In Bethlehem Pa. yesterday, UK cross country runner Mark Nenow placed 17th in a field of over 200 runners in the NCAA Cross Country

runners in the NCAA Cross Country Championships. It is the highest placing ever for a UK runner in the championships, and by finishing among the top 25. Nenow achieved All-American honors.
"It was one of those days when everything goes right for you" said the accounting senior from Arlington, Irax. "That time (29:36) really gives me a lot of confidence for track."

"Fantastic" was Coach Weber's reflection on his number one runnner's performance, noting that "he ran with some of the best runners

Henry Rono of Washington State, world record holder in four different track events, won his third title, clocking a 28:20 to shatter the course record by over a minute. University of Texas El Paso edged Oregon in a cloce team battle, 103 to 106. UK finished 16th as a team with a score of 485.

# Iranians free 10 hostages from embassy in Tehran

Embassy in Tehran early today for the airport, ABC-TV reported from the Iranian capital. A Swiss airliner was waiting there to fly them to West Germany to join three others released yesterday.

In Washington, a White House statement said any such espionage trial of U.S. diplomats would be a "further flagrant violation" of international law.

The first three hostages freed flew by commercial airliner to Copenhagen, Denmark, where they appeared happy. They did not answer reporters' questions. They were transferred quickly to an American military plane and taken to a U.S. Air Force hospital in Wiesbaden.

They bathed and rested, and State Department spokesman George Sherman said they all were in good health, "considering what they've been through."

The State Department said they would be questioned about the condition of the other hostages and debrieded, but Sherman said "the taty here will be very short and will only be a waystation on the way to their families.

# UK's in-state tuition below SEC and national median

It's not the stuff of which pep rallies are made, but UK finished second to Tennessee in the Southeastern Conference this year — second lowest in in-state tuition, that is.

in in-state tuition, that is.

A report compiled by the National
Association of State Universities and
Land-Grant Colleges shows UK's
yearly tuition charge of \$562 for instate students is below the nation.

yeary unifor charge of 3562 for in-state students is below the national median of 5781, and below the Southeast median of 5602.

When the cost of room and board is included, however, total cost of a year at UK is pushed to \$2,312, just below the national median of \$2,333.

Member universities cited two main reasons for the higher charges—inflation and the need to maintain program quality. Other reasons included the need to raise faculty and staff salaries, the absence of alternate sources of revenue, and inadequate appropriations from state legislatures. Most UK in-state students seem aware of the low tuition fees, "It's really cheap, compared to Maryland, where I come from," said Charles Member universities cited two main

Czarsky, a graduate student in history.

"That's why most people come here."

A teaching assistantship allows him to avoid out-of-state trution.

"I think tuttion is very low here," said Katherine Malone, who is keenly ware of regional differences in education costs. She's studying at the Sorbonne, in France next semester.

Tuition for out-of-state students is another matter, however, UK is the most expensive school in the SEC for out-of-state students. Although, at \$1,812, it is still below the national median of \$1,877.

The yearly cost for an out-of-state student at UK went up almost 8 percent this year, totaling \$3,562 with room and board.

There used to be a campus cliche that went something like."I can come to UK and still pay less than I would have in my state as an in-state rise total casts. 34 the year before student." # SG announces position on the Iranian situation

In an effort to realize "a reconciliation and eventual mutual understanding between 'Americans and visiting foreign students," UK's Student Government passed a resolution supporting a return to a peaceful co-existence between the United States and Iran.

The resolution, the first statement insued by SG since the US. embassy employees were taken as hostages in Tehran, Iran, was originally designed as a bill calling for an assembly of UK students desiring peaceful coexistence between students of the two nations. However, members of SG expressed concern over the possible ramifications of such direct action. "It can assembly could cause more

ramifications of such direct action.

"It (an assembly) could cause more bad feelings than good feelings," said Brad Sturgeon, at-large senator, explaining that "it (the situation) may or may not calm down on campus."

At-large senator Mark Rock agreed. "I feel the resolution is better than an assembly at this point in time because an assembly could cause problems — specifically violence," he said.

proteins—gsaid. Bob Clark, business and economics
senator, explained the resolution
allows SG to state its position without
sponsoring action which could hurt
student relations on campus
"We cannot change what's going on
we can take a stand," Clark said.

At last night's meeting. SG also refused to consider a bill referring to the Homecoming Queen selection process. The bill, sponsored by senator Bob Bolin, said the recent election of the candidates was conducted in an undemocratic manner since students were not allowed to vote on all representatives from student organizations.

The bill also stated that because secret ballots and ballot boxes were not used, the "cherished American tradition" of a free election was

tradition" of a free election was violated.

Bolin said his bill was designed "to air an issue that obviously is an issue and to devise democratic procedures."

Bolin said the the use of computer sheets in itself was evidence enough that the ballots were not secret. He also noted that the ballots were stacked on counters at the "voil booths" and not put in a box.

"It's stupid to conduct something in an undemocratic fashion." Bolin said.
"This clearly is an issue for students on campus."

But Clark said the main reason SG didn't consider the bill was because of the implications it made about SG's authority over other student organizations.
"If SG entertained that bill the way

it is worded, we would be entertaining the idea that we can censure other student organizations," Clark said.

