ABOVE AND BEYOND ...

Paul Willis recently received a copy of this letter addressed to Dean Timothy Sineath of the College of Library and Information Science, dated August 10, 1987.

Dean Sineath:

Having recently completed a one year Assistantship at the Agriculture Library. I would like to take this opportunity to state precisely how beneficial that experience was to me.

The Agriculture Library actively supports the research, teaching, and extension work of the College of Agriculture. The Assistantship was designed to expose graduate students to all aspects of librarianship and the integral workings of a research library. Graduate Assistants are required to keep the library open during peak evening hours and weekends during which time they are responsible for circulation, reference, and servicing the various collections. Hours worked during the regular business day are spent in technical services. Assistants have the opportunity to work with OCLC and the LS2000 as well as the documentation which supports the two systems. Practical experience is gained in searching the databases, cataloging, and serials control. The Assistantship is rounded out with a weekly seminar in which various topics such as reference tools, budgets, planning, staffing, or future considerations are considerations are discussed.

Working in both public and technical services provides the Assistants with the opportunity to develop their interest within the profession. Once a student has expressed an interest in an area, Toni

Powell and Lillian Mesner, in conjunction with the staff, work with the Assistant to design a project to develop that concern. An example of this is a project which was designed for me working with UKM records after I had expressed a deficiency in working with classification schemes and subject headings. The project allowed me not only to complete British cataloging records but to verify LC classification and subject headings.

The Assistantship has proven invaluable to me. It has enabled me to apply theory learned in the classroom to a working situation as well as provide me with practical experience. Through my Assistantship at the Agriculture Library, I have gained the confidence necessary to pursue my professional career as a Cataloging Librarian at the New York Public Library.

GUIDE TO RESEARCH SUPPORT AVAILABLE THROUGH THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

The new guide for research support available through the Graduate School outlines steps and procedures necessary in order to obtain funds. The following basic rules apply:

- Each request must be related directly to a specific research project.
- 2. Any full-time faculty member is eligible to apply. Visiting and adjunct faculty and generally not eligible.
- Funds are not intended for long-term support of ongoing research.
- 4. Awards seldom exceed \$5,000.
- 5. Deadlines for receipt of application for regular grants for the FY1987-88 are October 1, 1987 and
- March 1, 1988.

 6. Proposals requesting less than \$600 (exclusive of equipment) have no deadline. Such proposals, termed Minigrants, may be submitted at any time and will be reviewed promptly.

1988 NEH SUMMER STIPEND PROGRAMS

The 1988 Summer Stipend Program of the National Endowment for the Humanities has been recently announced. Each year, the NEH awards several hundred summer research stipends to university faculty. Both junior and senior faculty members are eligible for the program. The NEH not only considers projects in the traditional humanities disciplines but also funds projects in the social sciences and law that have humanistic content or focus. The stipend is \$3,500 for two months of summer research.

Over the past decade, twelve UK faculty members' proposals have been funded by the NEH summer stipend program. Dr. Jonathan Glixon, Department of Music, held a 1987 summer

stipend.

This year, the University will nominate three proposals for the national competition. Faculty are encouraged to apply.

Before applying, applicants should pick up a copy of the 1988 application guidelines from the office of David C. Johnson, Acting Associate Dean, College of Arts & Sciences, Room 271 Patterson Office Tower.

Interested faculty should submit a proposal and a curriculum vitae to Dean Johnson's office by Thursday, September 17, 1987. The proposal should follow the application guidelines and should be written to appeal to educated nonspecialists.
