A report has come to me this morning that you will probably veto the Bill appropriating \$15,000 to liquidate existing indebtedness on the ground that it is unconstitutional. Assuming this report to have some foundation I beg to submit for your consideration the following:

The 1/2 cent tax for the benefit of the College was imposed in 1880. In 1882 an effort was made to repeal the tax at which time the question of its constitutionality was raised. After the adjournment of the Legislature of 1882 the constitutionality of the tax was brought into the Court of Appeals but was not decided until 1890 when its constitutionality was affirmed.

Constitutional recognition of this tax was incorporated in the new Constitution. Some members of the convention urged that future Legis latures should be prohibited from increasing the tax without first submitting to a vote of the people the increase proposed. This was accordingly done. The latter part of Sec. 184 reads as follows. "No sum shall be raised or collected for education other than in Common Schools until the question of taxation is submitted to the legal voters and the majority of the votes cast at said election shall be in favor of such taxation Provided the tax now imposed for educational purposes and for the endowment and maintenance of the Agricultural and Lechanical College shall remain until changed by law."

It is clear then that the 1/2 cent tax cannot be increased by the Legislature without submitting the question of increase to the

legal voters. But can the Legislature make no appropriations for buildings, for the liquidation of indebtedness and for increase of revenue?

That it can do so the following analysis of the language quoted will I think show.

An Act to raise and collect money by taxation implies processes which in relation to the act are necessarily future. They relate to potential revenue non-existent at the time of the passage of the act. An appropriation on the other hand implies the existence of revenue already raised, already collected and transferred into the Treasury. The one deals with potential revenue and provides means for transforming it into actual revenue, the other deals with the actual revenue existing and available.

In providing for such specific taxation the money is not yet in the Treasury but in the possession of taxpayers resident in every county and in every precinct of every county in the commonwealth. The appropriation of money on the other hand presupposes that the money appropriated has been raised, collected and transferred to the Treasury where it remains subject to the disposition of the General Assembly. This distinction is clear, definite and unambiguous. In consequence of the accumulated indebtedness of the College and the uncertainty of being able to realize any of the appropriation made by the last Legislature to liquidate existing obligations and provide additional income, until the question of its constitutionality be decided by the Appellate Court we are unable to provide means this summer, as we did last, for paying the salaries of a competent staff of instructors to do the work of instruction in a summer Normal School.

I am willing however on my own responsibility to undertake that \$150. one hundred and fifty dollars, shall be provided by the Board of Trustees to pay for advertising a summer Normal School, provided that you look to the feesreceived for the compensation of yourself and assistants during the period referred to.

I am unwilling that the summer Normal School should be suspended.

I think that by proper vigor and a little self denial the summer Normal School might be made self sustaining as the summer School in Mechanical Engineering and that of the Academy are.

In July 1909 an order was passed by the Executive Committee to pay the amount of the overlap, viz: \$1250. for the year 1908-9 and to make my salary payable in ten monthly payments thereafter, instead of twelve as theretofore. This extinguished the overlap.

AN ORDINANCE TO REMIT CERTAIN TAXES ASSESSED AGAINST PROPERTY
RECENTLY ACQUIRED BY THE AGRICULTURAL AND MECHANICAL COLLEGE OF KENTUCKY.

Whereas in 1878 the city council of the City of Lexington offerred the city Park to the state of Kentucky as a site for the Agricultural and Mechanical College in order to retain the said institution in Lexington after it had been separated from Kentucky University, said city park to be held and used by said College as its site so long as the Agricultural and Mechanical College remained in Lexington, which offer was accepted by the legislature.

