## Mississippi Yearning: Optimism in loss

*Wildcats can't allow defeat to shake them*

STARKVILLE, Miss. — The winding, two-lane highway that snakes its way across the Alabama border into rural Mississippi paints a stark picture. Electric lights are few and far between. There are no foreign cars, and one headlight is the norm. The rebel flag flies just below the stars and stripes. The thriving metropolis of Columbus (population 23,799) and

its neighbor Starkville (pop. 18,458) are the region's cultural centers.

Mississippi State University sits in the middle of a pine forest just outside the latter.

Jackie Sherrill, one of the nation's winnings football coaches, came here to escape the scrutiny of a NCAA investigation at Texas A&M. He built the Bulldogs' back to respectability.

On Saturday, Sherrill reminded UK that building a football program takes time. I have never been a patient man. There is a formula for great

The first step is to expect victory, the second step is preparation, the third is execution and the final step is to get lucky.

A week after dismantling Louisville 38-24, the Wildcats pounced on their Southeastern Conference schedule with a new attitude.

The players, the fans, the coaches and the media expected them to win. Tim Couch threw three first-half touchdowns.

The UK defense contained a strong Mississippi State ground game, and the cowbell-clanging

idiots at Scott Field stood silent. I think I heard Earl and Buddy swallow their chaw.

Except for a special teams breakdown that let Bulldog Kevin Prentiss march 94 yards on a kick-off return, the first half was all UK. Mississippi State dominated the line of scrimmage in the second half, and for the first time in the Hal Mumme era, the Wildcats trailed an opponent, 22-21.

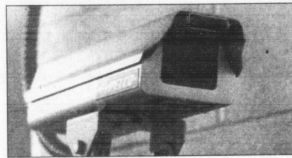
Instead of falling back into my usual pattern of doubt, fear and despair, I caught myself telling someone that no defense could hold UK for long.

## Security measures improving

Students living in residence halls might have reasons to feel a little more safe this fall.

Identification card readers and additional

New measures help students feel safer. Residence halls have added more student ID readers and announced fire drills to keep students safe.



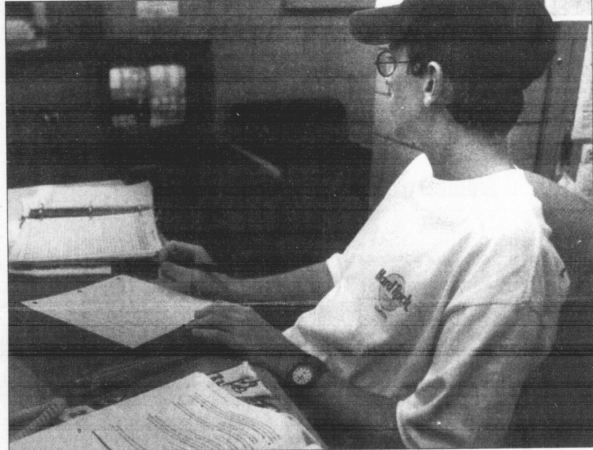

fire drills are on tap for the coming year, said Mast David, the hall director for Holmes Hall. "Safety is the primary concern of residence life," he said. "We are continually trying to improve in that area."

Although card readers are not available at every residence hall on campus yet, Haggin and Donovan halls have a card access system that requires students to swipe their IDs at the door.

"There is a plan at some point, to put all residence halls on the card access system" said Tony Ralph, assistant director of residence life.

But some students don't appreciate the concern because they

don't want to be further restricted and annoyed.

"I think a stronger security creates a problem only when it restricts the residents' personal rights and creates a strain between the (residence adviser) and the resident," said Ken Kirk, assistant hall director for Blanding Tower.

Jed Leano, a philosophy freshman, disagrees. "I really don't mind being carded when I walk in, because with everything happening on cam-

pus, I would like to know that visitors are being monitored," he said.

The addition of card readers would add to the already present rule requiring students to show their student IDs when entering their dorms after midnight.

Additionally, all halls have desk clerks available 24 hours for enforcing the security policies like enforcing visitors in coed halls to leave the halls by midnight on weekdays and 2 a.m. on weekends.

