## INFORMATION FROM THE PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

There are several ways to dry wet paper material. If the amount is relatively small, and if the exposure to water is slight to moderate, air-drying can be successful. Caution should be used for coated paper, the type often used in journals and art books. If allowed to dry without special attention, it will stick permanently and extreme care must be taken to avoid mildew. This method is described by Cunha, Waters and Spawn.

However, if space is limited or material must be held for decisions, it is best to freeze it at  $15^{\circ}F$  or colder. Freezing does not harm paper and will delay chemical and biological deterioration. Freezing provides time to look at alternatives and to check costs. (Jessie Adams)
