to the NCAA Final Four. On his

broad shoulders, the hopes of an entire state rest-

So when his bulky 6-foot-11, 240-pound frame crashed to the court in the Cats' first conference game of the year, the tension mounted among his teammates, coaches and fans.

And when UK trainer Joanne Hauser diagnosed the Cats' crippled big man with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee, his hopes of ever playing in a Wildcat uniform again vanished into that cold, January night.

That evening seemed to serve as just another pothole on the rocky road Dent travelled during



a cow.





Give KERA a chance to help public schools

Currently, the Department of Education is holding public hearings on the Kentucky Education Reform Act. The act has evoked strong opposition from critics, who doubt the plan's educational merits and question parts of the content.

Yet, many of these critics offer only the pre-KERA educa-onal system as the alternative and that is no alternative at all.

KERA was the result of the Kentucky Supreme Court ruling in favor of 66 school districts who charged the state with

inequality in funding and in quality of education.

KERA, made law in 1990, was also an attempt to improve the state's education standing (49) in the nation. The plan's six goals emphasize "the basics" of reading, writing and arithmetic as well as incorporation of instruction in America's social

Despite the plan's praise nation-wide (not bad for a state ranking two above the very worst in the country) and its large-scale adoption for the federal Goals 2000 program, KERA has run into controversy, principally over its social issues material. One teacher said that such material had no place alongside the basics.

This is a faulty argument and one that is detrimental to Kentucky's students. America is concerned with how its young people rank against their foreign counterparts in "the basics," and at the same time often perplexed why American youths do not sustain the country's democracy with the simple act of vot-

One of the chief reasons for such a low voter turnout is ignorance of the issues. This ignorance harms the American democratic tradition, and it is difficult to understand why

KERA's reformation attempts are meeting opposition. KERA must be fully implemented by 1996, but results cannot be fully evaluated until a kindergarten class advances through the entire twelve years of the new system. This is comparable to the time it took for Head Start, a very successful innovation in education, to prove itself.

All we are saying is give KERA a chance. Kentucky educa-

tion is beginning at the bottom and the old system is no longer

Commercialization of nature breeds neglect

door adventure sports.

Companies like Nike, Reebok and Pepsi Co have found it lucra and repsi Co have found it incra-tive to exploit images of rock climbing, snow boarding, moun-tain biking and similar sports as the hip indulgences of free-

wheeling young people.

These corporations peddle junk foods, flavored iced teas and athletic shoes with these images, figuring certain special consumers (you know who you are) will accept the idea that they need to buy a hip, free-wheeling product if they want to remain or become hip and free-wheeling.

As such ads continue, a heightened awareness of these alternative sports is created in their young audience, simultaneously fueling the outdoor sports indus-try while sating the junk food

moguls.

Just as Nirvana was used as a tool for marketing alternative music as mainstream, high-profile adventure athletes are prostituting themselves selling Jingus Cola.

Ethical and philosophical questions take a back seat to the need these athletes have to see their sports survive and prosper.

The taming of the raw drive of

these adventure sports is ironically being accomplished by the exploitation of their adrenalinerushing reputations, via MTV and Dan Cortese.

Everyday more and more peo-ple are outfitting their cars with superfluous sets of Yakima racks, or buying kayaks, cheap mountain

bikes, and rap-Porter Jarrard pelling gear. But as herds

outdoorobsessed cash cows fill our public lands and flood the lakes seeking the chal-lenge of the natural terrain, they are beginning to raise the ire of land managers and private land owners across the country who are may be legally liable for the deaths or injuries of these

Cortese-wannabes. This is already happening in the sport of rock climbing. Popular cliffs with decades of climbing history are faced with the prospect of being forced to

Some have already done so.

The popularity of climbing is a flame fanned by the media (anybody seen Cliffhanger?), and by the proliferation of indoor climb-

Its popularity has resulted in unanticipated hordes anxious to hop on the learning curve of an outdoor cliff every weekend.

Liability concern is not the only impact that this trend is causing. Environmental damage is allegedly being inflicted by these new athletes as well.

A couple of years ago, mountain biking was prohibited from all single track trails in the Red River Gorge.

Increased erosion and the possible creation of unauthorized "user-defined trails" were cited as

This seems spurred by closures of some trails on public lands in the western United States, where the ability of the ground to heal itself is slight to nonexistent, and proliferation of biking trails could be a problem.

Despite the fact that eastern soils revitalize quickly, a correla-tion was made from west to east, resulting in the Gorge's inane and unenforceable law.

The inconsistency is evident in the timber operations that continue on leased land in the Daniel Boone National Forest. The forest was clear-cut at some point in the last 120 years, yet timber operations continue, inflicting more havoc on the flora and fauna of the region than thousands of mountain bikers and rock climbers ever could.

The difference is that whenever big money is involved, land managers are careful to make politically prudent decisions designed only to avoid biting the hand that feeds them.

The main-streaming of outdoor adventure sports represents a shift in the types and attitudes of people venturing into the woods. A long shadow is being cast over individual freedoms. As more and more urbanites "just dew it" on our public lands, a basic respect and understanding of the differences between the city and the country is becoming blurred or being erased complete

That is the real danger: that people will conceive the outdoors as just another source of distrac-

on and entertainment.
We cannot afford to treat our remaining unscathed public lands with such a vulgar lack of respect.
