“... Proud of the past, relevant to the present, open to the future.”

That is the phrase used by the Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh to describe the stance of the University of Notre Dame as it enters its 126th academic year.

The past is something of which Notre Dame can well be proud. The University was founded in 1842 by a group of French missionaries led by the Rev. Edward F. Sorin, C.S.C., and the original site is commemorated today on campus by a replica of the log mission chapel which served for a time as the school's only building.

Strong administrative leadership, a dedicated faculty, and a spirited student body were among the factors which contributed to the growth of Notre Dame from an obscure school in the wilderness of northern Indiana in the 1840's to an example of the best in Catholic higher education.

The statistics of recent growth reveal Notre Dame's present strength. Since Father Hesburgh became president in 1952:

- The student body has grown from 5,400 to over 7,000.
- The University budget has gone from \$10 million to \$32 million.
- Faculty salary outlay has increased from \$1.7 million to \$10 million.
- Value of the physical plant has increased from \$18.3 million to \$61.6 million.
- Endowment of the University has increased from \$8.5 million to \$65 million.

The University's 5,900-member undergraduate student body — organized in the four colleges of Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering, and Business Administration — reflects the constantly rising standards of admission. In this year's freshman class, for example, one of every five students was

graduated one, two, three, four or five in his high school class. Notre Dame graduates have ranked the University near the top among all schools in the number of nationally competitive fellowships awarded its seniors.

In addition to its undergraduate colleges, Notre Dame has a highly respected Law School, the oldest on any Catholic college campus.

A key to the ability of Notre Dame's relatively young faculty is the increase in research grants from \$750,000 to \$7.5 million annually since 1952. The Colleges of Science and Engineering recently received large federal grants because of their outstanding research potential.

Notre Dame's future is closely tied to its financial resources, and the University recently announced a five-year, \$52-million development program called, "SUMMA: Notre Dame's Greatest Challenge."

SUMMA is a carefully conceived blueprint for Notre Dame's future, and the principal elements of the program include \$20 million for faculty development; \$13.9 million for graduate education; \$4.5 million for special research programs; and \$13.5 million for general university development, including three high-rise men's residences. Heading the campaign is Dr. O. C. Carmichael, Jr., chairman of the board of Associates Investment Company, South Bend, and a University trustee.

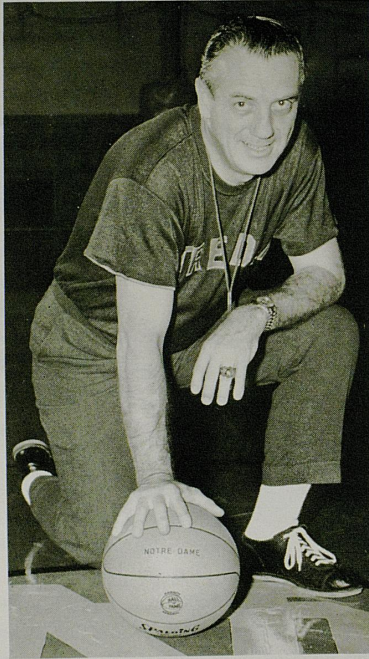
While not neglecting the Undergraduate program, SUMMA is geared to Notre Dame's young Graduate School, now enrolling some 1,150 students and offering the Ph.D. in 21 departments. Notre Dame now awards more graduate degrees each year than it awarded undergraduate degrees in 1940, and the SUMMA program hopes to widen the scope of graduate education and research at the University.

COACH JOHNNY DEE OF NOTRE DAME

One can hardly fault the extreme vitality of Johnny Dee as he moves into his fourth season as head basketball coach of the University of Notre Dame. Dee has truly rebuilt the Irish basketball program, and now with the groundwork completed can look forward to plenty of harvests.

In basketball circles, Dee has become known as an innovator. In addition to re-vamping pre-game activities in the Notre Dame Fieldhouse and renovating the Irish basketball program, he has added some of his personal touches to the game itself: He designed the basketball shoes and socks worn by the Irish. He is credited with initiating hand-foul indicators used by the scorer and was the first to indicate the official scorer's position on side court by use of a striped banner. For Dee, the adage that nothing is without need of improvement seems to be a creed.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1923, Dee moved to Chicago where he prepped at Loyola Academy starring in basketball, football and track. After serving with the Coast Guard, he attended Notre Dame from 1944-46 and then finished his undergraduate work at Loyola in 1947.



