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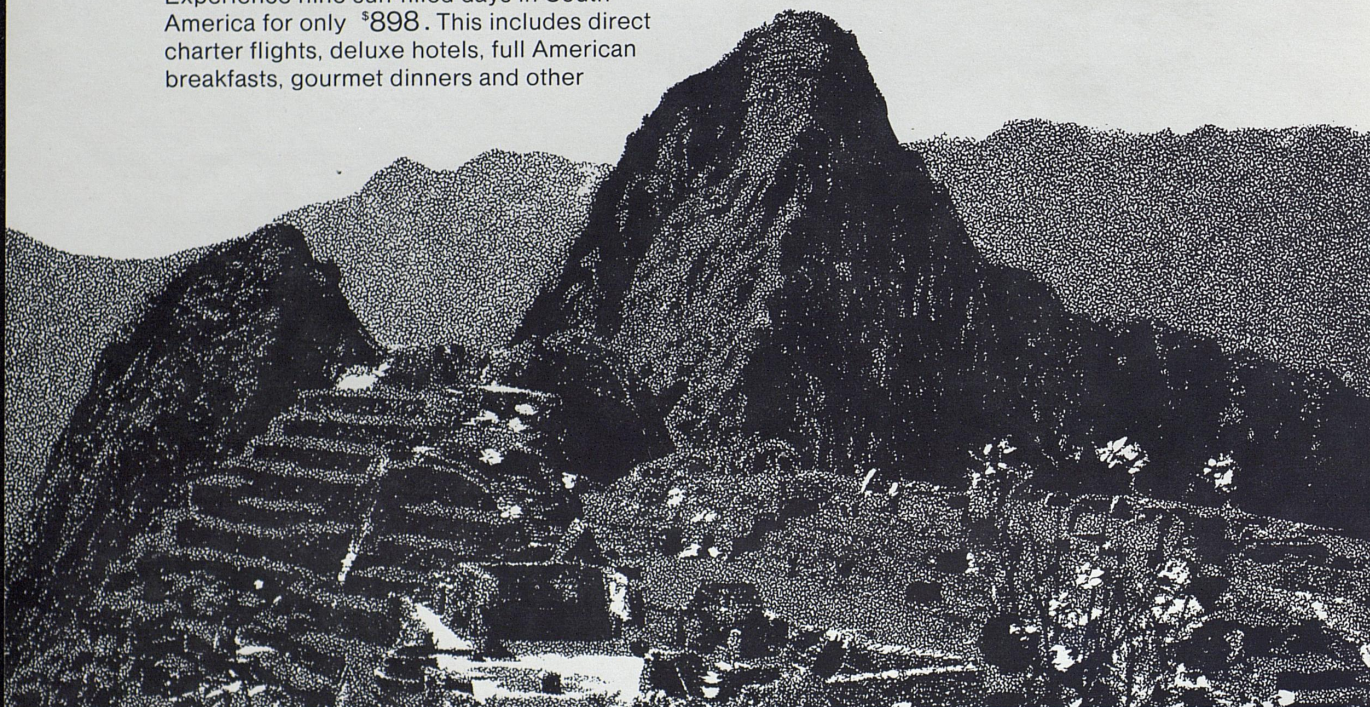

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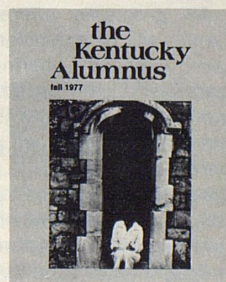
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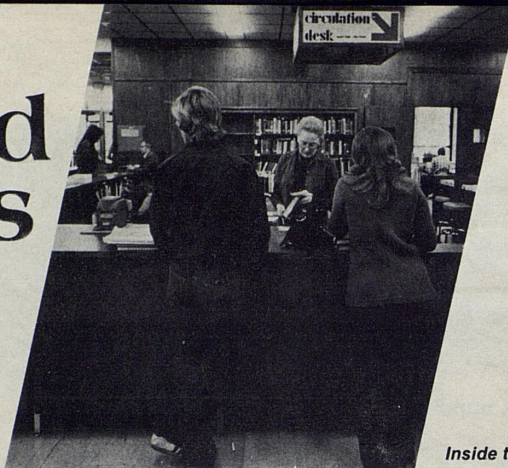

UK-NKU Establish Graduate Center

The University of Kentucky and Northern Kentucky University are cooperating in the establishment of a Graduate Center.

The Center will be located on the NKU campus and will offer both complete and partial graduate programs. Initial offerings will be in library science, educational administration and reading education.

"By working cooperatively through this Graduate Center, our two universities are seeking to meet the needs and interests of the people of Northern Kentucky for graduate programs that previously were not available," said UK President Otis A. Singletary.

The Center will be administered locally by NKU, while UK will have primary academic responsibility for the course offerings of the Center.

All programs offered through the Center will be extensions of regular UK campus-based offerings, and most courses will be taught by UK faculty members. Students taking courses through the Center will be able either to earn a masters degree or to complete a planned sequence of courses toward the degree, with the remaining courses to be taken on the Lexington campus.

Programs to be initiated in the fall include a portion of the program leading to the Master of Science degree in library science, a complete certification program in educational administration and four of the courses required for the reading component of the Master of Arts in Education degree.

The reading component courses may be applied by NKU graduate students to the master of arts in education degree offered by NKU.

