

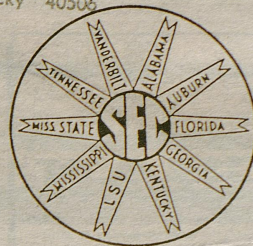

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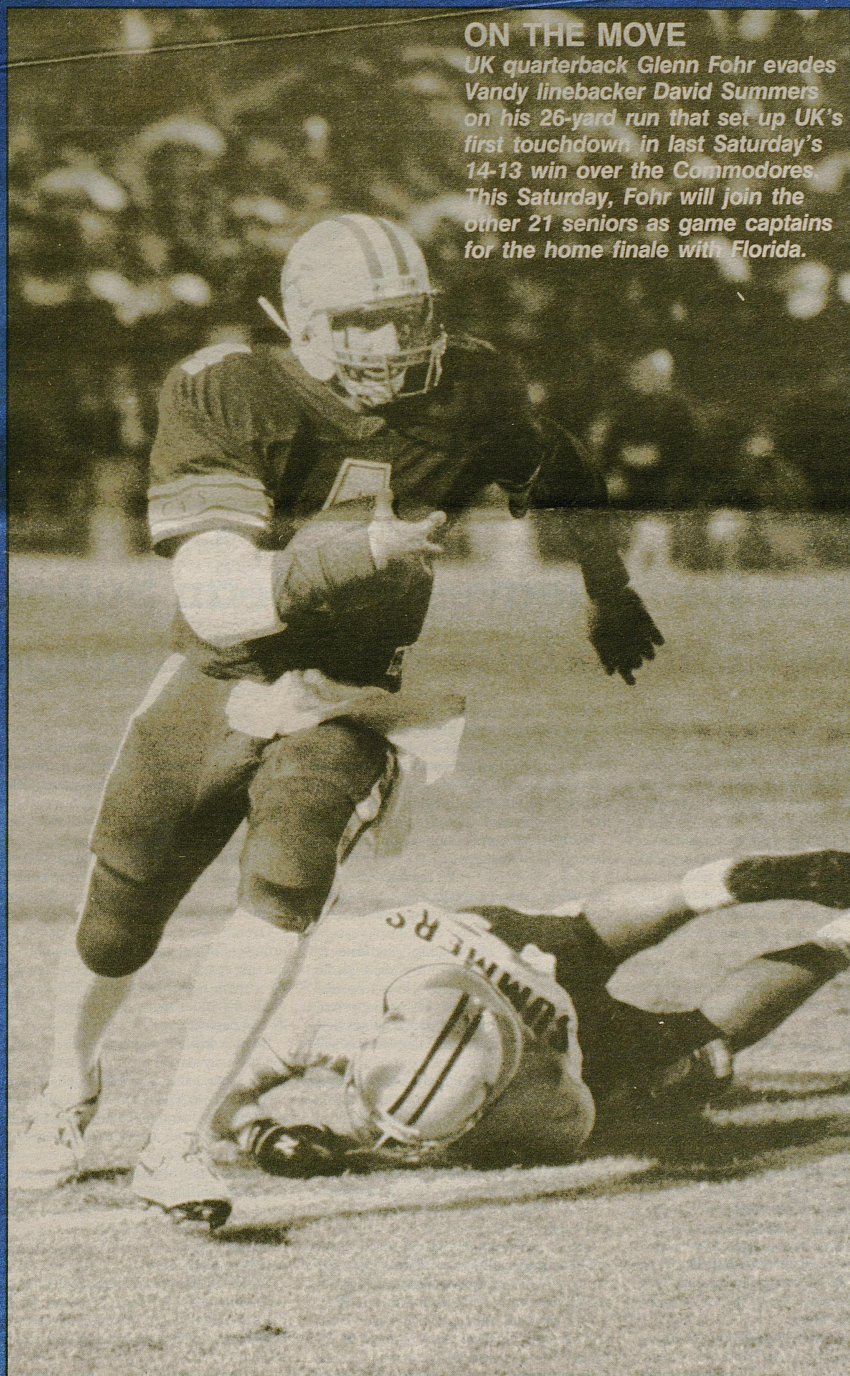

Shawn Kemp leaves UK; Sean Sutton injured during Blue-White scrimmage

Shawn Kemp, who police identified pawn-ing two stolen golden chains, has decided to leave the University of Kentucky.

Kemp, sitting out this season because of Proposition 48, will play next season for Trinity Valley Junior College in Athens, Texas.

"I'm fine and I'm doing real well and looking forward to going to Texas," Kemp told Lexington television station WLEX.

He plans on staying at Trinity for one season and then going to a major Division I institution. He also did not rule out the possibility of coming back to UK.

In a prepared statement, Sutton said: "We are sorry to see him go but we wish him the best of luck in junior college and all of his future endeavors."

No official charges were issued against Kemp.

Eddie Sutton's Kentucky Wildcat squad ran into more bad luck in its first Blue-White scrimmage last Tuesday, losing Sean Sutton for three weeks because of a broken right cheek bone.

Sutton, who was accidentally hit by a Derrick Miller elbow, underwent successful surgery Saturday and could possibly be back as early as the Alaskan Shootout. However, he will miss UK's opening game against Duke in the Hall of Fame Classic later this month in Springfield, Mass.

Team doctor Michael Ray said the injury was similar to Eric Manuel's facial mishap. Manuel suffered his injury a couple of weeks ago in a pickup game.

In UK's first scrimmage at Louisville's

Freedom Hall: freshman Richie Farmer hit a 14-foot straight away jumper at the buzzer gave the White team a 67-65 victory over the Blues. Leading the White team was freshman Chris Mills, who poured in 21 points while grabbing 14 rebounds. "Chris doesn't play like a freshman," Sutton said afterward. "He's had that competition in the summer-time (in Los Angeles)."

Hoping that he's finally regained the confidence he had as a freshman, junior guard Derrick Miller added 15 points and a team-high eight boards.

LeRon Ellis, the leading candidate to replace Rob Lock, scored a game-high 26 points, hitting on 12 of 22 shots from the field. Sophomore Reggie Hanson surprised the 9,000 fans on hand with a 20-point performance. Sutton later noted that Hanson will play a big role in UK's season.

Hanson "is a key to this club. He's a better player than he has shown because he hasn't had a chance to show it," said the UK head coach. "He's a good defensive player and a very good shooter out to 17 feet."

Other scorers in double figures were Mike Scott (Whites), 12 points; Deron Feldhaus (Whites) 10 points; and John Pelphey (Blues) 10 points.

One of the disappointing aspects of UK's initial scrimmage was the crowd. The 9,500 estimated fell way short of the 18,127 who attended last year's workout at Freedom Hall.

"It's certainly much smaller than a year ago," Sutton indicated. "but that's to be expected. We had a seasoned club then with the expectation of a good season. This year everybody's holding their breath with their fingers crossed."

Eddie Sutton was not pleased with the way his team performed in its first scrimmage. He wasn't much happier in the second Blue-White workout, either, as the Whites defeated the Blues 70-61 before a crowd of 3,900 at Bardstown (Nov. 3).

"We were hunting shots," Sutton said. "In the first 18 possessions the most passes we had was six. If a good shot's not there, you might take 10 to 12."

Overall, the two teams combined for 22 turnovers in the game's first 20 minutes. In the first stanza, the winning White squad hit on a mere eight of 24 shots (30 percent), while the Blues weren't much better, 10 of 27 (37 percent).

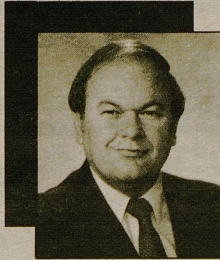
Derrick Miller and Chris Mills, who Sutton said may start at the point guard position in the Duke game, scored 22 and 17 points respectively to lead the Whites. LeRon Ellis for the second straight game was the leading scorer with 23 points. Blues' teammate John Pelphey added 22.

Pelphey also showed his strength on the boards by pulling down seven rebounds, second to Blue teammate Reggie Hanson's 13 boards.

Deron Feldhaus was the game's top rebounder, grabbing 14.

Miller hit nine of 15 shots, including two three-pointers. "I liked the way Miller played," said Sutton. "He had enthusiasm and confidence and he was moving well without the ball."

Freshman Richie Farmer (two points) was forced to sit out most of the second half with a bruised knee.

Busy for the holidays? There could be a bowl trip

This time next week, Kentucky fans just might be in the mood for making holiday plans which could include the game of football.

This time three months ago, a person would have been a prime candidate for the funny farm had he uttered such a dream.

Thanks to a 14-13 heart-stopping victory over Vanderbilt Saturday, Kentucky has positioned itself for a postseason bowl invitation if the 'Cats can defeat both Florida and Tennessee these last two weekends of the season.

Such an order is not impossible, perhaps not even improbable, if the Wildcats can prepare for them one game at a time. Again, a couple months ago, these two games appeared to be destined as sure-fire defeats for Kentucky this year. But a lot has happened since the opening kickoff back in the early fall.

Florida and Tennessee have puzzled their fans, to say the least. First, the Gators raced out to a 5-0 start, capped by a brilliant victory over LSU. What some people overlooked were lopsided wins over teams like Montana State and Indiana State. The other two wins came at the least of a couple SEC also-rans—Ole Miss and Mississippi State.

Since that stunning victory over LSU, Galen Hall's troops haven't won again. In fact, the Gators have now lost four in a row and could wind up the season with a six-game losing streak, unless Florida can beat Kentucky Saturday. Florida closes the regular season with a battle against arch-rival Florida State.

Although Florida's early season schedule was suspect, much of the Gators' problems mushroomed with the loss of offensive stars Emmitt Smith and Stacey Simmons, who were injured just as the Gators hit the 5-0 mark. Smith finally returned to action last Saturday, but his output was too little too late as Georgia mauled the Gators 26-3 in Jacksonville.

As one official of the Peach Bowl pointed out Saturday at Commonwealth Stadium, nothing less than a 7-4 record for UK will earn a post season bowl.

So, Kentucky cannot worry about Tennessee unless the 'Cats can handle Florida this week.

Still, folks have been thinking about the Vols for some time. For Kentucky, there is never a good time to hit the Vols. Just when it appears Tennessee is in the midst of a terrible slump, the Big Orange wakes up in time to knock off the 'Cats.

A couple weeks ago found Tennessee 0-6, the worst start in school history. Since then, the Vols have bounced back to beat Memphis State and Boston College. This weekend, the Vols have another opportunity to build more confidence as they take on Ole Miss in Oxford.

Regardless of the outcome in Oxford, if Kentucky ever expects to have a shot at beating the Orange, the opportunity certainly won't be any brighter than it will be next Saturday in Knoxville.

Saturday's victory over Vanderbilt was anything but beautiful, except when glancing to the scoreboard after the final seconds ticked off the clock.

There's an old saying which has it that the mark of a good team is one which wins when it doesn't play well enough to win. Kentucky, obviously, lived up to that saying last week.

More importantly, Kentucky has followed its emotional upset win over Georgia with back-to-back victories over Southern Illinois and Vandy and has earned itself a shot at a very fine season.

Back in August, most everyone around the South agreed if Jerry Claiborne could win five games with the schedule he faced in 1988, he should be national Coach of the Year. Folks, victory No. 5 is already in the bag.

Before we pass out the hardware, one must admit the schedule hasn't panned out as tough as previously expected. Indiana looks to be even tougher than predicted and you can certainly make an argument for LSU, Auburn and Georgia. But, overall, the SEC is experiencing perhaps its weakest campaign in the past two decades.

We say this not to detract from UK's accomplishments this fall, but to merely state an obvious fact. To Claiborne and the 'Cats' credit, Kentucky has been embarrassed only once the entire season and that came in Bloomington.

This Saturday is a mighty big challenge for the 'Cats. The way most observers see this contest is that perhaps Florida still has a slight edge in talent, but the game is played at Commonwealth Stadium, a place Florida despises to visit in November. The colder the weather, the most likely of a Kentucky victory.

With the Wildcats knowing full well they have to win their last two contests, there will be no chance of the 'Cats looking past Florida. On the other hand, the Gators most certainly will be looking for revenge of their 10-3 loss at the hands of Kentucky the last time they came to Commonwealth Stadium.

Florida isn't totally out of the postseason bowl picture, but the future isn't very bright. The Gators find themselves in an almost identical situation as UK—win their remaining two games or hit the winter weight program early.

The Gators must beat both UK and Florida State, and the odds of winning both are pretty high. A split would give Florida a 6-5 mark and probably leave the Gators home for the holidays.

Losses to both teams could also be disastrous for Hall, who has been under heavy fire from Florida fans during the current losing streak.

It should be a dandy this week.

Before we leave the subject of football, we've got to mention the 44,000 or so

fans who showed up for the night game against Vanderbilt.

As most of you know by now, the game was pushed back from its original 1:30 p.m. kickoff to accommodate the Breeder's Cup which was being staged in Louisville.

It's just as obvious there were very few fans who raced back to Lexington for the football game. Hopefully, this will be proof for UK officials to quit worrying about the thoroughbred industry and tend to matters which will help build UK football, and that includes not making football fans take a back seat to the racing interests around these parts.

The low turnout against Vandy (which includes some 3,000 or so Vandy fans) didn't go unnoticed by the Peach Bowl official. He noted the small crowd and wondered where all the fans were. The ability of a team to have a strong following on the road is one of the basic ingredients bowls use to determine which teams are invited.