His coaching career started in Chicago at St. Mel High School where he was head basketball coach for four years. He then returned to the Notre Dame Law School earning his law degree in 1952, while also working as a basketball assistant to John Jordan.

That summer, with law degree in hand, Johnny moved not to the courthouse but to the University of Alabama fieldhouse as head man of the Crimson Tide basketball program. During his four years at the reins, the Alabamans piled up outstanding 68-25 mark and in 1955 strung together 14 consecutive league wins to capture the Southeastern Conference title. John also served as an assistant football coach with the 1952 and 1953 teams which appeared in the Orange and Cotton Bowls.

Dee then moved on for five seasons with the Denver Truckers of the National Industrial Basketball League where his teams finished first or second for four seasons. John was named head coach of the Kansas City Steers in the American Basketball League and his team was on the top when the league folded on January 1, 1963.

GENE SULLIVAN ASSISTANT COACH



For Gene Sullivan, newly-appointed assistant coach at Notre Dame, filling the shoes of a 6-7 predecessor may pose a bit of a problem. But with ten years of outstanding success in the fields of coaching and education, his credentials seem more than ample.

Sullivan, athletic director and head basketball coach at Chicago's Loyola Academy for the past ten years, replaces former assistant coach Larry Staverman who became head coach of the Indianapolis Pacers of the new American Basketball Association.

A native of Chicago, Sullivan attended Carl Schurz High School in the Windy City where he was appointed captain by his teammates of the 1948-49 prep squad and was picked as the "most valuable player" by the Chicago Public League after the season. In 1949 he entered Notre Dame and graduated in 1953 with cum laude honors, earning a Masters Degree in Education two years later.

After two years in military service, Sullivan became head basketball coach at Loyola in 1957. In the following ten-year period, his teams won 295 games while losing 148. Included in his overall record are three Catholic

League Championships and four runner-up titles. His teams also won three DePaul University tournament titles and one Fenwick Tournament Championship.

JOHN TRACY STUDENT ASSISTANT COACH

John Tracy, after two years on the Notre Dame varsity basketball squad, moves to the position of student assistant coach.

He will work primarily with the Irish freshman squad aiding assistant coach Sullivan.

A graduate of Brother Rice High School in Chicago, Tracy monogrammed in his first year at Notre Dame seeing action in 14 games and scoring 35 points as a guard-forward.

While at Brother Rice, John earned four letters as a forward and captained his team as a senior when he gained all-state honors. He also earned all-metropolitan honors in both his junior and senior years.

A brother, Tom, is a sophomore guard candidate at DePaul University.

A native of Evergreen Park, Illinois, John is an economics major in the College of Arts and Letters at Notre Dame.



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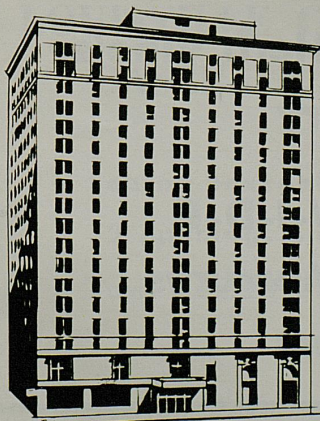
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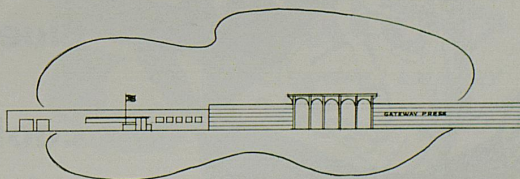
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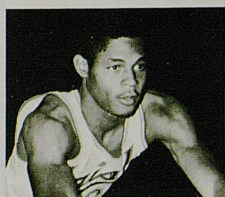
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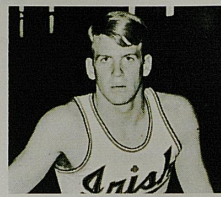
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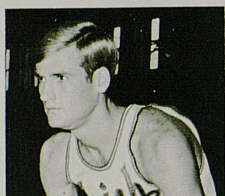

BOB ARNZEN (No. 40)

6-5 Junior Forward
Fr. Thomas, Ky.

