

JULIAN M. CARROLL
Governor of the
Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election.

Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

He is currently chairman of the National Governors' Association, the first Kentucky Governor to hold that post. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-77 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod.

The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

JAMES G. AMATO
Mayor
Lexington-Fayette
Urban County Government

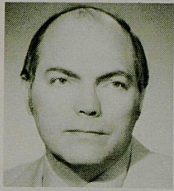
JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary University of Kentucky President

Now in his ninth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U. S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr. Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to administrative work, first as associate dean and later as assistant to the president.

The Kentucky president, and his wife the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Singletarys have two daughters, Bonnie and Kendall, and a son, Scott.

Cliff Hagan Director of Athletics

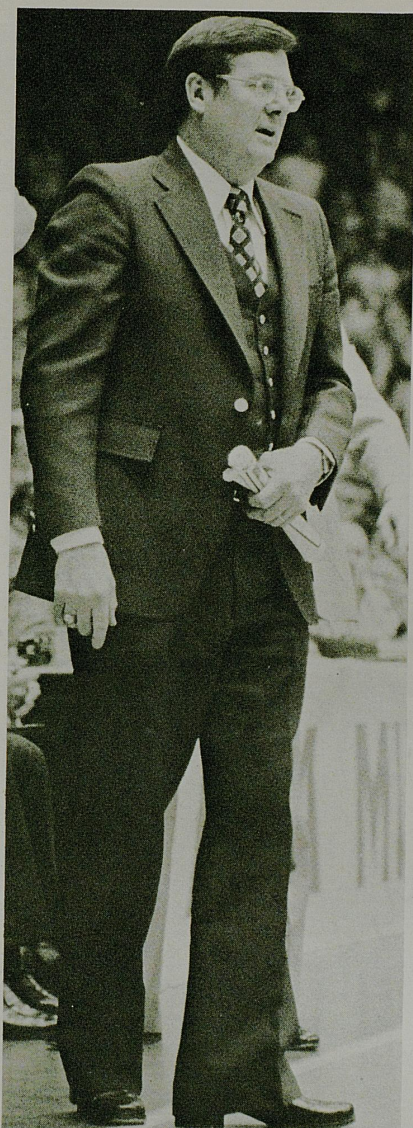
"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF HAGAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serving as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Under his leadership, the UK athletics department continues to develop success in all areas of endeavor including a strong dedication to the academic well-being of the athletes.

JOE B. HALL is beginning his seventh season as mentor of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which his senior dominated team captured the 1978 NCAA Championship. Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 135 wins against 42 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 211-98. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 135-42 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee. In 1978 he coached the U.S.A. team that hosted the first International Invitational Tournament.

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his fifth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

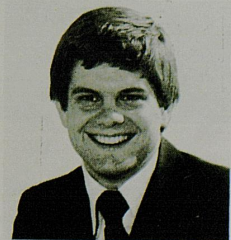
DICK PARSONS

DICK PARSONS, in his seventh year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.



FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

SUSAN FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

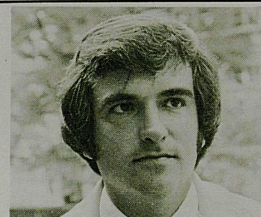
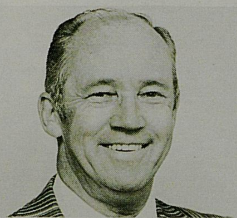
In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.

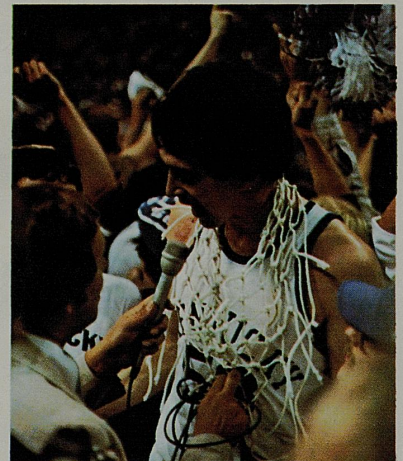

Museum to Feature Tradition

Kentucky tradition is anchored in mint-juleps, magnolia blossoms, stern wheel river boats, grass so green it is blue, saddle horse racing, and University of Kentucky basketball.

Whether its Stephen Foster's melodic image of dew glistening on a frosty morn, the thrill of hearing the race announcer's call of the Kentucky Derby, or the frequent bouncing of a basketball on a dirt backyard court, it's Kentucky.

