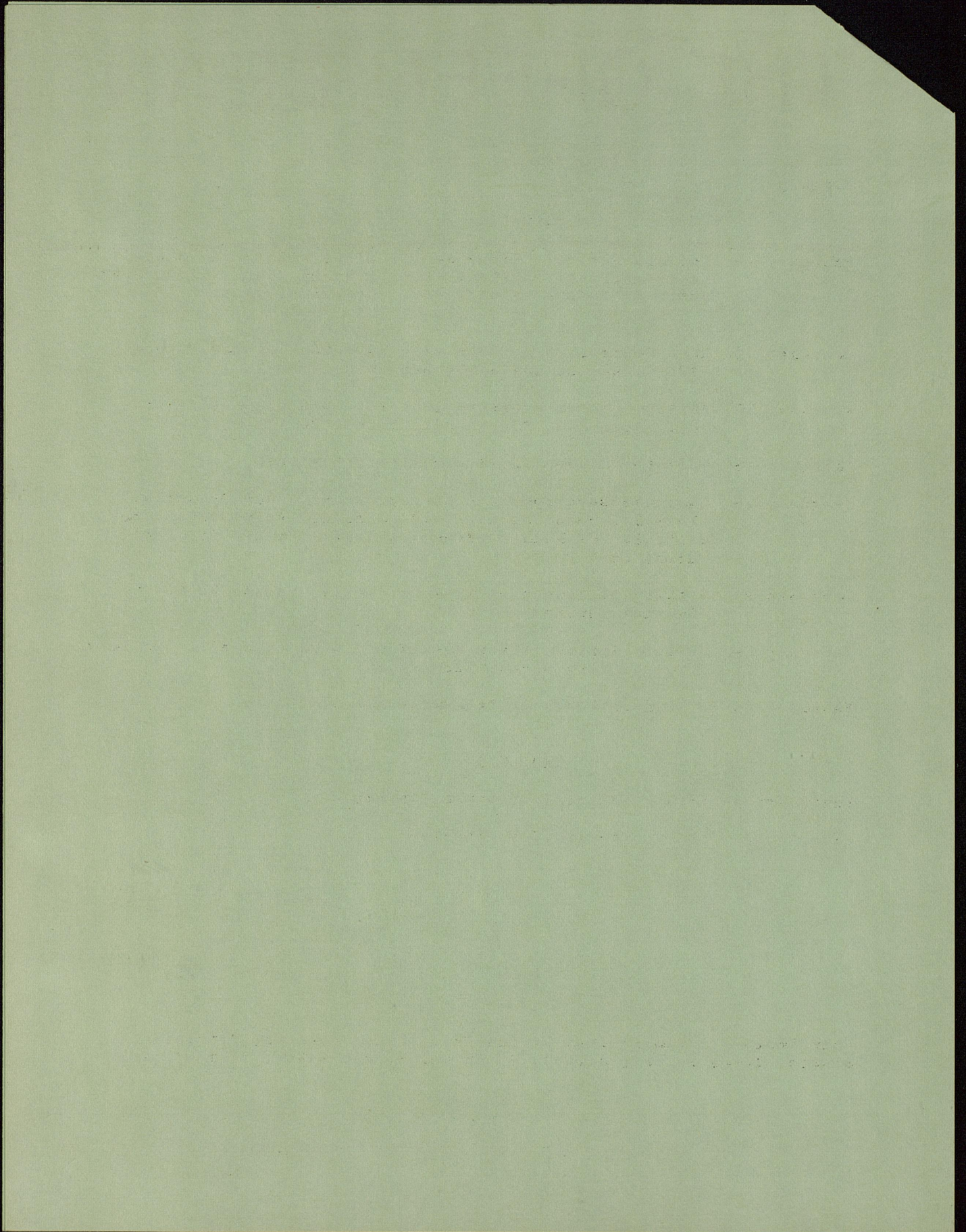

You certainly should not think me immune from all human faults. There is one insatiable passion which holds me and which hitherto I have been neither able nor willing to check (for I assure myself that it is a passion for something decent rather than otherwise). SECURITY