Also on the agenda to ensure residence hall safety is the increase of fire alarm drills during the semester.

"We have only had one fire test this semester," said Miranda Wright, a physical therapy freshman living in Jewell Hall. "Next week is Fire Awareness Week, and I am sure that we will have several more (fire drills) next week."

The two enhancements to residence hall safety add to existing

safety measures already at UK.

For example, Adopt-A-COPP, a joint venture between the residence halls and the UK police, assigns to each residence hall a police officer who will familiarize himself with staff and residences to provide more safety.

Also, the officers provide the residents with safety education programs and crime prevention methods.

### NATION Sisters, world mourn Mother Teresa

CALCUTTA, India — Weeping masses gathered in the rain Saturday to pay homage to one who belonged to this city as well as the world: Mother Teresa, a tireless minister to the "poorest of the poor."

The 87-year-old Catholic nun, who retained her simplicity and humility despite an avalanche of international fame, died Friday of a heart attack, surrounded by grieving sisters of her order.

"Today Mother Teresa is enjoying the presence of Jesus whom she loves and to whom she dedicated her work," said Father Sebastian, who celebrated a Mass in her honor at her convent's chapel. Sister Nirmala, her successor, said the funeral would be Sept. 13.

### Strike may strand commuters

SAN FRANCISCO — Employees of the area's commuter train system walked off the job Sunday in a pay dispute, a strike that could strand thousands when the work week begins.

The Bay Area Rapid Transit's 56 trains were idled as about 65,000 weekend riders were forced to find other transportation. Commuter headaches were expected this morning if the 275,000 daily riders are forced onto roadways. Union members reportedly are seeking annual raises of 6.5 percent, 5.5 percent and 5 percent over the three years of a new contract.

Story Musgrave left NASA when it told the 30-year space program veteran he wasn't scheduled for any more shuttle flights.

Musgrave at 62 is the oldest person to fly in space. He will be working for CNN, PBS, Disney and USA Weekend to spread his message about space.

## Student finds comfort in mourning masses

Editor's note: This story is a first-person account of events surrounding the death and funeral of Princess Diana as told by a UK student studying abroad.

LONDON — If there's any story that I hadn't planned on writing during my stay in London, the Death of Princess Diana ranks right up there with a dream article I wrote titled "My Dinner With the Queen."

Yet I am faced with living and working under the indescribably oppressive pall of misery that has swept through the capital this past week.

I awoke last Sunday morning, the same way most people in this country did, only to hear news that would shock a nation. Even at 7 a.m., every radio and television station had preempted normal programming for "round the clock coverage. News anchors were giving heartbreaking eulogies you knew they'd been rehearsing for the Queen Mum's death. Like the obligatory "It came outta nowhere" statement after a Kentucky tornado,

"shocked" is how everyone described the tragic death of the Princess of Wales.

By Monday evening, my roommate and I had resigned ourselves to joining the crowds at Kensington Palace, two blocks from our apartment. We joined the masses shuffling slowly toward the front gates, thousands of us lodged between the news vans parked next to the curb and the black, iron rails of the fence. I was momentarily cheered, when I saw ABC "World News Tonight" anchor Peter Jennings get into a black cab, just inches from where I stood.

Police guided pedestrians toward the main gates of the park and we filed in and fanned out over the lawn toward the palace. It looked like something out of a B-rate horror movie. The sky was an eerie red and thousands of people silently moved toward the dark house, candles in hand.

In front of the Palace gates bouquets of flowers were stacked knee-high, and there was still a long line of people waiting to place more. Attached to the countless flowers were

notes and tributes, most of them hopelessly banal, but no doubt heartfelt.

Naturally I had expected a lot of people, but what surprised me was the diversity. Men in three piece suits with briefcases, mothers and children, and guys in leather all stared solemnly toward the house. People I would cross the street to avoid meeting on a dark night seemed considerably less intimidating weeping over pink roses.

It is really difficult trying to write about the public grief felt at the Princess' death because it's not a public grief at all. It's a private grief, multiplied millions of times over. People I've observed and spoken to in this city over the last five days feel personally bereaved, as if a close relation has died.

Even now, almost a week after the accident, London is still blanketed in grief.

