A new recreation center could be in the future for UK students and faculty. Campus Recreation officials are considering a proposal for a new more modern recreation facility because the Seaton Center is lacking in many areas.

"We need a new recreation facility," said Ron Lee, associated director of Campus Recreation. "The Seaton Center is shared with the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, so the center was originally intended for classes."

Students complain the equipment at the Seaton Center is often inaccessible because classes are always going on there during the week. The center also does not have enough equipment at commodate such a large student population.

The proposed facility includes a gym with five courts an elevated jogging track and more racqueball courts. The new center might also include a deli/health bar, a lounge area with a TV and wellness.

Lee said UK officials visited Miami (Ohio), Vanderbilt and Western Kentucky universities. Much of what is in the proposal is modeled after the recreation facility at Miami.

His visit resulted in the birth of a new AKPsi colony. Fifty students founded the colony on Sept. 22 as a social and business organization with the College of Business and Economics.

Matt Marshall, the fraternity's vice president of member-

ship, said it wasn't just created for business majors.

"The colony provides students seeking business or business related majors with the opportunity to develop friendships while gaining experience in the operations of a successful organization," Marshall said.
The fraternity has 70 members, including students from other majors.

"We are quite proud of the diversification of our members, not only in the differences in degrees within the business school, but also within the entire University," Marshall said.

Alpha Kappa Psi is a coed, social and business fraternity. Members gain experience and valuable information about the world of business, while active to particulating in UK; Greek

waluable information about the world of business, while active-ly participating in UK's Greek system.

"We provide training and seminars on how to become a better job applicant, resume building and other professional activities," Kraemer said.

Fraternity member Regina Anzures emphasized AKPsi's social benefits.
"At a big university like UK, sometimes people feel left out," Anzures said. "In Alpha Kappa Psi, our fellowship encourages friendships through various social activities, including Thoroughblades games, football games, parties and other get togethers."

AKPsi has more than 170,000 active and alumni members at the national level. The fraternity was founded in New York in 1904 and is now one of the largest college fraternities in the nation. As a coed organi-

Kraemer said all of the members inducted this year will have their names placed on the fraternity's official charter as its founding fathers.

AKFs plans to give back to UK and the community by holding various social and service-ster. Individual goals for the colony include becoming recognized as an official chapter, increasing membership and becoming an active part of the campus.

Carpenter, who is in charge of training, said UKPD has been in the fore-front on back grounding and training.

A new law going into effect in 1999 will require new licensing procedures for police officers, including consistent training that must pass through state channels and an increase from 10 to 16 weeks at the police academy.

But the UK Police have been doing several of these things for about the past 12 years, Carpenter said.

She said it is the goal of the department to make sure people have the correct train-ing before it puts anyone out on the street.

Carneal deserves life in prison — not parole

By now, nost are familiar with the story of Michael Carneal, the boy who carried out an attack on a Heath High School prayer group in West Paducah last Dec. 1. Carneal fired repeatedly for almost five seconds into a crowd of 35 gathered in the school lobby, killing three of his classmates and wounding five others.

Carneal's motive: Opening fire on his peers would bring him acceptance. One lawyer said carneal believed his classmates made fun of his too much. This elicits to the same state fun of his too much. This elicits with the shooting people causements of the same stand on such shaky ground?

Insanity — both Carneal and his counsel. The defense team said, "These feelings of inadequacy (because of ridicule) were overwhelming to Michael, and he was unable to cope with them. Things that were said about Michael challenged his manhood."

Sorry attorneys, but few 14-year-old boys possess any type of manhood. And if they did command that level of maturity, they would know that a real man copes, somehow other than violently against others, with feelings of inadequacy, which of the continue long after kids' jokes and teen-age years. Unless, of course, he is indeed mentally ill.

Carneal's defense team argued successfully that he was. His lawyer called Carneal paranoid, with a disorder similar to schizophrenia. Therefore, a guilty but mentally ill plea was offered.

will face maximum penalty of life in jail for his ghasly crime when he is sentenced Dec. 16. But his lawyer
wants him to serve only 25 short years until parole.
And discressingly, 25 years is all he ill likely sent
Bad math. Because no matter what the courts

say, 1+1+1 does not equal 25. Never will. Jessica James, Kayec Steger and Nicole Hadley were murdered. And this loss adds up to much more than 25. In fact, the sum can't be computed.

The families of the girls have said, though, that they hope the announcement of the plea bargain would send 'a clear message that this outrageous violence will not be tolerated.

Brave words, but the announcement of Carneal's fate almost indicates the opposite; it seems to say that violence will be tolerated, as long as the offender can accept a quarter-century of incarceration. Carneal, 15, will be held in a juvenile detention center until he turns 18. Hel 11 then be transferred to an adult prison. At this time, his mental condition will be evaluated, and he may be treated. With such treatment, his lawyer said, "we might have a chance of salvaging a young man." Sounds good, but no kind of treatment will be able to salvage the-three young women lost to Carneal's violence.

So here's a different equation. 1+1+1=1. Carneal's life in exchange for theirs. This is not to say Carneal should be executed. Exchanging one life for another does not necessarily involve death. And even if it did, Carneal's case would be excepted because a defendant must be at least 16 to receive capital punishment in Kentucky.