\$2 Million Facility Planned for West Kentucky

The University will build a \$2 million Research and Education Center for agriculture at its Princeton substation in Western Kentucky, UK President Otis Singletary has announced.

"The Center," Dr. Singletary said, "will provide needed space for offices, meetings, and research and demonstration laboratories in an area where agricultural production has such an impact throughout Kentucky and even the nation."

Oran Little, UK associate dean for research in the College of Agriculture, noted that Western Kentucky produces 42 per cent of the state's corn, 92 per cent of its soybeans and 71 per cent of its wheat. Six of the state's top swine-producing counties are in Western Kentucky, and McCracken and Henderson counties are among the state's leading fruit and vegetable-producing areas.

A lot of the state's tobacco also is grown in that area.

The building to house the Research and Education Center will be a one-story structure containing about 33,000 square feet. A construction contract is expected to be awarded this fall, with completion of the project scheduled for the spring of 1979.

In addition to office space for Extension specialists and researchers, the Center will have laboratories identified with current and projected areas of research in both crops and livestock. For example, a laboratory for the analysis of soils is needed, Little said, to enhance the efficient use of fertilizer. Other laboratories will provide facilities for the analysis and measurement of pesticide resi-

dues and the identification of plant diseases and insects.

There also will be work done by UK at the new Center on design and testing of equipment for planting, harvesting and processing of crops and handling of animal feeds and wastes to promote further mechanization, Little said.

Library Associates Booking a Come Back

Books and manuscripts given to the University of Kentucky library over many years by UK alumnus W. Hugh Peal of Leesburg, Va., made up a special exhibition in the Department of Special Collections of the King Library North this summer.

The UK Library Associates honored Peal with a reception and presented him with a life membership in the newly-reactivated organization.

A native of Bandana, Ballard County, Peal was graduated from UK in 1922, then earned a law degree from England's Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar. He is a UK Fellow, holder of an honorary LID degree ('59) from UK, member of the Filson Club and a past director of UK Library Associates.

The Library Associates were first organized in 1954. The group helps to locate and acquire books, manuscripts, family papers, and other library materials that the University could not otherwise afford. Through their meetings, receptions, and exhibits The Library Associates promote the interests of the libraries and bring together library-minded persons in the Commonwealth.

Correspondence Program For Military in Top 15

Earl Pfanstiel, director of the Independent Study Program, says the office is among the top 15 in the nation offering college credit by correspondence to military personnel. More than 2,000 persons are taking correspondence courses this summer through the University's program. Enrollment during the regular academic year is more than 3,000. Most of the students going to college by mail,

however, are not military people. A majority of the students doing independent work also are full-time UK students, or are students attending another college in the state.

Membership categories include student, \$5; regular, \$10; family, \$25; sustaining, \$50; patron, \$100 or more; life, \$1000 or more. Many alumni are active in this group. Sam Cassidy '25 is president; Betty Kirwan 'AM, vice president. Other alumni on the executive committee are Jacqueline Bull '34, Charles W. Metcalf '39, Betty Tevis '46, and Paul Willis '63.

UK To Disseminate NASA Data to Business

Technical data contained in more than eight million reports and documents accumulated by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) became available August 1 to Kentucky industry and government.

Information generated through government contracts and paid for by the taxpayers is free. Fees are charged for specially requested computer time in private data banks, hard copy documents, or data analysis.

The State Technology Applications Program (STAP) is a joint effort between the University of Kentucky College of Business and Economics' Center for Public Affairs, and NASA.

UK/NASA STAP forms part of a non-profit technical and scientific information dissemination network involving eight industrial applications centers at universities across the nation. STAP, with a staff of six people, is headquartered in Kinkead Hall of the UK campus in Lexington. William Strong is project director. The

new program is administered through the offices of the Center for Public Affairs headed by Dr. Merlin Hackbart.

In addition to NASA, public and private research groups also contribute to the wealth of technical data. More than 60 different data banks are included in the program to bridge the gap between research and practical applications, Hackbart said. The program also draws upon experts from UK.

Strong said a survey of industry and government is being conducted to determine the need for technical information.

"We want to know exactly who needs what information and how the program can best deliver it," he said.

When asked for examples of how Kentuckians can use the information, Strong said a manufacturer might ask: "What changes in our production process could be made to save energy, materials, and time?"

He said another might be: "How can local governments improve the efficiency of their fire-fighting equipment?"

Strong said the world's largest technical data bank is now available to Kentuckians and "we hope they will take advantage of the opportunity. Those who want to know about the program should call us or write to us at this office." The number is (606) 258-4632. Video Programs On Discipline First in U.S.

Two videotape programs produced by the College of Education and the Office of Instructional Resources are believed to be the first on teacher discipline in the U.S.

The incidents portrayed in the programs represent very real classroom experiences ranging from tardiness to dope smoking; from absenteeism to alcoholism."

Both programs use the "trigger film" approach—short, open ended, provocative and critical incident vignettes which quickly focus viewer attention on specific topics and generate group discussion.

The first program, *Preventive Discipline*, examines the relationship between teacher behavior and discipline. It depicts assorted discipline problems and offers suggestions to the teacher for preventing discipline problems from arising.

The second program, *Teacher Values and Discipline*, concentrates on helping teachers clarify their values about enforcing rules.

The videotapes are now available on loan throughout the U.S., and a third program in the series is now in the planning state.

Never Too Late To Learn Effective Study Skills

It might be expected that students who enroll in the basic study skills course offered by the University Counseling Center would be new students, exposed for the first time to a college curriculum and higher education. But in fact, only 71 percent of those who take the non-credit course are new undergraduates. The other 29 percent are upperclassmen, graduates or unclassified students.