Radio stations continue to play morbid music on the off chance that if you aren't already suicidal, they might be able to push you over the edge.

All of this hoopla begs the question, why do I care? Lmean, I'm a Kentucky

girl; most of the headlines I read tend to have "UK Basketball," "tobacco" or "KERA" in them.

But in many ways Princess Diana's death has affected me because of where I am. No matter how loved she was around the world, the truth is London was her home. During the time I've spent in this country over the last three years, I've seen the love-hate relationship the British have with the monarchy. Most self-respecting Londoners would roll their eyes in exasperation when asked to comment on the Royal Family, but sneak a copy of "The Sun" or "The Mirror" into their briefcase on the way home from work.

I doubt I would have given it much of a thought if I were back at UK. However these days a lot of those same folks are feeling guilty for invading her privacy by supporting those papers.

I imagine the atmosphere here will remain much the same. The procession route was doubled due to public demand, and the service was broadcast on movie screens in Hyde Park.

Naturally, I was out of bed bright and early along with the other untold millions of Brits. After all, I am living in London.

Author and minister Renita J. Weems will speak on the subject "Something Within" as part of the annual Roots and Heritage Festival.

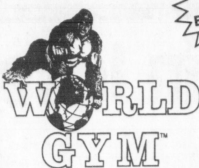

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**Wildcat defense suffocates foes**

The UK Wildcats captured the Kentucky Invitational title with back-to-back shutouts against Bradley and Cleveland State this weekend, and in turn raised their record to 3-1.

The team remained undefeated at home this season, defeating BU 3-0 and CSU 1-0.

"One of our goals is not to lose at home," sophomore Jason Bell said. "We're doing good so far." UK started out the game Saturday against Bradley with a Brian Baltzell penalty kick 13:08 into the match. The Cats then exchanged possessions with the Braves until UK sophomore Chris Villamil stepped in.

Villamil scored from 20 yards out unassisted at the 39:00 mark, putting UK up 2-0.

He wasn't done yet. Just minutes later, an ailing Bell headed the ball in to Villamil, who put it past the goalie, giving UK a 3-0 lead and the game.

"I got some opportunities around the goal," Villamil said. "I knew I had to finish them, or I'd probably be sitting right over there on the bench somewhere."

"The third goal was one of the best goals we've ever had here," UK Coach Ian Collins said. "I can't ask for better than that. All I can ask, is that we do it consistently."

As exciting as those few minutes were, the second half lost all thrills. UK's only significant scoring opportunity in the half was on a Sean Mondelli cross shot that glanced off the right pole and went out of bounds.

The team came back out to face CSU with the UKIT title on the line. UK wouldn't disappoint the more than 500 fans in attendance.

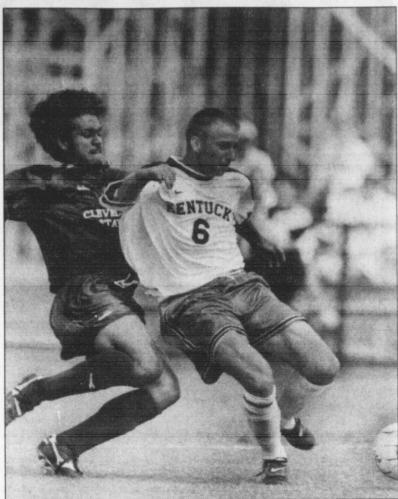
CSU, fresh off a 4-0 victory over North Carolina-Asheville the day before, had a distinct size advantage over the quicker Wildcats. UK used that to their advantage, running circles around the slower Vikings.

The Cats scored their only goal of the game on a deflection off Bell. Lee Baker fed the ball into Bryan DePriest, who took a direct shot at the goal. The ball was deflected off a CSU defender, into Bell's back, and then into the goal.

"It was a case of being in the right place at the right time," Bell said.

UK's defense took this weekend as a coming-out party, allowing no goals, and even more importantly to Collins, not many chances to put points on the board.

"We shut out two quality teams in a weekend," Collins said. "And also, the number of good scoring opportunities we gave away were really not very many."

Emotions began to run high at the end of yesterday's match, due perhaps in part to CSU's game plan not working as they had hoped it would. There were four yellow cards in the game, and Collins attributes that to the Vikings' loss of hope.

