Your letter of recent date at hand. My present lease of your land does not expire until March '97 but why I asked about it now was this I like to know a year ahead what I am going to do the next provided I live and have my health. I was in Ottawa some six weeks ago was talking to Mr Steinbaugh he said he was asking three hundred dollars per ye year rent for this land and asked me to make him an offer on it for a five yearr's lease but I declined to do so for I thought it too much for crops are so uncertain here and if we do get a good crop it isn't worth anything - corn is only I6 cts. a bu. now. But since I have studied the matter over I have come to a conclusion that if you decide to lease it to me this spring for five years more I will the three hundred dollars a year on a five yearr's lease. I am feeding all the crops on the farm and that way there is a great deal of maunure that needs hauled and put over the land but if I dont have it longer than this easson it wont pay me to take the time to do it. Also another reason I wish to know soon I have some hogs which I want to summer over and if I have the lease extended I will fence in a small pasture lot for them.

If I lease again there is onr little change I would like to have m made in the contract - that is to have the first rental payment Dec.Ist.

In as much as I am now engaged in briefing the Case of Berea College, Vs., Commonwealth of Kentucky, in the Court of Appeals here, and which involves the voluntary co-education of the two races, I write to ask you to give me your opinion on the following points:

Could the black race be elevated, or made better, happier or wiser by such social equality ?

Why should not those of the two races, who so desire, be permitted voluntarily to associate together for the common purpose of education or religion?

Why should the State prohibit such association?

Has the State more interest in the child than has it's parent?

Give me any statistics you may have, showing the advancement of the black race.

Did God in his plan and conception of the races, impress racial differrences and characteristics on each, which show that they should be kept seperate?

Wherein do their characteristics differ.

I should be glad to hear from you on this subject as soon as possible, and at as great a length as your valuable time will permit.

I feel that I have in mind no one else to whom I can appeal at this time, or one to whom I could go and get the desired information.

Your complicance with this request will only add one more to the many obligations under which I must always feel myself bound to you.and same will be greatly appreciated. With my kindest wishes, I am,

Dear Judge: -Senator Carroll advises me this morning that no questions were sent out to the County Superintendents for examinations of applicants who desire to attend the University under the provision of the law which allows them to attend free of certain charges. He further advises me that he has been advised that you have declined to follow the provisions of the law in other respects. basing your action upon my directions. I am sure there is some mistake about this, as the case now pending in the Court of Appeals involving these questions was continued upon agreement between a Senator Carroll and myself that you, as the President of the University, would follow strictly the provisions of the law in all respects until the Court of Appeals neld that the law is unconstitutional, if it should so hold. I trust that you will carry out this agreement between Senator Carroll and myself, as I thought it was satisfactory to you after having talked thematter over with you by telephone. In other words, the opinion of Judge Kerr was to be obeyed until the case was passed upon by the Court of Appeals. I hope that you will attend to these matters at once, so that Senator Carroll will have no reason to believe that I made an agreement with him which did not meet with your approval. While I am not seeking any other position, I would greatly appreciate the challenge offered by the presidency of your State University. The letter from Doctor Mann quite overwhelms me and, following your suggestion, I am writing him today.

Harry, Dean of the University of Cincinnati, asking me to write Colonel Stoll in his behalf. Doctor Harry is a very scholarly man and I took a great deal of pleasure in complying with his request. He perhaps lacks the necessary State University experience, but he has been very successful as dean in his administrative service and I dare say he would ultimately fit into the Kentucky situation to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Everything is moving on grandly in Vermont. The Executive Committee of my Board of Trustees has just adjourned after passing our budget with many salaries increased and plans adopted, on my recommendation, to put all our institutional resources, both human and material, at the disposal of the Federal Government in helping on the great war undertaken by our country to make democracy safe throughout the entire world. I had previously given President Wilson assurance that the State Universities would support him and our allies

loyally in all efforts put forth in behalf of universal freedom.

Dear President Patterson: --

Replying to yours of September 7. The salaries paid to professors in the Ohio State University areas follows:--

First. The law prevents us from paying more than \$2500.

Second. We paid \$2500. long ago but owing to financial stringencies there was a 10% reduction and since that time the salary of head professors is \$2250. In two or three instances we have moved up to the \$2500. point. We have the rank of professor, who is not head of the department, and these men usually get from \$1800. to \$2000.

Third. We have the rank of associate professor, who sits in the college faculties but not in the general faculty of the University and is not supposed to be doing independent work. This position pays as a maximum \$1600.

Fourth. The maximum for the assistant professor is supposed to be \$1200. although in one or two instances we have exceeded this amount.

All appointments of every kind are made by the Board of Trustees. All appointments can be cancelled by the Board of Trustees only. During my presidency since 1899 no appointment has been made except upon recommendation of the president. There is no rule for this last point but it, a kind of unwritten rule.

You understand that the experiment station is at Wooster and we are not able to make reply to question five.