The man who caused the basketball tradition to grow in the Commonwealth was the late Adolph F. Rupp, former coach of the UK Wildcats.

Lexington, the home of the University of Kentucky, constructed the finest basketball facility in the U.S. and christened it Rupp Arena in honor of the Baron of basketball. In 1979, construction will begin on an additional phase of honoring basketball in Kentucky when a museum will be built in Lexington Center to display and preserve that heritage's memorabilia. Appropriately, it will be named the Adolph F. Rupp-UK Basketball Museum.

The project is under the guidance of the Adolph F. Rupp-UK Basketball Museum Committee, whose chairman is DeWitt Hisle, treasurer for the Lexington Center Corporation.

It will be located adjacent to the entrance to Rupp Arena. It will contain photographs, trophies, other memorabilia, tape recordings, and films showing some of the great UK teams in action.

Funding for the approximately \$200,000 project will come from tax-deductible donations from the public. Operation of the museum will be funded by a small admission charge "not to exceed \$1," according to Hisle.

"We have a unique opportunity to perpetuate the legend of the late Adolph Rupp and the rich basketball tradition that has been established by the University of Kentucky," said Hisle. "The museum will give basketball fans everywhere a fascinating insight into what this game has meant to followers of the UK Wildcats."

Charles Atcher, archivist at UK, has been named curator for the museum. The basketball heritage found at UK is an on-going principle, a concept that Atcher plans to incorporate into the museum's design.

Atcher sees two pronounced facets of the museum when its complete. It will have the capacity to record achieve-

ments of future teams; and it will be ever changing in its displaying of the past. The variety of displays, Atcher hopes, will bring fans back for numerous visits.

"Of the inventory I have made thus far, we can see that we can use only 35 percent of the material at any one time in the museum," says Atcher.

"That leaves the other 65 percent to

be used to change the exhibits from time to time."

As an example of how the displays might be varied, Atcher suggests that during the NCAA tournament each year, the museum might set up a special display highlighting UK's participation in that event.

"Or you might have a special event, such as a reunion of the Fiddlin' Five, at which time the museum could put together a display on that team."

In other words, objects such as trophies and game basketballs will not be put on display and left to gather dust over the years. Visitors may well see something new each time they come back to the museum.

As for ways of displaying the enormous amount of material on the UK basketball program that has collected over the years, Atcher and the museum committee are considering many interesting possibilities.

Use of film clips and tape recordings are just two ways of bringing the museum to life. Atcher has retrieved "hun-

dreds and hundreds" of reels of film of UK basketball teams from various places, film which goes back to the teams just after World War II and includes the Fabulous Five of NCAA and Olympic fame.

Another idea is the use of oral history, whereby former UK players and perhaps coaches of opposing teams would be interviewed and their voices become part of a display area. Imagine, for instance, hearing the present day thoughts of Johnny Cox on tape as you view a film of the NCAA championship game in 1958 when Cox helped UK to the title over Seattle.

Material for the museum is coming from three major sources:

—The official archives of UK.

—Memorial Coliseum.

—The family of the late Adolph Rupp.

Atcher is inventorying all the many trophies, banners, game basketballs, photographs, film clips and tape recordings that have survived over the years.

Many of the tape recordings are play-by-play accounts of UK games, some donated by Mrs. Claude Sullivan, wife of the late sportscaster, and others from tapes of Cawood Ledford, the "Voice of the Wildcats" for the past 25 seasons.

"I particularly want the museum to be appealing to young people, many of whom did not have the chance to see Coach Rupp in action," says Atcher.

Atcher has been official archivist for UK for 15 years. His primary job is to be the keeper of official papers of the University that have continuing value.

A 1958 graduate of UK, Atcher has completed graduate work at the American University, Washington, D.C., and the National Archives Institute in Modern Archives Administration. He has

also completed the Archives Workshop programs at Case-Western Reserve University, Cleveland.

Cliff Hagan, athletic director for UK and a committee member, announced at the unveiling of the plans for the museum on September 8 that the net proceeds from tonight's exhibition game between the UK Wildcats and the National Team of Poland will be donated to the museum fund.

Donations from the public for the establishment of the museum may be mailed to a special post office address: RUPP—UK Museum, P.O. Box RUPP, Lexington, KY 40512.

Atcher continues in his description of the museum, saying that it will cover UK basketball from the first season in 1903 when the team recorded a 1-2 won/lost record through the most recently completed season.