"I think sometimes when you have a lot of possessions, like they

did, you feel you have a divine right to win the game," Collins said.

UK placed four players on the All-Tournament team, including three members of the defense: sophomore defenders Baker and Todd Stonestreet and senior goalie Chris West. Also named to the team was Villamil for his two goals in Saturday's game.

its fastest start since 1993, after winning two of three matches this weekend at the Hawkeye Classic in Iowa City, Iowa.

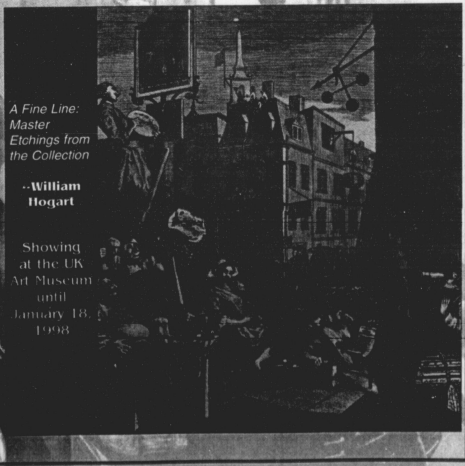

## Cats make grade, then fade: 35-27 Sanderford

Starkville provides interesting glance into SEC culture

STARKVILLE, Miss. — When the bully gets knocked to the ground, you have to hit 'em, kick 'em and beat 'em to ensure they stay on their backsides for good.

Saturday in front of 30,121 at Scott Field on the campus of Mississippi State University, the UK football team played the role of the abuser while the Bulldogs were thumped as the abused.

But it proved to be only Act I of a two-act play.

The UK backyard squall only lasted for 30 minutes as MSU turned it into a second-half brawl, handing the Wildcats a 35-27 defeat, their first loss of the 1997 season.

"It was a very physical game out there," UK head coach Hal Mumme said following the Wildcats' Southeastern Conference opener.

"You have got to give Coach Dunn (MSU defensive coordinator) and their defense credit. In the third quarter when they had to make plays on us they did."

Shooting out of the gates early, behind Coach's 211 passing yards and three touchdown strikes, the Wildcats built a 21-10 half-time lead.

Couch finished the contest with 39 completions on 61 attempts for 349 yards with four touchdowns and one interception.

His number for attempts broke the UK record he set last week against Louisville and tied the SEC mark with completion.

However, the host Bulldogs used an attacking zone defense in the second half, forcing Couch to stand in the pocket trying to find an open receiver in the midst of the MSU blitzes.

"The players got some rush on them and the game was completely different from the first half to the second half," MSU head coach Jackie Sherrill said.

The UK defense didn't get the same luxury, as they tried relentlessly to pressure MSU in the backfield. UK linebacker Jeff Snedegar said the Bulldogs were physical and big — bigger than the Louisville team the Cats faced in the first game.

"I thought they were bigger and better than Louisville," Snedegar said. "Their line was bigger and a little bit faster up front."

Still Mumme praised his defense's effort, holding the two MSU tailbacks, the two leading rushers in the SEC, to a combined 135 yards.

"I told the defense I felt like we played good enough for us to win," Mumme said.

At the 7:01 mark in the third stanza, UK trailed for the first time all season.

Running around the right side of the MSU offensive line as they did most of the afternoon, behind All-American offensive tackle candidate Robert Hicks (6-foot-8, 351 pounds), Bulldog tailback James Johnson took the ball from a 27-22 Wildcat advantage.

The two-point conversion failed, but still the Bulldogs led 23-22.

But not for long. UK's final scoring of the game came in the third quarter when wide receiver Kio Sanford hauled in a 19-yard bullet from Couch in the middle of the end zone for a 27-22 Wildcat advantage.

UK went for two, but Couch's pass was intercepted in the corner of the end zone.

But to get the touchdown, UK had to pull a "rabbit out of the hat" — a fake punt on fourth and 20 from their own 46-yard line.

Wildcat backup quarterback Dusty Bonner took the snap and hit Jimmy Haley for a 29-yard gain down to the MSU 25 yard line to set up UK's last score.

