Money: UK seeks private donors to fund \$8 million of Administration Building restoration project's cost

UK officials began a fundraising campaign to restore the Administration Building Wednesday and announced a "new" name for the facility.

The campaign, "Reflecting the Past-Illuminating the Future," will bring the building into the modern era, but restore its original name, the Main Building.

A fire gutted the Administration Building in May 2001. The estimated cost to restore the building, which will include classrooms and porches, is \$16 million. UK received \$7.8 million from the insurance

settlement. To raise the remaining 88 million needed, UK will look to private donors.

Terry Mobley, vice president of development, said administrators realize that with the budget cuts, it might seem like a difficult time to be starting the campaign. However, he said alumni and other donors have been supportive so far. "The University of Kentucky has been fortunate in the past to receive support from the private support from the private support," We are confident that this very special need will receive that continued support," be said.

Troops enter northern Iraq, seize airfield

Advances: As major battle in Baghdad looms. first humanitarian deliveries arrive in Iragi cities

Army airborne forces parachuted into northern Iraq on Wednesday, seizing an airfield as a prelude to opening a northern front againts Saddam Hussein. British warplanes bombed an enemy convoy fleeing the besieged city of Basra in the south.

One week into the war, the possibility of a major battle loomed within 100 miles of the capital as a larger convoy — this one made up of elite Republican Guard forces — moved in the direction of American troops aiming for Saddam's seat of power.

Jumping from low-flying jets into the Iraqi night, an estimated 1,000 paratroopers landed near an airstrip in Kurdish-controlled territory less than 30 miles from the Turkish border.

TANEGASHIMA, Japan — Police on foot and in helicopters patrolled around a space center on this remote island Thursday as officials prepared to move a rocket carrying Japan's first spy satellites to its launchyad for the final countdown. Hundreds of riot police have set up road blocks near the space center, where the satellites are to be boosted into orbit. Weather permitting, Friday's liftoff would mark the beginning of a \$2.05 billion intelligence gathering program created largely in response to the shock caused by North Korea's launching of a long-range ballistic missile that passed over Japan's main island before crashing into the Pacific off Alaska in 1988. This is for the purpose of information gathering, said Foreign Ministry spokesman Hatsuhisa Takashima. "It is not offensive, or intended to interfere with any other nation's security whatsoever." But he added that the satellites can be used to monitor natural disasters or gather other information that might be deemed necessary.

Tony Blair's plane hit by lightning

Tony Blair's plane hit by lightning ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE, Md.—The plane carrying British Prime Minister Tony Blair to a meeting with President Bush was struck by lightning as it approached the United States on Wednesday; a reporter on board said. No injuries or damage were reported. Britain's Press Association news agency said Blair's chartered British Airways Boeing 77 was struck by a lightning bolt as it approached Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland at about 10,000 deef. It landed 20 minutes later, at 505 p.m. Jon Smith. a Press Association reporter traveling with Blair, reported that the bolt hit the jet's left wing. The plane did not change course or descend and the pilot reassured passengers that "there's nothing to worry about." Blair's 10 Downing Street of fice said it was not aware of the incident. Blair flew on to the presidential retreat at Camp David for a working dinner with Bush. The two leaders will meet against Thursday to discuss the war in Iraq and plans for the country's future.

• No campaigning is allowed within 25 feet of any polling place.





The Kentucky Network, is always looking for tutors. His
courses depend on them. And
the first place he looks is UK.
Since it began its German distance learning program in 1991, KET has relied
on UK students to help teach
its courses. This year, all the
tutors in the program are
non-native speakers who are
UK students and graduates,
Sauer said.

"We use them because
they're so good and they have
down their skills, 'Sauer said.
"They're the best."

The German program uses a multi-media approach that incorporates a video lesson, a Web site and a telephone lesson to teach the language to high school students across the country. The tutors give 15-minute lessons to each class two or three times a week. Telephone lessons give the high school students a chance to speak and interact with German speakers, he said.

More than 350 high school students are compled in the program, with two-thirds of the students from 16 different states are enrolled in the program, with two-thirds of the students from Kentucky Sauer said many students come from districts without German teachers.

The UK students are paid employees, but most have spent time in Germany and enjoy practicing the language on a regular basis, brushing up on early grammar and vocabulary that they have forgotten.

"I love the German language and iterature," said John Arbegust, a graduate student of German who became a tutor in 2000.

Sauer said that the program has encouraged several tutors to pursue careers in German instruction.

"It gives them good experience in the feaching lield," he said.