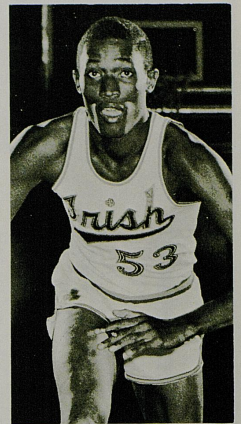
Captain of the 1967-68 team... first junior to lead the Irish since Ray Meyer (1936-37)... elected most valuable player for the 1966-67 campaign by his teammates... set scoring mark as a sophomore with 597 points... also the second highest season total ever scored by an Irish cager... only sophomore to be selected to the Academic All-American squad... also named to the Helm's All-American team... led team last year in total points for a 21.4 average... second in rebounding with 355... also led team in field goals and free throws... started all 28 games for the Irish... collected lowest number of personal fouls for a regular (59)... top scorer in seventeen games scoring season high of 38 points (14 field goals and 10 of 14 free throws) against Indiana... scored 30 or more points seven times... possesses a fine arching jump shot from his forward position... a strong rebounder and defensive player... also played baseball for the Irish this past spring hurling five victories against one loss... boasted lowest ERA for the Irish pitching staff... graduate of St. Xavier High in Cincinnati, where he earned seven letters, three as a basketball forward... also played baseball as a pitcher and football as an end... captained basketball team his senior year to a second consecutive Ohio state title... picked as MVP in the Ohio basketball finals in 1965.

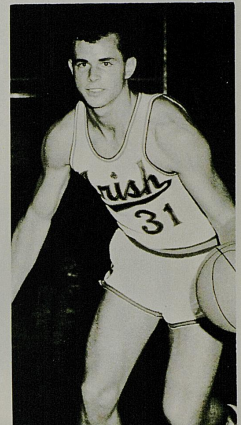

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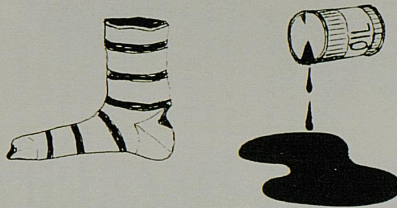
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JIM MCKIRCHY (No. 42)

Elkhart, Indiana

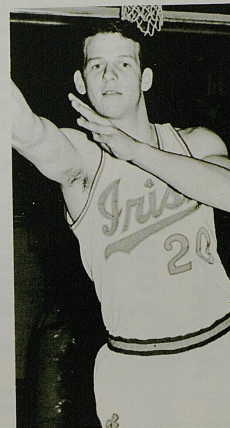

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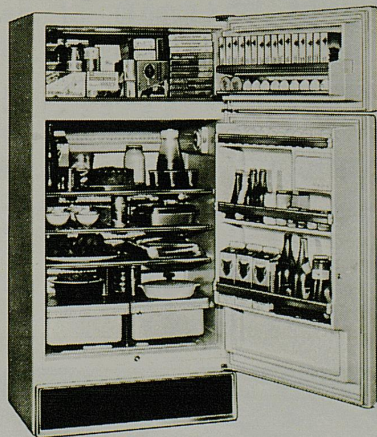
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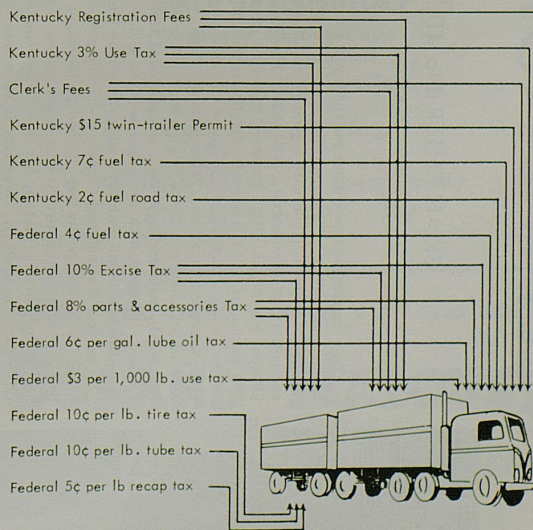
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BRIAN KELLER (No. 41)

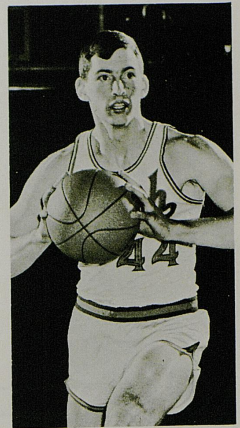

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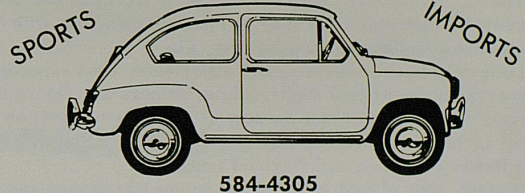
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UK 1968 OUTLOOK

Adolph Rupp enters the 1968 basketball season with more question marks than at any time during his 37 successful years as coach of the Kentucky Wildcats.

