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Med School Again

When the current controversy was dragged up over entrance of UK pre-medical graduates into the University of Louisville medical school, some students were asking why our University officials had little to say about the situation.

Why should they have any statements to make? Neither they nor UL officials are provoking any quarrel.

The whole discussion, arising from the discovery that five non-recommended UK graduates are enrolled in the med school, seems to be a rebash of this summer's brief report.

Any new entrance requirements for the University of Louisville will have to come from the University of Louisville. It's their business.

It is to be hoped, however, that the system will be worked out to the best advantage of UK, UL, and Kentuckians who may need medical attention any time in the future.

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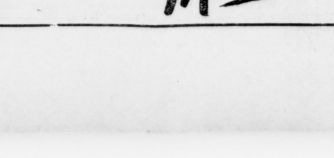

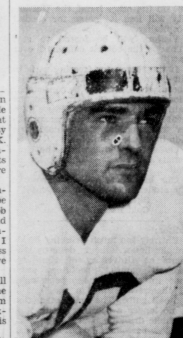
Georgia Gridders Out For Revenge

Time: 12:30 p.m.
Scene: University of Georgia's locker room. Wally Butts, Georgia's head football coach is speaking to his players who are gathered around him in a big circle.

BUTTS: All right, boys, sit down and take it easy for a few minutes. At 2 o'clock we go to work. You know who we are playing this afternoon. You also remember last season when we went up to Lexington, following our win over LSU, that Kentucky team just simply beat the 7 out of us and we took a 2-0 drubbing. That's not going to happen again today. We were too cocky last season. This time we know better. Now let's go over that lineup of Kentucky once more.

RAUCH (the quarterback): According to the papers, that Utkinli was the playing today.

BUTTS: Don't be too surprised if he gets in. You know how Bryant has with the cryin' lower. Course they reserves, Ford and Wolkie, are there.



DOCTOR FERRELL, 210-pound right tackle, played one of the best games of his collegiate career, last weekend against Ole Miss. Ferrell got several armloads of tackles throughout the game, and was the Rebels' big money wrench in the line. He's a senior; was an all state footballer at Richmond's Madison High.

HARTMAN (backfield coach): Boys, you won't be so tough today as he was last year. Against Ole Miss he showed just average speed, although he did average over four yards per run.

BUTTS: Yeah, and our scouts said that Boller, the left half, only made half yards in five tries in the Rebel game last week. Boller can be dangerous at times, but he hasn't shown much at all this season.

HARTMAN: This here Lee Truman, the number one fullback, is the biggest around. He is great on the defense. . . doesn't run the ball much, fortunately for us. How is another runner to watch out for, but he doesn't get to carry the ball too much either. How is plenty sharp on the pass defense, and ain't it rather weak at defense, but he can sure hit the leather on the offense. I rate him faster than Phelps. . . Judging by the first two games this season.

BUTTS: And listen, boys, don't let this little fellow Jamerson get away. He has plenty of guts and drive and hates to be stopped. I rate him as only 5-8 but a toughie, and a shifty runner to boot.

RAUCH: How about their quarterback? Blanda is back again this year, but I don't know about this guy, Gentilo, who played pretty much against Miss.

BUTTS: From my reports Blanda played a stinky game last Saturday. He fumbled, passed poorly and even his punting was off. But, lawd, he might be as hot as a pistol. That is, . . . ya never can tell about this here game. Blanda won't be under half the pressure today as last week playin' before a home crowd. He might just run back and throw all day. But we have had enough drills on pass defense to stop them. Gentilo is rather inexperienced and, although, he can be a wicked pass at times, this kid is liable to call some bad plays and we can then capitalize on them. We'll just have to play for the yards for those Cats start to get rough.

BUTTS: What do you think, "Whit," you've scouted Kentucky twice?

J. B. WHITWORTH (scout and line coach): Well, as I said last Monday, the Wildcats miss Rhoads, Serrin and Lair plenty! They stopped the Xavier running attack swell, but Ole Miss was just too damn tough for the Cats, that's all. I hope it's the same way this afternoon out there. . . just git in there and rush, rush and rush. The Rebels several times rushed Blanda and Gentilo and as a result their passing was pretty poor. That is what we have to do today.

BUTTS: How about the ends?

WHITWORTH: Naturally ole Walt Jones will be a tough baby to keep down. He has looked very good in both games this season and is the captain of UK for today, which should make him extra rough out there. Zaranka, like Jones, is 6'4" and can really slug passes well. After that, the Cats haven't much at all.

WEYMAN SELLERS (the other co-captain): Those tackles on Kentucky aren't too deep either, are they, Whit?

WHITWORTH: No they aren't. Bob Cain is mighty rough and will probably give you linemen a busy afternoon. Doc Purcell and this big McDermott blow hot and cold. Another, Frank Smotherman, has been injured and might not play, but he is darn good when he's right.

BUTTS: From what I hear, those guards aren't too much. That is where we are going to run most of our line plays. . . right over guard.

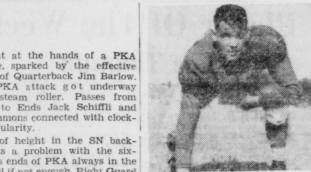

That is Lee Truman, junior fullback from Owensboro. Not only was he the only man to score against Ole Miss, but he was one of the leading defensive stars in the Wildcats' losing battle against the defending SEC champs.

Until his junior year Lee was a member of the high school band and marched up and down the gridiron playing a trumpet at halftime. At the suggestion of several friends he tried out for the team and made it.

Before long he was a member of the starting eleven. In his senior year he won All-State honors and was named as Kentucky's representative on the mythical All-Southern team, after scoring 20 touchdowns to lead his team to an undefeated season.

Last year Johnny Rauch completed 110 passes for 1,542 yards to tie an All America selection. Rauch turned up at Georgia four years ago as a captain and fullback of a high school team that didn't win a game in 1944. In his freshman year, Wally Butts worked him hard and developed one of the top T quarterbacks in the South.

As a sophomore, he teamed with Charley Trippi and guided Georgia to an unbeaten, untied season which wound up with a Sugar Bowl victory. He hit 40 receivers in 97 tries and finished with 818 yards total offense.

Rauch has been the All-Conference quarterback for the last two seasons and is almost a certainty for the honor again this year.

He's 21, 6', 185 pounds, a good punter, although somewhat overshadowed by his teammate, Joe Ger-

ry, a slow runner, and a great passer. He has averaged 46 minutes per game in his three seasons as a Bulldog.

An all-around athlete, he set a prep school record in Philadelphia by scoring 77 points in a basketball game. He has not played on the gym floor for Georgia but did play baseball and was the first man to ever hit a ball over the distant rightfield fence of the Ag Hill diamond at UG.

Married to an Athens, Ga., girl, Rauch is the father of a ten-month-old daughter. He plans to play professional ball and then coach.

If the underdog Wildcats can rush this passer as Chattanooga did three weeks ago, Kentucky may repeat their spectacular win of last year, when UK won 26-0.

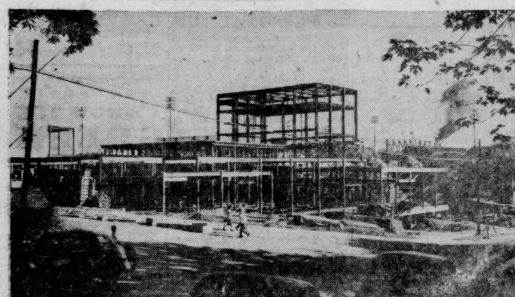
