NEW LIBRARY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

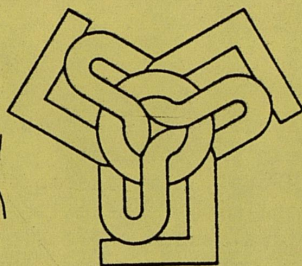
The cassette tapes and tape players will continue to circulate as before. Those who have tape players checked out on long-term loan are asked to evaluate their present need and to return items no longer being used.
