Gymnasium
Class schedule

Prof. White as chairman also of Com. upon schedule of gymnasium class work, reported that his com. had met and arranged a schedule, which had been approved by President Patterson, and had been handed to the Director of the gymnasium

A. & M. College of Kentucky, December 13th., 1901.

The following recommendations have been adopted by the Committee appointed by the President on the 6th., inst to prepare a schedule for instruction in Military Science and for class instruction in the Gymnasium for the remainder of the current year.

1. Divide the Battalion into two sections, A. and B.
2. Section A. shall be instructed in Military Science on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and section B. on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.
3. Divide the entire student body into ten classes, the first eight to be composed of the male students and the last two of the female students.
4. These ten classes shall be instructed on the days and at the hours hereinafter indicated.

Prof. Miller presented to the faculty a suggestion for a summer school to be held in this college. He believed that such a summer school might profitably be undertaken here, with the aid of our instructors and assistants, and that many teachers of the state might be glad of an opportunity to avail themselves of such a ^{school} opportunity; he thought that such a summer school would increase the popularity of the college throughout the state, and also be the means of making it much better known; it would furthermore give our assistants helpful experience in teaching, would increase their incomes, and thereby ultimately raise the standard of ability among them.

Prof. Miller referred also to the fact that the State Teachers association would meet in Lexington next June, and expressed the hope that as many as possible of the members of this faculty would be present and attend the meetings.

Upon motion of Prof. Pence seconded by Prof. Kastle it was ordered

Further remarks generally favoring the idea were made by Profs. Pence, Brooks, Kastle & Miller.

The Chair appointed upon this committee Profs. Miller, Brooks and Roark.
