



CERRITOS, Calif. — A third, as yet unidentified, aircraft took the attention of air traffic controllers at the time a small plane and an Aero-mexico jetiliner collided, killing at least 67 people on the planes and leaving 15 missing and feared dead on the ground, authorities said Monday.



Additional money won't help alleviate U.S. drug problem

"Money is the difference."
That's what Rep. Glenn English, D-Okla., whose House government operations subcommittee has held 38 hearings on the American drug problem, had to say about what will turn the tide in the war on drugs.

A bill that will be coming before the House of Represen-tives soon after its recess will show how many legislators agree with English's view

The proposal, the handiwork of 11 committees, offers a new generation of weapons in the war against drugs, along with hundreds of millions of dollars — in an age of extensive budget cuts — to back up the warriors.

The bill is long on promises but desperately short on providing real solutions to what Capitol Hill seems to see as America's latest scourge.

There are plenty of great-sounding measures included in the proposed legislation, but they seem to be aimed in the wrong direction.

Congressmen and Reagan administration officials constantly keep turning the big guns south, not toward the heart of this country where the heart of the drug crisis lies. First of all, we'll do the American thing — call out the cavalry. Three thousand frontline personnel would be added to our current forces — 600 for the Drug Enforcement Administration, nearly 900 for the Customs Service and 1,500 Coast Guardsmen. Wouldn't it be more effective to put 3,000 more social workers on the front lines of the inner cities and in the elementary schools to combat miseducation about drug use?

Secondly, there's the proposal to spend more than \$1 bil-Secondly, there's the proposal to spend more man ston-lion for construction of new prison space, which supposedly would be needed to house drug violators subject to the bill's new mandatory minimum prison terms that provide for no probation, no parole. Not that we don't need new prisons any way, but a billion dollars would go a long way toward building rehabilitation centers — and might even

leave some change to spend wisely.

Furthermore, there are measures for a hodgepodge of grants, sanctions, new laws and high-tech hardware that supposedly will strengthen our enforcement forces and coerce our neighbors into cooperating with our programs—whether these like it more whether they like it or not.

It all comes back to money, and in an election year the purse strings are always loose, especially when the flashy option of treating the symptoms buys more votes than the arduous process of curing the disease.

Group trying to impeach Collins

FRANKFORT — Four members of a self-styled citizens' lobby have petitioned the House of Representatives to impeach Gov. Martha Layne Collins, Commerce Secretary Carroll Kincley and four legislators.

Don Wiggins, president of the Concerned Citizens and Businessmen of Central Kentucky Inc., said yesterday the officials should be impeached for putting together the incentive package for Toyota Motor Corp., which he called "the most illegal, unconstitutional and improper action ever taken."

Kentucky law allows any citizen to petition the House for impeachment and mandates that such a petition be referred to a committee.

But Vic Hellard, director of the Legislative Research Commission, said the petition will likely not be considered until January 1988 when the General Assembly next convenes to conduct official business.

Bush decries arrest of journalist

Bush decries arrest of journalist

Vice President George Bush and Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said yesterday the Soviet Union falsely arrested an American journalist, while the head of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said Nicholas Daniloff's detention dims prospects for a superpower summit.

Speaking to reporters in Akron as he campaigned for Ohio Republicans, Bush said Daniloff's arrest threatens U.S.-Soviet relations, but stopped short of saying it would jeopardize a planned superpower summit.

"I can say that if the Soviets persist in going down this avenue, no question about it, it's making the chance for better relations much more difficult," he said.

Weinberger, in Cincinnati to address a convention of the American Legion, said, "It's a trumped-up charge. Anyone who knows Mr. Daniloff would know he would not do that. I think it's a deplorable situation."

The Soviet KGB arrested Daniloff, a Moscow correspondent for U.S. News and World Report magazine, on Saturday and accused him of engaging in espionage. A Soviet friend had handed Daniloff an envelope that he said contained newpaper clippings, but Soviet authorities say it contained top-secret maps.

Iran criticizes Iraq at summit

HARARE, Zimbabwe — The non-aligned summit abruptly went into closed session today when Iran's president lashed out at Iraq in a speech in which he also called the United States the "arch Satan."

Live television broadcast of the session broke off as President Ali Khamenei described Iran's foe in a 6-year-old war as "an agent of superpower imperialism." Iraq is also a member of the non-aligned movement.

"Iranian aides had distributed Khamenei's 37-page speech in advance. In the prepared remarks he said: "The Iraqi crimes, according to many international authorities,

Khamenei blamed the superpowers for the war and ex-pressed anger that neither the U.N. Security Council nor the non-aligned movement had labeled Iraq the clear ag-