Study skills help has been provided by the Counseling Center since 1955, but last fall course offerings were increased from the consecutive six-week sessions

provided twice each semester to one six-week course and two ten-week courses — aimed at different segments of the student population.

The rationale for including study skills in the offering of counseling centers has been that students who have difficulties with reading and studying are often able students who are not achieving because personal difficulties interrupt the learning process. They are unable to concentrate, to organize their priorities, or to pass tests, because of a complex of personal concerns.

King Scholarship Fund Benefits from Book Sales

The Office of Minority Student Affairs has sponsored the publication of a 63-page book, "Seems Southern To We," which features contributions from a number of University minority students. The idea behind the book is "encouragement to young writers," said a spokesman for the sponsors.

There is poetry as well as essays, with the underlying theme of the effects of racism on young hearts and minds.

On sale at local bookstores, the project nevertheless is called a non-profit venture, with any funds over publications costs going to the Martin Luther King Scholarship Fund.

Student Center Bursting at Seams

The board of trustees has approved a proposal to expand the UK Student Center by 80,000 square feet at a cost of \$4.08 million.

Included in the expansion project will be space for arts and crafts programs, theatre arts programs, additional meeting facilities and expansion of University Bookstore.

The proposal will now be submitted for action to the state Council on Higher Education.

"Expansion of the Student Center is critically needed," said UK President Otis A. Singletary.

"The only major addition and renovation of the Student Center was in 1962 when our enrollment was only 9,190.

Today, we have more than 21,000 students, three-fourths of whom live off-campus, commute to school and depend on the Student Center for selected services."

The project, if approved by the Council, will be funded by a University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bond. To retire the bond and to cover increased operating expenses in the expanded facility, the student activity fee will be increased for the first time since 1962, from \$12 to \$22 per semester during the regular term and from \$6 to \$11 during the summer term for full-time students.

Part-time students will be charged an activity fee of approximately \$2 per credit hour. In addition, a charge for use of Student Center facilities by non-student groups will be levied.

"We appointed a combined student-staff committee last spring to conduct a campus-wide telephone survey of student opinions regarding the expansion project," said Jack C. Blanton, UK vice president for business affairs.

"It was the committee's finding that approximately 80 per cent of the student body favored the expansion of the Student Center and were willing to pay an increased student activity fee to finance the expansion."

Blanton noted that UK's student fee currently is lower than student fees charged by all ten of the University's benchmark institutions.

The proposal to expand the Student Center is the result of a feasibility study of Student Center needs conducted by a University task force last fall.

Searching for the Past

The University of Kentucky Athletics Association, in a move to upgrade its historical files, is seeking films, game programs, pictures and other memorabilia of past Wildcat teams and players.

Cliff Hagan, UK athletics director, said that over a period of years, especially prior to World War II, many records of UK athletics were lost or not kept properly.

He said films were stored in a rather haphazard fashion, or were lent out or given to players, kept by coaches, lost or destroyed in some manner.

Several months ago, all films in storage at the athletic offices were turned over to the archives in the Margaret I. King Library, where they were catalogued and stored in moisture-proof containers in a temperature-controlled room.

"By doing this," Hagan said, "we not only took steps to preserve the films, but we also made them available to researchers and other persons who might find their use of value."

A person wishing to view the films may do so by contacting the UK archivist.

Hagan said a former football player, in possession of the 1951 UK-Oklahoma Sugar Bowl film, returned the film to the athletic department, which in turn is having the film copied and will return the original to the former player.

"I want to stress," Hagan said, "that if someone has an old film and does not want to give it up, we would like to borrow it long enough to make a copy for our archives. We will not ask where that person got the film. Our concern is preserving its contents."

Along the same line, Hagan said the UK Sports Information Office two years ago turned over to the archives a large volume of football programs dating back to the early 1930's, along with scrapbooks on all UK sports dating back to the early 1950's.

"If anyone has any old programs, scrapbooks or other memorabilia that they wish preserved they should contact the UK Sports Information Office," Hagan said. "Too many records of our athletic history, especially prior to World War II, have been lost. We now have the means and the intention of doing a better job of preserving such records."

Hagan also pointed out that the UK Sports Information Office during the past few years has been building up its files on all players who have worn the "Big Blue."

"There is a constant demand for pictures and information on our players past and present," he said. "People ask about the Blandas, the Parillis, the Issels, the Fabulous Five, the Fiddlin Five, Rupp's Runts, and old-timers like Basil Hayden, "Shipwreck" Kelly, Leroy Edwards and many others.

"We want to be able to have the answers to their requests at our fingertips."

Horse Nutrition Program Gains Industry Acceptance

Industry acceptance of the University horse nutrition research program can be seen in the large number of calls received by UK specialists from horse farmers and from feed manufacturers for help in planning their horse nutrition programs.

Investigations into the nutritional needs of horses began at the University about ten years ago. Research has concentrated on the needs of young horses for growth, the processes by which horses extract energy from the feeds they eat and on the factors which influence horses' use of calcium and phosphorous.

An average of eight graduate students conduct the research while pursuing their own advanced degrees in the College of Agriculture.

Jett Donates FFA Memorabilia

Documents of the nationally-recognized Stamping Ground chapter of Future Farmers of America (FFA) in the 1930s have been presented to the King Library by Ivan Jett '74 H of Georgetown.