Folks like to recall that famous Peach Bowl game against North Carolina back in 1976. About 20,000 Kentuckians made their way to Atlanta (the estimate has grown over the years to the 30,000 level now) as UK won 21-7. Of course, Kentucky enjoyed a jam-packed Commonwealth Stadium every game that year, also.

If Kentucky should find itself on the bubble for a better bowl during the next couple weeks (if UK can beat Florida), the difference could be the turnout for the Florida game.

Historically, Florida brings the fewest visiting fans to Commonwealth Stadium of any other SEC foe. There are a couple reasons: First of all, Lexington is the farthest point north for the Floridians and it's usually very cold or even snowing at times. Secondly, the UK game is always the week after the big Georgia-Florida blowout in Jacksonville and Gators fans are still recuperating from the partying of the week before. Last, but not least, Florida usually loses to Georgia and the fans are in no mood to travel the distance to Lexington after such an emotional loss as to the Dawgs.

If Kentucky is to impress bowl scouts with fan support, the 'Cats will have to do it without the help of an opposing team's fans. That means UK will probably have some 10,000 to 15,000 tickets available for sale this week.

Students at UK haven't used their entire allotment a single time this season. In fact, the students had almost 10,000 no-shows last week. Florida probably will bring less than 1,000 in comparison with Georgia which had almost 7,000 fans here three weeks ago.

You'll have no trouble getting a ticket for this one.

On to the basketball scene, as the world turns.

Another chapter was punched in last week when Shawn Kemp packed up his belongings and left town after an incident came to public light where city police said Kemp sold jewelry which had been stolen from Sean Sutton to a Lexington pawn shop.

There were all kinds of stories circulating about the incident and by the end of the week, Kemp had left town.

It was just another embarrassing moment in what continues to be one big problem after another.

UK's basketball problems have now advanced themselves all the way to the front page of the nation's No. 1 newspaper—*USA Today*. Last Tuesday, the newspaper published a story on national champion Kansas being hit with probation (it will be the first team in NCAA history barred from defending its title since Kansas won't be allowed to play in the tourney for one year), but the headline centered on Kentucky being the next school which will be penalized by the NCAA.

Up to now, almost all the embarrassment has pointed toward the athletics department and basketball staff, but now there are some who are beginning to question president David Roselle's handling of all the problems.

Without question, the most serious challenge to the university's reputation was the *USA Today* article. Being flashed across the top of the front page gives UK's name the ultimate exposure it had just as soon forget.

And guess what Dr. Roselle's reaction was?

You guessed it, he was "saddened" once again.

I've been one of Dr. Roselle's greatest fans since he arrived here more than a year ago. I've been most impressed by the way he has administered his office and dealt with all the problems relating to the athletics department. But I'm beginning to wonder if there isn't some feet-dragging going on these days.

I strongly believe Dr. Roselle is interested in having a quality athletics program at UK, one which adheres to all the league and NCAA rules.

Having said that, I'm not convinced he realizes just how important UK athletics, basketball in particular, is, to not only the citizenry of this state, but to the university itself.

When UK has a strong basketball program, the pride and tradition carries over to other branches of the university and certainly into the fund-raising aspects.

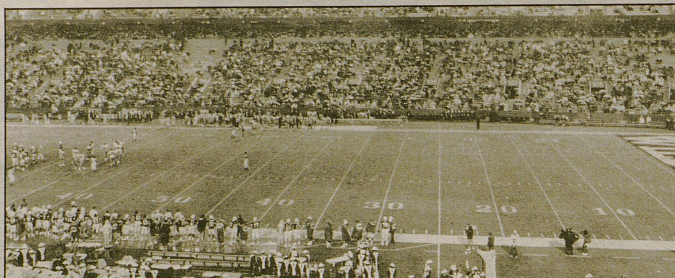
I say this because last Tuesday, I received over 30 telephone calls from subscribers (almost all of them outside the state of Kentucky). The message was sharp and strong: Kentuckians living outside the state are frustrated, embarrassed and ashamed of the UK program right now.

One gentleman from St. Louis was practically in tears. "I've been following the 'Cats for over 40 years," he said. "I

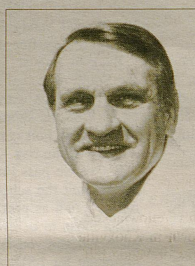

UK Athletics Association celebrating 43rd birthday

UKAA incorporated by president Donovan

When the guns of World War II were silenced, University of Kentucky president Herman Lee Donovan immediately got his priorities in order, placing at the head of the list the need for a new basketball arena while ac-

quiescing to the clamor for a winning football team.

Long before the war began, Adolph Rupp's championship basketball teams had outgrown Alumni Gym, which first was occupied by Wildcat teams in 1924, but the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor put on hold any plans to build a new arena.

Meanwhile, Wildcat football teams had gained little respect in the tough Southeastern Conference, which treated basketball as a stepchild to be utilized as off-season jobs for assistant football coaches and a means of keeping football players in top physical condition during the long winter months.

The Wildcat gridders had their brief moments of glory, but early-season Rose Bowl talk around Lexington in those early days was quickly shattered by the likes of Alabama's Crimson Tide, Georgia Tech's Yellowjackets, Gen. Robert Neyland's orange ogres down in Knoxville and even the then-powerful Commodores of Vanderbilt.

With athletics director Bernie Shively at the helm in postwar 1945, the Wildcats had a horrendous season, defeating only Cincinnati and West Virginia while losing the other eight games on their schedule.

MEANWHILE "DER BARON" RUPP'S 1944 "Kindergarten Kids," led by freshman All-American center Bob Brannum, finished with a 19-6 record, which included a Southeastern Conference championship and a third-place finish in the NIT.

One of the main persons applying the pressure for a winning football team, which also meant the hiring of a top football coach, was Guy Huguélet, a prominent alumnus who was president of Southeastern Greyhound Lines, which had its headquarters in Lexington.

By the time UK's famed backfield ace John Simms "Shipwreck" Kelly (1929-30-31) left Lexington for continued notoriety as a player and part-owner of the old Brooklyn Dodgers pro grid team, it was said that he would visit the local Greyhound station in a chauffeur-driven Cadillac and send the chauffeur in to pick up wages for which he never toiled.

"It really wasn't a Cadillac," Kelly said during a visit to Lexington in 1975. "It was a LaSalle. I had a Cadillac earlier, a convertible. Babe Wright (star UK tackle who later played with the Dodgers) would drive."

After turning down offers from Notre Dame and several other "name" football schools, Kelly enrolled in UK without benefit of scholarship, which he said really didn't worry him because he received money from his grandfather, who owned two large farms at Springfield. Kelly also encountered no trouble whatsoever in lining up a "sponsor" among the "horsey" set.

"LET'S FACE IT," HE SAID, "Ed Madden (owner of Hamburg Place) was good to me. "He was a great track man, and he got a big kick out of coming out to track meets.

"Daddy Boles (UK athletics director) was too cheap to send the track team on long trips, and I sometimes went as the team. Mr. Madden sent me to Chapel Hill, and I won the 100, 220, 440 and broad jump. I would run for the New York Athletics Club in the summer, and I was beaten out of the 1932 Olympics."

In other words, there was an untapped financial source

just waiting for the word from Donovan, who wasted no time putting his athletic ducks in the water immediately after the war ended.

One of his first moves was to draw up an article of incorporation of the UK Athletics Association and approve an agreement giving the association use of Stoll Field and Alumni Gym. The Athletic Council, which had governed UK athletics up to that time, was replaced by an 11-man board of directors, and the new association was incorporated Nov. 20, 1945, only two months after the war ended; as a result, the university could pay the new football coach more than the constitutional limit, which was \$5,000 a year at the time. The move also allowed the athletics department to cut the red tape involved in laws and regulations pertaining to equipment, travel, and other details.

Then Donovan had lunch with several prominent business and professional men and told them the university was ready to build a first-class football program, but they would have to supply the funds.

"IN OTHER WORDS," HE SAID, "put your money where your mouth is."

They responded by raising more than \$100,000, which was placed in deposit against a "rainy day."

With Huguélet serving as head of a committee screening applicants for the head football coaching job, the university finally hired Paul "Bear" Bryant, a promising young Navy veteran who was coming off a successful debut as coach of the University of Maryland.

When Donovan retired as president in 1956, UK already had seen what would become known as its "Golden Era" of sports. While his good friend and com-

panion Rupp had compiled a phenomenal 538-92 record, which included three NCAA, one NIT and three Sugar Bowl titles, and had served as co-coach of the 1948 gold medal U.S. basketball team after his Wildcats won the collegiate bracket of the Olympic Trials, Bryant had put the football Wildcats on the map, compiling a 60-24-5 record and three wins in four postseason bowl games before leaving UK after the 1953 season.

However, the Utopia that was supposed to be UK basketball exploded in Donovan's face in October, 1951, when investigators from the office of the New York district attorney seized three members, including two starters, of the 1948 "Fabulous Five" Olympic and NCAA championship squad and charged them with being involved in a mushrooming points-shaving scandal that at the time involved 31 players from seven schools.

By the time everything had run its course, two more former Wildcats were involved directly in the scandal while a third, an All-American center, was tried but not convicted. The investigation took another turn when evidence was uncovered that UK was guilty of violating NCAA and SEC rules involving subsidizing and recruiting of its athletes.

As a result, the Wildcat basketball program was cancelled for the 1952-53 season, which at the time was the harshest penalty ever assessed against a school's intercollegiate athletics program.

So as we say "Happy 43rd Birthday" to the UK Athletics Association, which is chartered until 1995, we remember the words of philosopher Rupp: "When you're on top of the mountain, somebody is always trying to knock you off."

We feel that news about the sports programs at the University of Kentucky should be required reading for all of the state's high school students.

Waiting for everybody to do it Claiborne's way?

Then you'd better not hold your breath

I knew I would get a lot of response from my recent column in which I suggested that Dr. David Roselle should get advice from someone who knows what goes on in big-time intercollegiate athletics before confessing

all to the NCAA.

And did I ever get response!

A woman from Louisa didn't wait to write a letter, she called to get on me on the state-wide radio show that Oscar Combs and I do on Monday night. Noel D. McDonald, 2882 Riedling Dr., Louisville 40206, had perhaps the best letter, so I'll share his thoughts with you and he'll represent other less-articulate readers:

"I usually agree with your views of UK athletics, but the opinions you expressed are dead wrong.

"Dr. Roselle is not naive about big-time athletics. What he is is an ethical man who apparently believes that the Jerry Claiborne way is the right way.

"I'm tired of hearing guys like you say it's OK to cheat because everybody else does.

"I am attending 10 of UK's 11 football games this fall, but I wouldn't walk across the street to see an Eddie Sutton team play.

"Some day, everybody will do it Claiborne's way."

We should live so long to see everyone doing it Claiborne's way. Unfortunately, more and more schools are NOT doing it Jerry's way.

Just look at these figures from the NCAA:

In 1980, when the NCAA had a staff of seven investigators, it handled 81 cases.

The fiscal year of 1988, which ended Aug. 31, saw 15 fulltime investigators working for the NCAA. Their case load jumped to a staggering 261. And, according to *The Florida Times-Union* of Jacksonville, which dug up these figures during a four-month study of the NCAA, the NCAA now lacks 23 of the 25 part-time investigators who were employed last year.

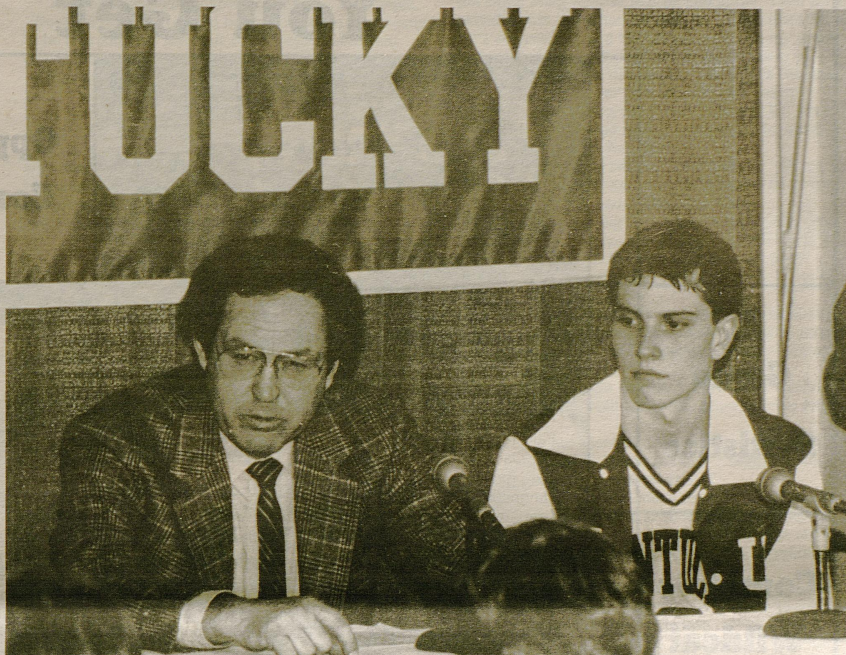
I most certainly have never said that it's OK to cheat because everybody else does. I do say that most everybody does cheat; that part is right. And I repeat that colleges that field winning teams consistently in football and basketball do not live within the rules.

A top prospect is worth thousands of dollars and there are plenty of schools willing to pay the going rate to get the top players. When schools recruit poor kids, SOMEBODY has to see that they have clothes on their backs and toothbrushes, toothpaste, etc.

And I repeat that Ivy League schools grant early admission to a selected number of athletes who also qualify academically. If anyone doubts that, write to any Ivy school and request an admissions book.

