City of Lexington sued over ticket sales arrest



LexTran funds could be major success

Lexingtonians looking for a more af-fordable way to work, church or retail stores once again have a Sunday ride. LexTran restored its Sunday service on March 6 as part of its restoration and ex-

The restoration and eventual expansion is made possible by LexTran's \$11.1 million budget, largely funded by the property tax approved by voters in November. It's nice to see the tax dollars going toward a service that poverty-ridden citi-

In hindsight, war wasn't justified

At this juncture we once again find ourselves pondering over that same worn-out subject. Two years ago, as I watched the initial air



ago, as I watched the initial air strikes pelt the Iraqi capitol, I fervently supported the invasion based on the rationale purveyed by the Bush administration.

Most cousins know now, do you still believe the U.S. intervention was an appropriate measure of foreign policy?" my answer would be "No."

The belated concession is basically hinged on a problem with deduction. The primary reason for engaging the war was based on intelligence that Saddam Hussein had weapons of mass destruction. As of date, that intelligence hasn't been verified, and evidence supporting claims of connections with al-Qaida or possession of WMDs has been tenuous at best. No one in his or her right mind does, in principle. However, the rationale shifted to emphasize those justifications when it became apparent that intelligence was in want of accuracy. War is such a serious under-

taking that its basis must be soundly fortified before any military excursion takes place.

It isn't clear that Iraq constituted an imminent threat to US. national security And so the ends, however desirable the effect on peace in the Middle East, were not justified by the means used to fight a supposedly defensive war.

There are some qualifications. Although I now feel the war wasn't justified, I don't necessarily buy all of the arguments contrived by war opposition. It's perfectly clear that the administration and intelligence community failed to responsibly gather information leading up to the war. But the notion that the grave mistake had the characteristics of something more malicious or conspiratorial. 

2003 - UK 74, Utah 54 - Second Round

UK center Marquis Estill tallied his third double-double of the season with 18 points and 10 rebounds to lead the Cats to their 25th straight victory and oust the Utes from the NCAA Tournament for the fifth time in 10 years. UK went on to defeat Wisconsin 63-57 before falling to Marquette 83-69 in the regional finals.

The Cats overcame a 10-point halftime deficit — the largest ever for a national champion — and went on to defeat Utah 78-69 to capture their seventh national championship in front of 40.509 fans in the Alamodome. UK senior guard Jeff Sheppard scored 16 points in the championship game and was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player:

1997 - UK 72, Utah 59 - Regional Finals

UK sophomore guard Ron Mercer led the Cats with 21 points and senior forward Jaree
Prickett grabbed 10 rebounds to lead UK past the Utes for the second straight year. The wines
cured the Cats' 12th Final Four berth and marked the first time in nearly fifty years the program appeared in consecutive Final Fours. UK defeated Minnesota 78-89 in the semifinals but
lost 84-78 in overtime to Artizona in the championship game.

Utah All-American forward Keith Van Horn scored 23 points to lead the Utes, but the Cats coasted to a 31-point rout. UK's Antoine Walker and Derek Anderson combined for 37 points and 14 rebounds, and the Cats forced 21 Utah turnovers. UK went on to claim its sixth national championship eleven days later with a 76-67 win over Syracuse.

1993 - UK 83, Utah 62 - Second Round

Junior forward Jamal Mashburn scored 19 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead a bal-anced UK offense, as the Cats jumped out to a 19-point halftime lead and never looked back. UK continued to roll through the opening rounds of the tournament, winning the first four games by an average of 31 points, and clinched its first Final Four berth in nine years. The Cats lost 81.78 in the semifinal game to Chris Webber and Michigan.