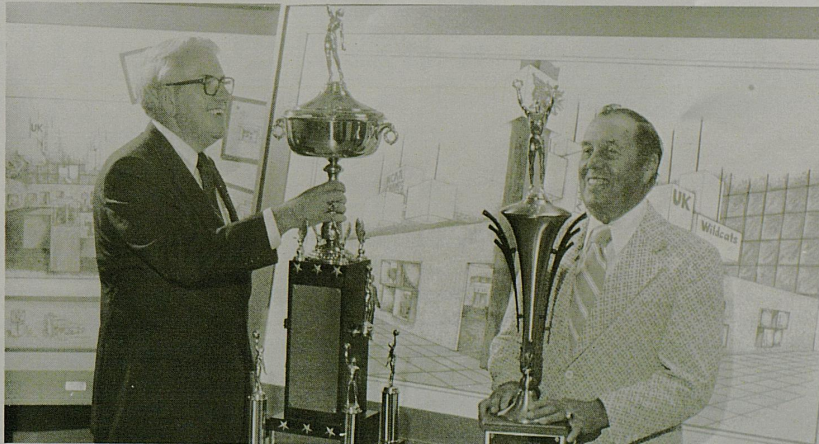
Atcher lists several ideas for display areas that are being considered by the committee:

—A small theatre area with a film would show the changing style of basketball over the past 75 years.

—Displays that would highlight a specific era of UK basketball with a film clip and memorabilia from that time.

—Use of the oral history concept, whereby tape-recorded interview with former UK players and coaches from opposing teams would be played back as part of a display area.

"Obviously one of the major advantages we have establishing this museum is the fact that we can build it around a central figure, the late Adolph Rupp, whose 41 seasons as UK head coach resulted in some of the greatest accomplishments in the history of collegiate basketball."

Fans to See International Rules Tonight

Rupp Arena basketball fans will see a slightly different version of the game tonight than they are accustomed to watching.

The game will be played by international rules that present slight differences from basketball played by United States collegiate teams.

There will be a 30-second clock used to time the amount of time the offense has the ball during each possession. Failure to take a shot before the 30 seconds expires results in the offense losing possession of the ball.

The other major difference will be that each team will commit ten fouls in each half before going into the bonus situation.

Prior to the game there will be a brief ceremony signifying international friendship. Each team will enter the Arena behind its national flag and line up facing one another from opposite ends of the court. The national anthems of the U. S. and Poland will be played and then the players and coaching staffs will exchange gifts as they are introduced.

Poland is on tour in the U. S. following a similar tour in Brazil. Its schedule in this country includes games with Cleveland State, Vanderbilt, Penn State, Evansville, Utah, Arizona State, North Carolina, and Kentucky.

According to Kentucky Assistant Coach Dickie Parsons, Poland exhibits many of the qualities that are seen in European teams — excellent shooting with good form, man to man defense but not pressure defense which includes denying passes, and the ability to find an open man when passing. "They take good shots and can shoot the lights out," commented Parsons. "They have good size and are fundamentally sound. They make few mistakes.

Vanderbilt is the only other Southeastern Conference team on the Poland schedule. Vandy played host to Poland on November 14 and won 89-81.

