## Lexington Pride Idol 2006

The GLSO Pride Idol Contest has begun. The next two preliminaries are on Friday, April 14 at Third Street Stuff and Wednesday April, 26 at the Bar Complex. Both contests will begin at 8 pm and the organizers will be there by 6 to take applications. You can pick up applications at any of the participating locations or at the Pride Center, 389 Waller Ave. There is a \$10 registration fee. (Call to be sure someone is here 253-3233)

You do not have to be GLBT to compete in this contest. All are welcome. On the 14th at Third Street Stuff, the contest will be held outside on the patio, weather permitting. This is the one location open to people under the age of 21. They serve food so come out and join the fun

Up to twenty individuals will compete at each preliminary. Audience members will vote for their favorites with ballots that can be purchased for \$1. The winners will participate in the semi-finals at the State Theater in May. A panel of judges including Robbie Bartlet and Steve Johnson will select ten individuals to compete in the Finals at this year's Pride Picnic in June. Everyone at the picnic will then vote for the next Pride Idol.

The winner will receive a trophy, a gift certificate for Discjocky in Lexington Green, and studio time at Grooves Professional Recording Studio to make ten copies of a two song CD.

## **Ernesto Scorsone Receives Humanitarian** Award

The Kentucky Conference for Community and Justice has chosen Senator Ernesto Scorsone to receive the Lauren K. Weinberg Humanitarian Award for 2006. He will be honored at their annual dinner on Thursday, April 27 at Griffin Gate Resort. The Bluegrass Community and Technical College will also be honored that evening.

Scorsone was chosen for his advocacy work within the Kentucky Legislature and in the state as a whole. He has consistently worked for equality and fair treatment of all people. He sponsored the School Safety Act, and legislation to ensure minority representation in the school system. He has advocated for healthcare reform, for GLBT rights, and for stricter bullying policies in public schools,.

Over a decade ago, Scorsone was one of the lawyers that successfully worked to overturn Kentucky's sodomy stature. He has been an advocate for GLBT people in many ways.

## Kentucky Fairness vs. Ky. Legislature

Members of the GLBT community sit on the edge of their seats awaiting the outcome of Senate Bill 236. The bill presents a grave danger to GLBT persons everywhere. It would abolish the already established fairness ordinances in Lexington, Louisville, and Covington. Furthermore, it strips citizens of their ability to take the legislature to court as it prohibits lawsuits against legislative state employees and members of the General Assembly. In laymen's terms, the bill would erase any legislative accountability. The bill would also allow for the posting of the Ten Commandments in a historical context on public property, which is clearly an un-Constitutional violation of the separation of church and state.

As we go to print, Senate Bill 236 has been sent back to committee. Fairness and our allies have succeeded in slowing it's progress but we can not quite claim victory at this point. Ernesto Scorsone attached an amendment to the Bill to limit the Governors ability to pardon himself. This will make the bill less attractive to Republicans. However, they do not have to accept this amendment. The bill could be brought back to the floor of the Senate for consideration on March 27 or on April 10 or 11, after the Legislature returns from it's break.

We would appreciate it if you (and you and you) would prepare to come to Frankfort on April 10th or 11th to support the defeat of this bill. We encourage you to stay informed about what is happening with Senate Bill 236 by checking the website below:

SB 236 is "political opportunism at its worst. It's an unconscionable attack on religious minorities, low-income school children, retired state employees, and, once again, gay people," exclaimed Christina Gilgor, executive director of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance. Other notables besides Gilgor have slammed the bill: The Honorable John Palmore, a former Kentucky Supreme Court Justice, described the bill as a partisan ploy to mobilize "the bigots" in the 2006 elections.

Senator Ernesto Scorsone indicated that SB 236 would "cut out the right of the people to challenge the work of the legislature. Citizens want their government to be more accountable, not less."