MSU kicker Brian Hazelwood sent the Wildcats their final bill with two fourth quarter field goals.

A 48-yard boot on the first play of the fourth quarter cut UK's slim margin to two and gave MSU a 28-27 lead. With his 32-yard boot at 7:19, the Bulldogs took the final advantage.

Johnson's 1-yard scamper around the left end tacked on six more points giving MSU a 35-27 lead and an eight-point deficit UK tried to erase in the waning moments of the game.

UK's final straw came with 1:10 remaining and 80 yards away from potential overtime.

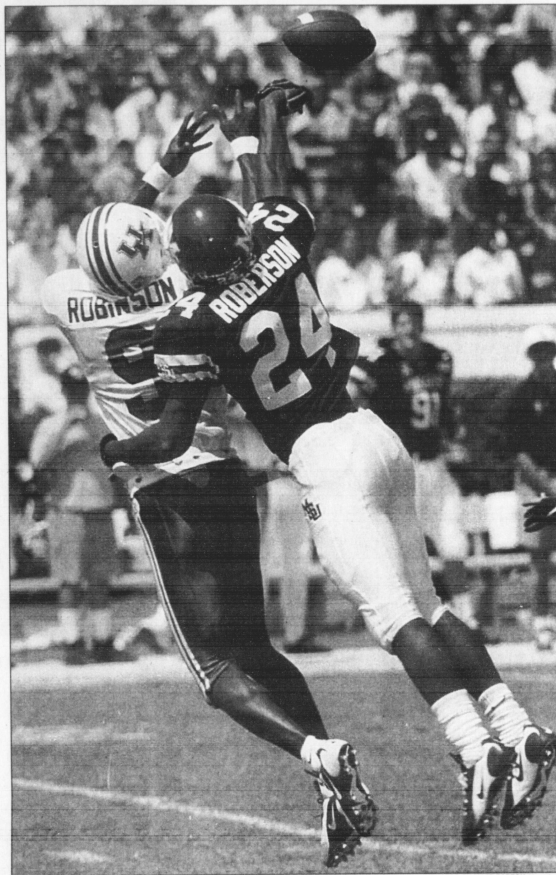
Couch orchestrated a UK drive down to the MSU 49-yard line with five ticks on the clock left before the final heave to the end zone.

"I thought Kio and Tim made great efforts to get that first down for us to give us one last shot at the end zone," Mumme said.

Mumme also said the Wildcats have to capitalize on every opportunity and play fundamental football each week in order to avoid the stale play in the final two quarters of the game.

"We're the type of team that we've got to maximize stuff," he said.

"We really have to do good things all the time and that includes the coaching staff."

## Mumme takes credit for stalled offense

STARKVILLE, Miss. — In the wake of UK's 35-27 loss Saturday to MSU comes a multitude of missed chances and costly mistakes.

Taking the blame was UK head coach Hal Mumme for the Wildcats' weak play in the second half against the Bulldogs, especially on the offensive side of the football.

"I did a poor job," Mumme said of his first loss in the Wildcat blue and white. "I didn't call some plays

we probably should have called."

Instead of mixing up the play selection and attacking the Bulldog defense by throwing downfield in the third quarter, the Wildcats tried to jump start an ineffective running game along with screen passes out in the flat.

Short dump passes are used like draw plays in this offense and were effective in opening up the field against Louisville. However, MSU defensive coordinator Joe Lee Dunn's defense's pursuit to the football was much quicker on the shorter pass routes which prevented

UK workouts from making the big plays. Dunn is now 5-0 against Mumme's teams.

"I got kind of conservative on our end of the field," Mumme said. "And where I think I messed up is that I didn't attack them like I did in the first half. I got a little bit conservative and we tried to go with some screens and they were ready for that."

"It was a good call on his (Dunn) part. We didn't attack down field."

UK quarterback Tim Couch supported his coach's decisions and

tried to overcome MSU's defensive pressure late in the game when the momentum swung the Bulldogs' way.

"Maybe we could have put the down field a little more," Couch said. "We're just going to take whatever he did and try to execute the best we can."

"I've got to do a better job of keeping people off balance," Mumme said. "I really think I let them gain the momentum on us right there (in the third quarter)."

