My Dear Mother

As well as I recollect my last
letter written at New Haven was directed to Pa and
if such be the fact, - you are of course entitled to this
one, I have just finished a long letter to Sam giving
him a scolding for not having written, I wrote to
Sister immediately on my arrival in New York
but have not had a word in reply yet, I think I have
good cause to complain of you and Pa, for
surely a letter has had time to come from
Kentucky since I wrote him, If I do not hear soon
from you, I shall imagine, that some of you are
sick, so let me hear from you, that my fears may
be at rest, - We spent some three weeks in New Haven
very pleasantly, - I formed some agreeable acquaintances
while there, and was almost loth to come away, - it is
a beautiful city, and plenty of good milk and butter
almost equal to that of Kentucky, - but not quite, when we
returned to New York we only staid two days, before
coming to this place, Mrs. Smith of Northwich is here
under medical treatment, she is Mr. Magan's Cousin
with whom we staid and of whom you have heard
me talk so much, she induced us to come on some