The first order of business is replacing graduated All-Americans Louie Dampier (20.6 scoring average) and Pat Riley (17.4 points and 7.7 rebounds per game).

Many eager but inexperienced hands seek the honor. Creating what could be a confusing and/or pleasing situation are 18 varsity players ranging from a 5-10 guard to a 6-10 forward-center.

The smallest Wildcat is Bill Busey, who teamed with Mike Casey to lead the Shelby County Rockets to the 1966 state basketball title.

Busey scored 9.3 points as a freshman while Casey, a 6-4 forward-guard, led team scorers with a 23.1 per game average during his break-in campaign. He also averaged 9.5 rebounds a game. Casey and Busey are part of a sophomore corps which takes up all but seven spaces on the 1968 roster, which includes six seniors and a lone junior.

The biggest Wildcat, also a sophomore, is Art Laib, who transferred to UK last year after playing his freshmen year with Gulf Coast Junior College in Panama City, Fla.

Laib, who needs seasoning and experience, isn't expected to earn a starting berth over such tried performers as seniors Cliff Berger, 6-8 1/2 and Thad Jaracz, 6-6. Other big men on the squad include sophomores Dan Issel, 6-8 1/2; Clint Wheeler, 6-8; Randy Pool, 6-7, and Wayland Long, 6-7.

Berger, who played in 20 of 26 games last season and was fourth high scorer with 226 points, is expected to share the pivot position with Issel, who averaged 21.1 points and 17.3 rebounds.

Jaracz, who was an Associated Press third team All-America his sophomore year, led the team in rebounds (8.3 average) and was third high scorer (293 points) last season.

Bringing experience to the forward position are seniors Gary Gamble, 6-5, and Tom Porter, 6-4, who saw quite a bit of action but averaged less than four points and three rebounds each last season. They'll be challenged by sophomores Casey, Mike Pratt, Wheeler and Pool. Rupp has experimented with Casey at both guard and forward and apparently has settled on the latter. Pratt, 6-4, enters varsity play after scoring 20.1 points and getting 8.1 rebounds a game as a yearling. He hit 53% of his shots. Pool missed the second semester of his freshman year due to academic problems while Wheeler missed the first three weeks of practice because of an ankle sprain. Long, put on a one-year scholarship after his freshman campaign, needs seasoning.

Phil Argento, 6-2, the lone junior, came on strong after earning a starting berth last season and could solve the problem at one guard position. Sophomore Terry Mills, 6-2, looked good in pre-season practice, but the competition is very keen with seniors Steve Clevenger, 6-1, and Jim LeMaster, 6-3, and sophomores Busey, Jim Dinwiddle, 6-4, and Benny Spears, 6-3, providing a strong challenge.

ND 1968 OUTLOOK

Youth and experience. These are the two assets with which Notre Dame basketball coach Johnny Dee will attempt to gain some lustre in the 1967-68 season.

With the return of two outstanding juniors, 6-5 forward Bob Arnzen, and 6-7 center Bob Whitmore, it's hard to question Dee's optimism.

As a sophomore, Arnzen was brilliant and at times spectacular as he scored 30 or more points on seven occasions. His two most notable performances were against Indiana, the Big Ten Conference champions, and against top-ranked Houston, as he scored 38 and 37 points respectively. He finished the season with 597 points to set a Notre Dame record for the most points scored by a sophomore. His output was also the second highest total ever scored by an Irish player.

Although Arnzen was the most productive of Dee's cagers, it was Whitmore who displayed the most improvement during the latter half of the season which earned him credit for spurring the Irish comeback in the 1967 portion of the campaign, as he averaged nearly 20 points per game. His overall defensive work and rebounding efforts were artistic and his .489 offensive accuracy established a Notre Dame record. His finest effort came against Butler at Indianapolis when he sank 17 field goals out of 22 attempts for a fantastic 77%, another Irish single game mark. He finished the evening's work with 43 points, the season's top individual performance.

