Seaton Center gets a facelift

A recreational center for students: Facility offers students many choices

It's not Euclid, the library or the engineering building under construction this time.

Instead, it's a building project that will offer students recreational facilities and a place to work: a revamped Seaton Center.

The operation of the new recreation eenter lies in the hands of UK students. Students will work the new center, as well as decide what activities take place there.

Bill Pieratt, director of campus recreation, feels that the construction on the "Seaton Center Expansion Project" will take over a year, but that the results will be worth it.

"The projected date for completion is set

"The projected date for completion is set for spring 2002." Pieratt said.

Ron Lee, associate director of campus recreation, said the new recreation center control of the control of the recreation center will have four miversity. The recreation center will have four multipurpose courts, an elevated jogging track, four racket ball courts and a 12,000 square foot conditioning room. We're also going to have a climbing wall." Lee said.

The cost for the Seaton Center Expansion Project is fairly high, but according to Pieratt, is a necessity for the new recreation center to meet the standards that they want.

"The estimated cost for the project is \$15,350,000," said Pieratt.
Funding for the project is made possible through a tuition increase that will go into effect just before the Seaton Center addition will be operational.

"SGA voted for a fifty dollar per semester increase in tuition for the recreation center. The increase will not start until Fall 2001," Lee said.

The new recreation center will be built as an addition to the existing Seaton Center, and the construction should not impose itself.

Even though construction doesn't begin until August, and a tuition increase will af-fect the students who use the facility. Pieratt and Lee are confident that the finished recre-ation facility will definitely be worth it for students.



The construction on the new Seaton Center will be an addition on the already existing recreation facility located on University Drive. The construction is slated to begin in August, and will be open in the Spring of 2002. A slight fultion increase will go into effect just before the opening of the new facility in the Fail 2001, to pay for the \$15,350,000 project.

The father of former UK basketball player Nazr Mohammed was found dead at his auto parts business in what police say is a homicide. The body of Alhaji Mohammed was found Monday night in his store on Chicago's South Side, Sgt. Bernard Ryan said. Police say the 55-year-old man died of apparent blunt force trauma. The medical examiner's office ruled the death a homicide.

Concorde: Delayed for maintenance

GONESSE, France —The Air France Concorde plane that crashed and killed 113 people during takeoff had been delayed for last minute maintenance on one of its engines. Air France said yesterday as its fleet of supersonic jets was indefinitely grounded. British Airways canceled its two night flights yesterday, but resumed Concorde service yesterday between New York and London after completing safety checks. The toll on the ground could have been much worse. 45 Polish tourists who were staying at a Gonesse hotel had left earlier to go sightseeing. They returned after the crash to find an inferno where their hotel once stood.

Cubans protest U.S. embargo

HAVANA — Hundreds of thousands of people streamed into Old Havana park on foot and by bus before sunrise yesterday for a march to demand an end to the U.S. trade embargo against the communist nation. Huge red, white and blue Cuban flags dangled over the narrow streets of historic Old Havana, where up to I million people are expected to gather for the protest. The march coincides with the 47th anniversary of the attack on army barracks by Fidel Castro and his comrades that launched the Cuban Revolution. The rebels seized power six year later, on New Year's Day in 1959.

WASHINGTON — Buoyed by two major Israeli concessions, the Clinton administration is reopening negotiations today between Israel and the Palestinan Authority. Next weekend, President Clinton will try personal diplomacy with Syrian President Hafez Assad in a parallel bid for a second Mideast accord. Announcing he would meet Sunday with Assad in Geneva, Clinton said in Dhaka, Bangladesh, "I don't want to unduly raise expectations, but I think this is an appropriate thing for me to do to try to get this back on track." The Israeli-Palestinian talks will begin without Clinton, who has interceded in previous sessions in Washington.

Dental duo teach how to ease fear

No more tears: Dr. Raybould and Dr. Smith have a unique way of treating their patients

Students enrolled in the College of Dentistry at UK have a different example to follow.

Instead of worrying about those paranoid and freaked out patients, they now have an alternative to learn for soothing their patient's

paranoia.

Todd Ratliff, a second year graduate student in the College of Dentistry, fears the day he consults a patient who is terrified of the dentist, but believes a course in patient treatment will drill away his anxi-

treatment will drill away his anxiety.

Ratliff, like many other dential students, attends a college that can not only teach him about dentistry, but can help him learn the best ways to manage patients who suffer from "dentaphobia."

With the work of Dr. Ted Raybould, a professor of adult special patient care at UK, and Dr. Tim Smith, a professor of adult special patient care at UK, and Dr. Tim Smith, a professor of behavioral science at the College of Dentistry, Ratliff cels confident about cooperating with those terrified patients.

"I've not had Dr. Raybould in May and Smith have wred together for years to conquer the fears of many patients. To

class but I know that he's really good with patients," Ratliff said. "I am a little fearful, but I think we're in a transition period. Dentistry now is going into an era where you shouldn't feel anything. The only thing (a dentist) has to worry about is the people afraid of needles."

Raybould understands the dif-ference between the types of pa-tients you see in medical school in relation to those you see in the office.

"I am the director of general practice at the College of Dentistry. The role of general practice residency is to take licensed dentists and train them on how to manage types of patients that they don't see in medical school," Raybould said.

