AND NOW FOR SOMETHING COMPLETELY DIFFERENT

Looking for something different--really different--to do next year? How about studying at the Ecole Nationale des Chartes in Paris for the 1986/87 academic year? The French Cultural Services, through the Newberry Library Center for Renaissance Studies, provides a monthly stipend of 2200-2400 French francs (\$300) and free tuition.
