Dear Sir

I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the condition of the classes under my charge in the school year 1884/85. - The classes in modern languages were attended in all by fifty-two students, of whom eighteen were girls. They were taught in five classes, four classes reciting daily and one, the Senior German, reciting every other day. Of the number originally entered, there were present at the examination at the end of the year, only thirty, among them nine girls. - The work done may be called satisfactory, generally speaking, since a large number successfully passed the final examination. The study in some classes, however, has been seriously interrupted by the long and severe winter. - This has been the case chiefly in classes, principally attended by girls, especially as the classrooms in the upper stories cannot be sufficiently warmed by the present heating apparatus, to be at all comfortable.