So I repeat my message to the University of Kentucky president, Dr. Roselle: Find out what goes on at successful football and basketball programs. Then decide what kind of program you want at UK, and act accordingly. If Dr. Roselle wants a basketball program the quality of Transylvania, Bellarmine and Centre, he can have exactly that.

And I have one more suggestion for the UK president: If he plans any action against anyone in the athletic department, the quicker the better. I hope that he doesn't wait until after the NCAA's Infractions Committee takes action. The quicker Dr. Roselle does something, the easier the NCAA is going to be. Frankly, UK fans should be scared to death after what Kansas got last

week.

UK & U OF L—I saw the UK and Louisville basketball teams perform on the same floor on consecutive nights last week. I have assessments of the two teams.

For UK fans: Get ready for a thrashing when the 'Cats and Cards tangle at Freedom Hall. This Kentucky squad is the weakest I've seen since 1979. The 'Cats have two quality players, LeRon Ellis and Chris Mills. I think the eventual UK starters will be Ellis at center, Mills and Sean Sutton at guard, and Deron Feldhaus and Reggie Hanson at forward. Derrick Miller will also play a lot at guard, with Mills switching to forward.

Something unusual happened to Miller during the Blue-White scrimmage at Freedom Hall. The junior guard hit a three-pointer and actually smiled! It had been awhile since that had happened. He just needs a few more like that to get his confidence back.

For U of L fans: Quit giggling. The Cards are so deep that I'd go with them right now as the nation's best. Denny Crum's No. 1 problem will be keeping all of them happy, but he'll tell you that is backward. The players' problem, Crum will say, is to keep him happy.

A UK fan was heard to say that Rex Chapman would have put 5,000 more fans in Freedom Hall. Speaking of Chapman, Eddie Sutton reportedly has decided that he will never permit another media darling on his team. Sutton stormed out of a meeting last season when the team watched the TV rerun of an SEC game during which Oscar Combs told Dick Vitale that Chapman was bigger than the UK program.

ABOUT TIME—John Dromo, who used to referee for UK's Harry Lancaster when they coached freshman teams (Harry did the same for him at U of L) finally will have his day at U of L.

U of L will honor its former head basketball and golf coach Nov. 16 at the Hyatt Regency in Louisville. He also was an assistant football coach and helped recruit John Unitas.

Dromo's 40-year coaching stint is the longest in U of L history. The public is invited.

HALL OF FAME—UK is well represented in the Basketball Hall of Fame at Springfield, Mass. 'Cat fans who go with the team for the Nov. 19 game with Duke should visit the Hall, where they can find the plaques of Adolph Rupp, director of athletics Cliff Hagan and Frank Ramsey. Two other Kentuckians are in the Hall (Ed Diddle and Wes Unseld) and one other should be. It's an absolute disgrace that Peck Hickman isn't in the Hall. The Central City product is the man who put U of L basketball on the national map, but he has continued to be ignored.

Of the nine people being considered for enshrinement this year, you can be that K.C. Jones and Dave Cowens will be selected. They are deserving (and Cowens, of course, is a Kentuckian), but they are favored because they are former Celtics—and the Hall is full of them.

MR. HAM—John Ray did UK a tremendous service when the former football coach brought Frank Ham to Kentucky. Although retired as assistant director of athletics at UK, Ham still serves the university. He filled in ably last week for Hagan at a speaking engagement.

One more word of advice for president Roselle: After the president, Fram Ham is the best representative UK has. He should be on the payroll and turned loose around the state.

Ham thinks that he is the only man alive who personally knew two coaching immortals, Rupp and Notre Dame's Knute Rockne.

Isn't senior season supposed to be special?

Mack's final year has been a peculiar one

During his five years at Kentucky Ron Mack has experienced thrilling victories and heartbreaking losses. Still, none of that totally prepared him for what happened this year. The 5-10, 188-pound senior defensive

back missed spring practice rehabilitating a shoulder injury. Then he sprained his ankle during the start of two-a-day drills in August and lost his starting spot to sophomore Chris Tolbert.

Instead of playing regularly as he thought he would, Mack became a backup as he struggled to regain his mobility.

Even when he was back to full speed, though, he couldn't get his spot back.

"I averaged about 80 plays a game in 1987 and suddenly I wasn't playing at all," said Mack, who had 41 tackles and two interceptions last year. "It was tough. But I tried to keep a good attitude. I didn't mope around and do things to hurt the team."

"I'm pretty much an optimist. I kept hoping I would get my chance."

He did. When starting safety Ron Robinson bruised a shoulder, Mack saw extensive duty in UK's upset win over Georgia.

He played even more against Southern Illinois because Mark Sellers, Robinson's backup, injured an ankle and Robinson was unavailable.

"I just try to come in and maintain order," said Mack. "Things can get chaotic at times on the field but as a fifth-year senior I have to keep things under control."

He did just that as he fought back from his injury. He kept believing he would get a chance to contribute.

"I tried to keep myself mentally prepared in case my chance did come," said Mack, who has played in five games this season. "I didn't want Ron or Mark to get hurt but when they did, I had to be ready to do the job."

Moving from cornerback to safety didn't present any real problems for Mack, who played safety at Tates Creek High School in Lexington.

"You attack from different angles at safety and have to do some different preparation," said Mack. "But I did it in high school and the switch wasn't that tough. It brought back a lot of old memories and I would have done anything to get to play."

He felt like a forgotten man until the Georgia game. He missed playing, talking to the media and being an integral part of the team.

"I guess going through something like this will help prepare me for life," said the UK senior. "I did feel forgotten, which sounds funny when you have 120 teammates."

"I tried to keep a good attitude and encourage others. But it wasn't always easy. I missed everything about being a productive football player."

UK Coach Jerry Claiborne knew he could count on Mack when he was needed.

"Ron Mack is just a super person," said Claiborne. "He's a team player and understood what happened when he missed so much work."

"He didn't pout or quit working. He encouraged others and got himself ready to play. He's the type kid you really enjoy coaching because you know he's going to be a big success in life after football."

Mack has no regrets about his Kentucky career. He will leave UK with his business degree and that's

more important than any play he made on the field.

"I'll leave here with a good education," said Mack. "Football is just an added bonus. I'll leave here ready to be a productive member of society. That's what counts."

"I'm not worried about what happens the rest of this year. I would love to play a lot and help us go to a bowl game. But I'm happy just to be healthy again and getting to play some."

"I've seen us lose games about every conceivable way during my five years. I've also been part of some big wins. I have had good times here and become a better person. That's what I'll remember most about my career when it does end."

KENTUCKY HAS had more than its share of problems preparing for the 1988-89 basketball season.

However, team morale is not a problem area for the Wildcats.

"Our guys have a great attitude," said UK assistant coach James Dickey. "They are listening and working hard every day in practice."

"They are a very close bunch and really care for one another. This team wants to win despite all the odds against it."

The odds certainly are against UK. Just consider:

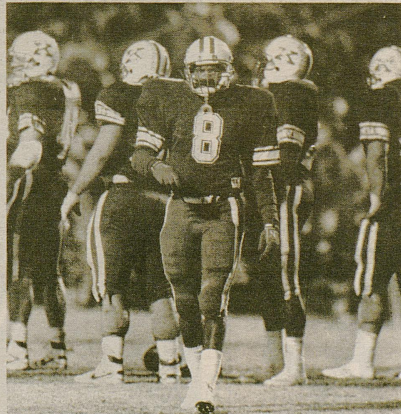
- The Cats had five players use up their eligibility last season.
- Another player, Rex Chapman, passed up his final two years at UK to join the National Basketball Association.
- Eric Manuel, the team's top returning player, has voluntarily withdrawn from practice or games while his college entrance test scores are being examined.
- The NCAA has charged UK with 18 violations, including sending cash to the father of freshman Chris Mills.
- Point guard Sean Sutton is out after breaking his right cheekbone.

"We had really been pleased with the progress of the team until Sean went down," said Dickey. "Sean going down really hurt us."

"We were looking at him as our point guard. With him down our depth is really low."

Freshman Richie Farmer could play the point but UK Coach Eddie Sutton may use Mills, a 6-7 forward-guard, at the point until his son resumes practice. Dickey even feels redshirt freshman John Pelphrey, a 6-7 forward, could play the second guard if needed to provide relief for Farmer, Mills and Derrick Miller.

Coach Sutton had never had a player fracture his

cheekbone until this year. Two weeks ago Manuel had the same thing happen in a pickup game. Then it happened to his son when he took an elbow from Miller.

"I've probably had 250 broken noses on my teams and a lot of teeth knocked out in my 30 years of coaching," said the UK coach. "But this is the first time for this. I never had this happen before."

Even before Sutton went down, though, UK knew it would have to depend on 6-10 sophomore forward-center LeRon Ellis for scoring.

"LeRon is getting better," said Dickey. "He's still not shooting as well as we would like and he needs to be more physical and aggressive inside."

"He can carry a big load inside for us along with Mike Scott. LeRon has the ability to score inside or step outside and hit the shot. But he can't keep shooting that fallaway and taking himself out of the play."

"We don't expect him to just carry us like Kenny Walker did three years ago. We have other guys outside who can shoot but LeRon will be very instrumental in our success."

Sophomore Reggie Hanson and redshirt freshman Deron Feldhaus, both forwards, must provide help for Ellis.

"Deron is not shooting as well as he can but he's a good, tough player," said Dickey. "Reggie is finally playing like we thought he could."

Hanson hit eight of 11 shots from the field, made four of four free throws, grabbed five rebounds, made two steals and blocked one shot in UK's first intrasquad scrimmage. He had 14 points and 13 rebounds in the second outing.

"All our guys are going to have to contribute like that," said Dickey. "They all have to rise to the top and play better than ever before."

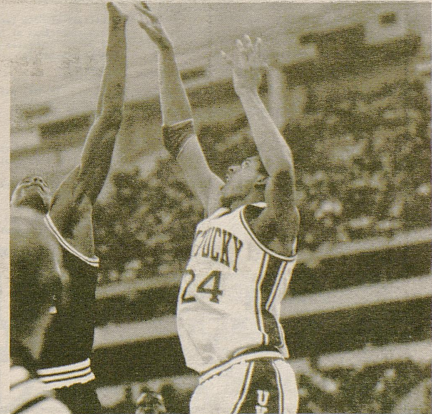
"One thing we have to do is shoot well, especially from the free throw line. We are trying to practice under game situations and pressure all we can."

UK knows opponents will pressure it more this season because of its lack of depth and experience, especially at guard. That's why the Cats have stressed defense, team fundamentals and the value of each possession during its preseason workouts.

"Our guys know they can't just come down and shoot the ball real quick," said Dickey. "We've got to get a high percentage shot and then hit it."

"We have to get the ball inside to LeRon and Mike and draw some fouls. We have to play defense and rebound."

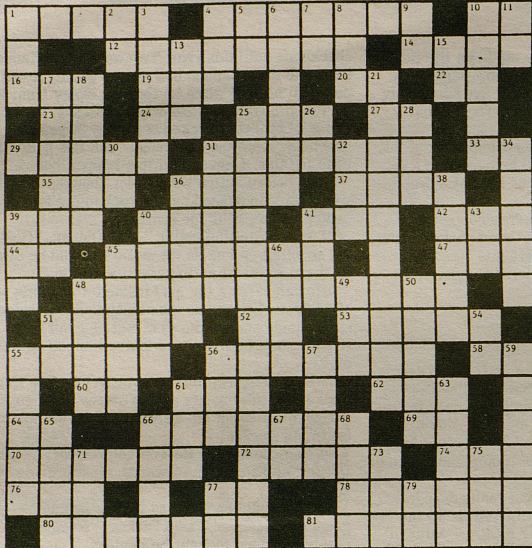
"We'll run some but we won't score as many points as last year. It's just not possible. But these guys will play hard and do what they are told. That's why we still think we can win."

TCP CROSSWORD PUZZLE

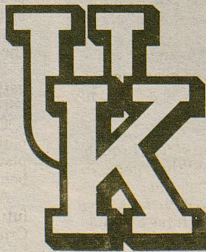
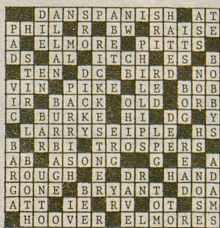

She went outside and pulled her University of Kentucky sticker off the back window of her car. Isn't there anything that can be done about this mess?"

My advice to the gentleman was to sit down in a very rational mood, pick up a pen and write a letter to Dr. Roselle. I hope the gentleman follows through and I sincerely hope Dr. Roselle will give the letter a great deal of consideration.

From the rumor mill, there are some who believe the current NCAA investigation won't be resolved before next April. If such a timetable is followed, you can be sure that Kentucky stands a very good chance of being another UCLA.

To be a 'Cat these days you have to have a lawyer

Duke Blue Devils just around the corner

basketball media guide hit the street last week, and while it contains just about every fact and figure you could imagine about the UK program, there is one important piece of information missing.

For each individual Wildcat, the guide lists stats, height, weight, hometown, favorite book and movie, etc., but nowhere to be found is an element that has recently rose to prominence: their attorneys.

It seems that everyone connected with the UK program and NCAA investigation has to consult with their lawyer before answering — or not answering — questions.

It's gotten to the point that I expect some shady lawyers to start paying the team managers to hand out business cards, like has traditionally been done with ambulance drivers.

I've tried my best to keep with everyone's mouthpiece and their respective firm, but I've gotten totally lost in this mound of legalese.

The latest player to take on representation is not even on the team. Proposition 48 casualty Shawn Kemp has hired an attorney after he sold a couple of gold chains worth \$700 for \$180 at a Lexington pawn shop.

