# A Lesson on Lead Pencils.

From June No., 1887, "COMMON SCHOOL EDUCATION," Boston, Mass.

BY R. E. MOWRY.

On the previous day the pupils were directed to learn, for the general exercise to-morrow, all that they could about lead pencils, including where the materials are found, and the places and method of manufacture.

Teacher.—How many of you have come to the conclusion that there is more to a lead pencil than ever you had thought of before? Yes, Tommy, you may give what you have learned about the subject, as it must be something very interesting, you are so anxious to give it.

Tommy.—They are not LEAD pencils at all, but are made of graphite. Teacher.-Why are they called LEAD pencils, and what is graphite?

Johnnie.- I found from the encyclopædia that previous to the employment of graphite for making pencils, common lead was used, and that this was used as late as the present century. Then when graphite with its black mark was employed, it was called BLACK LEAD, from its contrast to the pale color of common lead.

Mary.—I found in a chemistry that graphite is a mixture of carbon and a small quantity of iron. It is one kind of coal that we burn, but it is generally found mixed with some other substance.

Teacher.—Yes, and that is the reason that it has been so difficult to obtain graphite suitable for the manufacture of our pencils. Can any one tell me where the graphite was first found that was

employed to make such pencils as we now use?

Hattie. - They were first made from the "black lead" of the Borrowdale Mines, in the County of Cumberland, England. These mines were discovered during the reign of Queen Elizabeth. The English government soon prohibited the exportation of the graphite, and the mine was allowed to remain open only six weeks in the year, but the continued working of it for a century or more finally exhausted the yield.

Teacher. - What was then used for the manufacture of pencils?

Mabel.—Long before the Borrowdale Mine was exhausted, a French merchant, John P. Alibert, residing in Siberia, incited by the reports of the gold discoveries in America, began to examine the beds of the rivers in that region, hunting for gold. In one of the mountain gorges near Irkutsk, he discovered samples of pure graphite. After seven years of labor, and the expenditure of vast sums of money, he was rewarded by disclosing an unbroken layer of pure graphite, from which solid pieces, weighing eighty pounds or more could readily be taken. This mine is on Mount Batougol, now called Mount Alibert, in honor of John Alibert's discovery. Mr. Alibert finally entered into a contract by which the Siberian graphite was to be furnished for all time to the house of A. W. Faber alone.

Fred.—I should like to know where Mabel learned about this?

Mabel.—I found in uncle's library a pamphlet entitled "The Pencil-lead Mines of Asiatic Siberia." It gave a great deal more than I have given about the finding and working of these mines, and also gave an account of the starting and the later history of the manufacture of Faber's lead pencils.

Teacher.—Has any one else read this sketch?

Lester .- I have.

Teacher.—Then will you please tell us about Faber's establishment from the beginning?

Lester .- Caspar Faber settled in the little village of Stein, near Nurnberg, and there commenced the manufacture of Faber's pencils.

Teacher. - Can you tell us the year?

At that time his entire estate consisted of a small Lester.—I think it was in the year 1761. cottage surrounded by a garden, and the weekly product of his factory was carried to Nurnberg or Furth, in a hand-basket and sold. But the high prices then paid for his goods furnish the best proof of their early superiority.

Anthony William Faber, whose name the firm bears to this day, succeeded his father, Caspar Faber.

The business gradually grew under the successive owners, but under the management of Mr. J. Lothair Faber, who is at the head of the firm now, the business has increased rapidly. He associated with him his two brothers, Mr. John Faber, who remained with him at Stein, and Mr. Eberhard Faber, who came to the United States and established a branch house in New York, in which is centred the trade of the United States, Canada and the rest of North America. Each year called for additions and enlargements in the establishment. The new factory buildings were constructed with the view to promote the best welfare of the community of human beings growing up around the establishment. This community became a village by itself, which was cared for by the proprietor. A liberal increase of wages was given after a certain number of years' employment. A savings bank, library, child's nursery, and open-air gymnasium were established. In all out-of-door sports the sons and nephews of the proprietor take their parts with the other boys. A church was built and given to the people by Mr. Faber. The gardens and park surrounding the houses of the two brothers inclose the factory buildings on three sides, while the river Rednitz runs between them and the village itself.

Teacher.—The existence of such a village family of industrious working men, women and chil-

dren is a great benefit to the country where it is found.

Lester.—In 1861 a centennial festival was held in the village, at which employees and employees

celebrated the anniversary of the founding of the business.

Teacher.—Are all the "Faber's pencils" made in Stein, and does the graphite used in their

manufacture come from Siberia exclusively?

Mary.—All their pencils used in the United States are made in New York, except their high-priced drawing pencils, while those used in Europe are made at Stein. The graphite used in making the very best pencils, those known as the Siberian drawing pencils, is the Siberian graphite. The graphite used for the other pencils is obtained from the Bohemian mines.

Teacher.—Can some one give us a short account of how graphite pencils are made?

Johnnie.—The graphite is ground fine and washed until pure, and then formed into solid blocks by means of great pressure, generally in hydraulic presses. These blocks are sawed into thin plates about a sixteenth of an inch in thickness, which are again cut across so as to form them into small square sticks. These sticks are inclosed in wood to prevent their breaking or soiling the hands.

Teacher.—Mary, can you tell us about the cutting of the wood?

Mary.—The wood is sawed into thin boards about half the thickness of the intended pencils; these are then cut into small pieces about ten inches long by six inches wide, which are placed in a cutting and grooving machine. This machine cuts out a fine square groove into which the lead fits. This is covered by another piece of wood which is not grooved. The two are glued together and then passed through another machine, which gives them the smooth surface we see. They are next polished and stamped with the maker's name, and the letter that designates their peculiar quality.

Teacher.—You see a great deal of work is put into every pencil we use. What is the wood of

which they are made, and where is it found?

l

Hattie.—They are made of cedar wood, and that is obtained in Florida. The red cedar of Florida is noted for its adaptability for pencil manufacture, and the wood for all the pencils, except the large carpenter's pencils, is obtained in Florida.

Henry.—The wood from Faber's mill is carried to Stein and made into pencils to supply the

European trade, and is also carried to New York to be used to supply the American trade.

Teacher.—Then all the wood used for our pencils comes from our own country, and is manufactured in our own country. I wish you always to notice what articles are exported and what are imported. You will in this way form some opinion of the importance of the country we live in. I wish we could talk of this subject longer, but I see our time is up.
