GASOLENE STORAGE TANKS.

We have purchased a lot of heavy Boiler Tanks (taken out of a Sugar Refinery.) They are twenty feet long, forty-eight inches diameter, made of one-quarter inch boiler plates, riveted, and gasolene tight under pressure; can be buried in the ground without protection; are as good for storage purposes as new tanks; they will hold about 1900 gallons (thirty-eight barrels); are tapped for two inch filling and three-quarter vent and emptying pipes.

Large consumers of Gasolene are much benefited by having storage, as a quantity of fluid can then be purchased at once and at the time of the year when the market favors buyers. Freightage can also generally be contracted at more favorable rates by the car load.

By burying the tanks in the earth the fluid is *safely* stored. A pipe may be run to the gas machine, one hundred feet or more away, and by a valve the generator can be *frequently* replenished and a more *uniform* quality of light obtained.

We offer these tanks at the low price of \$150.00 each, delivered F. O. B. in Boston.

1^o 750,000 acres, for 26 members of Congress.

2^o All sold, for \$439,186. One tenth was invested in Experimental Farms and we were to receive our income from the remainder, - about \$395,000

3^o The bonds representing this \$395,000 were sold for \$405,000 and the state gave its bond to the college for an additional sum of \$95,000, making the round sum of \$500,000, chiefly land scrip fund from which we receive our income.

4^o The value of our farms, buildings apparatus, &c., has been placed at

\$532,000. ^{President's Office} cannot now place my hand on the data for this estimate, and so cannot verify its nor yet give the items.

5. The state gave \$99,500 to our building fund, and it recently paid a bonded debt of \$80,000, incurred partly for buildings and partly for purely educational outlays.

6. Not at all.

7. \$30,000 from the \$50,000 bond already referred to. Our other income, as from our farms, is small and varies from season to season so that it can scarcely be reported.

I trust that the foregoing answers will prove sufficiently full and explicit for your purpose.

You will please send me a copy of your latest report.

Some changes in our courses made it necessary for us to issue a circular which entirely supersedes much of our catalogue of 1880-81. Of this circular I enclose a copy.

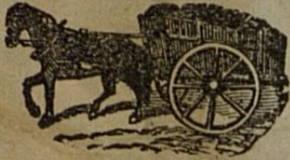

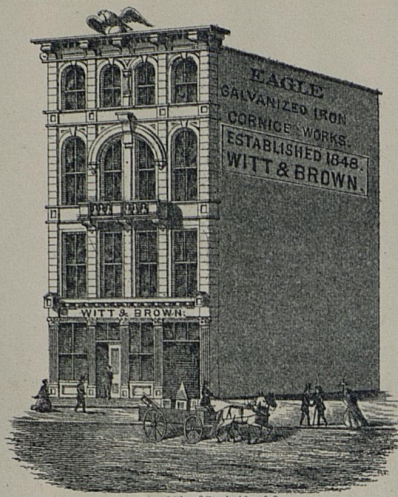