(HOW CAN COLLEGE kids afford an attorney, especially kids who are pawning gold chains for some spending cash?)

But this incident goes much farther than that. It's just one of the latest cans of worms that have been opened since the NCAA slapped UK with 18 allegations about the program.

Although there have been conflicting reports, it seems that Sean Sutton, son of UK coach Eddie Sutton, reported that two of his gold chains had been stolen from Wildcat Lodge. Sean and mother Patsy later identified two chains that police had recovered as being his.

Although the Suttons didn't know it at the time, the chains had been recovered from a pawn shop that bought them from Kemp. Kemp has not officially been accused of stealing the chains, but there is no doubt he sold them because he had to show an ID and have his photograph taken in order to pawn them.

But Sutton — according to his attorney — could not unmistakably identify the chains and is, therefore, not pressing charges. The police say the case is closed and the chains will go back to the pawn shop, where the Suttons will have to pay to get them back.

THE SCHOOL IS investigating the incident and could take some disciplinary action against Kemp if he is found guilty. However, we may never know because disciplinary action against students is not released to the public.

So, let's see: Kemp has an attorney and so do the Suttons, both Eddie and Sean. Eric Manuel has had one for a while — ever since his ACT scores came into question — and Chris Mills has had one even longer — since the infamous Emery package cracked open. Don't forget about Dwane

Casey who's also had a lawyer for months. If Bill Chupil didn't spend all of his money on basketball, he'd probably have one, too. And, of course, the school has an attorney.

That comes down to one-half of the coaching

staff and about one-third of the players having legal representation this season. Seems worthy of mentioning in the media guide, doesn't it?

By the way, there's not a word to be found about the current NCAA investigation in the guide. But then, I'm sure most of the book was finished before the final 17 charges were received.

* * *

BASKETBALL SEASON OFFICIALLY tips off in about a week, so let's take a few guesses at who might actually be playing against Duke Nov. 19 in the Tip-Off Classic in Springfield, Mass.

Sutton likes to give his seniors a shot, so let's pencil in Mike Scott in the post for at least the first game. LeRon Ellis would have to be at one forward slot. From here, it gets tricky.

If Sean Sutton has recovered enough from his broken cheekbone, he will surely be the starter at point guard. Reggie Hanson probably has the edge at the other forward slot as he has fared very well in the team's first two Blue-White scrimmages.

The other guard slot is up in the air as both Mills and Derrick Miller have been performing well. Miller probably has the edge because he is a junior, but if Sutton is out, look for both Mills and Derrick Miller to take over in the backcourt.

ERIC MANUEL APPARENTLY won't be playing, Richie Farmer has missed a lot of practice due to a virus and Deron Feldhaus, John Pelphrey and Johnathon Davis all could use a little more seasoning.

If Sutton is still hurting, UK could possibly open the season with just nine scholarship players and three walk-ons available.

That doesn't bode well against Duke, which is led by All-American Danny Ferry and should be one of the country's top teams. The Blue Devils return three starters and a fourth player who started two seasons ago. Plus, six of the team's 13 players are 6-10 or bigger.

If there is one saving grace, the game will be played in a tiny gym in Massachusetts, a long way from the rabid Duke Devil fans in Durham, N.C.

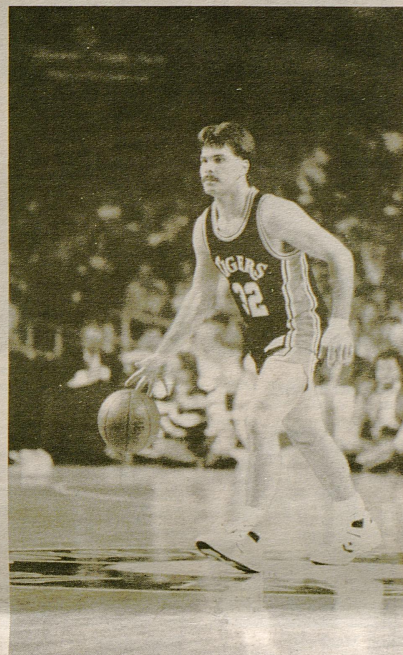
LABEL RICHIE FARMER an optimist from the start. The freshman from Manchester is used to a lot of success — Clay County won the Kentucky high school title in 1987 and was runnerup in 1988 — and he expects the same from UK this season.

"We've got a decent amount of talent this year and we're going to sneak up on some people," he said. "If everybody plays together, we're going to win a lot of ball games."

And while Farmer played under tremendous pressure the last two years because Clay was picked to win it all, he says the pressure of playing for UK is different.

"Some people may be expecting too much too quick," he said. "But that just gives me more incentive to go out and work harder to achieve my goals."

Although Farmer has been slowed by illness during preseason workouts, he did come through in the clutch during the first Blue-White game in Louisville. Farmer canned one from the top of the key at the horn — some witnesses have said after the horn — to give the Whites a 67-65 win.

Alabama, though, may be the teams of the future as both individual titles were captured by Crimson Tide freshmen.

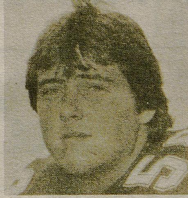

Bill Allen, 6-0, 201, West Liberty: Came to UK from Morgan County High School, where he starred in three sports, lettering four years in football and basketball, two years in track. Completed 443 of 800 passes for 6,440 yards and 42 TDs, and also scored 41 TDs in prep career. Was named first-team all-state his final prep season.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□As a redshirt freshman in 1985, Allen played in four games at quarterback, completing four of nine passes for 27 yards.

□As a sophomore in 1986, played in just one game, a 37-12 win over Kent State.

□Played in four games as a junior in 1987, and completed one of two pass attempts for the year, a 30-yard screen to Andy Murray against Ohio University. Held on three placement attempts (2 PATs, 1FG) against Georgia.

□Allen is currently third-string on the depth chart at quarterback, behind Glenn Fohr and Chuck Broughton. Has appeared at quarterback in two games this season, completing both of his pass attempts for 16 yards. Has seen action as holder on all placement attempts.

Jay Amshoff, 6-0, 208, Louisville: Came to UK from Louisville's St. Xavier High School, where he was a two-year starter at out-

side linebacker. Was named second-team all-state by *Associated Press* following his senior season.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.

□Saw no action during his redshirt freshman and sophomore years, in 1985 and 1986.

□As a junior in 1987, played in nine games, primarily in spot duty at linebacker and on special teams. Had season-high three tackles (one of them a sack) against Ole Miss, also had two tackles against Florida.

□Is currently listed as third-string at left linebacker spot, behind Chris Chenault and Randy Holleran. Has played in six games this season recording six tackles—three solos and three assists.

Mike Cahill, 6-0, 233, Louisville: Came to UK from Louisville St. Xavier, where he lettered four years in football and was named all-state by the *Louisville Courier-Journal* as a senior. Also lettered two years in track.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.

□Saw no action as redshirt freshman (1985), sophomore (1986) or junior (1987).

□Named to the Athletics Director Honor Roll at UK for the spring 88 semester with a 4.0 GPA in marketing.

□Saw only action this season against Kent State, logging two plays.

Chris Chenault, 6-2, 240, Lexington: Came to UK from Henry Clay, where he was a three-year letterman at tailback, fullback and linebacker. Was an all-city choice as a senior. Also lettered three years in track, where he was state champ in the 110-meter high hurdles and was second in the 300-meter dash as a senior.

□Redshirted his first year at UK, in 1984.

□Played in all 11 games as a redshirt freshman in 1985, sharing starting duties at right linebacker with Jeff Kremer. Was named to *Football News* first-team Freshman All-America Team after finishing third on the squad in tackles with 92 tackles—56 solos and 36 assists.

□Started all 11 games at right linebacker as a sophomore in 1986, where he was second on the club in tackles with 93—58 solos and 35 assists. Intercepted one pass and returned it for a 65-yard TD against Cincinnati. Named to *Football News* Sophomore All-America Team.

□Moved to left linebacker for junior season in 1987, where he played in all 11 games and earned 10 starts. Was second on squad in tackles with 160—77 solos and 85 assists—including three QB sacks and six tackles for losses. Had at least 10 tackles in last 10 games,

including a career-high 28 against Vanderbilt. Returned only interception of season for 40 yards against Vandy.

□Was named to *Birmingham Post-Herald* 1988 Preseason All-SEC Team prior to senior season. Started all nine games this year at left linebacker. Second on the team in tackles (behind Randy Holleran) with 105—54 solos, 51 assists. Has one interception and a team-high four fumble recoveries.

□Was named to *Birmingham Post-Herald* 1988 Preseason All-SEC Team prior to senior season. In spring drills, earned Most Aggressive Award for offensive players. Was scheduled to be the starter at tight end this season, but broke his foot in preseason practice and missed UK's first three games. Has

The more the merrier

When it concerns Kentucky's defensive play of late, almost everyone is getting in on the fun; left side has gained recognition but opponents now are respecting right side, too

This Kentucky defense has a little bit of everything.

Buoyant figures can be found in the Wildcats' wide-tackle-six alignment. There are high-metled performers. Yes, many, if not most, are considered stout defenders.

With the passing of each game, it's becoming more difficult to spot gaping holes in this unit. It's not just the 11 starters, either. Second- and even a couple of third-string defenders are responding with first-string capabilities.

Through its first nine games, Kentucky has only given up three points in the first 15 minutes of play. Before last Saturday's 14-13 encounter with Vanderbilt, the 'Cats' were ranked No. 1 in pass defense. And despite giving up 259 yards passing to Eric Jones and Co., Kentucky's aerial defense is allowing 121.3 yards per game.

In UK's last four games the defense has allowed a mere 12 points points per game.

"Everybody has a role," says star defensive tackle Oliver Barnett, "and I think everybody does their role well. It's like a play, everybody has a character—once the play is going on it just clicks, everybody's on cue. Everybody's in the right spot at the right time."

After watching film of Barnett's performance against LSU (11 tackles, including two sacks of Tommy Hodson), UK's last three opponents decided to run away from the 6-foot-3, 285-pound crackerjack tackle.

Along the left side with Barnett, who's on target for an All-SEC season, are: Tony Massey, end; Jerry Bell, guard; Chris Chenault, linebacker and David Johnson, cornerback. "We were talking about it earlier, me, him (Barnett) and Tony Massey," remembers Chenault, who currently ranks second on the team in tackles with 105. "It's kind of good that people respect him and the left side, but we wouldn't mind having them come at us a couple of times."

Thus, lately on the end of plenty of opportunities the right side has not folded, meanwhile. It's first-stringers include: Donnie Gardner or Doug Houser, tackle; Vic Adams, guard, linebacker Randy Holleran; Jay Dortch, end; and Chris Tolbert, cornerback.

Holleran, who at times fills in for Chenault, has the distinction of being Kentucky's No. 1 tackler, 134. Every time the sophomore has started—10 times—he's been credited with double-digit performances.

Last week's co-SEC Defensive Player of the Week, Holleran was in on 19 tackles, including 15 first-hitters on Vandy ballcarriers.

Free safety Ron Robinson has held his own in UK's secondary. Shoulder problems have not forced the junior from Nashville to miss out on the fun of a so far surprising 5-4 season.

Depth-wise Craig Benzinger, Mike Meiners, Albert Burks, Mike Chism, Ron Mack, Tony Zigman, Joey Couch and others have solidified UK's defense into a stingy group.

"They have a real good defense," notes Vanderbilt quarterback Eric Jones, who last season led his Commodores to a 38-29 onslaught on the Wildcats. "They have some of the same guys but with just more experience. And they were ready to play, they played tough."

Yes, Eric, you did your homework on the Wildcat defense. At the beginning of this season Kentucky returned eight starters from last year's defense. Lost were tackle Jerry

Reese (Pittsburgh Steelers), guard John Shannon (Chicago Bears) and linebacker Jeff Kremer.

Somehow, somehow this season the defense has turned nonbelievers into believers. Like Jones indicated, experience has allowed UK's defense to improve by leaps and bounds.

If experience is involved then consistency can't be too far behind. Just ask Barnett.

"When I first came here I was young and I was inexperienced," says Barnett. "As the years have gone on, as far as learning plays and stuff I was getting that down and playing consistent. Now, I've got the plays down. I'm hopeful to have a greater year my senior year."

But this is not a one-man wrecking crew. An embodiment of characters make up Kentucky's defense. A chuckling Barnett agreed. Barnett even obliged to label his cohorts.

Oliver, who's the heart of this defense?
"The heart? I think all of us are because we all have assignments that we have to carry out. Everybody plays together."

Who's the brains of the defense?
"I would have to give that one to the linebackers—Chris Chenault, Randy Holleran and Craig Benzinger. They're getting the calls from the coaches. Most people look on the linemen as a reaction (position) than the linebackers. There is reaction (at linebacker) but they have to shut off blockers

here, shut off blockers there, come up, go back."

Who's the best athlete?
"That's kinda hard to say because in each position everybody does what they're exactly supposed to do. You know, you can't fault a defensive lineman for not being able to cover a receiver. Then you can't fault a DB if he can't come up and sack a quarterback. So, everybody is a key player in their own position."

Uh, who's the strongest?
"I'm the strongest (Barnett smiles). As far as lifting goes I'm the strongest."

Who's the hardest hitter?
"I think Ronnie Robinson is. When they (ballcarrier) come up he stops them. He's the hardest hitter."

Who's the vocal leader?
"I would have to give that to Chris Chenault. He's yelling; he's keeping the team fired up. He keeps the team together and he shows verbal leadership."