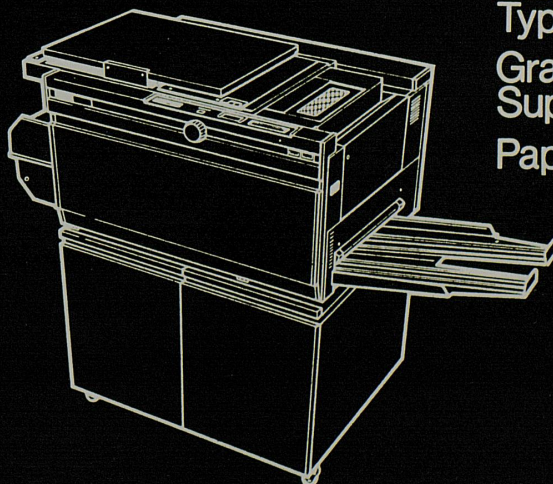

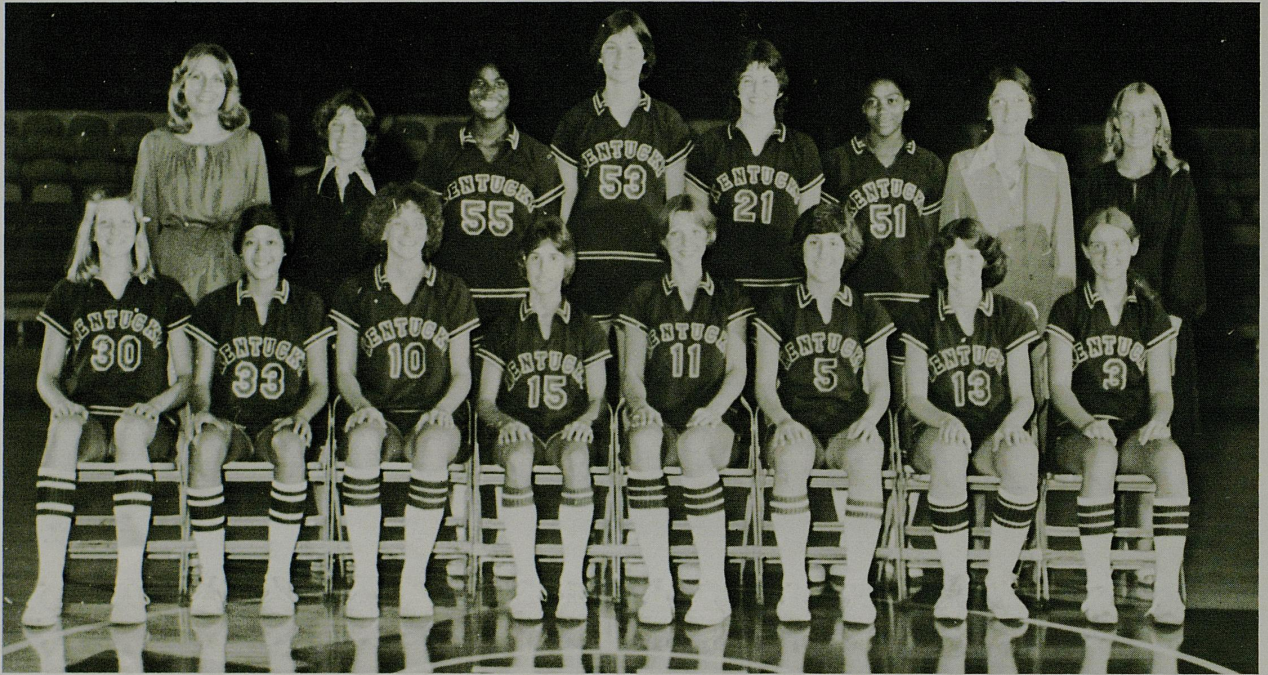

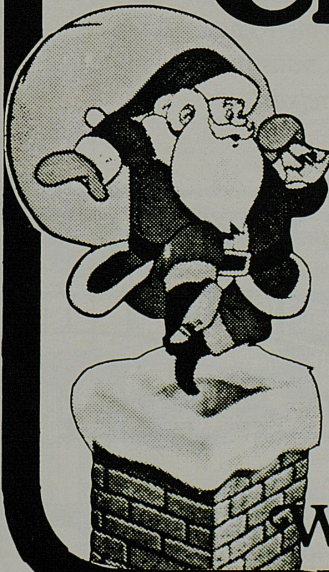

Wildcats Face Rebuilding Year

If you were to ask a University of Kentucky basketball fan what he thought was meant by the term "rebuilding year," you would probably get a blank stare in return.

In the eyes of their fans, Kentucky basketball teams don't have rebuilding years. They may not be quite as strong one year as the next, but they are always thought of as national contenders, at least at the first of the season.

Joe Hall knew that when he took over as UK's head coach in 1972 following the legendary career of the late Adolph Rupp. It creates a kind of pressure that Hall has learned to live with. In fact, he has stated on many occasions that he welcomes the pressure because it represents to him and his players a challenge, and that brings about motivation.

For most teams in UK's position, the coming season would be the classic case of a rebuilding year. Gone from UK is the veteran front line — Jack Givens, Rick Robey, Mike Phillips and James Lee — that powered the Wildcats to a 30-2 season and the NCAA champion-

ships in 1978. Inexperience and youth are about all Hall has to take their places.

Still, in the hearts and minds of the Wildcats' devoted followers, there is the lingering hope that somehow, someday, Hall can put together another team, perhaps with a different style, that will continue the UK winning tradition.

To do that, Hall cannot rely on an experienced front line to play power basketball. The theme that he stressed in pre-season practices is one of speed, finesse and accurate outside shooting.