Along with Arnzen and Whitmore is another returning monogram winner, junior Dwight Murphy, who could well key a banner year for the Irish. The lack of experienced guards forced Dee to call upon Murphy, 6-2, for one of the outside posts last year. He made the transition but not without experiencing some difficulty in the early stages of the season. This year, however, he is being counted on for his more natural forward slot which will enable him to capitalize on his special fade-away jump shot. But should he ever be needed at guard, Murphy can fill the bill after a year's experience. If the switch is needed Dee will then move 6-4 Jim McKirchy, a speedy and quick senior and two-time monogram winner, to forward.

The most likely candidate for one of the guard positions is Jim Derrig, still another junior who stands 6-2. The nifty play-maker came into his own toward the latter part of the season to help the Irish where the most help was needed. His 118 points came from a very respectable .489 shooting percentage and a team high .833 free throw accuracy.

Battling for the other guard spot will be senior George Restovich, 6-1, junior Mike Franger, 5-1, and 6-1, sophomore Mike O'Connell. Restovich began last season on the top unit. Franger saw considerable action as a front line reserve.

Although the Irish have lacked experienced depth in the past few years, Dee is counting heavily on senior Brian Keller, 6-4, John Gallagher, a 6-4 sophomore and 6-4 junior Dan Quinn for reserve help at forward. Tony Vignali, a 6-6 senior, adds even more depth at forward but he will get the early call at center.

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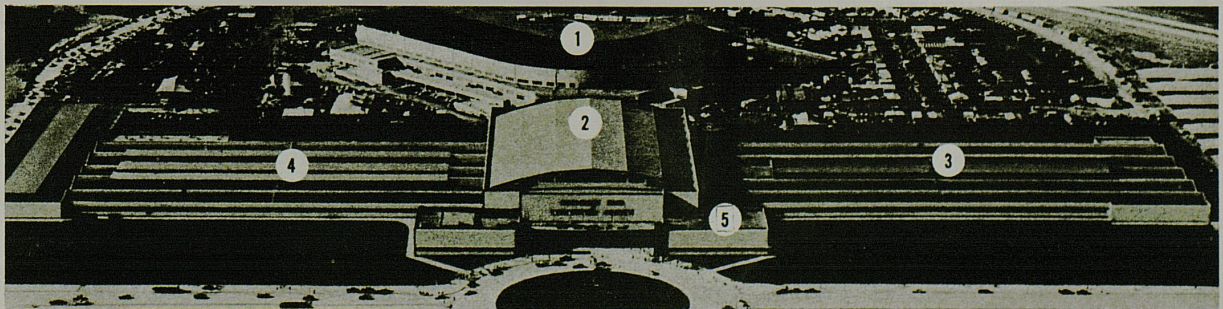

6-2 Junior Guard
Cleveland, Ohio

Worked into the Wildcat lineup slowly in 1966-67, as expected, and came on strong at season end. . . Finished with a 5.2 scoring average, hitting 41 of 82 field goal attempts for an even 50 per cent and 28 of 31 free throw attempts. . . Showed signs of fulfilling promise of sparkling frosh season, when he broke the UK freshman game point production mark four times and posted a high point total of 50 for his best effort. . . Scored 48 points on two occasions. . . Wound up frosh season with 460 points and a 30.7 average. . . Starred at West High School in Cleveland, Ohio, with 30.7 average in his final season. . . Posted a career total of 1,259 points in 50 schoolboy games. . . Put new marks in high school record books for scoring, rebounding, assists, field goals and free throw shooting. . . Twice All-State. . . Possesses fine touch, a good eye for the basket and a knack for getting a shot away quickly. . . Family nationality Italian and Irish.



MIKE CASEY (No. 34)

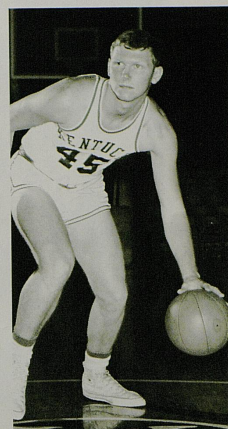
6-4 Sophomore Forward-Guard
Simpsonville, Ky.

