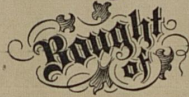

CLOSING EXERCISES AT WEST POINT.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE N. Y. TRIBUNE.

West Point, June 7th, 1882.

During the last year at West Point especial attention has been paid to gymnastics under the superintendence of Lieut. Farrow, who was graduated in 1876, but has already won some reputation

in Indian fighting, and has written three treatises on military subjects. The result of this drill is that this year's graduating class contains the finest gymnasts ever seen at the academy.

General Horace Porter, and the other members of the Board of Visitors, were present at the exercises to-night, which included vaulting and turning somersaults over a high horse, Indian club swinging that would have done credit to professionals, tumbling, and the use of the hanging rings, trapeze, parallel bars, and pole leaping. The exercises on the horizontal bar were particularly admirable, and Cadet Kuhn won rounds of applause by executing the *giant swing* six times in succession. The cadets appeared to great advantage in white close-fitting uniforms.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE N. Y. HERALD.

West Point, June 7th, 1882.

Lieut. Edward S. Farrow, who is an Assistant Instructor in Tactics and head of the gymnasium, has made a careful study of the effects of systematic practice upon the cadets. Upon coming under his care each "plebe" is carefully measured, and at the end of each term the measurements are again taken. The last report on the present class, which covered the period of four months, from September 1 last to December 31, showed, out of a total of sixty-three members, the following figures:—

In connection with this branch of physical training one of the most enjoyable and satisfactory exhibits of the series of displays made before the Board of Visitors was given this evening in the gymnasium, where about a score of the fourth class men went through a programme of mixed gymnastics in a manner which would bring credit to a professional company. It was certainly the very best display of amateur work to be seen in any institution, and was far ahead of any college efforts. The order of exercises included some twenty different forms of effort, opening with wall climbing, in which some of the students acted as supports for those above. The springboard was followed by exercises

in tumbling, where the white jacketed athletics turned over and over and turned themselves about in a most bewildering fashion. Two great "bucks," or wooden horses, (one of them a fair model of Jumbo) were jumped over in all manner of ways by the agile cadets. The parallel bars, pole leaping, weight lifting, and exercises on the ladder—each showed to advantage the admirable training of the boys, who had been but a year in the Academy. The programme was carried out before a very large assemblage of the visitors to the Post, and at its conclusion Lieut. Farrow, the instructor of the class, was heartily congratulated on the success which had attended his efforts to make the new cadets strong of limb, *quick of eye and ready of muscle*.