Jett was vocational education teacher at Stamping Ground in Scott County when the documents were collected. They include the reports of accomplishments of the chapter in the FFA national chapter contests of 1935, 1936 and 1937.

"The Stamping Ground FFA chapter won the national contests of 1937 and 1939," said Jett. "It was the only time that the same chapter twice won the national contest."

The FFA official scrapbook and Jett's own scrapbook of the period also are included in the donation. The scrapbooks contain hundreds of pictures.

Jett said that when he left the Stamping Ground school in 1940 the documents remained. The tornado of April, 1974, destroyed part of the school, but members of the chapter in the 1930s found the documents in the wreckage and contacted him.

Carriages & Trophies

The University of Kentucky has donated its collection of antique horse-drawn carriages to the new State Horse Park currently being constructed near Lexington.

The collection, consisting of 28 carriages, is valued at more than \$100,000 and is recognized as one of the most complete of its kind outside New York City.

The carriages were donated to UK in 1959 by Mrs. Pansy M. Grant, former owner of Spindletop Farm.

The University also has loaned on a permanent basis to the American Saddle Horse Museum, a statue and photographs of Roxie Highland, one of the all-time great saddle horses. The University also will loan the museum three trophies won by Roxie Highland and other items related to saddle horses.

The carriages and the items being loaned to the Saddle Horse Museum currently are being stored at UK's Spindletop Farm.

New Filters for Cigarettes

A filtering system in the process of being patented shows promise of removing carbon monoxide from cigarette smoke, and the developers, the staff at the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, say the system already had proved effective in reducing other potentially harmful gases inhaled by smokers.

National attention has shifted recently from tars and nicotine as the greater threats to health, to a variety of gases found in cigarette smoke, but work with gases has been getting more emphasis at the institute over the past two or three years. At least five researchers have been dealing with carbon monoxide, one of the most controversial of the cigarette gases.

Application for a patent on the filter idea is based on reductions in the smoke of such harmful compounds as hydrogen cyanide, aldehydes and amines.

Significant Activities Of Faculty and Staff

Steven A. Channing, history, has been given a Fulbright-Hays award by the

Board of Foreign Scholarships and the U.S. Department of State, and will lecture on American history and culture at the University of Genoa in Italy from January to June 1978.

Paul F. Parker, pharmacy, was awarded an honorary degree by the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science.

Louis Diamond, pharmacy, has been appointed to a two-year term on the Tobacco Working Group of the National Cancer Institute. The group is composed of scientists from private research institutions and foundations, academic institutions and the National Institute of Health.

George A. Digenis, pharmacy, has been reappointed to a year's term as associate scientist at the Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research in New York. He has just completed his first one-year term.

Judge T. Calton, University Hospital, has been named president-elect of the Kentucky Hospital Association.

Harry E. Moore, dentistry, has been appointed to the Governor's Economic Development Commission.

David Goldenberg, medicine, has been elected to the board of trustees of the Association of Community Cancer Centers.

Myron G. Sandifer, medicine, has been named a fellow in the American College of Physicians.

The Director's Message

I want to report to you—our stockholders—on some of the highlights for the alumni year 1976-77 and, indeed, some of our major concerns.

In terms of alumni activities, both within the state and out, this was a banner year for all of us. Thanks to the energies of our associate director, Bob Whitaker, and tremendous cooperation from a great host of volunteer club workers and alumni board members, 22 new alumni clubs were organized last year and the number of activities held by those clubs which have been in existence for a number of years were expanded significantly. The beginning of basketball play in Lexington's Rupp Arena gave cause for a series of alumni club nights in conjunction with that sports activity. Such club nights will again be held during the 1977-78 basketball season and each home game will find active members of this association enjoying the festivities as participating members of the local club.

Of course the highlight of the alumni year when measured strictly by attendance and enthusiasm was the weekend celebration of the Wildcat football team's participation in the post-season Peach Bowl. Every activity planned by the staff for the alumni was a "sold out" affair and unfortunately many friends were turned away for lack of space. Kentucky supporters at the Peach Bowl game may have set a new national record for tickets purchased by a participating bowl team. An estimated "Big Blue" crowd of some 37,000 fans jammed into breezy Atlanta Stadium to "assist" the Wildcats in their 21-0 shut out of North Carolina.

With a total staff of just 13 employees, it is no secret that much of the work of the Alumni Association is done by volunteers—you and your classmates and friends who feel the urge to participate for one reason or another. The vitality of the UK Alumni Association, in great measure, depends upon a magnificent army of volunteers who make phone calls, lick stamps, provide financial support, preside at meetings, host parties and luncheons, attend called meetings. We, at the King Alumni House, hope that the variety of benefits and programs offered by this organization are both satisfying and inducive of your support. We are cognizant of the fact that these benefits alone precipitate some participation and are, in reality, a trade-off for your dues money. But we also know that most persons volunteer their help because they take a great pride in this university and want this institution to succeed in all of its goals. I think there is a simple rationale: the better our university becomes, the better we, as graduates and former students, appear which in turn intensifies our pride. Fortunately for UK, we have a great host of people who believe in this university's potential. For example, 292 alumni of the university have been recognized as Fellows since 1967. Their dollar commitment to UK is just short of \$10 million. Getting closer to home, we know that 18,326 people are paid members of the UK Alumni Association. And, while we are never satisfied with that figure, we give thanks that those people are interested enough to join and participate and carry the major load of financing this organization. We are also ever mindful that the number of members in total and based on percentage keeps increasing from year-to-year. Some day additional ways will be thought of to adequately recognize alumni volunteers and other true supporters of this university. Mentioning only a few names in the limited space I have here would do injustice to the many who have contributed so earnestly. We trust that the true volunteer does not need this kind of publicity and knows of our gratitude.

