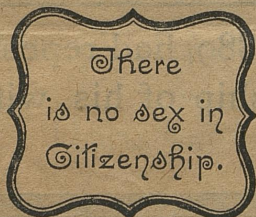

The women of Newport, Covington and Lexington are now entitled to vote for School Trustees and are eligible to the office themselves, by the provision of the new charter for cities of the second class.

Mrs. Col. Jones and Mrs. Humphreys of Versailles, are a special committee appointed to go to the legislature to have the age of protection for girls raised to eighteen years. They are now protected by law only until twelve years of age in Kentucky.

The STATE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE consisting of Miss CLAY, Mrs. FARMER and Mrs. JOSEPHINE K. HENRY have done splendid work in improving the laws governing the women of Kentucky.

In 1893 they had a law passed enabling A MARRIED WOMAN TO MAKE A WILL. This took effect last October.

In 1894 the law was passed giving the wife equal property rights with her husband, and the same rights after his death that he would have if she died. Heretofore the husband got all of the property for life, irrespective of the children's rights, and the wife got only one-third even if the property had been left to her by her father.

We are still working for the law making mothers equal guardians with the fathers of their children. In Kentucky a man may give or will his wife's children away from her and she is powerless to prevent it.

I believe in the eternal order of things, and will be busy over there.
