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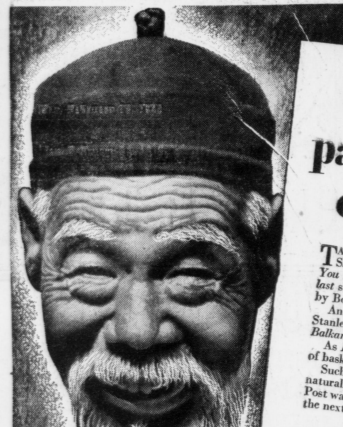

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## VOLS AND TECH TO BE MET ON TRIP

Once again rolling in basketball prosperity, Kentucky's Wildcats, currently hotter than a constable's pistol, will make their final foreign invasion of the year for South-eastern Conference games this weekend when they meet Tennessee tomorrow night in Knoxville and Georgia Tech Monday night in Atlanta.

The two bouts will boost to five the number of games they have played in nine days. The activity spurt includes wins over Alabama, Xavier and Mississippi which lifted the season record to 11 wins in 15 times out.

Against Tennessee the Cats will be leading the team that Coach Adolph Rupp feels will prove the greatest threat to Kentucky's conference title security. In an earlier meeting the Blues, playing one of their best games of the season, nipped the Volunteers by 53-52 in a glittering defensive show. Since that time Tennessee has moved into first place in the league standings.

Information concerning Georgia Tech has been scarce, but the Engineers dropped a bomb shell into the conference ranks with a stunning 57-39 win over Vanderbilt, a team that trapped Kentucky by a score of 40-32. Tech gave a further demonstration of its power with an easy 53-31 verdict over Auburn's sophomore team last week.

Three factors are mainly responsible for Kentucky's gallant comeback after it appeared about ready to lose everything but faith. The sudden rise to scoring form of Keith Farnsley and Marion Cluggish and the work of "Hot" Combs, who has filled in at the guard post vacated when Lee Huber dropped a decision to the flu, have been outstanding in the present victory spurt.

Troubled all season by extremely bad luck on his shots, Farnsley finally found the range with 18 points against Marquette and continued to burn the hemp against Alabama, Xavier and Mississippi State. The rebounding of the cloud-bumping Cluggish has been one of the features of the Cats' last four games.

Following the triangular meet with Eastern and Murray, Kentucky will head forth on March 6 for its annual Yankee-land stop with meets against Lovell, Armor Tech and DePauw. In view of the fine showing made even in events which they lost on the Southern jaunt, the Cats believe they hold an excellent chance of ending the season without further damage.