Our publications program which consists mainly of two quarterly items, this magazine and the *Open Door* newspaper, is making giant strides in keeping all alumni informed of not only alumni activities, but University programs and personalities as well. While publication program costs have increased about fifty percent during the past three years, we still believe that your money is well invested and spent wisely. The newspaper, usually

eight pages, costs less than four cents a copy to print and the magazine costs only 28 cents per copy. I think you will agree that this phase of alumni programming is in excellent shape. Our biggest concern in the publications area is not printing costs, per se, but mailing and addressing costs. Postage for all types of printed material is constantly increasing and, as most of you are aware, guaranteed delivery is a thing of the past. In fiscal 1976-77 your Association spent over \$27,000 for postage and addressing to send out over 700,000 pieces of mail.

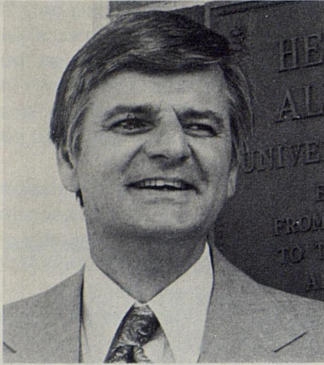
With regard to this problem area, two items, I believe, are worthy of further discussion. You—the reader—as well as all alumni of the University must make every effort to keep the association informed of address changes. Whenever a letter or periodical is mailed to an incorrect address and the post office returns to us a forwarding address, a charge of 25 cents is made. Whenever mail is returned without a forwarding address, then the records department sends a card to acquaintances or parents seeking a new address. Each such inquiry costs twenty-two cents in postage. These figures are more acute when one considers that some 30,000 address changes are made annually. It may be that many alumni are not at all interested in receiving mail of any type from either the Alumni Association or University departments. If that is the case, then we shall be glad to remove them from the mailing lists and thereby save postage and addressing costs which are paid from dues income.

The second item of concern follows closely. While this office is quite aware that success of club-sponsored activities is often measured in quantitative terms, we are also aware that our operating budget is made possible by those good alumni and friends who choose to become members and thereby pay dues! I, personally, have severe conflicts with the idea that all alumni ought to be permitted to participate in Association-sponsored and financed activities—especially when I have first-hand knowledge that only 28 percent of the total alumni body pay dues. It would seem to me that the people who pay the "rent" ought to live in the "house". On the other hand, should such a strict policy be enforced hundreds of graduates would never be notified about class reunions or some other important activity which has significant meaning to both the graduate and the University.

If one of the goals of the Alumni Association is to make friends for the University of Kentucky then some compromise is necessary. With the knowledge that 32 percent of the total budget of the UK Alumni Association comes from the University's General Fund (nine of the thirteen salaries of full-time staff members are paid from this fund), I am committed to the belief that all alumni—dues payers or not—are entitled to some benefits. However, wishing to protect the investment made by our stockholders, I am just as committed to the belief that major benefits such as athletic tickets, participation in foreign or domestic group tours, membership in Spindletop Club, alumni club bus trips and others ought to be reserved for those who "pay the rent."

If we adhere to the latter belief, then we will cater to the needs of our members in increasing order. Notices of club meetings will be mailed first class to the active members whenever the situation demands, but notices to non-members—if and when notified of such meetings—will be handled as bulk-rate mail. Tickets to athletic events such as club nights in Rupp Arena, club trips for Wildcat football games and the like will be distributed by the local club leadership to members only. Book discounts will continue to be given to members and other ways of benefitting the dues payer will be a constant concern of the staff.

I apologize for perhaps over-reacting to fiscal matters, but as I review monthly and annual reports prepared by the staff and finance committee of the alumni board, I realize that these money matters are not to be overlooked. The rate of inflation as it pertains to operating costs, the leveling of interest and dividend income from life membership investments, the competition for the entertainment dollar and the increasing demands for volunteer support of organizations such as ours are very real concerns—almost problems!

Alumni Relations Programs

Annual Meeting and Reunion Banquet. Former Gov. A. B. "Happy" Chandler was the guest speaker at the annual meeting and reunion banquet. More than 300 persons attended the May meeting which saluted the reunion classes of 1912, 1917, 1922, 1927, 1932, 1937 and 1942. Each reunion group held individual activities. Other activities for the weekend included a campus tour, viewing of a newly-produced film "The Commonwealth Is the Campus" and racing at both Keeneland and the Red Mile.

Alumni travelling the greatest distance to attend the Spring reunion weekend were 1912—James W. Carey of Exeter, Calif.; 1917—Carlyle Bennett of Adairville, Ga.; 1922—Harry Whaley of Ft. Myers, Fla.; 1927—James L. Brady Jr. of Lake Worth, Fla.; 1932—Peter D. Giachini of Maywood, Ill.; 1937—Thomas Nichols of Albuquerque, N. M., and 1942—E. R. Hermann of Winnetka, Ill.

Athletics tickets. The opportunity to purchase tickets to UK football and basketball games would probably rank as the number one benefit of membership among most alumni. With UK's success in both sports, the ticket market is a very tight one despite modern facilities which seat 58,000 football fans and 23,600 basketball fans. Before the season even begins tickets to all games are virtually sold-out.