"I don't know what got into me."

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# a Tribute to Greatness

Industry's best tribute music great

Late August, the Bob Dylan-founded Egyptian Records released *The Songs of Jimmie Rodgers - A Tribute* in celebration of the 100-year anniversary of Rodgers' birth. This disc sets the standard for what a tribute album should be. In the age of cheap remakes by trendy artists (see the Led Zeppelin Tribute-Encomium for example), *The Songs of Jimmie Rodgers* stands alone as a sincere and worthy homage to a revolutionary.

It boasts an impressive list of artists — the likes of Van Morrison, Bob Dylan, Bono and John Mellencamp — each one legendary in their own right.

OK, this looks impressive, but who the hell is Jimmie Rodgers? Well, the singing brakeman or the blue yodeler as he was known, was a gifted guitar player and innovative singer/songwriter of the 1920s. He was the first inductee to make both the Country Music Hall of Fame and the Grammy Hall of Fame and is widely regarded as the father of country music.

As important to the revolution of modern music as Elvis and John Lennon combined, Jimmie Rodgers is in many ways "the man who started it all."

Through this eclectic and heartfelt collection, Jimmie Rodgers' undeniable impact and genius are revealed. The texture of the songs are rich and colorful. The song choices are impeccable.

Willie Nelson's cover of "Peach Pickin' Time in Georgia" and Van Morrison's cover of "Mule Skinners Blues" are countrified and

fun. While Steve Earle's "In the Jailhouse Now" and Dwight Yoakam's version of "I'm for Texas" sound perfectly raw and bluesy. The pace changes again with John Mellencamp's brilliant cover of "Gambler's Bar Room Blues" proving that Jimmie Rodgers was more than some country crooner but an out and out rock 'n' roller.

As well as this album rocks it also sways. Dylan's sweetened vocals on "My Blue Eyed Jane" are just plain beautiful and David Ball's "Miss the Mississippi and You" is lovely.

On the opening track I was unexpectedly taken by U2's Bono, who sounds much more at home on "Dreamin' with Tears in My Eyes" than anywhere on the *Pap* album. It is down right pretty — this is the Bono we know and love.

By far, the most touching performance on the album is Jerry Garcia's "Blue Yodel #9." This was Garcia's last-ever studio recording before his death in 1995.

The atmosphere on this track is bittersweet and laced with irony (after all Jimmie Rodgers died long before his time at the tender age of 36). The vocals are soft and the instrumentals are exquisite. If you ever loved music, you must hear this album.

However, it will probably be shocking to many young ears for the very reasons I recommend it. *The Songs of Jimmie Rodgers* is in no way a record company gimmick. Jimmie Rodgers was not given a 1997 makeover and you will definitely not find pre-pubescent Hanson harmonizing on "Waiting for a Train."

Instead you get sounds of love and deep admiration for an artist, the artist, who in many ways made it all possible. The list of singers goes on, each song is as unique as the man they are sang for.

*The Songs of Jimmie Rodgers - A Tribute* is a landmark effort and is a necessary addition to any music collection.

## Program offers an 'in'

*New summer session proves to be successful*

In an effort to broaden the University's admission criteria, the school is looking beyond merely ACT scores and grade-point averages for student acceptance.

"We didn't want to just admit these students," adviser Don Giles said. "We wanted to try to admit them into an environment in which they would be successful."

"That was our goal."

The Summer Eight program, developed by Admissions Director Pat Herring, was created to ensure that incoming freshmen who otherwise would not have been accepted into the University would be successful this year by attending an eight-week session of classes this summer.

Sixty-one students enrolled in Communications 181, English 101 and UK 101 under the guidance of various professors and academic advisers.

The goal of the program was to prepare students for the challenges of the fall term, by allowing them to get "a feel for university-level work," said Giles, a member of the Summer Eight committee, which tracked the program from beginning to

end.

The program was implemented this year out of concern that the level of competition among the freshmen class has been going up every year at UK.

"We are looking at really good students that cannot be accepted," Herring said.

Although the students are talented in many areas, he said, UK is unable to accept them because they either did not have a high enough GPA or ACT score.