Who's the unsung hero—the quiet leader?
"I would give it to Jay Dortch because when teams are running to our right side, he does a real good job of containing. The whole right side does what it has to do to keep the quarterback inside. That gives the back side time enough to make the plays. I think Jay

Dortch is the most consistent in doing that."

A few months before the Wildcats reported for August workouts, Barnett made a bet during an interview with Lexington WLEX's Alan Cutler in which UK would win at least six games. The bet? If the 'Cats didn't finish with a winning record then Cutler could smack Barnett with a pie in the face. But if UK recorded a winning season, then Cutler would have to face the same consequences.

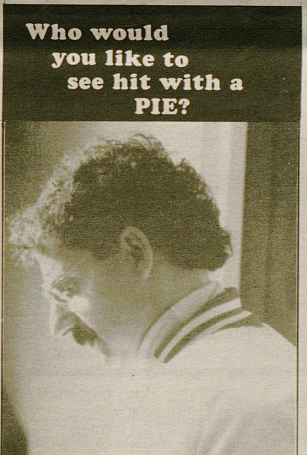
All Barnett needs is either a victory over Florida and/or Tennessee to win the bet.

"Everytime I see him all he has on his mind is pie," Cutler said after UK's win over Southern Illinois.

"I've been thinking about it just about every night," confirmed Barnett last week. "For me it's like a motivator. Everytime we win a game we get closer and closer to what we want to do as a team and what I can do to Alan Cutler."

As far as having confidence in the '88 Wildcats he said: "I have confidence in my fellow teammates and the coaching staff. To be able to have a positive attitude and knowing that you are going to have a winning season is a positive you can take into the season."

If he wins the bet, Barnett said he would surprise his victim with an unannounced pie to the face.

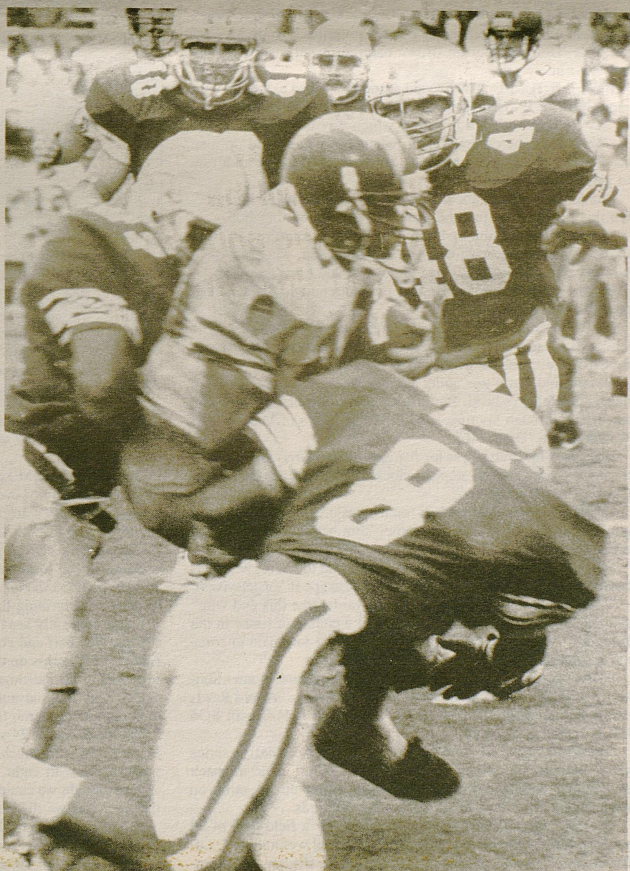

Kentucky slams 'Dores 14-0

UK jumped out to early 14-0 lead, then held on as Vandy, last-second field goal come up short

Kentucky tried to "gift" the win away to Vanderbilt last Saturday night at Commonwealth Stadium.

But it was written on the wind that the 'Cats should finally close the 'Dores, 14-13.

"The wind caught it good and held it up," said Kentucky linebacker Randy Holleran of John Clark's 47-yard field goal try with 11 seconds left.

The blond basher from McKeesport, Pa., sank slowly to his knees watching the play.

"I WAS PRAYING," said Holleran. "I said, 'Come on Lord.' It happened. He missed."

Clark had made nine of 13 field goal attempts this year and six of his last seven. But this time a gusting 20 m.p.h. wind did him and the 'Dores in.

"Things are finally bouncing our way," said Holleran. "We're finally catching up to all the bad times we've had. We do what we have to do to win."

The 'Cats of Jerry Claiborne used about nine lives Saturday night. But fortunately they also had Georgia on their minds.

"I think beating Georgia carried over," said cornerback David Johnson. "Now, when we get in close situations everybody wants to go home and be heroes instead of being goats."

There were both—heroes and goats—Saturday night. Take the last 32 seconds, for example.

It was Johnson who pulled on the Superman cape with 32 seconds left.

Vandy had just cut the lead to 14-13 on a five-yard touchdown pass from gifted quarterback Eric Jones to fullback Andy McCarroll. The 'Dores of Watson Brown naturally went for two points and the win.

JONES ROLLED RIGHT and desperately tried to lock in with super receiver Boo Mitchell. But Johnson wasn't about to let Vandy say Boo. He covered him ever which way but loose.

"We had a zone coverage then, whereas we had lined up man the whole game," said Johnson. "Mitchell faked inside and tried to get outside."

But Johnson wasn't about to wear the goat horns for this one. On this play he was just the goat. He kept on butting Boo.

"I kept bumping him and bumping him and kept him in front of me. When he gets even with you or behind you, you can't touch him anymore. Jones finally had to throw it and I was there for it."

But the 'Cats decided close was just not enough. They had to take this one to the limit.

On the ensuing inside kickoff, flanker John Bolden tried to be a hero. He tried to snare the spinning ball as it came off Jeff Owen's foot like a duck-hook drive by a golf hacker.

Never mind that it was going out of bounds. Visions of heroism danced in Bolden's head. But instead of latching on to the pig, he saw it slip through his fingers and into the hands of Vandy's Joel Walker at the 'Dore's 46.

Jones then hit Brett Hayes for five and Corey Harris for 19 before throwing a pass away to stop the clock with 11 seconds left. Enter Clark. Then exit 'Dores.

"If we hadn't touched the ball (on the inside kick) it would have gone out of bounds," said Claiborne. "But he (Bolden) dove and missed it."

ONE DIDN'T HAVE TO TELL Claiborne the 'Cats were fortunate. He must have been watching "Great Escape II" on television.

"We can not get penalties (10 for 101 yards) like this and win," said Claiborne. "We should have scored a couple of times in the first half, but the penalties killed us. We were fortunate to come out a winner."

An inopportune slap pushed the 'Dores into contention after Kentucky took the second-half kickoff 73 yards to score. Alfred Rawls went the last seven and Ken Willis' PAT made it 14-0 with 8:36 left in the third quarter.

A dead ball personal foul kept the next Vandy offensive series alive. But this one sputtered. The next one didn't. Held in check in the first half, Jones came alive. He picked up 20 yards on scrambles and hit five of six passes for 50 yards.

But the 'Dores seemed destined to settle for a field goal of 28 yards by Clark when Jones' TD pass to Mitchell was nullified. Officials ruled Mitchell was out of bounds, and his shadow, UK defen-

sive back Chris Tolbert, agreed.

But then the Bell rang for Vandy. UK defensive guard Jerry Bell slapped one of the Vandy players in the headgear trying to block the field goal. The penalty placed the ball at the UK five. Sean Guerin scored on the next play and Clark's PAT made it 14-7, with 10 seconds left in the quarter.

Kentucky responded with a drive of its own. But quarterback Glenn Fohr's third-down pass from the Vandy 28 fell into the hands of the Law: Steve Law.

"The receiver (Bolden) went one way and Fohr threw another...it was miscommunication," said Claiborne.

Completions of eight and 23 yards by Jones and 21 yards rushing by McCarroll had Vandy threatening again at the Kentucky 34. But subsequent drops by Harris and Mitchell preceded a bad toss by Jones to Tony Pearcey. Tolbert stepped in front of Pearcey to intercept the ball at the 12.

UK, however, was determined to give Vandy a taste of what had been its own medicine in previous games.

A 26-YARD SCRAMBLE BY FOHR and a 12-yard pass from Fohr to Alfred Jones helped set up a 52-yard field goal with the wind by Willis. But it went wide with 3:06 still left. Lots of time for Jones to do his stuff. It began at the VU 36.

Jones either passed or ran on 11 straight plays before finding McCarroll over the middle at the one. McCarroll clawed his way to the goal line.

Jones finished up hitting 24 of 41 passes for 259 yards after the

'Cats had bagged their man most of the first half.

Stung by a Jones quote, the 'Cats had hounded the senior from Decatur, Ga. into only seven completions in 13 attempts for 89 yards by intermission.

Offensive tackle Mike Nord said Jones had allegedly remarked, after leading Vandy over Kentucky a year ago, that if he played against Kentucky's defense every week he'd be a Heisman Trophy candidate and an All-American.

"That got the defense going," said Nord. "We also put up a poster of Jones in the locker room where we had his head on one side and the body on the other. If you cut off the head, the body dies," said Nord describing the poster.

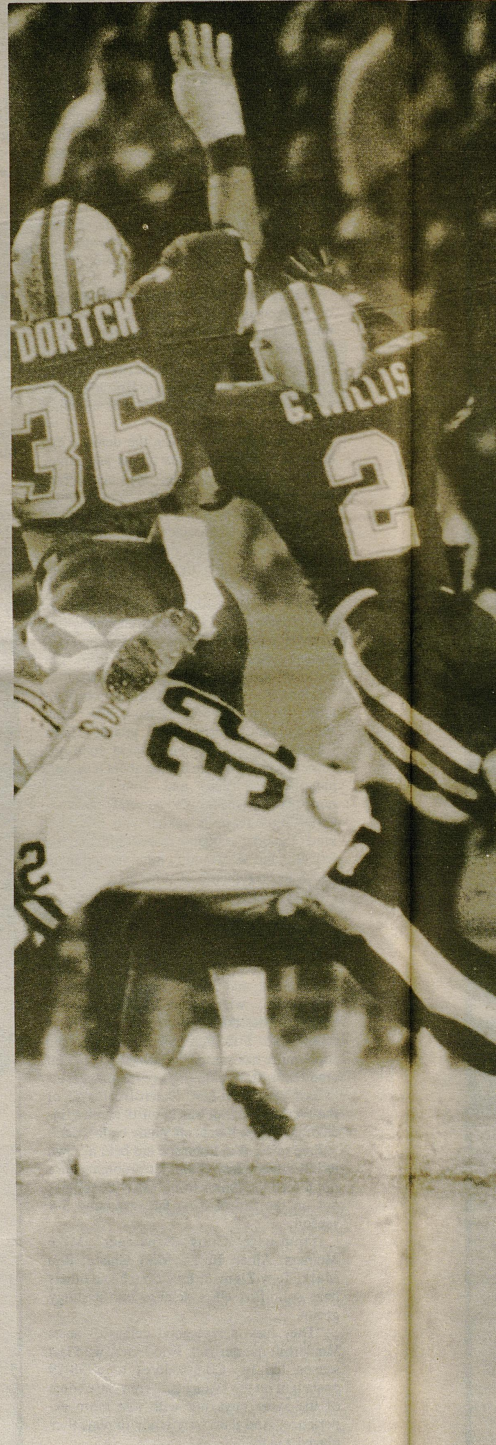
UK successfully separated Jones from being his usual effective self the first half and enjoyed some of its own success. The 'Cats ripped off 92 yards on the ground and added another 61 in the air in taking a 7-0 halftime lead.

Kentucky took advantage of a 21-yard punt by Tim Richardson to begin its TD march from its own 40. A 20-yard pass from Fohr to Al Baker and a 24-yard scramble to the three by Fohr set up Baker's three-yard touchdown scamper around left end. Willis' PAT made it 7-0 with eight seconds elapsed in the second period.

"We thought we could control the ball and keep their offense off the field and we did," said Fohr.