Rated one of top freshman prospects in land, Casey lived up to advance billing last season. . . Freshman captain led Kitten scoring parade with 471 points (23.5 average) and was second leading rebounder with 195 grabs to Dan Issel's 355 as frosh finished with a fine 18-2 record. . . Considered almost a sure bet for starting position this season. . . All-State at Shelby County High where he averaged 28.5 points a game as the Rockets finished 33-1 and won the State Tournament. . . Honorary captain All-State team and Kentucky's "Mr. Basketball" for Kentucky-Indiana series. . . Headed Coach and Athlete Magazine's list of nation's top 10 prep All-Americans. . . Four-year point total 2,088 points in career of 96 games. . . A clutch shooter with all the moves. . . Lone unanimous choice on All-State Tournament team.

CLIFF BERGER (No. 45)

6-8 1/2 Senior Center-Forward
Centralia, Ill.

Could be a big man in Wildcat plans, from the point of leadership as well as scoring and rebounding proficiency. . . Starter in the final 13 games last season. . . Cliff logged 543 minutes playing time in 20 games and finished with 226 points, tying fellow senior Thad Jaracz for third place scoring honors with 11.3 points per game. . . Led team in field goal accuracy, hitting 98 of 176 shots for 55.6 per cent. . . Made 30 of 36 from the free throw line. . . Finished third in rebounding with a per game average of six. . . Operated as the Wildcats' No. 6 man in his sophomore year, scoring 84 points and hauling in 86 rebounds during 297 minutes of action in 25 games. . . He is remembered for his fine relief job in Kentucky's pivotal win over nationally third-ranked Vanderbilt that season. . . Widely sought after a high school career in which he won All-America honors at Centralia Township, Cliff scored 796 points and averaged 26.5 plus 14 rebounds a game his senior year. . . At 6-8 1/2, he is the Wildcats' biggest pivotman since 6-9 Ned Jennings in 1960-61.



STEVE CLEVINGER (No. 32)

6-1 Senior Guard
Anderson, Ind.

An excellent ball-handler and passer, the "Hoosier Hot Shot" shook academic troubles and minor injuries, which plagued him in his freshman and sophomore campaigns, respectively, and saw action in all but two of the Wildcats' 26 games last season. . . He started five games, compiling a total of 81 points during 316 minutes total playing time. . . Credited with 39 assists—third to departed All-Americans Pat Riley (68) and Louie Dampier (57). . . Shot a respectable 48.3 per cent from the field and contributed 1.4 rebounds a game. . . As a sophomore, he performed creditably in 11 games before breaking a small bone in his foot just prior to the NCAA Tournament. . . Ran into academic difficulties in his freshman year (1964-65 and wound up ineligible the second semester—causing him to miss three-fourths of the games (13 of 19). . . All-State three straight years as a schoolboy at Anderson and Indiana's "Mr. Basketball" for the Kentucky-Indiana All-State series. . . Accounted for 1,298 points in high school play.



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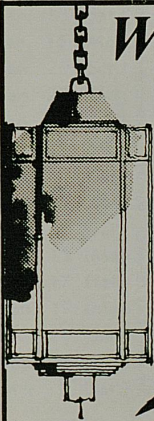
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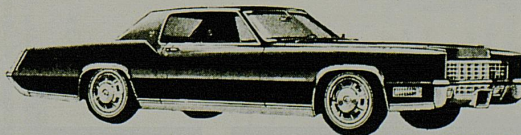
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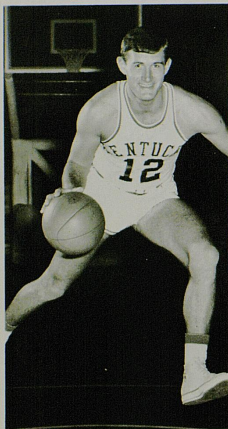
MEET THE KENTUCKY WILDCATS



DAN ISSEL (No. 44)

6-8 1/2 Sophomore Center-Forward
Batavia, Ill.

Displayed rebounding talent that Wildcats have long lacked as he garnered 355 grabs in 20 games for 17.7 average. . . Also held up his end of scoring, finishing second on squad with 416 points for a 20.8 average. . . Hit 50.6 per cent from the field and contributed 35 assists. . . Definitely a top contender for starting center position. . . Chose Kentucky over 100 interested schools. . . Classified by Coach Rupp as "the best pivot prospect in the country". . . Scouts called Issel one of top three schoolboy cagers in nation. . . Blessed with fine speed, great ability and plenty of moves near the basket. . . Scored 2,500 points in high school career of 106 games—725 for 25 average in senior season. . . Excellent student majoring in Commerce.