It is estimated that more than 6,100 different members of the Association saw either a basketball or football game through distribution of the Alumni Association's allotment in 1976-77. Additionally, several hundred alumni members established football season ticket priorities and 800 ordered tickets for the UKIT basketball games.

The availability of tickets and the assignment of seat location are controlled exclusively by the UK Athletics Association.

Alumni clubs sharing in the Association's football ticket allotment in 1976-77 were Christian County; Cumberland Valley; Mason County; Trigg County; Detroit, Mich.; Greater Atlanta, Ga.; Knoxville, Tenn.; Nashville, Tenn., and Washington, D.C. Football tickets were allotted to three reunion groups also.

Basketball tickets were distributed to these clubs: Ashland-Boyd, Big Sandy, Bourbon, Carter, Carroll, Century, Christian, Cumberland, Fayette, Franklin, Jefferson, Madisonville-Hopkins, Mason, Northern Kentucky, Owensboro, Trigg, Union, Warren, Winchester-Clark, Nashville and Knoxville, Tenn.

Special mailings were sent to inform alumni members only of the opportunity to establish a football season ticket priority and to purchase tickets to the University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament in basketball.

Alumni were able to follow the football Wildcats to the post-season Peach Bowl in Atlanta. Alumni Association-sponsored events included a charter round-trip package, a "Welcome Wildcats" reception at which the UK-Notre Dame basketball game was shown on closed-circuit television, a pre-game brunch and a New Year's Eve dinner-dance. Demands for tickets far exceeded available hotel space for all activities.

Post-season basketball play led alumni to Philadelphia, Pa., and College Park, Md. A pre-game reception was held in Philadelphia.

"It is estimated that more than 6,100 different members of the Association saw either a basketball or football game through distribution of the Alumni Association's ticket allotment in 1976-77."

Clubs. Alumni and friends of the University are introduced to the activities of the National Association through the alumni club program. Alumni clubs, organized by geographical areas throughout the country and state, bring together the organized efforts of all UK alumni, encourage participation in the University, and foster association among University of Kentucky graduates.

Through alumni clubs, the University communicates with its alumni, and alumni relay feedback information to the University. The alumni club is the University in a specific locality. Every club's goals are to provide alumni activities that will stimulate interest in UK and to interpret University achievements and needs to the alumni and people of the local community.

Clubs are managed by a volunteer group of alumni under the guidance of the Alumni Association. The credit for the success or failure of the clubs rests on the shoulders of these volunteers. Directing the activities of an alumni club is not an easy assignment, but the current alumni officers have done an outstanding job.

Club presidents are being asked to increase their efforts to develop volunteers and future leaders, therefore, insuring the continuity of their local club. They are finding that the most effective method is assigning worthwhile projects, activities, and tasks to as many volunteers as possible.

The past year there was an increase in alumni clubs and activities. The size of clubs range from 50 to over 3,000 members. You automatically become a member of your local club by joining the UK National Alumni Association.

Club activities are varied. There are football TV get-togethers and club nights in Rupp Arena, bus trips to athletic events, tennis parties, dances, riverboat cruises, pre-game buffets at the King Alumni House, student recruiting and admission nights, scholarship programs and speakers from the University. The highlight of out-of-state alumni club activities are the annual Kentucky Derby Day parties.

Club leaders are listed by locale on page 19. Feel free to contact them for assistance when making a move or changing employment. Ask them about their club's activities. Tell them what your interests are in relation to alumni work for the University. Alumni clubs are great avenues for renewing old friendships and meeting new people.

If there is no club in your area, contact Bob Whitaker, associate director, UK Alumni Association, 400 Rose Street, Lexington, Ky. 40506 and he will help you organize.

Career Nights. The need for career nights received renewed emphasis this year. The McLean County Alumni Club put together a special program for area high school students and UK students who were home on spring break. The UK Admissions office and the Jefferson, Fayette, Ashland and Owensboro clubs co-sponsored programs for entering freshmen students. The aims of such programs are to acquaint the young people and their parents with the University and its programs and to talk with alumni concerning the relationship between academic programs and real life work.

Creason Memorial Lecture Series. Through contributions to the Annual-Giving Fund from alumni and friends and fund-raising efforts on the part of the Jefferson County Alumni Club, \$25,000 was raised for a matching gift from the Bingham Enterprises Foundation to support the memorial lecture series named for journalism alumnus Joe Creason '40. The annual event was initiated in April by newspaper columnist and television commentator Jack Kilpatrick. Kilpatrick met with students during the afternoon and gave a public lecture to a standing room only crowd. In attendance at the first lecture was Joe's widow, Sheila, sons Joe, Jr. and Bill and Joe Jr.'s wife. Barry Bingham Sr. and UK vice president Ray Hornback also participated in the program.

Fall Reunions. Three reunion functions were held during the football season. The class of '61 met following the UK-Oregon State game; the classes of '43, '44, '45 and '46, following the UK-Penn State game, and the class of 1956, following the UK-Florida game. All classes had a social hour and dinner at Spindletop Hall.

Government. There was only one change in the by-laws governing the Alumni Association during the past year. Article VI was amended to read:

"Any elected director who moves from the geographic district from which elected shall vacate the directorship. Should such a vacancy occur, another member of the Association who resides in the district shall be nominated by the national president to fulfill the unexpired portion of that three-year term. Such nomination will be ratified by the Executive Committee of the Board. All other vacancies created by reasons of death, resignation or failure to meet attendance requirements will be filled in like manner."