# UK priorities shouldn't put athletics above academics

The football team has exceeded all expectations Fran Curci said before the season began that he would nominate himself for coach of the year if the team won five games. Not only has it done that, but this team. decimated by suspensions and injuries, has a chance to finish with a winning record. And, according to some ress reports, an appearance in the Hall of Fame Bowl ill be forthcoming with a victory over the University

The basketball Wildcats, although they started the season with a loss to Duke, show the potential for greatness. Coach Joe Hall has a wealth of talent including what is probably the best class of freshmen

including what is processed with the nation.

Contrary to what some think, there is a place for sports at UK. It is a singularly pleasurable experience to see young men and women perform to the best of their physical abilities—especially when those men and women are wearing the name of your school on their backs.

It is even conceivable that their efforts can spur me of the rest of us on to greater physical activity.

And you can't ignore the appeal athletics hold for UK alumni. The old grads love to see their alma mater's name in print, as long as that print is in the "win" column. When the old grads are happy, they

tend to give money.

This is a source of funds for the University that can't be trivialized in this period of shrinking state support, declining enrollment and galloping inflation.

But sports has to be kept in its place. UK is above all else an academic institution. Our priorities should reflect this.

— Finals should not be rescheduled to allow

students to attend a basketball game. The suggestion

doesn't deserve any further discussion.

— There also should not be any serious discussion of adding 20,000 seats to Commonwealth Stadium while there are colleges whose programs are threatened by inadequate facilities. No matter that the stadium expansion would be paid for with private donations — the colleges of pharmacy and architecture could benefit from that money far more than the football program.

— Every member of the basketball team must

remember that classes come first. No matter how great your skills are, they are of no value to the team unless you are academically eligible to play.



I should not have been surprised when I picked up Monday's Kernel. After four years of reading Kernel "journalism," I could have assumed that the article on the interview that I took part in over morning coffee would be filled with inaccuracies. like Fidel.

ould also like to know why I was I would also like to know why I was mis-quoted. I did say that the outburst of violence against the American embassy in Teheran was a logical consequence of a history of the presence of American imperialism in that country, but I prefaced my remark with a condemnation of any violent action taken against these low-level functionaries. But then those kind of statements don't make good articles, I guess.

What actually transpired in Friday's two hour "interview" was much different than what appeared in Monday's Kernel. An understanding of what has occurred in Iran over the past two weeks requires an examination of U.S.-Iranian relations over the past few years as well as an attempt to understand the nature of revolution, especially an Islamic

revolution, especially revolution.

U.S. presence in Iran has followed much the same course over the past twenty years, as it has in other developing nations. As the U.S. did with Trujillo in the Dominican Republic, Somoza in Nicaragua, Batista in Cuba, the U.S. helped install the deposed Shah in the early 50s, at

the height of the Cold War. After the success of U.S. covert operations in the coup that brought the former Shah to power, the U.S. soon began to export its industrial modernia well as the commodities that help perpetuate the values that follow fro not a unique sort of policy, a look at U.S.-Latin American relations since reconstruction is a clear example.

#### response

Thus, U.S. imperialism (or Thus, U.S. imperialism (or hegemony, or any other name one would like to use) was fostered under the Shah. As the effects of capitalist modernization began to transform Iranian society, the Iranian people became more and more alienated: an alienation very similar to the one Franz Fanon describes in The Wretched of the Earth, a very respected analysis of the Algeiner revolution against the French.

Now, maybe we can begin to see why the embassy take-over was a

revolution against the French.

Now, maybe we can begin to see
why the embassy take-over was a
logical step, considering the past
sytheses of history. The present
conflict in Iran is not directed against
the American people, but rather
against the American government. I
know that many Americans still
believe in the myth of pluralism, but
even a brief overview of history reveals
that the American government
represents interest groups, especially
abroad. Look at Guil-Western in the
Dominican Republic, IT&F in Chile,
and one could go on almost ad
infinitum.

The basic feeling during Friday's
coffee, was that the American
government should begin to represent
the American people. If Great Britain

requested the extradition of an IRA guerilla, the Carter administration would oblige them. If West Germany demanded the extradition of a Nazi war criminal, the U.S. would react positively. Likewise, if Iran, a sovereign nation, wants the Shah, also

sovereign nation, wants the Shah, also a war criminal, the American government should honor that request. Are the Iranian Revolutionary Council's trials any different than those at Nuremburg!

I am not at all pleased with the actions of Ayatollah Khomeini, but he is, evidently, the legitimate ruler of Iran. Many would argue that the Shah should never have been admitted (to the U.S.) but hindsight is nothing more than a speculative pleasure. The Carter administration should take into mind the integrity of the American Carter administration should take into mind the integrity of the American people as well as the lives of the remaining hostages, and many of the students' charges are believable. A review of McGorage Bundy's and then Undersecretary Cyrus Vance's actions in the Dominican Republic near the end of that country's 1964 revolution, illustrates the American propensity for pursuing counter-revolutionary measures in nations undergoing social revolution.

In sum, the Iranian students an right on many points, but those remaining hostages' lives should not be endangered. The Shah should be

be endanges.

One final note. I should like to point out that others quoted in the article were misrepresented. It is unfortunate that such a blatant example of poor journalism be found in the state's largest student newspaper.