There are six good reasons why that style of basketball makes sense for UK this season. They are: Kyle Macy, Truman Claytor, Jay Shidler, Dwane Casey, Dwight Anderson and Tim Stephens.

All of these players are in the 6-1 to 6-3 height range, which would make most of them natural guards. It is the speed, finesse and outside shooting of these six players that will probably set the tempo for the Wildcats this year.

Kyle Macy and Truman Claytor are the only returning starters. Macy, the

consummate playmaker, is considered an All America candidate (he was third-team All America last season). Claytor has an excellent outside jump shot; he shows the kind of form that coaches could use in shooting clinics.

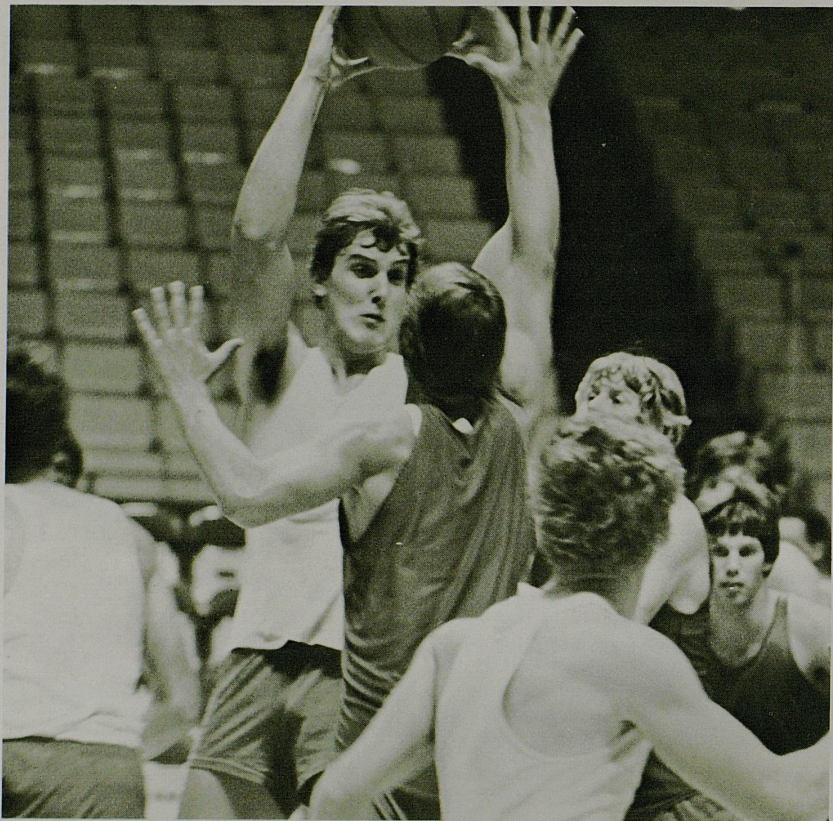

UK's 6' 10" center, Chuck Aleksinas, will carry a heavy responsibility this season. He is the largest Wildcat on the squad and its only true center.

Anderson make up an imposing group of reserve guards. Shidler was a starter as a freshman on the UK team that made it to the finals of the East Regional before losing to North Carolina. Casey, who, along with Claytor, make up the senior class of this team, has been a dependable player off the bench for three seasons now.

Then there is Anderson, the fellow most coaches tabbed as last season's best high school player. Blessed with quickness, speed and a fine shooting touch, Anderson reminds you of Michigan's Ricky Green in the way he moves down the court with blinding speed. With his jumping ability, he may see action at a small forward spot.

With this much talent at guard, Hall has been forced to move Stephens to a small forward slot, which seems to suit the McCreary County native just as well. Stephens' strong points are his outside shooting, defense and hustle.

All of this is not to mention walkon Chris Gettelfinger, a tough customer at guard who is a favorite with Wildcat fans.

So much for the good news. When you leave the backcourt and move up closer to the basket, UK's weaknesses become more apparent.

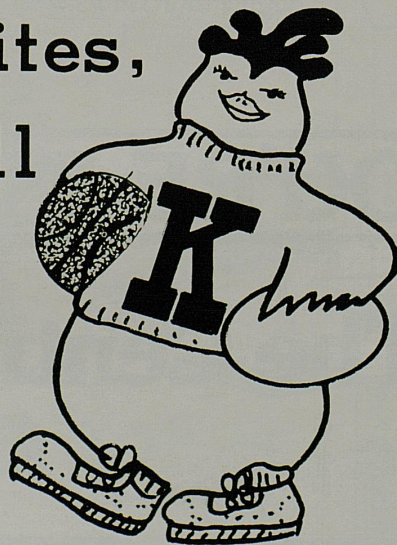
For starters, the team has only one true center, 6-10 Chuck Aleksinas, a sophomore who saw limited action last season. Probable starters at forward are 6-8 sophomore Fred Cowan and 6-6 junior LaVon Williams. The combined scoring average of these three players last season was 7.5 points a game, largely as a result of riding the bench so much.