JIM LeMASTER (No. 12)

6-3 Senior Guard
Lexington, Ky.

Could be classified as a farmboy — his father is resident manager of Spendthrift Farm on the outskirts of Lexington — but attended high school in Paris, Ky. . . He earned All-State honors in 1964 at Bourbon County High as a 24-point scorer and also was a grid star. . . Kentucky's first race All-America (Basil Haydon '21) also hailed from Paris, but Jim isn't expected to follow in Haydon's footsteps. . . Considered a reliable "fireman," however, and should shore up the Wildcat bench this season if he doesn't nail down a starting guard position. . . Saw action in 17 games, with two starts and 217 minutes playing time last season. . . Averaged 2.7 points and 2.1 rebounds. . . A tough, muscular competitor, LeMaster handles himself well on the court and is classified a fine floorman as well as "take charge" type and a fine passer. . . Hit 51.7 per cent of his shots last season, but his strong point probably is defense. . . Won Jaycees Freshman Leadership Award as a yearling.

THAD JARACZ (No. 55)

6-6 Senior Center-Forward
Lexington, Ky.

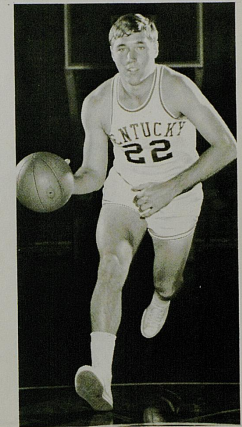
A native Lexingtonian, Jaracz is the only returning player who started every game last season. . . Led the team in rebounding with 215 grabs (8.3 per game), eighth in the Conference. . . Third in team scoring with 293 points. . . Named most valuable player in the 1966 UKIT. . . As a soph in 1965-66 he was honored by the Associated Press on its third team All-America selections (only sophomore among 15 honorees) and chosen as "Sophomore of the Year" in the Southeastern Conference. . . Proved to be one of key men in Kentucky's surprising surge to No. 1 position in the national polls and close miss in its bid for a fifth NCAA championship that season. . . Operated at both center and forward last season, but probably will shift toward this season as taller sophomores battle for the pivot position. . . Played high school ball at Lexington Lafayette. . . His father played football at UK in 1941-42. . . Much of the team's success will depend on leadership generated by Jaracz.



MIKE PRATT (No. 22)

6-4 Sophomore Forward
Dayton, Ohio

A picture of confidence, muscular Mike has served notice he expects to earn a starting berth at forward—quite a task considering the senior and sophomore talent with a similar goal. . . Backs his contention with a solid 20.1 scoring average during a freshman season in which he totaled 402 points while hitting 55.1 per cent, to lead the team, from the field. . . Also was third rebounder with 162 grabs. . . Led the frosh in assists with 55. . . Rated one of top schoolboys in Buckeye State history. . . Held under double figures only twice in last three years of high school and posted 24.9 average final season. . . Collected 1,396 points in 76 games of career for new Dayton-area record. . . Averaged 16 rebounds as senior. . . All-City football and baseball twice.

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COACH ADOLPH RUPP *'The Baron of Basketball'*

The nation's winningest basketball coach for nearly four decades and one of the most colorful figures in the game today... That's Baron Adolph Rupp, who has been producing winners at the University of Kentucky for longer than most people can remember.

Able to boast of a nation-leading career percentage of better than 83 per cent success in his chosen profession, Coach Rupp has guided the Wildcats since 1930--and never had a losing season.

Few major goals of the coaching profession have escaped the grasp of this 65-year-old veteran, feared and respected by opponents and beloved by millions of fans to whom he is known familiarly as "The Man In The Brown Suit." The appellation was tagged on Rupp years ago in tribute to his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.

Among Coach Rupp's major accomplishments are:



- 765 victories in 925 starts during 37 years at Kentucky.
- Membership in the ultra-exclu-

sive "700 Club" (700 career victories) which were achieved at the earliest stage of any coach... And he bids to become the first active coach to attain 800 wins.

- An unprecedented four NCAA titles captured during a record 15 tournament appearances.

- A record 22 Southeastern Conference championships in 34 years of the league's existence.

