UK has the highest ACT scores and grade point averages for freshmen among its benchmark universities, yet 25 percent of these students leave after their first year.

This fact and others are what the College of Communications and Information Sciences discussed as it hosted two speakers Friday afternoon to address freshmen expectations and students' racial attitudes and stereotypes.

Don Giles, an adviser with Central Advising Service, said one of the reasons incoming freshmen do not return for their sophomore year is because they have a lack of connection to the university, "If a student comes into the university and is able to get connected with a faculty member, adviser or someone who has at least some idea of what's going

Douglas Boyd, dean of College of Communication and Information Sciences was disturbed by the findings. "The belief as an educator that where you go into college and where you come out you become a different person," he said. "It is the process of working with others of different backgrounds and reading and discussing...! I would hope the system would become more tolerant."

## McDonald house is home for families

OK. So now you know about the Rock-a-thon, the fund-raiser whose proceeds go to the Ronald McDonald House here in Lexingron.
What's that? You didn't know there was a Mickey D's House here? Well, there is. But it's not owned by McDonald's. Children's Oncology Services of the Bluegrass, a nonprofit organization, owns the house, and leases the property from UK. It's all privately funded by local operators.

erty from UK. It's all privately funded by local operators.

The House, which is actually more like a huge, inexpensive bed and breakfast inn, leases property from UK at 50 Cooper Dr.

It has the perfect location for its purpose — to house families whose children are in the hospital.

Charging only \$7 a night, the house offers 21 rooms as a refuge for families in times of distress.

"No. 1 it saves them from sitting in a chair 24 hours a day," said Sally King, resident manager.

King knows quite a bit about the House, because she has been working there 11 years. It opened 12 years ago.

"They're grateful for a comfortable place to come and lay their heads."

And many families, especially those who end up having to stay three or four months, are grateful that the House never turns anyone away who can't afford to pay the fee each night. In addition, they are thankful there is no limit on how long they can stay.

"As long as a child is being treated at the hospital, a family can stay here," King said.

Although the majority come from the UK Medical Center, any family with a child under 18 years old being treated in a Lexington hospital is eligible to stay at the House.

Because of the severity of some children's illnesses, many families end up having to stay months.

But the House offers most of the amenities of home, including a living room, library, four kitchens, a big dining room, a recreation room and a laundry room on each floor.

However, the win over the Commodores has to be satisfying enough for Cat fans, who have grown tired of seeing their team humiliated by the boys from Nashville.

In fact, Uk players had gotten so tired of being embarrased by Vandy that they even made it one of their goals of the season, right after "Bowl Berth."

"We haven't beaten Vandy in five years." Derrick Logan said, "and this being the last home game for Coach Curry and the seniors, we knew we had to play well."

And Logan did his part, trushing for his third straight 100-yard game with 132 yards on 26 carries. His 70-yard scamper late in the fourth quarter help set up the Cats final touchdown.

Quarterback Billy Jack Haskins completed 17-of-30 passes for a career-high 217 yards.

Last week, the Indians reportedly offered Belle a five-year deal worth \$30 million to \$40 million.



# **Wildcats stumble** in season opener

INDIANAPOLIS — "Uneasy sts the head that wears the

rests the head that wears the crown."

UK found out what that old adage means on Friday night, when No. 20 Clemson upset the hird-ranked defending national champions 79-71 in overtime at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis.

The game was part of the Black Coaches Association Classic doubleheader, with Indiana beating Connecticut 68-61 in the opener.

"We're disappointed with the loss," UK coach Rick Pittino said, but give Clemson credit. They played a tough, hard-fought ballgame."

It was the first season-opener that UK (0-1) has lost since Pitino has been here. The last time the Cats had lost an opener was to Duke in the 1988 Tip-off Classic.

The loss also marked the first time in 41 games that UK has gone into overtime. The last time was in the 1995 Southeastern Conference Tournament championship game against Arkansas.

But the story of the game was the difference between the team that faced the Tigers (1-0) and the one that beat Syracuse last April. Obviously, the departures of Tony Delk, Walter McCarty, Mary Carty, Mary Carty, Mary Sandan one.

Depth was probably the biggest area affected. Four players played at least 40 minutes against the Tigers (1-0), led by Jared Prickett's outrageous 45 minutes of playing time. Allen Edwards (42

minutes), Derek Anderson (42), and Ron Mercer (40) also logged at least 40.

Since it is only an eshibition game, the team is putting things in



Mike Leigh has a history of making films that are difficult to watch with virtually no likable characters. His last two pies Life is Sweet and Naked were brutal, distant and generally unenjoyable. That's why it comes as a surprise that his latest film, Secrets and Lies, delivers a stunning array of enjoyable characters with an uplifting message.

Winner of the prestigious Palme d'Or at this year's Cannes Film Festival, Leigh's picture delves into the harsh realtites of tamily life both poignandly and comically, while managing to tackle serious moral and social issues in an effective yet subtlemanner.