Two freshmen forwards — 6-6 Chuck Verderber and 6-7 Clarence Tillman — are being counted on to back up Williams and Cowan. Aleksinas and Cowan are the only UK players 6-8 or taller.

In a nutshell, the team seems to be overloaded with highly talented and experienced guards while woefully lacking in size and experience up front. The key to the season may well be how successful Hall and his assistants are at coming up with a strategy that will take advantage of the speed, quickness and shooting of his guard corps.

Come to think of it, that may explain why the UK coaches have worn out last year's game film of the Alabama game at Tuscaloosa, where Wiley C. M. Newton used a small, quick lineup to pin one of the two losses on UK.

Dwane Casey, Truman Claytor Chosen to Lead Wildcats

The prospects for the 1978-'79 University of Kentucky basketball season hinge on how well the young Wildcats fill the void left by graduating four seniors. Part of the responsibility for providing leadership for the team will fall on the recently appointed co-captains, Dwane Casey and Truman Claytor.

Senior guards, Casey and Claytor have shown the UK coaching staff that they have the character and desire to be examples by which the other players can pattern themselves.

"Oh, it was a real honor for me!" said Casey referring to his being chosen. Claytor echoed his sentiments, saying that he was pleased that the coaches had that much confidence in him.

"We will have to maintain high standards not only on court during practice and the games but off the court as well," said Claytor elaborating. "Helping the freshmen adjust to college basketball will be just one responsibility. We will be the liaison guys between the

team, the coaching staff and others. It's a big honor for us."

Claytor is a 6'1", 180 pound native of Ashland, Ky., who played his high school basketball in Toledo, Ohio. He started for UK in 1977-'78. Casey is a 6'1", 195 pound Kentuckian from Morganfield. Claytor is known as a good ball-handler and excellent jump shooter. Casey is remembered for being inserted into the Wildcat lineup when strength and scrappy defense are needed. Casey led a rally that sparked a come-from-behind win in the first round of the NCAA tournament last year and Claytor shot the cords off of the basket in the opening round of the Mid-East Regionals to help UK's advance to the National title.

Coach Hall states that the pair remind him of the 1976-'77 season when UK got excellent leadership from Larry Johnson and Marion Haskins. "We are real pleased to have Dwane and Truman as our co-captains. We need the kind of leadership they can give this young squad. They will play an important role in our season."

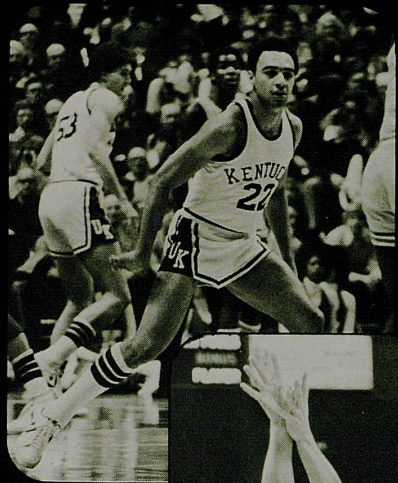

UK Network Largest in Nation

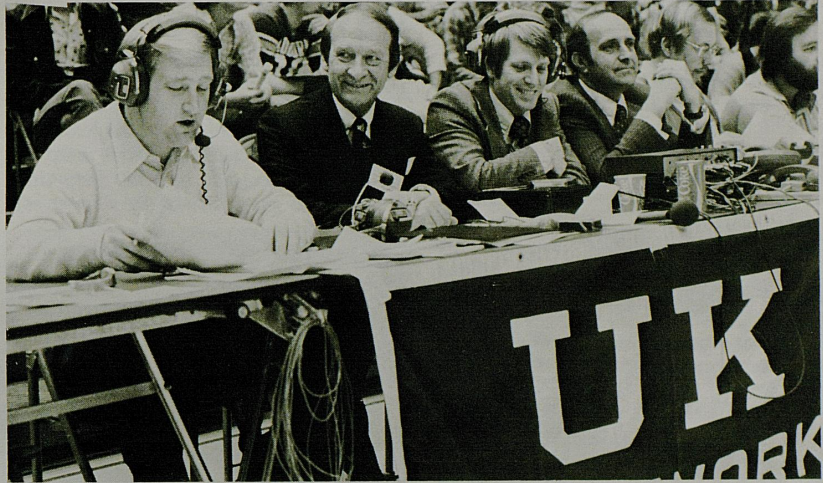
Captivating play-by-play announcing by Cawood Ledford and expert color commentary by Ralph Hacker highlight the University of Kentucky basketball broadcasting network, the largest network of its kind in the nation.