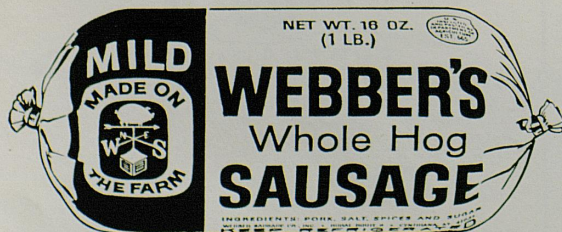
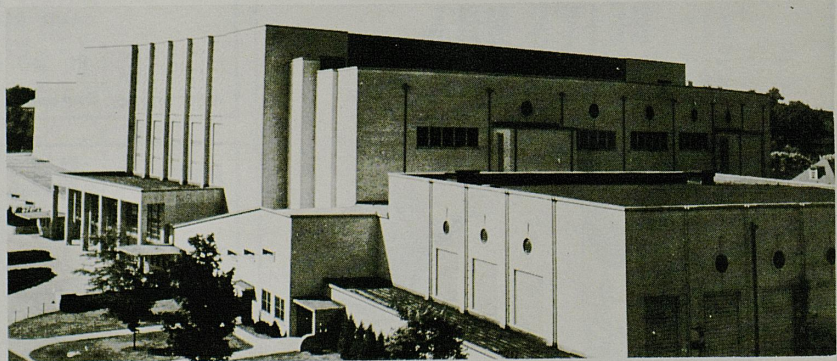
- Top world honors as he helped guide the USA entry to success in the 1948 Olympics and to the championship of the first International Universities Tournament in 1966.

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Wildcat Assistant Coaches

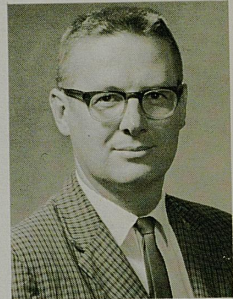
HARRY LANCASTER



Recognized as one of the top assistant coaches in the profession, Harry Lancaster has served in the capacity of chief aide to Baron Adolph Rupp since 1946. Among his various duties, the Paris (Ky.) native spends much time scouting future opponents of the Wildcats, recruiting some of the best schoolboy talent in the nation and coaching with much success the UK freshman cage team.

Lancaster in the past 16 seasons has guided the Kittens to a record of 193 wins and only 48 losses. Harry is a graduate of Georgetown (Ky.) College, where he was an all-around sports standout in early thirties. An All-Conference halfback in football three straight years, his grid career almost overshadowed his play on the basketball court. Even though he considered himself a better gridder than basketballer, he starred in basketball with an equal number of All-Conference selections and widely chose to stick with the cage sport as a career. Lancaster spent nine years as a high school principal and coach before coming to UK in 1942 as a physical education instructor.

JOE HALL



Former Kentucky basketballer Joe Hall of Cynthiana, who proved himself a successful coach for nine years, joined the cage staff of Adolph Rupp in 1965. The new Wildcat aide transferred from Central Missouri State College, where he was head coach during the 1964-65 season and posted a 19-6 record enroute to guiding his team to the school's first NIAA Conference championship since

1951. A guard on Coach Rupp's 1949 UK team, Hall entered coaching upon his graduation in 1955. He spent three years at Shepherdsville High, twice achieving conference "Coach of the Year" honors, and then moved into collegiate ranks at Regis College. After one season as freshman coach, Joe was elevated to head coach and for five years posted successful records. The 38-year-old Kentuckian also coached the Capital Federal Denver team in the AAU Tournament and later was honored by selection as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic Trials. Hall is given much credit by Coach Rupp for recruiting this season's outstanding freshman team.

Construction of the Science Center is well ahead of the September '68 target date.

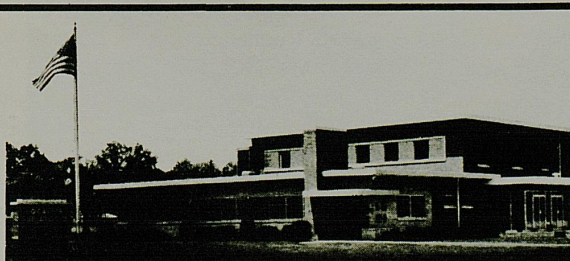

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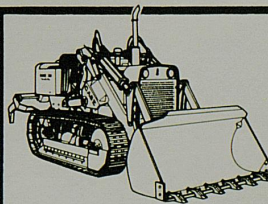