Of course, KFA is not sitting on its haunches hoping for a miracle. KFA recognizes the profound threat this bill proposes and is working harder than ever to insure its sound defeat. KFA leaders have decided to host two more lobby days in Frankfort: March 23rd and April 10th. Besides that initiative, KFA will create a downloadable in-district lobby kit prepared for the two week legislative recess which will occur from March 27th through April 7th. During that recess, concerned citizens will have the opportunity to meet with their legislators on their home turf, and KFA will provide the instructional tools to make those meetings successful.

KFA strongly encourages all citizens to get active. Members of KFA happily recognize their responsibility to lobby on behalf of all LGBTQ persons, but legislators need to see more faces and hear more voices. Until legislators see that persons in the gay community are numerous and that those persons include respected society figures, friends, neighbors, and family members,

they will not take the plight of the BTQLG to heart. There is an irrefutable strength in numbers, but those numbers must be visible. KFA hopes everyone will do his or her part and go toFrankfort in April, call the legislature and leave messages. You can download the in-district lobby kit to learn how to meet with a legislator. Let's all work to make the numbers visible.

## Couples Relationship Workshop "Getting The Love You Want"

We take lessons in tennis, golf, or to learn more about our computer, so why not about relationships? Jessica C. Bollinger, LCSW and a certified Imago Relationship Therapist, is offering couples workshops on April 14- 16 and May 12-14.

Imago "Getting the Love you Want" workshops offers you a safe environment to develop skills that can help you and your partner transform your relationship. The workshops are for relationships that are:

- Just beginning...buoyed by new connection, new love, and new dreams
- Becoming too routine...marked by longing for the way things used to feel, along with confusion over what happened to all those dreams
- At the breaking point...filled with conflict, pain, confusion, despair and little or no hope for the dreams that once existed

Jessica creates a safe space in which to learn. You are n't ever required to share personal information with the group. Your work with your partner will involve pairing off from the group at various intervals during the weekend. Share with the group only that which feels comfortable. The workshop includes brief lectures, movie clips, music and opportunities for private reflection and sharing with your partner.

What you can expect from the workshop:

- A new sense of the sacred space between you and your partner
- New communication skills for cleansing that space
- Greater compassion for your partner's story
- New tools to turn conflicts into opportunities for healing and growth
- An expansion of your capacity to dream together your greatest dreams

 Creating new desire with a new design to release your joy and have fun together.

Jessica is a co-presenter with her life partner, Cathy Wieschhoff. Their workshops in Lexington are held at their home on their horse farm nestled in a tranquil place in the heart of the Bluegrass Come experience the joy of connecting on new levels of conscious loving.

Getting the Love You Want Couples Workshop cost 80% less than the cost of hourly therapy and is often worth 3-6 months of weekly couples therapy. #### Deborah Batts (Federal Court Judge)

Deborah Batts is most well known as the first openly Lesbian African American to be appointed as a Federal court Judge. Before her appointment by then-president Clinton in 1994, Batts had many years of law experience and had made a name for herself as a judge. Batts was even recommended for nomination during Bush senior's administration.

Batts began her studies at Radcliffe College and then attended Harvard Law School. After finishing her law degree, she worked both as a litigator and as Assistant U.S. Attorney in New York. She then taught family and property law at Fordham University. She is known as a strong supporter of equal rights for the LGBT community.

#### Mandy Carter (Activist)

As a career activist, Mandy Carter, is well known as an outspoken and articulate voice for the African American LGBT community. She is the recipient of numerous awards which testify to her commitment to ending oppression and her ability to organize others around this most noble of causes. She has worked closely with the National Black Lesbian and Gay Leadership Forum and was awarded their Bayard Rustin Award for political activism in 1999.


Currently Carter is focusing her efforts on monitoring and responding to the Religious Right's efforts to foster anti-gay attitudes in communities of color. She also works closely with the Democratic party, serving as a Member-At-Large on the Democratic National Committee and on the DNC Black and Lesbian Caucuses.

