Veterans Drop Plans For Trailer Park

Plans to establish a central trailer park for the married University student veterans and their families who own house trailers have been temporarily abandoned because of an announcement made Saturday by Darrell B. Hancock, president of the University student veterans club. Hancock said that "insurmountable difficulties" had been encountered which made it impossible to carry out plans formed last May to occupy a site on South Broadway between the Lexington and Troy Breders association. He declined to elaborate on the reasons for the failure of the project designed to care for approximately 25 student veteran families now living in their own trailers at various points in the city.

'Literacy Alone Cannot Bring World Peace'

"Literacy alone cannot bring peace in this world of ours — we must use knowledge that makes us literate to construct in the minds of man a program of common action," Dr. Ruth McCurray, U. S. State Department liaison officer to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, declared Wednesday in an address before members of the League College being held on the campus. Explaining the founding, organization and world program of UNESCO, she said that the organization is designed to collect the mutual knowledge and understanding of peoples, to give fresh impulse to popular education and to the spread of culture, and to maintain, increase and diffuse knowledge among the nations in all branches of human activities.

Wets Must Apply For Paid Leaves

According to a recent V. A. Directive, veterans who wish leave of absence must apply for it within 90 days prior to date of withdrawal. Therefore, any veteran who wishes to be paid leave of absence during the interim August 30, through September 24, and did not apply for it at the time of preparing V. A. Form 7-198, should report to Room 204, Administration Building, prior to July 30, 1947.

Terrell Attends Convention Dean D. V. Terrell of the University Civil Engineering department, is attending the summer convention of the American Society of Civil Engineers, of which he is a national director, in Duluth, Minn., July 16-18. He will also attend board of direction meetings starting July 14, preceding the convention.

Four Projects Underway Explaining the current program of the organization, Dr. McMurray discussed briefly four large-scale comprehensive projects: (1) The reconstruction of educational, scientific and cultural activities in member countries devastated by war. (2) A project of fundamental education, including a vigorous attack on illiteracy throughout the world, and progressing to the provision of more advanced learning aids for the newly-literate, and the establishment of a universal basic minimum of education. (3) The promotion and encouragement of international understanding through such means as teachers' seminars, improvement of text books and teaching materials, a study of teaching for international understanding in the schools of member states, clubs, adult education, international study centers, and the exchange of persons. (4) A project to study the establishment of an international scientific institute in the Hylan Aman region of South America to coordinate research activities and to investigate economic and social potentials in this vast area of the equatorial forest.

(Continued from Page One) made up of a delegation from each member state, is the annual convention which determines policies and program; The executive board of 18 chosen to represent UNESCO as a whole, and A secretariat responsible for implementing the program of action. Also, Dr. McMurray pointed out, this country has a national commission whose members are considered the outstanding minds of the country and serve as an advisory group to the U.S. delegation. The State Department UNESCO relations staff also serves as an intermediary and interpreting group between the general conference and the national commission.

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Also on the morning program of League College were talks by Ben Barkin, Milwaukee public relations counselor, who explained some actions taken by various groups to implement the UNESCO program.

Agronomy Field Day Scheduled August 7

The annual agronomy field day at the University of Kentucky has been scheduled for Thursday, August 7. Visitors will see the field experiments with barley tobacco, which include fertilizer and cropping tests, breeding work and variety tests. The forage crop plots of red clovers, white and lamotte cover, alfalfa, tall fescue, bluegrass and orchard grass will be featured also. Those interested in corn breeding and hybrid corn testing will have an opportunity to see the breeding and yield-testing plots.

Two graduates of the University's department of journalism are now managing editors of rival papers in Dayton, Ohio. Eugene B. Moore, a 1925 graduate, recently was named assistant managing editor of the Dayton Herald, while John Day, who received his A.B. degree here in 1935, holds the position of managing editor on the News. In another recent appointment, Vincent J. Crowder, a 1941 graduate of the University Journalism department, and a more recent graduate of the Pulitzer School of Journalism, was given a position on the news staff of the Louisville Courier-Journal. Crowder formerly was news editor of the Kernel, and a reporter for the Lexington Leader.

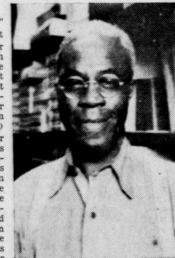

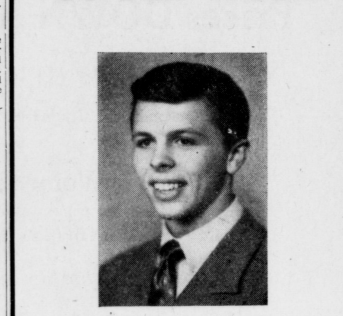