This season's network lineup features 94 stations in Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and Tennessee, an increase of 12 stations over 1977. There are two 50,000-watt stations on the network, WCKY in Cincinnati and WHAS in Louisville. The signal coverage of these two stations alone carries the UK broadcasts over vast areas of the eastern and midwestern United States.

Cawood Ledford, sports director for WHAS radio and television, is now in his 26th season of calling the play-by-play for Wildcat basketball games. He is known throughout the Commonwealth as "The Voice of the Wildcats" and has become something of an institution with UK football and basketball.

Ledford has been honored eight times as "Kentucky Sportscaster of the Year," and is the only on-the-air broadcaster to have received the Kentucky Broadcasting Association award.

Ralph Hacker, station manager of WVLC radio in Lexington, is in the midst of his seventh season as color commentator for the UK sports network. His knowledgeable and articulate observations on the game have won for him the respect of UK fans and his peers in

the broadcasting profession.

The popularity of the network is seen in the fact that it was chosen 17 times during the course of last year's football and basketball seasons to be featured on the American Services Network, beaming the UK games to a world-wide audience.

The basketball network is administered for the University of Kentucky under the terms of a contract with Jim Host and Associates, Inc., a Lexington public relations firm. The Host firm also administers the UK football network and

the NCAA basketball championships network.

In addition to WHAS and WCKY, other primary stations on the UK network are WAMX-FM, Ashland; WLBJ-AM, Bowling Green; WCTT-AM and FM, Corbin; WKIC-AM and WSGS-FM, Hazard; WSON-AM and WKDQ-FM, Henderson; WHOP-AM and FM, Hopkinsville; WVLC-AM and FM, Lexington; WFTM-AM and FM, Maysville; WOMI-AM and WBKR-FM, Owensboro; WPAD-AM and FM, Paducah; WSIP-AM and FM, Paintsville; and WSFC-AM and WSEK-FM, Somerset.

Wildcat TV Network Cooking With Microwave

VHF and UHF . . . probably everyone knows that depending on the area in which they are located, the television stations transmit on one or the other frequency. But when you talk "network," whether it be national, like CBS, or regional, like the Wildcat Football Network recently put together by WKYT-TV in Lexington, you're talking microwaves . . . and we don't mean ovens!

Network transmissions must be done on a frequency other than VHF or UHF so that only those stations set up to receive the network programs will, indeed, receive them. Consumer television sets are designed to only receive VHF and UHF transmissions.

The first step in putting together a network is to contact commercial television stations in the various market areas. Ideally, the network originator wants those stations which can deliver the largest number of viewers as "network" stations. After network stations have been selected, AT & T sets up microwave lines from the originator station

(during Wildcat football this was WKYT-TV in Lexington using their million dollar mobile unit) to each of the stations in the network. This step is further complicated by the fact that microwaves are "line-of-sight" waves;

they cannot be transmitted through mountains or any other solid object and must be routed around such obstacles.

BROADCASTING

Preparation for the actual broadcast of any Wildcat sports event begins weeks

ahead of the game. Game announcers must research players on both teams, memorizing names, jersey numbers and basic facts and statistics. Basketball games give announcers even more of a challenge due to the swift action of the game and the close proximity of the players to the announcers booth. Most announcers chose to memorize faces and corresponding jersey numbers to be able to deliver a smoother, quicker play-by-play. Denny Trease, sports director of WKYT-TV, says "it's not too difficult memorizing Wildcat ball players, but trying to quick-study the members of each week's visiting team is sometimes pretty tough."

In addition to the research that the announcers do, statistics on all players must be gathered and programmed into an "electronic graphics generator". These stats can be called up during the game and are usually seen by television viewers superimposed over the action.

