Humanity has yet to reach a definitive answer, but UK students will get their chance at a forum tonight to ask, "Does God exist". Seven panelists will represent atheism, Christianity and Islam at the forum "Does God Exist". Arguments from Both Sides," tonight at 7:30 in the Student Center Small Ballroom. Event director Bryan Kennedy, a journalism sophomore, said he cannot guarantee the forum will provide an answer to this age-old query but said he promises it will generate discussion within a diverse community. Kennedy

"Especially in college, you're around so many different people who don't know what their feelings are for different things." Kennedy said. "Somebody going against the normal, everyday religion is pretty interesting—it's good to try to see where they're coming from."

The discussion aims to give students a better understanding of beliefs other than their own so they can build relationships with people and ideas that are unfamiliar to them, Kennedy said.

Three students from UK Campus Crusade for Christ will speak for Christianity. Ben Hornback, a member of CRU, agreed to be on the panel because he said the Bible calls on Christians to defend their beliefs.

"It's something that a lot of Christians and a lot of people in general just don't do," salf Homback. "They don't know why they believe what they believe. They re told what to believe and they just kind of accept it."

A member of the Muslim Student Association will represent Islam. One of the atheist panelists, UK SHIFT founder and president Adam Leedy, said his organization endures attacks from many religious angles. "We are constantly painted as amoral, anti-American, angry militants or any other negative description you can think of," Leedy said. "We are really just normal people who happen to have our own ideas about religion."

According to the 2008 Statistical Abstract, 77 percent of adults in the United States identify with the beliefs of Christianity, Less than one percent is reported to identify with Islam and one percent with atheism.

Despite its majority, Christianity also suffers from misconceptions, Hormback said,





"We looked at this game like it was the championship game for the SEC," said Crawford, who chipped in nine points while playing through foul trouble for most of the game. "We put ourselves in a position to win; we just did-n't pull out the victory."

The loss keeps the Cats in second place in the SEC East, a position head coach Billy Gillspie said his team wasn't looking forward to. If the Cats had won, they would have been in first place

in the SEC East.

"We didn't come in here looking to be in second place," Gillispie said, "We came here to win."

In the second half, the Cats came out attacking against the Vols, forcing Tennessee to play a half-court game. But while the Cats pulled within two points early, Crawford picked up his fourth foul just four minutes into the half. With Crawford joining Patterson and injured sophomore guard Jodie Meeks on the bench, the Cats attacked the low post with Stevenson and Harris, who Crawford said played the best game of his UK career.

"I just wanted to be aggressive," Harris said, "Coach was saying I had been passive, and I just wanted to not make mistakes while being aggressive, And I just thought I couldn't be passive today, I can't just be an extra body out there,"

Even without Patterson, the Cats tried to establish a post presence from sophomore forward Mark Coury and Stevenson. But both Coury and Stevenson struggled early to produce the offensive low-post game Patterson provides, with both accounting for only three points in the first half.

Even after Tennessee stormed out to a 20-5 first-half lead, UK battled back late in the half. Led by Harris, the Cats struck back with a mixed attack, using 3-pointers and slashing layups and unpures in the lane to pull within seven points at halftime.





Amend laws to avoid future disputes over trustee appointments

Gov. Steve Beshear may have created one crisis for Kentucky universities with his proposed budget cuts, but at least he's resolving another: the political imbalance on schools' governing

Ernie Fletcher, accusing him of violating state law by appointing a disproportionate amount of Republicans to the boards of trustees at state universities, including U.K. The suit was still unresolved when Fletcher, and Stumbo, a Democratic of the suit o

Last week, Beshear and Attorney General Jack Conway — both Democrats — came to an agreement that would prevent trustees from having to resign, as Stumbo had demanded, the Kernel reported Friday.

Under the agreement, which is pending until the two parties appear in orur Friday, Beshear will appoint only Democrats to the boards until they come into balance with the proportion of registered Democrats and Republicans statewide.

The agreement will help preserve stability amide or the control of the

cans statewide.

The agreement will help preserve stability amid a tough time for state universities — at least they will not have to deal with reshuffling their boards of trustees while dealing with

boards of distances while dealing with sizable budget cuts.