And Whereas, the city council of the city of Lexington offerred in addition to the city park, the sum of thirty thousand dollars in city bonds, for the creation of buildings on said park, which offer was also accepted by the legislature; and whereas these donations were made to further and promote the educational interests of the city of Lexington and by their acceptance and the establishment of said College, the city of Lexington has a peculiar and substantial interest in said College, which has thereby become, in a special sense, the property and ward of the city:

And whereas the property recently purchased by the college upon which to erect a college home for young women, known as the Pepper property, is encumbered by an obligation known as the brick street tax, and other taxes due the city of Lexington and unpaid:

And whereas the precedents recited in the preamble hereof, in which the donations of the city park and thirty thousand dollars in City Bonds, were given for the retention of the College in the city of Lexington and for the upbuilding of the educational interests of the city of Lexington, which benefactions have been productive of the happiest and most beneficial results to the city, to the county and to the Commonwealth;

And whereas all the other property and estate of said College heretefore acquired is free of all taxation for state, county and municipal purposes; That the property mentioned in the preamble as the "Pepper Property" having been acquired by the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky as a College Home for young women students of said College and being now and for all time to some dedicated to educational purposes as a part of the property and location of said college, therefore the taxes known as the brick street taxes - taxes assessed against said property and constituting a lien thereon, amounting to \$1057.32, including penaltics, and the city taxes, amounting to \$105.00, also constituting an encumbrance thereon, be and the same are hereby released and remitted, in consideration of the public service performed by said College and the public use to which said property is dedicated and appropriated.


To Whom it May Concern:

My dear Sir:-

A report has come to me this morning that you will probably veto the Bill appropriating \$15,000 to liquidate existing indebtedness on the ground that it is unconstitutional. Assuming this report to have some foundation I beg to submit for your consideration the following:

The 1/2 cent tax for the benefit of the College was imposed in 1880. In 1892 an effort was made to repeal the tax at which time the question of its constitutionality was raised. After the adjournment of the Legislature of 1882 the constitutionality of the tax was brought into the Court of Appeals but was not decided until 1890 when its constitutionality was affirmed.

Constitutional recognition of this tax was incorporated in the new Constitution. Some members of the Convention urged that future Legislatures should be prohibited from increasing the tax without first submitting to a vote of the people the increase proposed.

This was accordingly done. The latter part of Sec. 184 reads as follows: "No sum shall be raised or collected for education other than in Common Schools until the question of taxation is submitted to the legal voters and the majority of the votes cast at said election shall be in favor of such taxation <u>Provided</u> the tax now imposed for educational purposes and for the endowment and maintenance of the

Agricultural and Mechanical College shall remain until changed by law."

Granting then that the 1/2 cent tax cannot be increased by the Legislature without submitting the question 66 increase to the legal voters. But can the Legislature make no appropriations for buildings for the liquidating of indebtedness and for increase of revenue?

That it can do so the following analysis of the language quoted will I think show.

An Act to raise and collect money by taxation implies processes which in relation to the Act are necessarily future. They relate to potential revenue non-existent at the time of the passage of the Act. An appropriation on the other hand implies the existence of revenue already raised, already collected and transferred to the Treasury.

The one deals with potential revenue and provides means for transforming it into actual revenue, the other deals with the actual revenue existing and available.

In providing for such specific taxation the money is not yet in the Treasury but in the possession of taxpayers in every county and in every precinct of every county in the Commonwealth.

The appropriation of money on the other hand presupposes that the money appropriated has been raised, and collected and transferred to the Treasury where it remains subject to the disposition of the General Assembly. This distinction is clear, definite and unambiguous.

While the Constitution prohibits the former action in relation to the College until the conditions imposed by the Constitution have been complied with, it leaves the General Assembly free to provide for the exigencies of the Institution by appropriation.

A specific tax is forbidden until certain conditions are complied with, a specific appropriation is not forbidden. Any other interpretation would deprive the Colored Normal School of maintenance as well as the school for the education of the Blind and the school for the education of Deaf mutes. If an appropriation for the A. and M. College be unconstitutional equally sovmust appropriations for the maintenance of the Colored Normal School, the school for the education of the Blind and the school for education of Deaf mutes be unconstitutional.


If appropriations for the latter be constitutional equally so must appropriations for the former be constitutional. If the language quoted be prohibitive in the one case, it is prohibitive in the other.

If permissive in one case, it must be permissive in the other. They stand or fall together.