A couple of days prior to the game, engineers from the originator station, the station which will be transmitting the game to its network stations, arrive at the event location and begin the tedious task of wiring and placing cable for the equipment which will be used during the taping or televising of the game. In Rupp Arena, cable trays are suspended

from the ceiling and engineers string approximately 2 miles of cable along these trays within the arena.

The day of the game, production crews work closely with the engineers and the director to finalize plans. Types of shots and sideline shots are discussed and in some instances, practiced, to determine the very best camera coverage for every inch of the playing area. Everyone is at their place, with headsets to receive directions from the director,

at least an hour before game time.

During the game, the director will preview the pictures from each camera and call out the camera whose picture will be taped. If a shot is missed, there's no second chance; directors have to make snap judgements as to what the television viewer will see.

The taped, or live, show is then transmitted, via microwaves, to the network stations for live broadcast or possibly for taping and then airing at a later date.

Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and

describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomitories. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the

Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.


SIGNS

Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

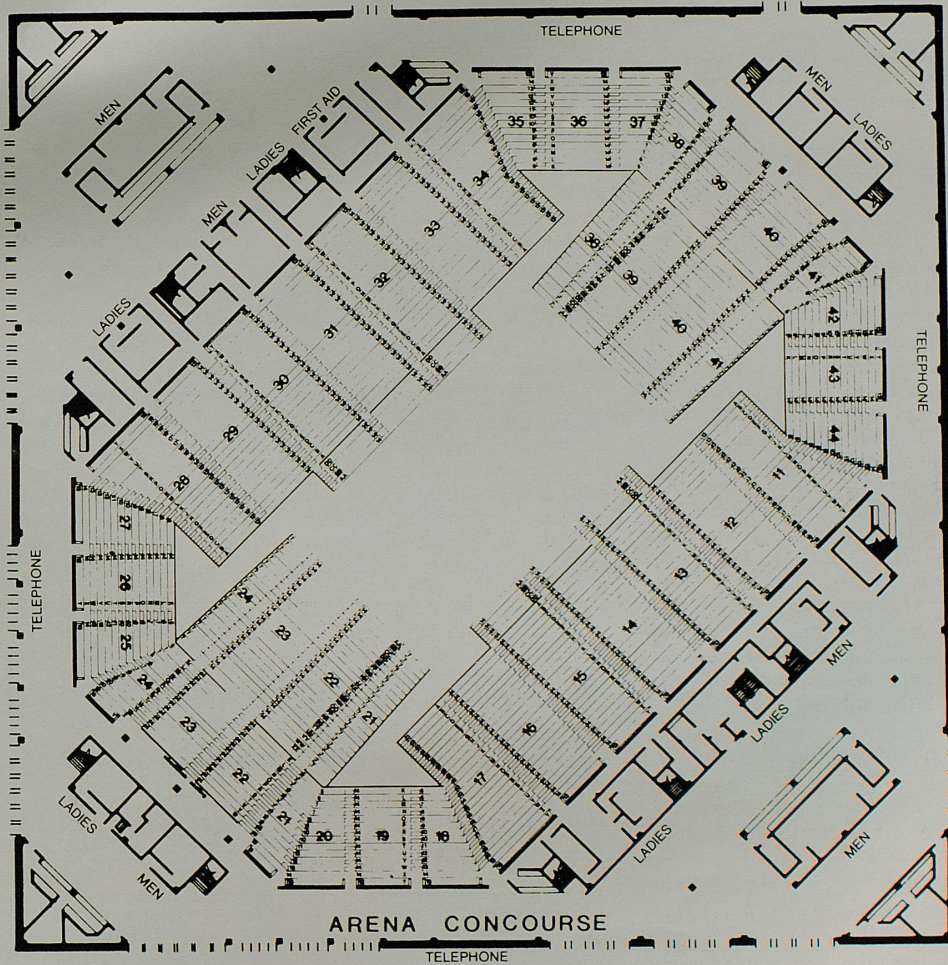

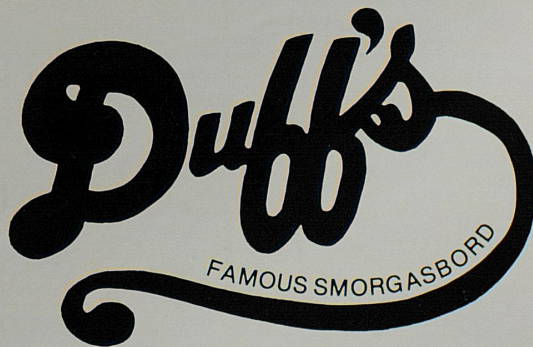