Of the more than 8,000 applicants, the admissions office invited 340 to attend the transitional program. Sixty-one students accepted the university's offer and 59 completed the program.

"It was incredibly successful," Giles said. "The reaction from parents and students was nothing but positive."

There were no failing grades and only a handful of Ds earned in classes that were taught on the university level, Herring said.

Regarding Summer Eight, parents shared positive thoughts in a survey such as, "It gave my child a chance to meet new friends and get acquainted with campus," and "It was an excellent program ... I only hope it is around for my younger child."

The University is in the process of rethinking admissions criteria to go beyond simply ACT and GPAs, in an effort to admit those students who fall just short of the standards.

"We want to go beyond the numbers," Herring said. "We want to look at how students do their senior year and if their classes were particularly challenging."

Summer Eight is the first step in revising the standards of acceptance.

Plans are underway for next summer's session with hopes that it will expand to around 100 students, although Herring noted that the size and growth of the program depend on students' willingness to work and their desire to be at UK.

"At admissions, the last thing we want is to set our students up for failure. We are being very ambitious (with regards to the program), but we want to proceed cautiously."

The students will be tracked closely through the school year by academic advisers to monitor how they are performing and adjusting.

The group of 59 have classes with each other, in hopes of further easing them into university life.

## Social Work dean retiring

A search and screening committee has recently been appointed by Chancellor Elisabeth Zinser to help decide who will be the next dean of the College of Social

Work.

The committee is made up of 12 educational professionals, two students and one person from the State Department of Mental Health and Retardation Services. Some of these professionals are in the social work field while other

committee members are in different selected field areas.

Committee members include a person from Northern Kentucky University and a person from the University of Louisville. Both a graduate student and an undergraduate student will join the committee.

Jim Hougland of the UK sociology department will serve as committee chairman.

In an Aug. 29 memo to the committee, Zinser announced the committee's purpose was to:

- ▼ Seek a candidate with original ideas, a proven record in leadership, capacity for change and progress and a commitment to inclusive learning.
- ▼ Develop a diverse pool of candidates.
- ▼ Screen applicants and recommend candidates for interviews.

Ed Sagan has been Dean of the College of Social Work for the past two years. Sagan, who has been with the University for 29 years, has decided to retire after this year.

Along with his position as dean of social work, Sagan has worked with the College of Education and the Graduate School.

Sagan said his greatest accomplishment with the College of Social Work was the establishment of the new joint doctoral program in social work between UK and U of L.

"We essentially had a summer to design a curriculum, to do all the planning and admissions criteria," Sagan said.

Sagan said after the proposal was passed, things got a little crazy.

"We had to scurry like mad to get the publicity brochures and the applications out quickly," he said.

Between the two universities there are currently 12 students — six at each school.

"For a new doctoral program, it's considered to be very substantial," Sagan said.

Working with Zinser to help bring the program to UK was his most memorable experience as well as his most challenging, he said.

Zinser said Sagan "has really established a legacy in the University. He provided a strong but gentle leadership role in the College of Education as well as in the College of Social Work."

She said Sagan is a joy to work with.

"He is a happy person who loves the University," she said. "He pushes himself and his faculty."

Along with serving as dean of social work, Sagan serves as chairman of the admissions committee at Virginia Place, a family shelter. Virginia Place helps single parents who are in post-secondary education programs.


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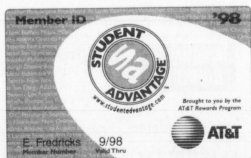

We must take the issue to the administration at every turn and encourage local media outlets such as the Herald-Leader, radio and television stations to focus more than ever on the needs of UK's handicapped population. It's imperative that every group contact SGA/RHA to see how they can contribute to this effort.

A solution won't come cheap or come quickly. There once was a proposal to install an elevator in the Commons, but it fell through because its structure does not lend itself to creation of a single shaft through every floor. The costly structural changes required by an elevator would come directly from the housing department's budget and not UK's general budget.

There are projects in the works to improve handicap access such as plans for ramps at Keeneland and Patterson halls; however, it's wrong to limit wheelchair-bound students to one portion of campus simply because it is cost-effective and convenient for the university. Perhaps those in the Administration Building will join us and finally make the entire campus friendly for everyone.
