It appears from the statement of Mr. Murray that the Station used the canvas covers first in 1886. They were borrowed of Col. Phelps and were in the possession of the Station about six [6] weeks at that time.

Mr. Murray reports that they were then in fair condition.

They were borrowed again in the winter of 1888, for a short time, to cover up some tobacco to keep it "in case".

They were then returned and placed on the cannon.

In June, '88, they were again borrowed to put under the "fan", and at this time Mr. Murray reports that he found them on the ground and considerably torn.

Just how much the Station damaged them, I can not tell, but am inclined to believe that the weather had more to do with their destruction than our use of them.



In addition to the regular courses of instruction, and the appointed aids in Laboratory work, occasional lectures, or informal accounts of results obtained in special lines of research carried on at the Laboratory, may be expected from some of those who will occupy investigators' tables. Professor E. B. Wilson, of Bryn Mawr, and Professor C. S. Minot, of Harvard Medical School, will be among the number of such contributors.

The new Laboratory is located on the shore, at Wood's Holl, Massachusetts, near the Laboratories of the United States Fish Commission. The building consists of two stories: the lower, for the use of students receiving instruction, the sists of two stories: the lower, for the use of students receiving instruction, the upper, exclusively for investigators. The Laboratory has aquaria supplied with running sea water, boats, collecting apparatus, and dredges; it will also be supplied with alcohol and other reagents, glassware, and a limited number of microtomes and microscopes. By the munificence of friends the library will be provided henceforth not only with the ordinary text-books and works of reference, but also with the more important Journals of Zoölogy and Botany, and many of them in complete series. many of them in complete series.

#### THE LABORATORY FOR INVESTIGATORS

will be open from June 3 to August 31. It will be fully equipped with aquaria,

will be open from JUNE 3 to AUGUST 31. It will be fully equipped with aquaria, glassware, reagents, etc., but microscopes and microtomes will not be provided. In this department there are eight private rooms for the use of investigators not requiring instruction, who are invited to carry on their researches at the Laboratory. Those who require supervision in their work, or, being already

prepared to begin original work, desire special suggestions and criticism, or extended instruction in technique, will occupy tables in the general laboratory for investigators, and will pay for its privileges a fee of fifty dollars.

#### THE LABORATORY FOR STUDENTS

will be opened on Wednesday, July 10, for regular courses of seven weeks in Marine Zoölogy, and Microscopical Technique. Botany will be taught for the present season during August. Opportunities will be given for collecting and preparing material for use in the class-room and for special lines of study. Hand lenses, dissecting instruments, drawing materials, etc., may be bought at cost in the Laboratory. It is desired, that students owning microscopes or microtomes should being them and material for use in the class-room and for special lines of study. Hand lenses, dissecting instruments, drawing materials, etc., may be bought at cost in the Laboratory. It is desired that students owning microscopes or microtomes should bring them, and applicants for admission should state whether this requirement can be complied with. The fee for workers in this department is twenty-five dollars, payable in advance. The number of students will be limited to twenty-five, and preference will be given to teachers or others already qualified. By permission of the Director, students may begin their individual work as early as June 15, without extra charge, but the regular courses of instruction will not begin before July 10.

Applications for places in either department should be addressed to Miss A. D. PHILLIFS, Secretary, 23 Mariborough Street, Boston.

Rooms accommodating two persons may be obtained near the Laboratory, at prices varying from \$3.00 to \$4.00 a week, and board from \$4.50 to \$7.00. Gardiner Cottage, a small house not far from the Laboratory, has, for the second time, been placed at the disposal of the trustees by Miss Sarah B. Fay. In this Cottage, which will be under the superintendence of Mrs. S. F. Stantial, of Boston, table board will be supplied to members of the Laboratory, after July 9, at \$5,00 a week.

Wood's Holl, owing to the richness of the marine life in the neighboring waters, offers exceptional advantages. It is situated on the north shore of Vineyard Sound, at the entrance to Buzzard's Bay, and may be reached by the Old Colony Railroad (2½ hours from Boston), or by rail and boat from Providence, Fall River or New Bedford. Persons coming by the way of Boston should buy round-trip tickets (\$2.85).