Raybould explained how a medical student could make it through the entire program of dentistry, but fail to experience the nightmare of a fearful patient.
"One aspect (that I teach) is

"Very few people like to come to the dentist, but some people have developed true phobias. They can make the appointment, but they can't manage to show up. Some people are so afraid that we have to take them to the operating room," Raybould said.

In order to help these patients, Raybould and Smith practice a different type of treatment. Instead of a typical visit to the dentist office, their patients have the opportunity to become educated, as well as involved with their treatment.

"We are helping them overcome their fear," Raybould said. "We decide at the first appointment tow they want to get the work done. We proceed as they make the decisions allowing them to stop at any point along the way."

Smith believes tha allowing the patient to control the situation definitely shows in the final results.

Crash kills 109 onboard; 4 on ground

GONESSE. France — An France Concorde took off had been repaired at the capital's insistence just before the flight began, officials said Wednesday.

As the plane flew low over the airport, an air traffic controller saw the flames shooting from the newly repaired engine and quickly alerted Capt. Christian Marty, but the pilot's frantic, last-ditch attempts at an emergency landing were in vain. Moments later, the supersonic jet crashed in a huge freball, killing 109 people on board and four on the ground.

Relatives of the victims, mainly German lourists, began arriving in

Senot, who is in charge of the crash investigation, said the control tower alerted Capt. Marty that the back of the plane was on fire 58 seconds after takeoff. The pilot replied that he had engine trouble, at which point the flames were rapidly growing, France 2 television quoted Senot as saying. Marty said he was trying to reach Le Bourget, a nearby airport. "It is during this looping maneuver that the aircraft crashed on the hotel in Gonesse," France 2 quoted Senot as saying. Although the required piece was not available, the plane was cleared for departure because it still met manufacturer's safety requirements. Air France said. The captain, however, ordered the part replaced before he would take off, the statement said.

Workers made the repair using a part from a backup Concorde, the airline said. It did not say whether the last-

minute repair could have been related to the catastrophe.

The Ministry of Transportation said the two recorders were damaged but had been found.

The Concorde had a perfect safety record during 31 years of service until Tuesday's disaster. All 100 passengers and nine crew members died just minutes after takeoff from Charles de Gaulle airport.

Four people on the ground also were killed, and 12 people were rushed out of Hotelissimo, the hotel that was hit.

Ninety-six of the passengers on board the Concorde

were from Germany - 13 from the town of Moenchengladbach, on the border with the Netherlands. There were also two Danes, one Austrian and one American. The American, identified by the State Department as 65-year-old Christopher Behrens, was a retired Air France employee who was living in Germany.

The crash did not appear to be linked to cracks found recently in both British Airways and Air France Concordes.

The Concorde, which fisted with 1960, has been considered among the world's safest planes.

Students have little to worry about with revisions

The Council for Postseondary Education (C.P.E.) released reports nationwide to
universities as a preliminary to assess
their degree programs. Though many universities found themselves ending several
degree programs. UK officials said that students have little to worry about.

Shirley Raines, the dean of education
and vice chancellor of academic services,
said that the C.P.E. looks at graduation
rates routinely to decide if a program
needs to be discontinued or changed in
some way.

"This is only an alert that programs are going to be discontinued. It's too early for students to worry," Raines said.

Raines said that after the reports have

een reviewed, Chancellor Elisabeth inser would be responsible for working ith the deans and department chairs of e colleges to decide if a program should e discontinued.

oe assontinued.
Raines said the reason for a review is
that some degree programs have a very
low enrollment, and some don't have any
students enrolled. In fact, some programs
without any students enrolled are already
in review.

in review.
"Some programs need to be discontinued because they don't have enrollment or have low productivity. It will be the dear's responsibility to work with the department heads and student representatives to see what to do with them," she said.

lows universities to discontinue degree programs, however the law requires that those students enrolled have the opportunity to graduate with that degree.

"The students enrolled in the program could finish," she said. "The college would reassign faculty, and the dean would work with the program to make sure students graduate."

The reports affect all colleges at UK, but the graduate programs, not the undergraduate programs, are facing the major changes.

changes.
"Depending on the program, the faculty will certainly be affected—they could be reassigned," Raines said. "But if it is a program where faculty members have very few students, they probably have already been teaching other areas."

Napster may lose, but online music here to stay

SAN FRANCISCO — Napster Inc., the small company that has used the Internet and digital technology to revolutionize music distribution, could see its death warrant signed by a federal judge.

The Recording Industry Association of America is seeking a temporary injunction that would all but put Napster out of business pending a trial over whether the San Mateo-based company is violating copyright law.

The hearing was scheduled to begin swapp

Napster works as a clearinghouse pointing users to computers where songs in the popular MP3 format can be downloaded. The industry considers itself in a life-or-death struggle with a software startup that has made music piracy simple.

The company is daily conversation grist among young people who use it with a vengeance, but it has also prompted congressional hearings and caused considerable angst in corporate boardrooms.

It is unclear whether internet music fileswapping is so bad for the music industry af-

ter all.

A recent study of more than 2,200 online music fans by Jupiter Communications suggests that users of Napster and other music-sharing programs are 45 percent more likely to increase their music purchasing than fans who aren't trading digital bootlegs online.

The recording industry says the Napster case isn't about alienating music lovers, but rather about protecting artists.