Merchandising. The Association introduced a new merchandising plan in cooperation with the Kennedy Book Store. A brochure describing available merchandise was mailed to members of the Association last fall.

A limited edition "Silver Scenes" etching of the Administration Building was designed by the Franklin Mint and offered to members. A preliminary count shows that 258 silver scenes were purchased. This is the second Franklin Mint project offered by the Association. The first was a sterling silver plate with a Memorial Hall etching.

Sales of other merchandise during the fiscal year were: alumni chairs, 21 netting \$616.92 to the Association; *Cat's Pause* sports newspaper, 1,287 subscriptions of which 1,060 were bought by members of the Association at a discount, proceeds to the Association were \$1,406.37, and Administration Building print by C. G. Morehead, 106 sold resulting in \$2,120 for the Association scholarship fund.

Publications. Circulation for *the Open Door* newspaper rose to nearly 58,000 households. For the third straight year, the per copy printing cost continued to decrease and stood at 3.7 cents in '76-'77. Printing cost for *The Kentucky Alumnus* magazine, circulation nearly 15,000 households, remained steady at 27.6 cents per copy. Postage charges, however, increased considerably causing a severe drain in the publication's programs total budget allotment.

Tours. The Alumni Association's tour package increased 33 percent to eight trips while participation in the program went

up 68 percent. During the '76-'77 fiscal year, 466 members took advantage of Association-sponsored tours. The most popular trip was an eight-day excursion to Moscow and Leningrad enjoyed by 180 alumni. This trip will be repeated January 30-February 7, 1978. Second in popularity was the London destination with 148 participants. Other tours went to Alaska; Munich, Vienna and Budapest; Austria-Alps; Trans-Panama and Rhine River.

Tours planned for 1978 are: Rio de Janeiro January 28-February 5; Moscow & Leningrad January 30-February 7; Great Britain May 30-June 5; Scandinavia June 28-July 10 and Tokyo, Hong Kong and Kyoto, August 19-September 2.

Honoree A. B. Chandler

I could talk for many, many minutes about this gentleman's credentials—but I will not. What can you say about a man whose name is synonymous with Kentucky? He has long been active in the affairs of the University—chairman of the Board of Trustees, for example. But many consider his best accomplishment on behalf of the University to be our University Medical Center which bears his name. His constant devotion, unabashed love and deep-felt loyalty to UK are legend. I am happy to make this presentation to the Honorable A. B. "Happy" Chandler.



Honoree Charles Landrum Jr.

I have worked with this gentleman for several years on the Board of Directors—and I must admit that it takes me a while to understand him—he's a lawyer. Kidding aside. He first sat on the Board of Directors as a representative of the College of Law for two years. Then he was elected to represent District VI—Lexington and he gave us another six years of service. In 1974 he was National President of our Alumni Association. During his term of office he was instrumental in the commissioning of Mr. Morehead—the Kentucky artist of property—to make a print of the Administration Building. To date, your association has realized more than \$7000 earmarked for scholarships from that project. Also during his term the Association purchased "Old Blue" for the University to use in conducting campus tours. This tour program received national recognition last year from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education. A graduate of the class of 1942, a senior partner in the firm of Landrum, Patterson and Dickey, married to an alumna—the former Ruth Bradford—Charles Landrum, Jr.



Honoree John Nichols

This gentleman is an exemplary alumnus! His interest in our University has been demonstrated time and again through his work with the Alumni Association. 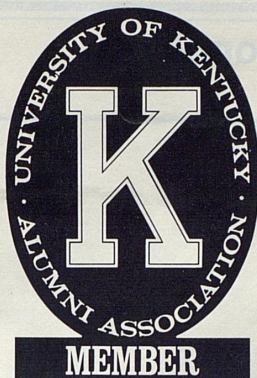

MEMBERSHIP

Membership in the University of Kentucky Alumni Association continues to grow. This past year a total of 18,326 members were on our rolls, an all-time high, indicating increased interest in the university and our Association programs.

One of the largest membership organizations in the Southeast, the total number of life members reached 4,497 as of June 30, 1977 and during the past fiscal year, 395 alumni and friends joined as life members bringing the total life membership roster to almost one-fourth of the Association's membership. A total of 105 annual memberships were converted to life memberships. In addition, 3,918 new annual members joined our ranks.

Twelve benefits of membership are now offered. This past year a major new benefit was initiated when the Association began Club Nights in Rupp Arena, our new 23,600 seat basketball coliseum. Members in active alumni club areas purchased 3,600 tickets.

Last month members of the Association were sent a calendar of events for September through December listing more than 60 different activities.

A new car decal was designed for both annual and life members. The "block" K became slim and modern in an oval setting. Additional decals are available from the Alumni Association's membership coordinator.

The Alumni Book Purchase Plan is the most successful of its kind in the nation. Up to 30 percent discount is offered on books published by the University Press of Kentucky and sales to date amount to \$60,000 with a savings of \$18,000 to members! Many books are of regional and historical interest to UK alumni.

Spindletop Hall, our beautiful alumni-faculty club on the Iron Works Road, offers excellent dining and recreational facilities to members. The club now maintains ten tennis courts, five swimming pools and a picnic area. Alumni membership increased this past year to 1,400.

Alumni continue to use the free borrowing privileges at all university and community college libraries. The King Library on the main campus ranks 14th in the nation.

