# **Preparation can ease finals woes**

Sistant professor in biology. "I try to classes during the first few months of school and expect to pull their grades up at the end of the semester. Well, it's now the end of the semester. "We see alt of students, especially after mid-terms, who are not doing well in their classes," said Greg Strouse, coordinator of learning skills, at the Counseling and Testing Center. He said for students in this situation, theirst step should be to speak with their professors as soon as possible. "When they start having problems, they should see their instructor during office hours," said Fon Gorden, history professor. He said even though students may be intimidated or embarrassed to admit their laziness to professors, seeking help from the instructor can make the difference between a passing grade and a failing grade. For many classes, the only score now left for students to make is that on the final exam. In some cases, this grade could determine if a student passes of fails.

"You just have to try as hard as you can for the final," said Jim Krupa,

assistant professor in biology. "I try to prepare (the students) as much as possible."

Strouse said the Counseling and Testing Center can help students who are in academic trouble.

"We try to sit down and assess where they are right now, reconfirming their motivation about why they're in school," he said. "We'll help them find a tutor and encourage them to meet with their instructors.

Simpson is currently the head coach at Henry Clay High School in Lexington. Cowboys backup quarterback Jason Garrett was also present for the workows. Aside from Allen Edwards, UK's roster for next season lacks as swingman with those credentials. Pitino just missed on his first two attempts to land impact players for next year.



Same-sex couples have an inherent right to marry as citizens of the United States. The right for same-sex marriage is denied by bans on it, which are a form of discrimination. Discrimination is wrong when it is based on things over which a person has no control, such as sexual orientation, race or gender. Marriage laws do not require that there be children, or wen sexual relations. There are many purposes for sarriage other than procreation. Opponents say, Marriage is to promote basic family norms." A amily is a union between two or more people who share a common bond of love, commitment and responsibility. Marriage supports these values between a couple and within their family. Same-sex

marriage honors and embraces these very same values.

Those who oppose same-sex marriages generally do so on the basis of their personal religious beliefs. This country operates, though, with freedom of religion, whitemeans that the government can not enforce the beliefs of one group on everyone else. Would same-sex marriage force homosexuality and acceptance of it on others? No. You still have the right to believe what you want, but you must recognize our right to marry (just as you might not agree with what someone says, but must recognize their right to say it).

Acceptance of homosexuality is not created by marriage licenses. Acceptance is created by education and personal contact. The Defense of Marriage Act passed in 1996. It passed because legislators even fair-minded ones, were afraid of political reprisals if they opposed it.

Those reprisals have not been forthcoming. The Advocate magazine reported that of those representatives who voted against DOMA who were seeking re-election, NONE of them lost the election. 

When cars became compact and sexual freedom increased, drive-in movie theaters dwindled drive-in movie theaters dwindled in number. Traveling the back roads of Kentucky, you'll find the remnants of old drive-ins linger-ing as fruit stands or as hang-outs for derelicts.

Fortunately, Americans grow sentimental to trends. In antique

stores, a few pet rocks remain; a few roller skating queens still reign; and in Kentucky, a few drive-in movies still play.

In fact, more than 20 drive-in the-

aters will open this summer in Kentucky, including the Stanford Drive-In Theater in Stanford,

Drive-in Theater in Stanford, which doubles as flea market. Around Lexington, there are theaters in Paris, Richmond, Stanton, and Danville. The Sky-Vue Twin Drive-In in Winchester remains the theater closest in proximity to Lexington, located 8 miles north-east on Lexington Road.

Road.

Owen Young, district manager for Checker Theaters, Inc., anticipates opening Sky-Vue Memorial Day weekend and running movies only on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

"If we get a good turnout, we may open up during the week," Young said.

Young said.

For several years, the theater charged \$5 per

person, but with all the stow-aways in trunks and under back seat blankets, the theater decided

seat blankets, the theater decladed to charge §5 per car.

"I remember once some girls from (UK) stopped across the street from the drive-in and piled into the trunk ...," Young said. "A state patrolman saw them and followed them into the theater. When the girls got through the gate, the officer turned on his lights and asked the girls to open the trunk."

the trunk."

Now the \$5 price will allow viewers to pile beacoups of people into one vehicle, trunk, truck bed or back seat. During the shows a security officer patrols the 570-space parking lot to ensure that the theater's No. 1

rule is obeyed: no alcohol.

"We want to provide a place for families to go and have a little privacy while watching a movie," Young said.

Drive-Ins bring audiences to an isolationist ideal.
"People love not having to

be so close to other people," Young said. "Managing the drive-in is easier than a multiplex because people don't complain as much because they are not so close to each other.

Privacy includes other ben-efits: smoking in the car, seeing the stars, more inclusive concessions (hamburgers, fries) and talking during the film. However, the viewer will lose the controlled temperature or the start of the sta


