### "WHEN EARTH'S LAST PICTURE IS PAINTED-

The tragedy of a man who died at the wrong time is seen in the death of Rudyard Kipling. Had he died forty years ago, as the Victorian era was grasping on its death bed, he would have probably been acclaimed the greatest of the late Victorian poets. Last week he died, a great writer, but a writer out of tune, as many claim, with the times. So bitter was he against the exploitation of modern ideas, and so carely was he against being exposed to them that ful was he against being exposed to them that his seclusion from the world made him virtually unknown to the younger generations.

Although he lived in America for the shor span of four years, he later became eloquent in his denouncement of the influx of American ideals into England and the continent. It is thought by many, however, that he really loved

thought by many, however, that he really loved this country, but that he was forced to pretend the opposite because of relative beliefs.

The fact remains, nonetheless, that Kipling was a great poet and as such deserves a place in the hall of the dead–great. It is safe to say, we believe, that much of his poetry will live long after the works of many of those he denounced so thoroughly.

### CONFIDENCE BUILDS

Confidence builds and improves a communi-ty, lack of it destroys communities. Distrust is a destructive element that eats into the very vitals of community life, whereas trust in one another

is the only foundation on which towns and cities can build for the future.

The people of this community could not be ex-pected to patronize local merchants if they did not trust them, if they did not believe they were gtting value received.

Men seeking jobs and jobs seeking men, and the two can't get together. The men aren't prepared to fit the jobs.

It is a pathetic condition of everything being out of joint. There are plenty of "educated" and "trained" men, but they are not properly educated and trained for the specific jobs that need men. Those who have education cannot use it. There are 10,000,000 employables between the ages of 18 and 29 who never held a job. Many of these have been through the schools; many have studied in high schools and colleges. They tell the employment manager that they will do anything but they can't name the particular thing they know they can do well. It is a serious situation and the remedy cannot be applied immediately. Mistakes of long standing will have to be corrected. A proposal has been made that manufacturers and other industrialists revive the apprentice system. That may help.

Certainly the whole system of education needs careful inspection and readjustment. Conditions change rapidly. Employment managers that they are the pressure of the pr

### CRIME CIRCUS-BETWEEN BRUNO AND DEEP BLUE MYSTERY

The Hauptmann case jumps into the head-lines again with Governor Hoffman's investiga-tion, carried on through the chief of detectives of Burlington County, New Jersey, creating grave doubts about the justice of the settlement. Much doubts about the justice of the settlement. Much is made of a letter allegedly mailed from Buffalo, N. Y., which is supposed to have predicted where the baby would be found. Also it is now brought out that while it has been established that a piece of wood of the famous ladder came from Hauptmann's attic, no investigation has been carried on to find out where the rest of the wood was obtained.

was obtained.

The kidnaping story has never been explained to the satisfaction of the American people. We have had plenty of circumstantial evidence. The passing of the money, and the ladder evidence point to the fact that Hauptmann was involved. He might have been one of a group of plotters, or merely the one who was caught on planted evidence and passage of "hot" money.

Barrels of ink were used during and after the Hauptmann trial in the newspapers of the country criticising the manner in which the trial was conducted. Many a person feels that it was just one grand circus in which everyone—including the press—was attempting to get the spotlight. The blunders of the counsel for the defense became notorious during the trial and afterward.

Regardless of the degree to which Hauptmann was involved in the crime, the American people want a more complete explanation. They feel that until the case has been more satisfactorily explained the death sentence should not torily explained the death sentence should not be imposed. Perhaps in the future some links may be found in the chain of mystery, and then perhaps through Hauptmann the rest of the case can be fully explained. Under the circum-stances, Governor Hoffman will not receive great criticism if he steps in to prevent the death pen-alty until more inquiry has been made,—The Minnesota Daily, University of Minnesota.

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