Membership fees in the Association once again held the line. Annual membership fees remain at \$10 for an individual and \$12 for husband and wife. Life membership fees are \$175, individual, and \$200, husband and wife, if paid in full. A five-year life membership installment plan is offered to individuals for \$225 and a joint membership at \$250. Payments of \$45 or \$50 are made annually. However, if an installment life membership contract is paid in full prior to the end of the five-year period, the amount due will be reduced by \$10 per year for each year of pre-payment.

All graduates and former students are invited to join our growing ranks. Associate membership is offered to non-alumni friends of the University at the same fees stated above and we welcome them at all functions.

Approximately 70 percent of our members reside in Kentucky with 30 percent out-of-state. They live in all counties of the state, in every state of the union and many foreign countries.

"Total yield on the life membership investment account during 1976-77 was 5.3 percent. Total income for the year was \$22,582.94. During the fiscal year, \$50,000 was transferred to the portfolio for investment."

"Total revenues of the UK Alumni Association increased \$74,000 while operating expenses rose \$69,000."

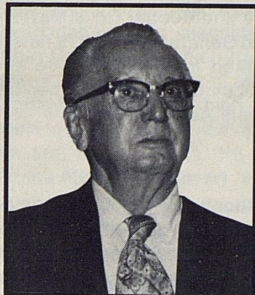

Wilkey on the Scene When Blue Jeans Fad, Disbursements Audits Begin

Clifton C. Wilkey '28 is a man that has overcome numerous handicaps only to succeed in a very unusual profession.

Wilkey was born, November 11, 1904 in Marshall County. His early years of schooling were at Calvert City, Marshall County. He attended high school at Clay Kentucky High School.

He entered the University of Kentucky in 1924, facing circumstances that might make the ordinary person give up . . . but not Clifton Wilkey. His finances were such that he had to work his way through college despite his handicap, caused from a "cut spinal cord" in 1919, leaving him 100 percent paralyzed. According to Wilkey, he recovered partially making it possible for him to obtain a position with the Lexington-Herald Leader Co. delivering newspapers. The University issued him a special permit to ride a bicycle to deliver the papers.

Wilkey entered the College of Engineering but soon realized that he would not be able to continue in this field due to the partial handicap. By this time, the commerce department had opened up and he decided that mathematics was the answer to a professional career that would be more compatible with his physical abilities. He graduated with a BS in commerce in 1928.

Upon receiving his degree, Wilkey accepted a position with Ernst & Ernst, an international accounting firm in Memphis. He remained with the firm for five years. In 1929, he left Ernst & Ernst due to the "stock crash". During the depression it was almost impossible for a CPA to get a job, forcing these professional people into other fields. Wilkey commented, "There were CPAs pumping gas in filling stations for \$15.00 a week". It was at this time that he started his own business. He was the originator of "disbursement audits" with more than 600 clients in 42 states. He concluded that there was a market for this service by "observing what was needed by clients and other business firms". The purpose of his business was to discover why many clients were "losing money" and "going broke" and to help turn their businesses into profitable concerns. For a time during World War II, he was a government auditor.

Wilkey claims that he started the "fad" of school children wearing jeans . . . "when crossing a footlog on the way to high school, I fell into the creek. Instead of returning home for my only suit to dry, I went to the store and fitted myself with overalls, blue shirt and a matching overall jacket. Before the month had ended, every boy in school had followed my dress. The principal of the school contacted my parents and asked that they have me return to my dress suit. Some years later, I was talking to a client in Kansas City, makers of the Lee Jeans, and I asked him who had started the fad. He said that it was started in western Kentucky in the early "twenties".

Clifton Wilkey is a member of the Calvary Baptist Church, the Lexington Kiwanis Club and a life member of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association. He resides at 148 Surfside Drive in Lexington. His activities are limited due to problems with his eyesight and hearing, but he still manages to keep busy experimenting in his workshop and has a patent on the "Wilkey Cross", an attache carrier for handicapped persons. Wilkey is presently compiling information for a book that he plans to write on his unusual occupation which would include "200 ways a client can lose profit".

Wilkey feels that he has made a contribution to the business world by maintaining high standards. He commented that he felt his success came as a result of a code of ethics given to him by his father which was, "always be honest; always be truthful; and don't be afraid of hard work".—R.H.

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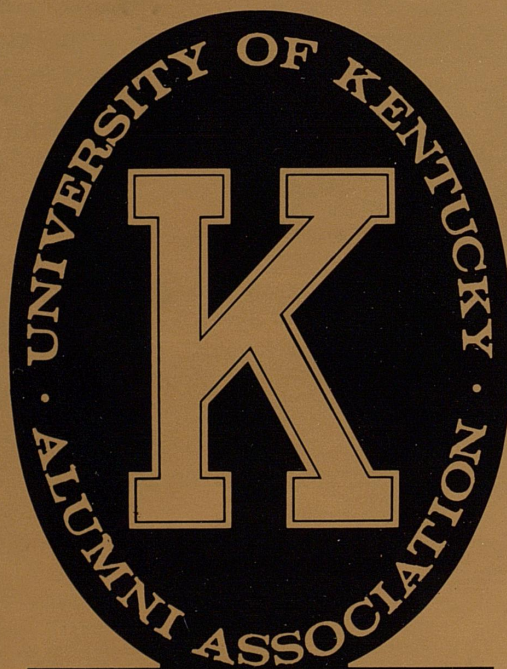
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
