Athletic board passes budget

The UK Athletic Association yesterday approved a financing plan to build its basketball teams a \$27.5 million practice facility adjacent to Memorial Coliseum. The Board of Directors also passed an operating budget of \$54.2 million for the 2005-06 Athletic Director Mitch Barnhart said the facility excheduled to open in October 2006 — will keep the men's basketball program among the nation's elite and elevate the women's team to that level.