However, a trustee crisis like this one could arise again in the future, and it may not be so amicably resolved if the attorney general and the governor

happen to be from different political parties. To prevent further disputes, the General Assembly needs to amend the laws governing university board ap-

laws governing university boatd appointments.

One of the key points of dispute between Fletcher and Stumbo was whether the political affiliations or not elected trustees—those who are not elected trustees—those was not experiently such as student, faculty, staff adlumni representatives—should count toward the legally mandated balance.

nor's appointees; a switch in affiliation within the elected seats should not force the governor to seek trustee resignations for the sake of balance. However, this point is not spelled out clearly in the laws about appointments to UK, the University of Louisville, and the regional and community colleges. Some simple legislation could clarify the language and fix this problem. What's even more important is for the governor's office to not let political considerations drive trustee appointments. When spots on the boards open up, Beshear should fill them with experts on education policy, not campaign donors and assorted political alies.

Through video games, one can vent anger and frustration, fulfill

dreams that are impossible in the real world, and interact in a virtual yet devoted community.

However, I am convinced that the ultimate problem, as well as the solution, lies not within the games but the addicts themselves. In other words, many gamers are not addicted to be games — they are addicted to burning their time or gaming.



Landlord Q&A

Moving into your first house can be a little intimidating and overwhelming. You spent all this time searching for the right house, or even just an available one, and once you found your new house there are a few things you need to know. Some things are common sense but it's amazing what you can overlook such as what day does the trash get picked up or when is rent due. When it comes to leasing a house from someone, there are no stupid questions; better safe than sorry

According to Living.apartments.com, there are essential things you should ask your landlord before signing the lease. Here are the top seven questions you should ask:

- 1. How long is the lease? No brainer, right? As oblivious as this question is, it's probably the most important. You need to know how long you are committing to the lease because if you want to study abroad one semester or travel over the summer, then you need to plan accordingly. Sometime leases overlap which can be a hassle and the last thing you want to do is pay for two houses.
- 2. What other fees are involved? We would like to think that all we pay is one monthly due but usually that's not the case. Most every landlord charges a security deposit fee which takes care of any damage to the residence that occurred while you were there. The upside to a deposit is if you took care of your house and nothing broke, then at the end of your lease you will get that money back. Also when signing a lease, be very clear on application fees, lease breaking fees and fines for late payments.
- 3. Are utilities included in the rent? Every house is different when it comes to utility bills especially depending on if heat is electric or gas powered. At some places



utilities are all inclusive in the rent and at others you pay for utilities separately. Utilities are deceiving because they can vary from an extra \$25 to an extra couple hundred dollars. So if rent sounds like a deal, it might not be. So ask the landlord how much the utilities usually cost so you can better predict what you will be paying each month.

- 4. What about parking? If you will be living close to campus, parking will probably be limited. Make sure you know where your parking area is. Some places have assigned parking spots. In this case, you should know which one is yours and who you notify if someone is in your spot. In other cases you may have to pay for a spot so find out how much a parking pass costs (hopefully you covered that while asking question #2).
- 5. Is sub-leasing allowed? If you do decide to study abroad for a semester or travel over the summer, then you need to know if sub-leasing is allowed. Sub-leasing is when some else takes your spot in the house and pays your portion of the rent. Some landlords allow it and others don't.
- 6. What are the decorating restrictions? To make your house feel like a

home you will probably get the urge to decorate it. Before you go "Extreme Home Makeover" on it, make sure you know what you can and can't do to the house. The things landlords are usually concerned with are the walls, floors and ceilings. Some would prefer that you don't paint the walls or make big nail holes. If you have a flat screen television that you wish to hang on the wall, check with your landlord first. If they do allow it, then they may want a professional to mount it because the last thing you want is a smashed TV and your security deposit spent on the giant hole in the wall.

7. Are pets allowed? This is a big one. Once we move out of the dorms, we seem to get the urge to own a dog or a cat. Some landlords don't want you to have a pet because they're a messy liability and other landlords could care less if you were running a bunny farm. If you are allowed to have a pet, then there may be a fee. Pets are expensive and a lot of responsibly comes with owning a cat or a dog. So seriously think about everything that comes with owning a pet especially your landlord's restrictions