Fohr wound up as the leading rusher with 65 yards on 10 attempts. But the 'Cats spread the ground wealth effectively as Hunter (12

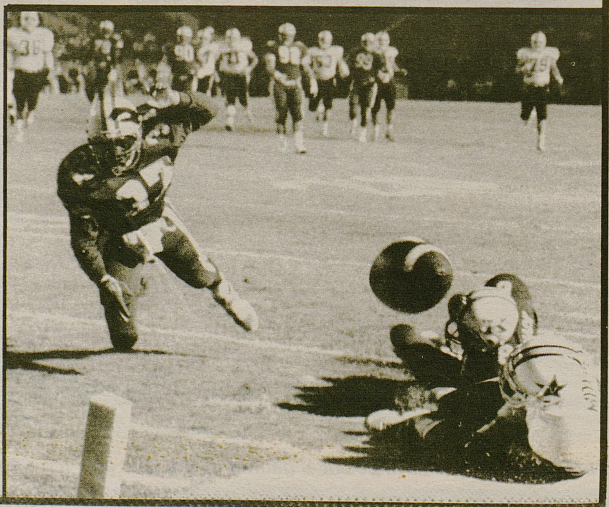
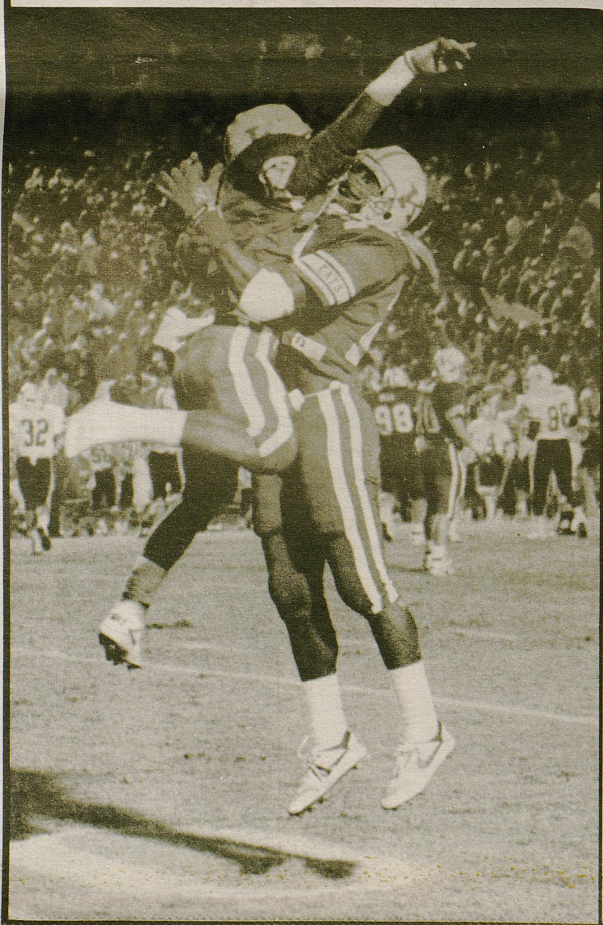
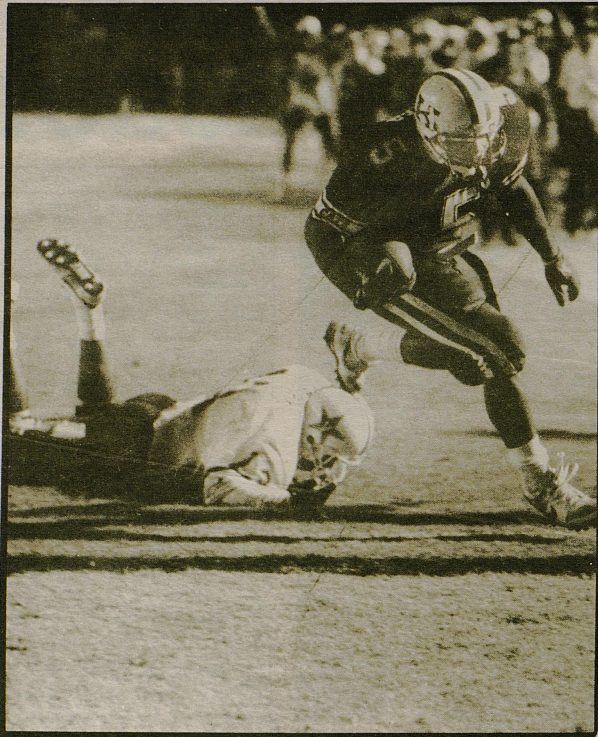

Wideout looking for better things to come

Before the season began, Kentucky wide receiver Phil Logan had some mighty big shoes to replace. With the team's leading receiver Dee Smith leaving the squad before spring practice got underway, Logan instantly

became the man to fill the void.

Well, you can safely say the void has been filled because Logan has certainly arrived as UK's big-play receiver. No more was that evident when the Wildcats nearly upset nationally-ranked Alabama last month at Commonwealth Stadium.

With the 'Cats holding on to a slim 20-16 fourth quarter lead, it was Logan who was on the receiving end of a clutch 44-yard pass from Glenn Fohr, setting up an Andy Murray one-yard TD run.

That score seemed to put UK over the hump—an 11-point lead with the fourth-quarter halfway complete. Although UK failed to keep the lead, you might say the Louisville native left his mark for future games to come.

"Yes, that was a big play," remembered Logan. "I only wish that I could have caught a couple of more. But it (the catch) was one of the highlights on my season. I just wished, though, we could have held on to beat Alabama."

Though the tough loss against the Crimson Tide was extremely hard to take for anyone who follows Kentucky football.

Better time were on their way, however.

When Georgia invaded Lexington a few weeks later, this time the 'Cats were able to secure their lead against one of the SEC's elite.

FINALLY, LOGAN AND HIS UK teammates were able to shed the tag of 'chokers' when they defeated Vince Dooley's Bulldogs 16-10. For Logan, it was a time to wash away all the disheartening memories of losses to Alabama and LSU.

"It was a fantastic win," said Logan, a UK business major. "Everybody was really happy. In the past we had let teams like Georgia comeback and beat us. But we were determined not to let that happen. Everybody was pumped up and ready to play."

In addition to improving his team's record in close games, Logan hopes to improve his skills as well. With a pro-type frame—6-foot-2, 203 pounds—Logan has the talent to become one of the premier receivers in the SEC. But in order to achieve those accolades he realizes a couple of aspects of his wide receiver position must be improved.

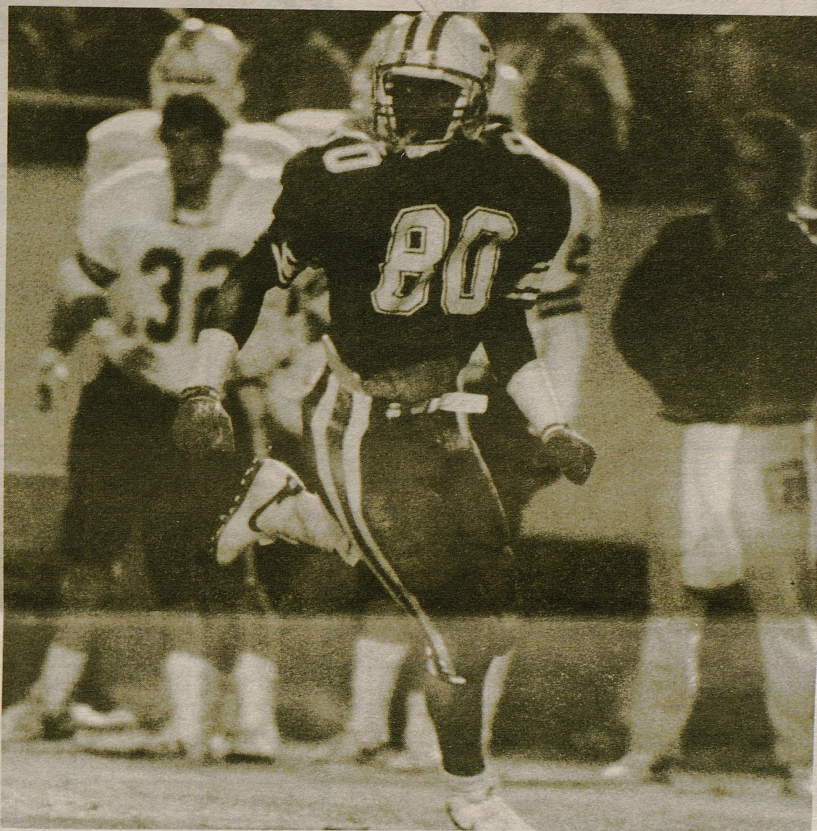
"I need to increase my strength and agility to help me become one of the top receivers in the conference," said Logan, who had hauled in 12 passes for 214 yards prior to UK's battle with Vanderbilt. "That's what I will work on during the offseason."

Just a sophomore in Kentucky's rotation of receivers, Logan wants to become the 'Cats' deep threat as he continues his college career. His lofty stats (before the Vandy game) serve as a barometer. You want proof? The Wildcat wideout has averaged more than 17 yards per reception.

THUS, HE IS ONE of the receivers UK quarterbacks will look to during clutch situations throughout the remainder of the '88 season.

"I just want to make some big plays," explains Logan. "I think I'm a true deep threat. I think more big plays will come my way as time goes along and with hard work."

"I just need to keep pressing on and play up to my

potential."

Playing up to his potential is something Logan has always taken pride in ever since his days at Louisville's Holy Cross High.

While at Holy Cross, Logan was a three-year starter and a two-time All-State selection in addition to leading his team to the state playoffs. His talents widened the eyes of several SEC schools which included Tennessee and Kentucky.

"This was my homestate and I was pretty well-known in the state of Kentucky," said Logan, reflecting back to his decision to attend UK. "I felt I had the ability to play as a true freshman."

"I JUST FELT IT WAS THE RIGHT decision."

Along with defensive back Chris Tolbert, the UK sophomore was the only other 'true' Wildcat freshman to letter last season. Though he didn't put together spectacular numbers as a college rookie, Logan did catch four passes for 59 yards. And when you calculate those figures up you get 14.8 yards per catch.

Last season proved to be the start of better things to come.

"I'm pretty happy with the way I've developed as a receiver," he said, "but I haven't reached my full potential. I have a ways to go to reach that."

Logan hopes to witness all of UK's quarterbacks reach their potential as well because No. 1 signal caller Glenn Fohr ends his Wildcat career this season. With a returning Chuck Broughton who has already seen plenty of action this season along with a completely healed Freddie Maggard, the UK flanker likes what the future holds for seasons to come.

"I think we are in a great position with Chuck and Freddie both coming back," said Logan. "Both have good arms and Chuck has already gotten some valuable experience this season."

"Plus, Ryan Hockman and Brad Smith are redshirts and they also have a lot of ability. I feel more great things can happen with any of those quarterbacks."

IN ADDITION TO the quarterback position, Logan likes the Wildcats' quartet of receivers which includes Alfred Jones, John Bolden, Raynard Gover and along with himself catching passes. It's a group that did get off to a rocky start, Logan explains, but has improved with each game. "The first couple of games some of us were getting our feet wet. It's a matter of adjusting to the different defensive coverages each week, and believe me we have played against some tough defenses. It seems like we are getting better with more game experience."

It's that game experience for a young Kentucky team which has inspired and improved the 'Cats to four victories in its first eight games. The win over Georgia may even spring enough momentum for a winning season.

Prior to UK's opening win of the season, who would have dreamed such a goal possible? Meanwhile, Logan wants his teammates to remain patient and not let any distractions bother the Wildcats as they conclude their season.

"We need to stick together and not let any obstacles get in our way," Logan said. "With our schedule we can't afford to overlook anyone. It's a matter of planning for one game at a time and just concentrating on one opponent."

on it and we noticed a crack in the area which predicted Mississippi State would be the most improved football team in the league this year. That's probably how the forecast got screwed up. Nevertheless, here's how our fortune telling equipment sees the events of the next 12 months.

Prediction No. 1: The Southeastern Conference Sugar Bowl representative will be decided Nov. 12, when Georgia plays Auburn. Notice, we did not say the SEC champion.

There are four teams which can still get a piece of that. But if LSU ties with somebody the Tigers will have to look elsewhere for a game Jan. 2. The Sugar Bowl people don't want them because the New Orleans merchants don't want them. The city does not benefit from fans who drive in that morning and drive home that night. The perfect conference representative from the New Orleans point of view is a team with a large, affluent, loyal following which comes in early, fills the hotels and restaurants and loves to shop.

SPELL THAT G-E-O-R-G-I-A or A-U-B-U-R-N. "L-S-U" does not compute.

You say we forgot about Alabama? The Crimson Tide would satisfy the criteria but our crystal ball says it will not beat both LSU and Auburn. However, remember our crystal ball has been wrong before.

Prediction No. 2: There will be no coaching changes in the SEC this year unless they are voluntary.

Billy Brewer will survive at Ole Miss. He has done a really good job with a limited amount of talent. The interesting thing about Brewer's future is what will the school do about his contract?

He only has one year left on it and no coach can recruit when all he can promise a prospect is they'll be together for a single season. On the other hand, it is commonly believed Brewer is not popular with his bosses and if they extend his contract they may have to buy it back should the Rebels slump in 1989.

The Rebel turnaround has apparently solved Brewer's problems while creating some for chancellor Gerald Turner and athletics director Warner Alford.

The state is lacking in quality football players and is more interested in basketball and horse racing than in football. They'll leave Jerry Claiborne alone. No one can do any better.

Prediction No. 3: The NCAA will make a 12th football game legal. The colleges will try to con the fans into believing that's what the players want—the opportunity to play yet another game. The fans won't buy it. They will recognize the 12th game for what it is, a money making scheme. However, they will still buy tickets and

still watch on TV. All of which means that a school playing a game in the Kickoff Classic or in Hawaii, neither of which counts against the 12-game limit, and which also goes to a bowl will have a 14-game season, only two short of what the pros play.

PREDICTION NO. 4: KENTUCKY will be slapped hard by the NCAA for alleged basketball recruiting violations. Look for two years probation with no TV appearances. The other nine SEC schools will pay for the Wildcats' alleged transgressions because without Kentucky, the SEC's TV basketball package will suffer a severe decline in value. Eddie Sutton will survive, sadder, wiser and a bit more clever. So will the Wildcat program.

NOT FOR BROADCAST: Auburn punter **Brian Shulman** kicked 12 of his first 27 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Eight were downed or went out of bounds inside the 20 and four were downed or went out inside the 10. Despite that record, Shulman is still averaging more than 40 yards per kick.

The new Kentucky basketball press guide is out and it is 180 pages thick, plus front and back covers. It looks like a miniature Sears catalog. If there is anything about Kentucky basketball that isn't in this book we can't imagine what it might be.

There is one close contest in SEC football for a prize no one wants—"the worst traffic problem on game day." The two leading contenders are Baton Rouge and Birmingham. When the Ole Miss defense held Alabama to no pass completions it marked the first time since 1957 and just the fourth time in Rebel history they had done that.