#### Ruth Ellis (Activist)

Ruth Ellis's life began 70 years before Stonewall, an event that some consider to be the start of the LGBT rights movement in the United States. Although by her own account Ellis's life was unextraordinary, many in the LGBT community would disagree.

Ellis owned her own business in a time when very few African Americans let alone African American lesbians owned businesses; she and hergirlfriend opened their home as a gathering spot for gays and lesbians before there were bars, community centers, or other public LGBT gathering places; and she lived openly as a lesbian for more than half a century.

Although Ellis passed away in October of 2000 at the age of 101, she will be remembered in part because of the documentary "Living with Pride: Ruth Ellisat 100." Ellis will also be remembered for her work in the LGBT seniors movement and for leading the San Francisco Dyke March in 1999 at the age of 100.

#### **Lorraine Hansberry (Writer)**

Sharp witted and controversial, Lorraine Hansberry elicited much attention, praise, and criticism for her work as a writer. She is most well known for writing "A Raisin in the Sun" which won the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award for best play of the year and was the first play produced by an African American Woman on Broadway. When asked if she won the Circle award because she was black, Hansberry replied that if she had that it would have been the first time in America that anyone had been given an award for being a black woman.

Hansberry used her identity as an African American woman to inform her works throughout her short career and life. These works included "The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window," and "Les Blancs," as well as a collection of letters and other writings that were published after her death. Although married in 1953, Hansberry later divorced and publicly proclaimed her lesbian identity in a letter to the the Lesbian

periodical "The Ladder."

In 1965,she died of cancer at the age of 34. Another play adapted from her writings, "To be Young, Gifted, andBlack," was produced off-Broadway four years after her death. Through this work and others Hansberry still continues to influence and inspire black writers and artist 37 years after her death.

#### George Washington Carver (Inventor)

George Washington Carver is one of the most well known African American historical figures as well as one of the most important figures in American Agriculture. Most school children know him as the inventor of hundreds of uses for the peanut and the person who popularized peanuts as an agricultural crop.

Although primarily famous as the driving force behind the peanut's growth in importance in agriculture, Carver is also notable for many other reasons. Carver was the first African American to attend Iowa State University as well as its first African American faculty member. His research included many other plants other than the peanut, and his work as an educator and innovator within the agricultural community led to the spread of "movable schools" or extension agencies to the South.

Carver died in 1943, and has since been honored with commemorative postage stamps, a fifty-cent coin, and inclusion in the Hall of Fame for Great Americans and the National Inventors Hall of Fame. One fact about Carver's life which is rarely if ever mentioned is his sexuality, which may not be relevant to most of his achievements but is integral to the understanding the inventor as a whole.

## LIVE LONGER AND BETTER: HELP OTHERS

Many studies show that volunteering your time, experience, and help to others can lengthen and improve your life. Unpaid acts of kindness give you a sense of wellbeing and lower stress hormones in your body. This can lead to improved cardiovascular health and other physical and mental benefits.

While speaking in Winchester last month, Dr Zorba Pastor advocated community involvement of all types to increase the sweetness, quality and length of your life".

Although it's not known exactly how the act of being helpful and kind to others increases your life expectancy, there are several strong theories. Shelley Taylor, a professor of psychology at UCLA and author of *The Tending Instinct*, says that helping others can relieve your own accumulative stress. "You can derive physical and psychological benefits from knowing you are making someone else's life worthwhile," she says.

So what exactly can you do? It makes sense to focus on things that are important to you. I, for example, am drawn to helping adults who need more education. Giving real, practical help to an adult learner has a great impact not only on that person's life but also their entire family and the community as a whole. And I benefit as well; the best conversations in recent memory have come to me while giving mature student rides to class.

Issues that inspire your passion are more fun to work on. You are much more likely to follow through, stay involved for a greater length of time and solve problems creatively. All of which will provide you with immeasurable rewards.

Volunteering with the GLSO Pride Center is one option. They need people to staff the center during evening hours, particularly from 5 to 7. More people would come in if they knew someone would be there every evening.