Who says football is not a one-man game? Have you seen Florida's offense since running back **Emmitt Smith** went down?

When Alabama defeated Kentucky, the Tide players took game balls back to Tuscaloosa and presented them to injured teammates **Bobby Humphrey**, **Gene Jelks** and **Byron Holdbrook** who had not made the trip.

Georgia's recent opponent William and Mary came in with a star receiver, **Harry Mehre III**. The youngster is the grandson of former Georgia coach **Harry Mehre** (1928-37) who later coached at Ole Miss (1938-1945). Georgia's athletic complex, the Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall is co-named for Mehre and former coach **Wally Butts**.

Speaking of Georgia, the 'Dogs do not play a single game on artificial turf this season.

When Ole Miss scored on LSU in the first quarter of their recent game, it marked the first rushing touchdown against the Tigers since last year's Mississippi State game.

In case you were wondering, CBS gets first pick of the SEC schedule for TV. ESPN chooses second and TBS gets what's left over for its SEC Game of the Week. CBS telecasts starts at 1:30 p.m., ESPN at either 3 p.m. or 6:15 p.m. and TBS at 11:40 a.m. No game on TBS can conflict with either a CBS or ESPN time slot.

Since **Pat Dye** has been coach at Auburn, 41 of his players have gone to the pros, all of those drafted made the NFL their first year and 26 still are in the pro ranks this season.

THE LAST WORD: Tennessee athletics director **Doug Dickey** after the Vol football team's 0-6 start:

"We are not only losing but on the verge of being ridiculed in the press and from people all over the state. It is important that our team return to a competitive level. It is obvious that we do not have the physical ability to compete at the top of the Southeastern Conference right now. It is going to take more and better athletes. We do not intend to have a second rate program."

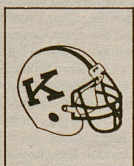

Except for a couple of miscues, Glenn Fohr has to be credited for playing an excellent game. Al Baker made a

couple of the hardest and most-determined runs seen from the UK back this year.

WELL, THE 'CATS still are in the hunt for postseason play, but first things first—a winning season. But hmmm, I smell a Peachy aroma in the air. I wonder what's causing this strange phenomenon?

I personally know several longtime UK football fans who chose to bypass on their tickets this year. There are various reasons for their actions. One, maybe a "defeated" attitude. Because of last year's inability to produce a winning record and because of this year's schedule, some said, "What's the use?"

Others looked at the senior losses, compounded by the losses of big-play man Dee Smith and Carwell Gardner. And another reason is the air is price increases in tickets.

I believe that Kentucky football is in these fans' blood and they will eventually return. This is a transitional process which is taking place in the minds of these fans. This means judging the mind of taking the whole family opposed to early participants.

This transitional process means justification of their return by the quality of the product. I've heard some longtime talk from fans that Jerry Claiborne can't coach. Thus, their exit.

Almost all of the fans were hoodwinked into believing this would be a disastrous year for the Wildcats.

The local media sometimes does not give the football team its due. I believe more of a concerted effort should be made in the offseason to give the fans what they want to hear. Such as: what type of dedication is being shown, with the conditioning in the weight room, etc; who is showing the most improvements; and how the quarterback, running backs and other positions are shaping up.

This summer I mentioned something to one of our local television personalities, about getting some sporadic tidbits about the football team. He arrogantly said: "I will report something when there's something to report, but would not if there wasn't."

"They are not going to have anything anyway."

THE UK STAFF has said this team has been a joy to coach. First, the attitude has been great, starting with this summer. Reportedly, there were a total of 70 team members who worked out at the Nutter Center this summer. There were 51 players who never missed a workout.

Some of the coaches say they knew the talent was there, but because of the youth and inexperience they did not know how they would respond.

There are several factors which have led to the success of this football team. The walk-on contributions have been immeasurable. The drive and determination of players on the offensive line such as Brian Denham, Bill Hulet, Joel Mazzella and David Crane have undoubtedly pushed the offensive line's play to a higher level of intensity. The same can be said for Mike Chism and Mike Meiners in the defensive line. And what about Neal Clark and Jeff Shehan in the receiving corps?

The next contributing factor came from the JuCo ranks. How about that Alfred Rawls, who leads the running back corps? Wideout Alfred Jones has solidified the receiver positions, and Alfred Burks and Tony Missick have helped in the defensive secondary.

Many times, players have a burning desire to prove themselves. The JuCo kids have been waiting for two years to get their chance. Generally, they all have high confidence levels, because many were stars in their

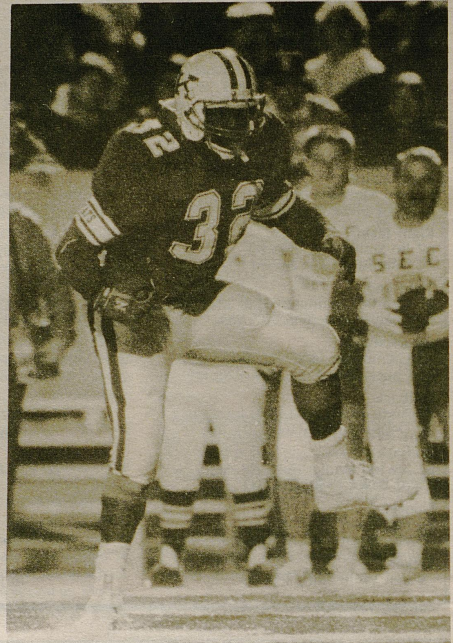

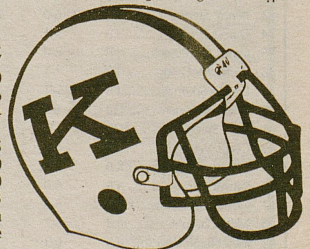

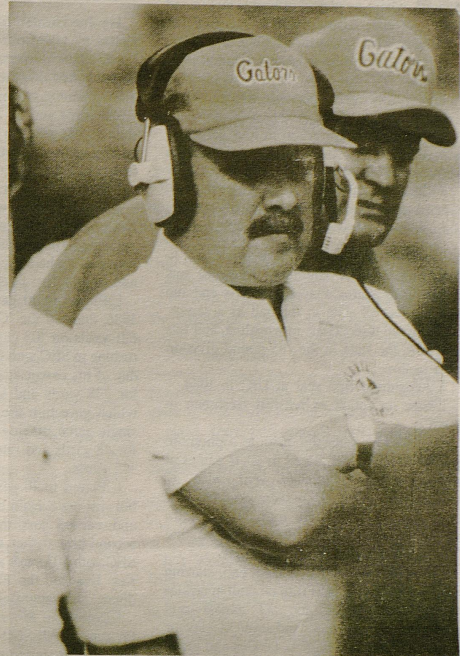

Brian Denham, 6-1, 254, Winchester: Came to UK from George Rogers Clark High School, where he played offensive tackle and defensive end. Also lettered in baseball.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Saw no action in redshirt freshman year, in 1985.

□Played offensive guard in two games as a sophomore in 1986.

□Played offensive guard in four games as a junior in 1987, seeing a season-high nine plays against Utah State.

□Currently listed as second-string at left offensive guard positions, after sharing starting duty with Dean Wilks earlier in the year.

Jay Dortch, 6-1, 212, Paducah: Came to UK from Paducah Tilghman, where he was a three-year starter. Played defensive end and tackle. Was all-state in football as a senior. Also earned three letters in wrestling, and was fourth in the state in the 185-pound division as a senior.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Saw no action as redshirt freshman in 1985.

□Earned a scholarship prior to sophomore season in 1986, and played in all 11 games at defensive end. Finished year with 37 tackles—20 solos, 17 assists—and tied for team-high in sacks with four. Had one interception, one that led to the game-winning TD in UK's 34-22 win over Vandy.

□Became the regular at right end, starting all 11 games there. Was fifth on club in tackles with 71—38 solos and 33 assists—and registered two QB sacks and seven tackles for losses. Had season-high 12 tackles and graded out at 98 percent against Tennessee. Graded above 90 percent in six games.

□Has started all nine games at right end this season, and has developed into a team leader. Leads team in interceptions with two and is second in sacks with three. Has been in on 73 tackles—39 solos, 34 assists.

Glenn Fohr, 6-2, 214, Phillipsburgh, N.J.: Came to UK as a transfer from Hudson Valley Community College in Troy, N.Y. Operated out of the run-and-shoot offense at Hudson Valley, where he completed 100 of 205 passes for 1,512 yards his last year.

□Played in nine games as a junior in 1987, and earned four starting assignments. Led UK in passing and was second in total offense. Completed 74 of 163 passes for 973 yards and six TDs. Ranked ninth in the SEC in passing efficiency and was 11th in the league in total offense. Ended the season in style by throwing for 240 yards and 2 TDs in that heart-breaking 24-22 loss to Tennessee.

□Has started every game at quarterback this season, although he has been relieved in seven of those by junior Chuck Broughton. Has completed 78 of 163 pass attempts (47.9 pct.) for 1,052 yards and three TDs. Has been picked off 10 times in 1988.

Ray Gover, 6-3, 196, Dayton, Ohio: Came to UK from Jefferson High in Dayton, where he was a four-year letterman. Was all-area and all-city in each of his last two years. Also earned three letters in basketball and track. Once high-jumped 6'11", and won state high jump title his senior season. Turned down several basketball offers to play football at UK.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Started his career on defense, playing in all 11 contests at safety as a redshirt freshman. Had 17 tackles—seven solos, 10 assists—recovered a fumble and picked off a pass.

□Had 14 tackles—seven solos, seven assists—and one interception from safety spot as a sophomore in 1986.

□Because of a shortage of receivers in 1987, Gover moved to flanker, where he played in all 11 games last season. Started three games and caught two passes for 32 yards. Returned five kickoffs for 57 yards.

□Was not in the starting lineup in UK's season opener this year, but has been there ever since. Second on club with 14 catches for 197 yards and one TD, a tipped 37-yarder against Alabama. Averaging 14.1 yards per catch and had one kickoff return for 26 yards.

Ivy Joe Hunter, 6-0, 218, Gainesville, Fla.: Came to UK from Gainesville's Buchholz High, where he was named Athlete of the Year and inducted into the Buchholz Hall of Fame after a senior season that saw him rack up 1,388 yards and 12 TDs. Was first-team all-state on the gridiron his senior season. Earned two letters in football and basketball, four in track.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Was hampered with injuries as a redshirt freshman in 1985, missing five games with ankle and knee problems. Played in six contests and rushed for 112 yards and four TDs, and caught five passes for 64 yards.

□Played in 10 games as a sophomore in 1986, and led the 'Cats on the ground with 621 yards on 103 carries. Ranked seventh in rushing in SEC with 62.1 yards per game. Had day of his career against Vanderbilt, rushing for 238 yards and four TDs on 30 carries, which gave him the modern UK record for single-game rushing total. Caught 11 passes for 48 yards and returned seven kickoffs for 145 yards.

□Played in 10 games as a junior in 1987, but was once again hobbled by a knee injury and earned just three starts. Was team's second-best rusher and was 11th-best in the SEC with 503 yards and three TDs on 100 carries. Reached the 100-yard mark against Indiana, and caught eight passes for 81 yards.

□Named to *Birmingham Post-Herald* 1988 Preseason All-SEC team prior to senior season. Has started all nine games at tailback and is second on club in rushing with 404 yards on 116 carries. Leads team in receiving with 17 catches for 160 yards. Third on club in scoring with 36 points. Has returned 10 kickoffs for 238 yards. Leads UK in all-purpose yardage with 89.1 yards per game.

David Johnson, 6-1, 190, Louisville: Came to UK from Louisville Male, where he lettered three years in football as a wide receiver and defensive back. Had 26 catches for 415 yards and seven TDs as a senior, and earned all-state honors. Earned two letters in track, where he won regional titles in the high jump and long jump, and one in basketball.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Moved over from offense prior to redshirt freshman season in 1985, and shared the right cornerback spot with Tony Mays. Intercepted two passes and had 36 tackles—24 solos, 12 assists.

□Played in all 11 games at right corner as a sophomore in 1986, and was in on 33 stops—28 solos, five assists. Picked off one pass, and returned it 95 yards for a TD in a 37-20 victory over Cincinnati.

□Started all 11 games at left corner as a junior in 1987, and also saw time on specialty teams. Broke up a team-high 11 passes and picked off one pass. Forced two fumbles and recovered one. Was seventh on club with 65 tackles—46 solos, 19 assists.

□Has been the No. 1 man at left corner every game this season. Has been in on 32 tackles—22 solos, 10 assists—has one interception and broke up the two-point conversion attempt that allowed UK to defeat Vandy. Also involved in freak play against Indiana. Johnson grabbed a blocked punt out of the air and returned in 15 yards for a UK first down.

Mike Jones, 6-0, 255, London: Came to UK from Beechwood High, where he was all-conference, all-district and all-region. Played in 1984 Northern Kentucky All-Star game.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Saw no action as a redshirt freshman in 1985.

□Played in one game as a sophomore in 1986, and two games as a junior in 1987.

□Is currently list as third-string at left guard behind Dean Wilks and Brian Denham. Has played in three games, with a high of 15 plays against Kent State.

Ron Mack, 5-10, 188, Lexington: Came to UK from Tates Creek, where he was a three-year letterman at quarterback and defensive back. Was all-state and all-city as a senior, and was named team MVP and Best Defensive Back. Also lettered in baseball and track.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Lettered as a redshirt freshman in 1985, making six tackles—two solos, four assists.

□Played in all 11 games as a sophomore in 1986, registering 23 tackles—14 solos, nine assists—and one fumble recovery.
□Came into his own as a junior, starting all 11 games at right corner. Was in on 41 tackles—22 solos, 19 assists—broke up four passes and had two interceptions.

□Had reconstructive surgery on his left shoulder in February of 1988 and was back at full speed for fall drills. He injured an ankle and an Achilles' on the first day of fall drills, however, and lost his starting corner spot to Chris Tolbert. Has played in seven games at both corner and safety, and has been in on five tackles—four solo, one assist.

Todd Meyer, 5-9, 180, Louisville: Came to UK from Louisville Trinity, where he was a three-year letterman as a defensive back.

□Played in two JV games, but saw no varsity action as a freshman in 1985.

□Redshirted second year at UK, in 1986.
□Played in seven games as a reserve cornerback in 1987 as a redshirt sophomore.
□Has played in one game as a junior in 1988, and was in on one tackle. Is scheduled to graduate early and will forego final year of eligibility on the gridiron.

Jeff Nelson, 5-10, 165, Florence: Came to UK from Boone County High (by way of Miami of Ohio), where he was a three-year letterman as a punter and wide receiver. Was all-state punter following senior season. Also lettered in basketball and track.

□Transferred to UK from Miami of Ohio, and sat out 1985 as a redshirt.

□Lettered during sophomore year after an injury forced starter Jay Tesar out of action. Averaged 40.2 yards on 41 punts. Had 12 coffin-corner punts. Turned a bad snap into a 52-yard pass completion to Guy Neal in 32-0 win over Southern Miss.

□Saw no action as a junior in 1987.
□Miss spring drills prior to senior season in order to participate in an internship program. Took over No. 1 punting job in fall practice, and started first six games of the season. Averaged 41.1 yards on 33 punts, but has not appeared since he had his fourth punt blocked and mishandled several snaps against LSU.

Martin Pennington, 6-2, 226, Corbin: Came to UK from powerhouse Corbin, where he was named first-team all-state following a senior season in which he caught 12 passes for 257 yards and four TDs. Also lettered in basketball and golf.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Started first game he appeared in, against Bowling Green as a redshirt freshman in 1985. Played in six games, and ended year with three catches for 27 yards.

□Played in all 11 games as a sophomore in 1986, catching four passes for 45 yards.
□Was penciled in as a starter before his junior season in 1987, but was slowed by a hip pointer two weeks before the season opener. Appeared in 10 games and was fifth on team in receiving with nine catches for 173 yards and one TD. Averaged a team-high 19.2 yards per catch.

□Was elevated to starter after Charlie Darrington was injured in fall drills this season, and started UK's first six games. Caught seven passes for 87 yards before going out with a sprained knee against LSU. Missed Georgia, Southern Illinois and Vandy games, and was

questionable for Florida game.

Mark Sellers, 6-3, 204, Louisville: Came to UK from Louisville Eastern, where he was a three-year letterman at quarterback and wide receiver. Also lettered in track.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Began UK career at split end in 1985, during his redshirt freshman season. Played in all 11 games and caught two passes for 22 yards.
□Moved to safety prior to sophomore season in 1986, and played in just one game.

□Played in nine games, earning three starts, in earning his first letter as a junior in 1987. Was in on 25 tackles—14 solos, 11 assists—and had two interceptions before a torn thigh muscle put him out for the year.
□Played in first eight games of 1988, but missed Vandy game because of an ankle injury. As backup safety, has been in on 32 tackles—19 solos, 13 assists—forced one fumble and recovered one fumble.

Bill Shehan, 5-11, 190, Florence: Came to UK from Boone County, where he lettered two years.

□Saw action in one game as a sophomore in 1986, three games last year as a junior.

□Has played in every game this season with the exception of UK's loss to Indiana, but has not been credited with a reception.

Bo Smith, 6-3, 267, Lexington: Came to UK from Henry Clark, where was a four-year letterman at linebacker and offensive tackle. All-conference pick last two years, honorable mention all-state as a senior.

□Redshirted first year at UK, in 1984.
□Played in three games as both a redshirt freshman (1985) and sophomore (1986).

□Injury hobbled his junior season in 1987. Suffered stress fracture in August, recovered, then played in only two games, against Ohio University and Ole Miss, before reinjuring the foot and going out for the season.

□Designated as UK's "swing tackle" early in the 1988 season, but has been the starter at right tackle since the LSU game after Mike Pfeifer and Tom Crumrine went out for the season with knee injuries.

Tim Smith, 6-1, 196, Whitesburg: Came to UK from Whitesburg, where he lettered three years as a running back.

□Saw no varsity action during his freshman (1984) and sophomore (1985) seasons, and was redshirted in 1986.

□Appeared in six games as a redshirt junior in 1987. Averaged 4.9 yards per carry and was fourth on squad in rushing with 112 yards on 23 carries. Had 54 yards against Utah State and 43 yards against Ohio University.

□Currently listed at both tailback and split end, but prior to the Florida game, had no rushing attempts or receptions.

Jay Tesar, 6-0, 184, Vine Grove: Came to UK from North Hardin, where he was a three-year letterman at quarterback and kicker. Was honorable mention all-state as a senior.

□Won starting job (and a scholarship) as a freshman in 1985, averaging 40.5 yards on 68 punts, seventh in the SEC.

□Hampered by injuries as a sophomore in 1986, missed seven games. Averaged 38.2 yards on eight punts.

□Retook starting job from Jeff Nelson as a junior in 1987, averaging 39.9 yards on 54 punts, seventh in the SEC. Placed 20 of those 54 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line.

□Sat out first six games of 1988 with a knee injury, and was expected to be redshirted this season. Has been the starter since the Georgia game, after UK punt team experienced problems with blocked punts and bad snaps. Has punted 12 times this season for an average of 37.3 yards per punt and a long of 53.

Jim Wetta, 6-2, 195, Wellington, Kan.: Came to UK from Hutchinson (Kan.) JC, where he was a two-year letterman. Had 30 catches for 500 yards as a sophomore.

□Played in three games as a junior in 1987.
□Hasn't seen action this season.

Back Thru The Wildcat Years

Five Years Ago

Playing in what would be their poorest game to date, the Kentucky Wildcat football team scrambled to tie the Cincinnati Bearcats 13-13 at Commonwealth Stadium.

Kentucky could not get its offense going for the entire evening. After two interceptions in the early going, coach Jerry Claiborne inserted backup quarterback Bill Ransdell, who did an adequate job, but his stats of 10 for 23 were deceiving, considering that time after time Wildcat receivers dropped passes.

The 'Cats got off to a bad start when on their first possession at the one-yard line tailback Lawrence "Choo Choo" Lee was pinned behind the goal line. And following a field goal, the visiting Bearcats led 5-0 after the first 15 minutes.

In the second quarter, Jenkins' second interception led to a 53-yard return and

suddenly Cincinnati led 13-0 after a successful two-point conversion.

Ransdell then entered the contest and promptly marched his team 63 yards for a touchdown. The Wildcats went into the halftime break trailing 13-7.

In the second half, Kentucky started a long offensive drive late in the third stanza. The drive was capped off in the early stages of the fourth quarter when George Adams found paydirt from three yards out. Unfortunately for the 'Cats, placekicker Chris Caudell missed the extra point as the final score ended at 13-11.

Adams led UK with 93 yards on the ground, but coughed up two fumbles on the night. Ransdell finished the game with 125 yards in the air.

Next Saturday, Kentucky travels to Nashville to take on Vanderbilt before a

WTBS televised audience. If UK, 5-2-1, wins it will have secured a winning slate, a paramount accomplishment considering last season the 'Cats recorded an 0-10-1 record.

Eight Years Ago

Kentucky broke loose with 14 points in the second half to defeat Vanderbilt 29-10 at Nashville for the Wildcats' first road win and fourth overall of the season. Vandy took a 10-9 lead in the first half before Kentucky scored on a Terry Henry to Scott Petersen touchdown pass from five yards out to lead at the half. UK then widened its lead in the third stanza when cornerback Greg Long intercepted a pass and ran 45 yards for the score.

Long recovered a fumble a few plays later and the 'Cats ended the scoring when Rod Francis found pay dirt from a yard out. UK's other first-half scores came on a 34-yard run by Chris Jones and a 37-yard field goal by Rick Strein. Jones gained 125 yards on the day while fullback Shawn Donigan had 88 for the 'Cats. UK finished the game with 284 yards via the ground.

Henry connected on six of 11 in the passing department.

The University of Kentucky basketball team held two scrimmages last week in the Bluegrass.

Before a jam-packed crowd at Cawood High School in Harlan, the Blue team defeated the Whites 79-65. Sam Bowie scored 22 points and grabbed 11 rebounds for the White team, while LaVon Williams added 21 points and Kyle Macy chipped in with 19. Dwight Anderson led the Blue team with 22 points.

In the second scrimmage before a sellout crowd of 6,000 at the Owensboro Sportscenter, the Blue team prevailed again, by a 92-80 score. Williams scored 24 points while Bowie added 22 and hauled in 15 boards. Forward Derrick Hord scored 19 points and Anderson 18 for the winning Blue squad. Fred Cowan scored 21 for the White team while Chuck Verderber netted 20.

Let's play two! The Kentucky Wildcat sports fan will get a double dose of Big Blue sports this Saturday. While the football team is battling the Florida Gators in Gainesville, the University of Kentucky basketball team will tipoff its season against preseason No. 1 choice Duke in the debut of the Hall of Fame Classic in Springfield, Mass.

Thirteen Years Ago

University of Kentucky basketball coach Joe B. Hall says he is very surprised as well as pleased after the Wildcats held their first intrasquad scrimmage game in Elizabethtown. The White team defeated the Blue team 100-82. Freshman Truman Claytor had 22 points, Rick Robey 20, Jack Givens 10 and Larry Johnson 14 for the White team. The Blues were led by Merion Haskins with 21 points, James Lee with 17 and Mike Phillips with 16.

In their second scrimmage the Whites won 130-85. Givens poured in a game-high 35 points while Robey contributed 32. Phillips and Claytor also tallied 28 and 19 points, respectively. Freshman Bob Folwer netted 24 while James Lee added 22 points.

It was a long and dreadful afternoon for the Kentucky football team in Gainesville, Fla. The Gators embarrassed Kentucky 48-7, the worst UK loss since 1970. UK tried four quarterbackbacks with Bill Tolston starting but having to leave with a knee injury.

Freshman Mike Shutt tried his hand but also was injured. Then Cliff Hite came in as well as Derrick Ramsey from his tight end

position.

Ramsey rushed for 72 yards for the 'Cats while Sonny Collins gained 68. Kentucky's only touchdown came with just six minutes remaining in the game.

Eighteen Years Ago

When it was all said and done, 220 points were totaled during a recent UK basketball scrimmage. While the offense brought good news, Adolph Rupp and his staff received some more good news when they learned Mike Casey did not suffer a bone chip in his right thumb, as thought earlier.

Kent Hollenbeck scored 34 points followed by Tom Parker with 29, Stan Key 25, and Terry Mills and Larry Steele added 21 apiece. Larry Stamper chipped in with 16 rebounds. Running back Doug Kotar was the Freshman Team's leading rusher this season. Kotar helped his club rack up a 4-1 mark by gaining 508 yards on the ground.

Mark Campbell gained 346 yards and quarterback Mike Fanuzzi added 305. Frank LeMaster rushed for 210 total yards.

Fanuzzi hit on 47.3 percent of his passes for 316 yards while backups Bruce Wohlleb and Ron Scriarro combined to connect on 14 of 23 passes.

Jeff Woodcock had 14 receptions while Jack Alvarez had 10.

Despite a 24-13 loss at the hands of host Florida, UK head football coach John Ray was pleased with his team's effort. This SEC contest, marked by many mistakes by the Wildcats, was deadlocked at 10 apiece at the completion of the first half. However, John Reeves came out as hot as a two-dollar pistol in the second half, hitting for three touchdowns passes.

UK's Bernie Scruggs hit on 12 of 26 passes, while Jim Reed led the team in rushing with 43 yards.

After an 11-year drought, Kentucky shocked favored Tennessee to win the Southeastern Conference cross country meet in a record time. Coach Press Whelan's team was led by Vic Nelson and Paul Baldwin, who crossed the finish line holding hands to insure a tie for first place.

Thirty Three Years Ago

Although crippled with injuries, the Kentucky Wildcats eased past Memphis State 41-7 at Stoll Field. The Wildcats were in front by only seven points at the intermission break (14-7).

The margin of victory proved to be the largest for the Wildcats since the 1950 Cotton Bowl team beat George Washington 47-13. Quarterback Bob Hardy rambled for touchdowns, twice from four yards out and threw for one touchdown to Howard Schnellenberger.

Billy Mitchell, Dick Maloney and John Cornelius also scored, the latter coming on a pass from Kenny Robinson.

Kentucky is now ninth in the 12-team Southeastern Conference race with a 2-3-1 conference record. Overall, the Wildcats are 5-3-1. The Mississippi Rebels lead the league with a 4-1 mark with the Auburn Tigers next at 4-1-1.

Two of the nation's top backs—Kentucky's Bob Hardy and Tennessee's Johnny Majors—will meet this week as UK's senior class bids to become the first-ever Wildcat team to never lose to arch-rival Tennessee.

Majors ranks ninth in the nation in total offense and 21st in rushing. Meanwhile, Hardy is listed No. 19 in total offense and No. 10 in the country's overall passing department.
